In the early 70's Dick Spees collaborated with Ron Dellums and UC Berkeley School of Education to win an \$8 million Department of Labor grant to reorganize McClymonds High School Curriculum. As part of a 30-year effort, Dick served as the lead to build the new Chabot Space & Science Center, forming the Joint Powers Authority of the Oakland Public Schools, City of Oakland and the East Bay Regional Park District. He established a distinguished Board, served as Founding chair and raised funds to build the \$80-million facility.

Jean Spees began her long history as a leader with Oakland Public Schools as PTA Chair at Joaquin Miller School in 1968. Two years later Jean co-founded the National Education Film Festival with her husband. Today it is the largest organization of its kind in the United States tasked with viewing and judging educational films Jean served on its Board for 30 years.

Mr. Spees said what this award means is a commitment on our part that we have to keep on working. He said we are happy to do that. Public education is the most important thing we have in our lives. Our four children went through these institutions and did remarkably well. All four went on to earn undergraduate and graduate degrees. Education here is great. All we have to do is take advantage of it and continue to build upon our base. Mr. Spees thanked the Board for the award.

Mrs. Spees said working with students at any age is a privilege for her and she wished that everyone would make an effort to volunteer and participate. Volunteering is most gratifying and has made her life much richer.

Colonel James Madison was able to promote and graduate in 2007 West Point's first African American Skyline graduate, Jerry Vernado. Thanks to the supervision and inspiration of Col. Madison, 95% of ROTC graduating seniors has matriculated to 2 or 4 year colleges since 1993. A number of these graduates have entered the U.S. Armed Forces with scholarship grants of \$12,000-\$50,000 each. Skyline was the first Oakland Public School to successfully nominate students for early and direct admission into West Point. Skyline's ROTC Program has consistently earned the rating of "honor unit with distinction," the highest rating granted by the U.S. Army Cadet Command.

Col. Madison said a few years ago he was teaching at the military academy at West Point and everything was beautiful. He said, "one day I realized that I was training and working with students who were already successful. I then decided I needed to go back to the high school level and help move students from this level up to that level." He said he is proud of the District's motto "Expect Success" and the creation of the 9th grade academy, the Atlas House, to make sure every student has the opportunity to be successful.

Student Director Eric Adams reported that All City Council's has been going to different schools trying to establish focus groups which they are still gathering information on and trying to implement.

"We had our Middle School All City Council Leadership Meeting last Tuesday and there were 70 youth from five different schools. We had an excellent workshop about identities.

We had our first meeting for the A-G Implementation Committee last Tuesday and it was a very informative meeting. Since that meeting All City Council has met and decided they wanted to be more involved and have more students on the different committees. We are encouraging the students and student leadership to come to the meetings and give us your feedback."

Public Comments on All Non-Agenda Items Within the Subject Matter Jurisdiction of the District - Board of Education - September 23, 2009.

Oscar Wright, Oakland Resident, noted one of his sons graduated from Skyline High School. Mr. Wright said he had a tough time keeping his son in the GATE classes. He has

been a successful businessman for a number of years. Mr. Wright said he attended the Black College Exhibition last Thursday in Hunter Hall of the Administration Building. He said there were a large number of Black Colleges being represented and a lot of young people attended the event trying to get into college. Mr. Wright said there were twice as many young ladies as there were young men. He said we have to do something better. He said we have the right Superintendent now; let's make a difference now.

Sharlette Rodgers, Food Service Manager, said a lot more is being added to them. She said in order to provide the work for them "we need a raise. We have not received a raise in over 12 years." She said more and more is being introduced to them. They are adding a salad bar. We want the children to learn how to eat healthy; but when we don't have the help to do it, it's not going to work. She said you have these vendors outside the schools who are not selling healthy stuff; food that has been on the carts all day long; selling candy; that's not being healthy. We have these new supervisors coming in getting paid. We're not getting a raise. She asked how are they getting paid, grants? She said get a grant to pay us. We are the ones that the children see. Ms. Rodgers said she wanted to thank Ms. McDonald, the principal at Franklin Elementary School, for allowing her and her staff to work and try to make this happen at her site.

Felicia Aubrey, Chief Steward with ASFME and Food Service Manager at Skyline, said she agrees with Ms. Rodgers and she takes it a step further. She said Jennifer has come to them saying "we want to find ways to make the difference in the money." She said we understand that people are tired of hearing that. She said there is also some money every year that goes into the General Fund and we were told it was \$500,000 but it never comes back to our department. We would like for someone to look into it. We have to protect our workers because that is becoming a problem. She said we had a student who broke out the window in the cafeteria, choked an employee, and everyday there's another incident. What we are asking the District is to show the same consideration and concern for the employees as we do for the children. She said we brought it to the attention of Labor Relations, the department head and she just wanted to bring it to the Board.

Claudette Roberts, Skyline employee, said she enjoys working at Skyline and with children. She said she was attacked by one of the students. She said the student choked her because he wanted her lunch, but he already had lunch. She said, "I came to work the next day because I like working with children. I go to the doctor and I receive therapy." She said they still want her to work with that same child everyday and he still continues to do what he wants to do. He wants to have his way. She said if he sees someone else having lunch, he wants there lunch too. She said he has fits in the classroom and nobody can control him; there are no men(adults) in the classroom, all women.

Thelma Vazquez, Aide to the Handicap at Skyline, said since the first week of school they have had to deal with violent students being sent to their classroom and/or coming undocumented. She said the kids are biting, kicking, scratching, hitting and I consider it sexually harassing us because we are in a classroom and all the adults are female. She said we have males in the classroom who think it is nothing to grab our breasts or touch our bodies and nobody thinks this is a problem. She said she has a family to go home to and take care of and she should not have to worry about being bitten, scratched or kicked which could cause me to be maimed, call Workmen's Comp and be off work. She said, "I think if I am to provide a safe environment for my students, the District needs to provide a safe environment for me to work in." She said Special Education "likes to put band aids on

things, but I think it is rude of them when we raise expectation that there are no expectations of them."

Cristine Ford, Chief Steward for AFSME, said she has been off work since March, and just recently started getting back into work because of medical issues. As I returned, I received calls about students who have violent behaviors. I met with labor management and I have gotten calls about being transferred without knowledge. She said some of the transfers are refused because they say they are under staffed. She said regarding the violence of the students, she said she heard some students like to jump out the windows and one recently attacked the teacher at this site. The same students have to go into classrooms with regular education students and teachers. She said she is asking that the Board look at this and try to change and come up with a solution that we all can be safe.

J. Report of Regular Board Members

Director Hodge reported on the Breath Mobile event that took place at Anna Yates School in Emeryville. The Breath Mobile was being unveiled to serve children who have asthma and respiratory issues. Director Hodge said she talked to Dr. Burns and we will have a Breath Mobile that will be stationed at Prescott Elementary School and perhaps at other schools throughout the District. We are trying to find the right language to speak to how do we get the best academic results inside of our schools and what does that mean around reform and redesign. She said she is planning to do some work the first week in October to make sure there is a dialogue and discussion among staff, community members and educators in West Oakland.

Director Dobbins reported that tomorrow night is Back to School Night at Skyline. He attended Parker's Back to School Night last week and said the principal did a great job as usual. Director Dobbins said he liked the idea of having pot luck on the playground with the families and community. Last Wednesday morning we had a great PTA meeting at Webster Academy noting the meeting was packed. Director Dobbins thanked Lynne Rodezno for getting the Child Development Center opened at Bridges@ Melrose School. On October 3rd the OAL will honor Rickey Henderson at Oakland Tech at 9:30a.m. On the same day State Treasurer John Chung will speak at a workshop in Oakland and he is looking for events to go to on that day. Director Dobbins reported the top three most improved schools were in District 6, schools that traditionally have not done well and he wants to recognize them - Futures Elementary, East Oakland Pride (Webster) and Burckhalter Elementary.

Vice President Yee reported the first College Planning Council had a meeting last week and the Superintendent was in attendance. Vice President Yee said he appreciated Director Dobbins focusing on the instructional improvement in our schools. Vice President Yee noted in District 4 there are 15 schools and for the first time every school showed gains in Reading and Math over a two year period and he congratulated the staff, parents and students. He said when he visits the schools for Back to School Night they talk about not just the test score gains but what is the effective teaching practice that resulted in these gains.

Director London reported Art Esteem is having their annual art exhibit called Inspiring Imagination on Saturday from 1:30 p.m.-4:30 p.m. Oakland Parents Together is having an

Open House to celebrate their new headquarters off Grand Avenue. Piedmont Avenue School is having a Bar-B-Que from 11:00a.m.-2:00p.m. September 30th she is hosting a Town Hall Meeting with Superintendent Smith starting at 7:00p.m. at Oakland International High School.

Director Kakishiba requested the Board hold a Special Board Meeting on December 9th focused on (1) Review and adoption of the 2009-2010 First Interim Budget Report; (2) First Full Board Budget Development Workshop for the 2010-2011 fiscal school year. Director Kakishiba said he met with a group of parents and he said he was interviewed by a number of parents from District 2 Schools about the Food Services Department. He said what was represented to him was those dollars are close to \$500,000 that is being accounted for in our General Fund but is not going specifically to the Food Services Department. Director Kakishiba wanted clarification if it was true. Director Kakishiba wanted clarification on the department's contribution to repaying the state loan or is that contribution to fulfilling the deficit by the department up to 2003. He said he wanted to know was there money that could be freed up for improving and enhancing Food Services. Director Kakishiba reported that he attended at two-day workshop sponsored by the cities, counties, and school districts about reform initiatives around the state budget and state finance. He said it was a quick educational and deliberation about the potential State Measures and the potential State Constitutional Convention within the next year and encouraged the Intergovernmental Relations Committee to take a look at this because these matters will be on the state ballot in June and November.

Director Spearman reported she attended a at meeting on the Stonehurst Campus and talked about the nutrition issue and the same things were brought up that Director Kakishiba mentioned. She said she had a different take on it because she knows the Food Services Department is not paying back the loan. None of the money coming out of Food Services should be going to pay back the loan. She said it was a good meeting and one of the things that came out of the meeting was people complained about the food. She said the prepared food we get from one of our vendors is lousy. She said she would not eat; and does not know why we make our children eat it and said the talked with the Superintendent about this. We need to assure our parents that there is conversation and action being taken on what to do. We had a meeting with the Sobrante Homeowners Association about doing something in Sobrante Park. There also was a meeting with Councilmember Larry Reid, Superintendent Smith and Tim White and we came to some agreements about some things we need to do with our schools. Director Spearman said she attended the Historical Black College event and she said the turnout was tremendous. She also attended Rise Elementary School Back to School Night and attended some events at Thurgood Marshall Elementary.

President Gallo recognized all the schools, the students and their parents for the recent test scores. He said we are not where we want to be, we are not where we should be, but it's a big difference from where used to be. He said we are making a lot of progress and we are going in the right direction. It is going to take all of to come together. President Gallo said the world does not have any borders anymore when they compete, it's invisible. He said for our children we need to provide the best opportunity, the best instruction, and the best technology to give them a decent chance to compete. The children in Oakland deserve no less. President Gallo told the public and the television viewing audience that the Board will come back with engagement sessions asking you for your advice; what are your brightest ideas to keep this District solvent; to keep our teachers working in a positive environment. He said recognizing our children should always be a priority and the other

loyalty we have forgotten is with our seniors.

Director Kakishiba presented this item to the Board for approval. He said this was staff's recommended action of Operational Expectation 08, Financial Administration. He said the report, with some revisions that are included in the document, passed unanimously from the Finance Committee and we are recommending approval from the full Board. Director Kakishiba highlighted on page 1, the policy, in the evidence of compliance around accurately documenting student enrollment and attendance. One evidence of compliance is a quarterly report conducted by the Internal Auditor who is a direct report to the Board. There is a heavy emphasis on financial management of school budgets in the policy and the citizens committees where we have received a lot of complaints about the functional quality of the committees. This policy states each of the committee will evaluate two times a year about whether or not staff is providing sufficient and adequate information and support to the committee for them to fulfill their work.

Board Comments

Director London said it is crucial that we respect people when they come in as volunteers to serve and that we set up some standard operating procedures across advisory committees of how we are going to interact with these volunteers. She said we might want

to look at the by-laws of each of these committees and make sure they have some key elements that we believe should be relevant to each one.

Brad Stam, Chief Academic Officer, presented Part II of the 2008-2009 Student Achievement results to the Board. He said at the last Board meeting he presented the California Standards Test results for grades 2 through 11 in English Language Art and Math; Science and History for grades 5, 8, 10, and 11 as well as the California Exit Exam results for grades 10, 11 and 12. He said the news overall was positive with substantial increases in students scoring at proficient and advanced in grades 2 through 7 in both English Language Arts and Math. All student sub-groups increased in proficiency with the exception of Native American Students in Math. We narrowed the achievement gap modestly but not at the pace that we need to. Our high school results were mixed for Both CST and CAHSEE. We know that our focus needs to remain and be re-doubled on high school as a whole and on the progress of our African American and Latino students across K-12. He said tonight he would review the Federal, State, Federal and District accountability systems. Mr. Stam began the PowerPoint Presentation. He said we operate with three levels of accountability; Federal Accountability - Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP)State Accountability - Academic Performance Index (API) and the District Accountability - Tiers (Blue, Green, Yellow, Orange, and Red).

The AYP is a series of annual academic performance schools established for each school district in the state as a whole. School districts in the state have met AYP if they meet or

exceed each year's goals. He said there are 46 AYP criteria and 44 apply to OUSD. OUSD must make all 44 criteria in order for it to be considered having made AYP as a school district. He said this was difficult to do as the AYP benchmark continues to go up. While performance improved for all groups, only four groups made the AYP target of 45% for English Language Arts; the American Indian, Asian, Filipino and White sub groups. Our performance parallels the state's performance where African American and Latino Social Economically Disadvantaged English Learner students with disabilities also did not make AYP at a state level. The target will go up next year to 56% and will accelerate up to 100% in 2013-2014 if the Federal Government keeps it current process under No Child Left Behind. In Math while performance improved for all sub groups this year only four sub groups made the AYP target of 45.5% in Math; American Indian, Asian, Filipino and White sub groups. Statewide African American and Latino and Social Economic Disadvantaged did not make AYP. Because we did not make AYP in all 44 criteria, we are in Program Improvement as a school district along with the majority of school districts in California. It will be up to the State Board of Education to decide what measure we will need to take as a Program Improvement District to raise student achievement.

The State Accountability is the Academic Performance Index (API). The API is a single number, ranging from a low of 200 to a high of 1000 that reflects a school's or school district's performance level, based on the results of statewide testing. Its purpose is to measure the academic performance focusing on the growth of schools. The API target for California is 800. Our overall growth was 19 points compared to the state growth of 14 points. African American students showed a 20 point growth; American Indian doubled the state; Asian Students at 807 API; almost doubled with Filipino students and somewhat better with Latino students; and Pacific Islanders almost tripled their performance. He said there was a lot of good news with API. We're not moving at a rate as fast as we need to. From 2004-2007 we showed the highest API growth of 57 points.

District Accountability: Tiered Accountability & Support Framework. In order to accelerate achievement in every school, OUSD must differentiate the supports and interventions provided based on where schools currently exist along the continuum from needing intervention to having demonstrated a capacity to accelerate achievement. This differentiation also allows for innovation while increasing accountability across the system. There are three sets of criteria: 1) Absolute Performance; 2) Accelerated Student Level Growth; 3) Closing the Achievement Gap. Mr. Stam reported the schools that had the highest API gains the top three elementary schools were in District 6.

Board Comments

Director Kakishiba asked Mr. Stam in terms of the Tier System, were the measures the CST? Mr. Stam said "Yes." Mr. Stam said you have to be moving children all across the band so the students who are Far Below and Below Basic need to be moving up as well as the students who are moving into Proficient and Advanced. For the achievement gap the API distance between the lowest performing sub-group and the schools API. The lowest performing sub-group has to be above a certain number for the school to get credit and it has to be closing it at a rate greater than 15% to get credit. Director Kakishiba said this did not capture the results policies around academics. He said graduation is not a factor for high schools. Director Kakishiba asked if including the graduation rates in the high schools and algebra proficiency were important things to have in the Tier System. Mr. Stam said "he believes so." He said there are other indicators as well that we may be

looking at. Director Kakishiba said because we have these three different assessment frameworks, and we get paid by the Federal Government and the State, going forward are we going to use the District framework more as the point where we are going to apply more pressure and provide more support to more schools.

Dr. Smith said as long as this is the system that our schools and District is held accountable for we are going to use it. He said we are going to augment the way we are going to support and evaluate schools. He said as long as this is the system we are held accountable for there's a whole infrastructure in the state and in the United States around compliance and he said we have to dot our I's and cross our T's in the existing system while we have these other conversations. Dr. Smith said we have to improve performance across the board for all of our students.

Student Director Adams had some follow-up questions. He asked had there had been any conversation around using a test that wasn't written in the way the CST's were? He said from him taking them not too long ago, he can say they are not written in a way a lot of students are used to hearing or even possibly might understand. He said he believes in the piece on keeping students in school; on matriculation or how we come to classes with them; how we speak to them and how we engage them; and vocabulary that we use.

Mr. Stam said Oakland has been a leader in trying to expand the kinds of assessments students work with. He said a good example is our writing assessments we have in all grade levels where you examine primary source materials and develop a thesis supported with evidence from the materials. He said those are the kinds of skills students will need to demonstrate in college.

Vice President Yee said an assessment policy based upon compliance that measures using CST whether or not a school is Program Improvement or successful. He said if you looked at the CST scores of our high school students they are in single digits in some of the high schools. He said it's no wonder when a student enters high school how important is it that the CST scores for the school does not reflect their professional growth that's occurring in the school. He said that is the system we have and we don't have the luxury of changing the system. Vice President Yee said what he liked about the last half of Mr. Stam's presentation around changing the Tiering Strategy is that it focuses the question of what kinds of services should we be providing to schools and whether the old system or the new system more accurately reflects the way we want to differentiate our intention to those schools. He said his point of view it is not necessarily a different way of punishing or rewarding a school, it's a different way of distributing our resources. Vice President Yee said identifying the three results policies of reading in elementary school, math in middle school and graduating he said he would caution us from identifying only reading at third grade, algebra at ninth grade and graduation/ready to learn as the metrics we are going to use to measure progress in those areas.

Director Hodge said one of the dialogues that happened during a Teaching and Learning Committee Meeting was looking at the high school test scores and recognizing there are other realities happening for high school students. We talked about this was not a high stakes test for high school students. The high stakes test for high school students are the CAHSEE, SAT, ACT and getting themselves prepared for a vocational test to go into vocational school. Director Hodge said this is a piece of marketing and little bit of public relations looking at how we talk about this CST with high school students. How can we get

them invested in it? Perhaps they can do well and can show their strengths and wisdom. Right now it is not important to them, it is more important to us to have them do well. Director Hodge asked Mr. Stam to talk about technology in the strategy. Mr. Stam said he was not pleased with the state of instructional technology in the District. He said he feels it's an area of under investment and we have not had sufficient professional development for teachers. There are some exciting examples of schools that have tackled this and trying to make it a part of their school's strategy. He said in the area of self paced learning and independent learning there are a lot of opportunities for technology. He said on-line communities, Wickies, and Blogs are great opportunities for writing with technology as well.

Public Comments

Betty Olson-Jones, OEA, said she is extremely happy to see any movement away from a system that has been designed to fail for years, meaning No Child Left Behind. She said she is happy to see we are looking more at a growth model. She said she is hardened by some of the comments made tonight talking about things other than test scores. We are looking at things like keeping students in school. How do we engage students? How do we engage teachers? How do we get away measuring everything through that one lens. Ms. Olson-Jones said she knows there is a place for test scores, but it not the place they have been given, the Holy Grail, where everything else gets shoved to the side. Ms. Olson-Jones said she wanted to add a few more criteria that she hopes we will develop better measures for. 1) Building community; how do we measure school climate; how do students, parents, and teachers measure it. 2) How do we look at teacher's developing professional development and having more autonomy in making the formative assessment so that teachers don't look at the next thing that comes down as yet one more thing I have to do.

Jim Mordecai commented on technology and talked about concerns there isn't enough money in the District that is being spent on technology. He said we are in the state of California which is near the bottom. When you say there is not enough money in technology he said you could say this in every other area. This is what you are faced with when you don't have the resources to deal with it. He said you are going to dust yourself off and try to continue and he said he appreciates that attitude because that is the only attitude you can have otherwise you just have to give up.

Lashica Crawford, Executive Director for Moving Forward Education, thanked Mr. Stam for his report saying the report was right on and it really explained in very good terms what the direction of Oakland Unified School District needs to be. She commented on the social emotional piece and how important that is. When you talk about pushing out African American and Latino students we're ultimately talking about the creation of a school to prison pipeline. If these children are not in school they are in prison and we need to do something about that. She said growing up in San Francisco, one of the things that helped her was social/emotional; having supportive mentors that guided me; having that welcoming school environment. She said it did not translate into exemplary test scores for her; but it get her a Ph.D. She said as you see the test scores go up you will also see our students enjoying school more. They have more positive relationships with their teachers. They have more mentors. They have more support from their parents. Their self esteem is higher.

General Counsel Jacqueline Minor stated she did not have any specific questions for Board Members. She said the documents as she understands came out of committee. She said there is a question whether Finance and Human Resources approved the Operational Expectation 08 that's attached to the packet. Ms. Minor said we believe the version that is in the packet coincides with the official copy that's on the Board's website and was attached to the agenda for the meeting on September 14th. Director Kakishiba has indicated to us that maybe we have the wrong version.

Director Kakishiba, Chairperson for the Finance and Human Resources Committee, made a specific recommendation that is a little different than what's presented in the packet. Director Kakishiba said on OE-06 Personnel Administration, the committee recommends what's included in the Superintendent's evaluation are only three items out of the seven items.

Number Two - Insure that every school has a principal who is an effective, strategic, instructional, and organizational leader.

Number Three - Increase retention of committed and caring teachers at every school, especially at low performing schools that have high teacher turnover.

Number Seven - Maintain financially sustainable compensation practices that successfully attract, retain, and support effective employees.

Director Kakishiba said we are recommending OE-07 and OE-08 in their entirety; Financial Planning and Financial Administration. He said since we just got out of state receivership and we have a new Superintendent, fiscal solvency is a high priority. He said what the General Counsel was pointing to was what was posted in previous agendas and on the website for OE-08 is the incorrect document and it is not the document we just acted upon in terms of the interpretation. He said what we acted upon tonight is the correct OE-08. Mr. Rakestraw said the modification in terms of the monitoring report language is also effectively an amendment of that policy. He said in order to correct what is being said in the combination monitoring report and the change of the language also effectively amends the policy and we have to record it that way because the two were mixed.

Vice President Yee, Chair of the Teaching and Learning Committee, said this committee has the same difficulty because the OE-11 that is in our document is the old OE-11. He said in the Teaching and Learning Committee we proposed a revision of that OE to make it more strategic and less operational. He said the OE-11 that General Counsel Minor attached is the proposed revision of OE-11 not the one that is attached. It would be tied to the Superintendent's evaluation not the original OE-11. The recommendation to move forward with a simplified OE-11. Vice President Yee proposed in spirit we look at the first two pages of OE-11. He said we think this OE is more reflective of it. General Counsel Minor said Teaching and Learning restated OE-11 and we attempted to capture that starting at the bottom of the first page that's stapled We appended the original OE-11 merely so that the entire Board would have it in front of them the changes that are reflected between what was adopted by the committee and the OE as it was adopted by the Board. Vice President Yee said that was exactly right. He said what remains to be done is just the same as Director Kakishiba mentioned. The Superintendent and his staff will have to write the interpretations of the OE. OE-1. items 1, 2, 3, and 4 will have those operational interpretations built into them. The operational interpretations will lead to the rubric around the evaluation.

Director London said in the Facilities Committee Meeting last week it was discussed that we still need to amend OE-10 and we were going to do it at the next meeting. Director London asked would they be able to include the amendment of OE-10 in the evaluation or are we locked into the language if we amend the OE. President Gallo asked General Counsel to respond. General Counsel Minor said the technical legal answer that the OE's as you approved them today for purposes of the Superintendent's contract is what the Superintendent's evaluation will be based on. She said the Superintendent's contract is a contract and the parties can mutually agree to modify any contract as long as it is a mutual agreement. Provided the Board and Superintendent concur that the revisions to OE-10 for Facilities should be incorporated into his contract, it's permissible. President Gallo asked the Superintendent if he was fine with that and the Superintendent replied "Yes."

Director Kakishiba said it sounds like a number of OE's if they are being revised they have not been adopted by the Board. He said he is concerned that if we adopt the old language, which is in the agenda that is what we are adopting. He said if we go through the process

of revising which will take four to six weeks, are we still within the time frame to be able to fulfill the contract. General Counsel Minor said if the parties mutually agree to modifications to include the revised OE's and modifications to extend the time period to finalize the OE's it permissible. Director Kakishiba asked if the Board would have to take action again. General Counsel Minor said the Board would have to take action to finalize the approval of the OE's and once that happens the Superintendent would concur, we would do a quick modification to his contract and we would be set. Director Kakishiba said ok.

Director Dobbins, Chair of the Facilities Committee, said at the Facilities Meeting the Committee they did discuss that they wanted to amend OE-10 to include a Water and Energy Policy for the District and a Green Building Policy.

Director Hodge said to be mindful of the deadlines we are talking about; October 1st to be able to have the evaluation in the conversation and some agreement with the Superintendent and April 15th is when the evaluation is taking place. She said in the spirit of things we are not shifting in a huge way when we talk about some of the revisions.

Director Dobbins moved to approve with the amendments to OE-10 and Director London seconded the motion. Director Kakishiba wanted to know if the vote was to accept the amendment or to include all of the policies as part of the Superintendent's evaluation. President Gallo said it was the policies with the amendments on Facilities. Director

London withdrew her second on the motion and said she would clarify the intention coming out of Committee. Director London said because we had not formally noticed on the Facility Committee Agenda that we had intended to amend OE-10 we were informed at the Committee Meeting that we could not actually bring forward a proposal here. Director London said what the Facilities Committee should consider for the Superintendent's current evaluation is what we discussed a few minutes ago. She said we will adopt OE-10 as it appears; when we amend it in Committee we can bring it back to this body and at that point as the General Counsel has indicated, we can amend our contract with the Superintendent. Director Dobbins withdrew his motion to adopt and stated a new motion to accept OE-10 as written for the purposes of the Superintendent's evaluation. N. Superintendent's Report

Superintendent Smith said it's been really wonderful to talk to school staff about success and accomplishments that we reported earlier. He said it is important to say it is by design. Dr. Smith cited Futures Elementary where the teaching staff, family members, and community members who were focused there; believed the results they were getting were unacceptable for students and family and they re-designed themselves to a school called Futures. He said they believed deeply in the future of those students and families and they focused on instruction on building community and creating the conditions for success. He said the same work at West Oakland Middle School through a design process thoughtfully engaging. What are the things we need to do; what are the practices that get results for these students. He said people thought about it and put it into practice. Dr. Smith said he was celebrating the accomplishments and the hard work of individuals who spent time and energy and community engagement to create schools that would meet the needs of students. Dr. Smith said he has a lot of respect for the people in the schools doing that work. Dr. Smith invited the public to visit schools; check in at the office and visit classrooms. He said it is extraordinary that's going on. He said if you live in Oakland and have opinions about the schools, positive or negative, go and check. Dr. Smith said it is hard work to keep young people engaged all day long and people are doing incredibly thoughtful work in the classrooms. He said as an organization have a lot to be proud of and we have to speak truth. He said this District has figured out how to meet the needs of white children really well. He said we have thousands of young white children in our District who are being extraordinarily successful; this system is meeting their needs. There are a lot of

people who think if we just did the system better we would see the same kind of results for every child. Dr. Smith said, "I don't believe that. I am not one of those people." He said, "I think the system gets the results it gets because that is the way it is designed. If you look at the same results, same patterns playing out city by city; district by district; it's time for us to look at, pay attention, and take responsibility for the predictability of those gaps." He said individual students are doing great but when we have aggregate scores of 630 for African American Students and 900 for White Students in this district, there is a problem. He said the problem is that we have not figured out how to meet the needs of whole groups of students. Dr. Smith said he was happy to be reminded of the work in San Francisco which he said he would have not left if not to come home to do the same work. He said access, accountability, and achievement were the big three goals for the District. Through community meetings, engaging teachers, families, and community based organizations those goals came to life as: Make social justice a reality, engage high achieving and joyful learners, and keep our promises to students and families. Dr. Smith said for him this is not a problem for African American students, this is a white people problem. He said we need to be allies; figure out how to get our act together and do everything we can in the system that exists because that is the system we have. Outcomes are disproportionately negative if young people of color and from low income backgrounds are not successful in the system that is. He said we need to do that system well and figure out how to get higher test scores for those students now and we need to assess different things and be different. Dr. Smith said if we take our eye of those things now, we will be under state administration again. We cannot afford not do well in the system that is in particular for the least well served among us. Dr. Smith said he is more excited, more passionate and believes more deeply in the educator in our system and the families. He said it is by design and people by design have organized schools that are meeting the needs of students; we need this across our entire city. Dr. Smith said our neighborhoods are at risks. Our education system has to be very different if we are going to transform life outcomes for all the students and families in Oakland. This District has a huge responsibility and has the responsibility to get in front of that where necessary, but not sufficient. Dr. Smith said he is charging everyone to say we need to get our arms together; we need to work in partnership in ways we haven't before; and we need to get adult issues out of the way and put children at the center of this work and this city and really take it where it needs to go. Dr. Smith spoke of his work in San Francisco and said they had to get real and put thing into practice. He said school climate became a way they said let's not reward test, let's reward conditions that promote equitable outcomes for all students. He said we have to be that explicit if we expect to interrupt a pattern, a history of oppression and privileged. Dr. Smith said he is excited about the quality of the evaluation that he is being held accountable for and he is being more aggressive than people thinks he should be. He said if we meet these academic targets that mean we are moving African American and Latino students and that's what we need to do. Dr. Smith said the funding structure and existing mechanisms are more vulnerable and the least served are taking a disproportionate hit. Dr. Smith said there were questions about the programs we had and how we were going to support them and asked Brad Stam to respond.

Mr. Stam said one of the questions was were there additional adult classes opening and Mr. Stam said there would be no more additional adult classes opening until at the earliest the spring semester. He said the Adult Education department is engaged with Cabinet in the discussion around the alignment of its program to support the District's goals in the context of the financial challenges that we are facing and we will be bringing some of those recommendations to the Board in the future.

Vice President Yee said he asked the last time based upon commitments we made by adopting the strategic plan of the Adult Education Department in the spring. Vice President Yee said if there is a change in those priorities the community that is serviced by Adult Education in Chinatown whose classes which did not begin need to have a clear and public statement about what the procedure is. He said he understands the change in priorities that have occurred and he is happy to support that and he has consistently supported it over time. He said the community served by those classes, especially for adult students who fit the category that Dr. Smith and Mr. Stam talked about; underserved and not able to speak English, many of them came out in various other ways in the spring to ask those questions. Vice President Yee said he needs to know if we are re-setting our priority in terms of having those classes. He said what he heard from Ms. Marshall and Mr. Stam it was an issue about leases. He said if it simply a matter of getting the rooms for those classes, that's one thing. He said if it is a re-prioritization of Adult Education Classes in Chinatown he needs to hear it. Vice President Yee asked if it was a re-prioritization or a matter of finding appropriate rooms. President Gallo asked Dr. Smith or Mr. Stam to respond. Mr. Stam said at this point his understanding in the immediate it is a lease issue; we will be coming back to the Board around re-prioritization. Vice President Yee said the community was told classes would start in October and we are one week from October. Vice President Yee said if it is a re-prioritization he would like to have the conversation sooner rather than later.

Director Hodge said Ms. Marshall was very clear in multiple reports around aligning Adult Education with K-12 goals. She asked Vice President Yee to clarify. Vice President Yee said the money was set aside for Adult ESL Classes and the concern is because it is a Chinatown community that we are not having ESL Classes or is it another priority. He said the discussions around Chinatown were the building was inadequate. He said if it is going to be a re-prioritization it has to be a city-wide prioritization and not something focused on Chinatown and their adult students.

Director Kakishiba said that was his recollection of what's being going on since April with how Adult Education was handling the budget cuts. He said it is a yes or no question; did we get more classrooms or did we not to hold the actual classes. He said he would like to consider how we can use Adult Education dollars to dramatically strengthen high school education, drop-out recovery, and community re-entry services. He said we have to do what we said we were going to do. This is an example about keeping our promise to the community. Director Kakishiba said he cannot believe we cannot find two or three classrooms. Mr. Stam said his understanding is the search is continuing for that. Mr. Stam said he would go back to Ms. Marshall and convey the sense of the Board and will go back if there is a new update about these classes. President Gallo suggested Vice President meet with the Superintendent and be clear as to what your needs are and get a response from the Superintendent.

O. Adoption of General Consent Report

Public Comments

Betty Olson-Jones, OEA, said she was given information that there are four rooms at the Chinese Presbyterian Church that are available and she hopes it will be followed through

on. Mr. Stam said we do have a lease agreement with the Chinese Presbyterian Church that the Board will be approving on the Consent Report tonight. Vice President Yee said he wanted to pull the item from the Consent Report. After further discussion Vice President withdrew his request to pull the item.

Joseph LeBlanc said his bid was out of line in the Finance Committee and he wanted to pass out his bid to Board Members. Mr. LeBlanc read from the bid passed out to Board Members saying Foster's bid on prices of 1% of homogenized was .5986; his cost was .6499 and he said he would like to make another bid if possible and to re-bid at 799. He said he would like the Board to reconsider and make a new bid to have new prices for the new bid. He said this is only for the CDC's. President Gallo said he would have Legal Counsel to respond to Mr. LeBlanc. Ms. Minor said this is a bid that was publicly advertised. She said sealed bids were submitted; the Committee that considered it had a number of questions asked by Board Members and she said it was well vetted at the Committee level. She said there was encouragement on the part of several Board Members in the future to continue to work with small businesses. Ms. Minor said there is no procedure for this Board as such to reject a bid that has been advertised and submitted in that fashion. She said you have to let the bid stand.

Jim Mordecai said the Consent Agenda contains all kinds of items that cost all kinds of monies. He said some of the highest priced items have to do with school construction and items having to do with what goes on in the classroom. Measure "G" provides money to make decisions on what goes on in the classroom; they are supposed to have oversight. He said there has been a laxity in terms of the oversight. He said when you are dealing with Measure "G" it should be on the agenda for the public to see. Did the Oversight Committee see this item. Mr. Mordecai said he does not see why we cannot put if the Oversight Committee saw anything. He said the idea of school construction was the taxpayer voted on something and they have an Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee. He asked how it can be independent if it was appointed by the Board because if you don't like what they are doing, you get rid of them. He said there are millions of dollars being spent from Measure "B" Funds and there is nothing on the agenda about the Oversight Committee. He said there is a Citizens' Bond Oversight Facilities Committee By-Law and he said in the By-Laws it states very clearly it is the duties of the Board and the Superintendent; after that the Oversight Committee has full jurisdiction. Mr. Mordecai said the By-Laws say the Measure "B" Committee can meet twice a year, but it can meet more. He urged the Committee to meet more and find out what is going on. President Gallo said the Measure "B" Committee had a lengthy meeting yesterday evening and they have been meeting frequently and asked Tim White to respond. Mr. White said as of today the Measure "B" Citizens Oversight Committee has been meeting monthly. He said last night it was decided to meet bi-monthly after two more monthly meetings.

Oscar Wright said he has listened tonight to the improvements in the test scores and he said he has been listening to this for 48 years and we are still saying we are going to wait to 2013. He said the time is now. Mr. Wright said it was like Dr. Smith said we got the results, it worked out exactly as it was planned. He said from Brown v. the Board of Education when they integrated they closed all the black schools sending all the black students to white schools. He said once the black students got there and started receiving the same quality of instruction, supervision and information that the white students received, a lot of the black students excelled.

W. Introduction of New Matter

Director London said she had two requests.

- (1) Director London requested a briefing in writing or oral from Legal Counsel on the process for which we bring recommendations that come out of Committee to the Full Board. She said in tonight's Board Meeting two situations where there was confusion at the Committee level about how we move our items forward. This may bring us to a need for some briefing for Board Members on some of the process issues that we need to be following in order to make sure that when a recommendation comes out of Committee it is brought to the Full Board for consideration.
- (2) As the minutes are approved from the various Advisory Committees they be placed on our agenda information so that someone who isn't going back and reading all the Committee agendas has the opportunity to know that the Committees met and this is what happened once their minutes are approved.

Director Kakishiba requested a Special Board Meeting on December 9th and President Gallo said we would have that meeting.

Public Comments

Jim Mordecai said he wants the Board to consider supporting him on process. He said when the Board met at West Oakland Middle School he handed Mr. Rakestraw a piece of paper where he had a motion that he wanted the Board to consider. That was not put on the agenda of the previous Board Meeting which I assumed it would be. He said Education Code 35145.5 says it is the intent of the legislature that members of the public be able to place matters directly related to school districts on the agenda of school district Governing Board meetings. He said the back of the agenda says Introduction of New Matter. Mr. Mordecai read from the agenda. This section of the agenda permits the introduction of new business matter within the subject matter jurisdiction of District that may be scheduled pursuant to requirement of Board By-Law 9322 for future meetings. He said if you look at Board By-Law 9322, agenda and meeting materials the sentence begins: Members of the public may have matters directly related to school district business placed on the agenda of

any regular meeting of the Board. He said it further states provided a written request including the language of the specific legislative proposal and supporting documentation for such item is filed with the Secretary, Mr. Rakestraw, at Regular Meeting during Introduction of New Business or filed in the Office of the Board. Mr. Mordecai said he did file the request with Mr. Rakestraw and it has not surfaced. He said he would like to hear what the procedure is, why it did not surface, and leadership from the Board that if somebody from the public brings something that it gets placed on the agenda.

President Gallo asked Legal Counsel to respond.

Ms. Minor responded saying she provided a legal response on behalf of the District explaining why that matter was not agendized for consideration by the Board. She said it was a request that the Board seek an opinion from the State Attorney General and under state law citizens do not have the right to request a public opinion from the Attorney General and we found the request to be a way of circumventing state law and that is the reason that it was not agendized and the written explanation was provided.

Mr. Mordecai said in procedure, if somebody does something like this I think it would be common courtesy that somehow he is informed to what is going on.

Ms. Minor said a written response was provided and asked Mr. Mordecai did he not receive it.

President Gallo said Mr. Mordecai will be provided a copy of the written response.
