The Measure N Commission is pleased to release the attached 2020-21 Measure N Annual Report to the Public. The Commission appreciates this opportunity to share the exciting, transformative work that is helping to strengthen the college and career readiness of Oakland students.

Measure N Purpose

In 2015, the Oakland College & Career Readiness For All Fund was established to pay for the implementation of a comprehensive approach to high school education, which Oakland is doing through the model of Linked Learning. Linked Learning integrates challenging academics with career-based learning and real-world work experiences. Through small learning communities of career-aligned pathways, students receive intensive, individualized support that creates the conditions for them to graduate high school prepared for success in both college and career.

Measure N Goals

- Decrease the high school dropout rate
- Increase the high school graduation rate
- Increase high school students' readiness to succeed in college and career
- Increase middle school students' successful transition to high school
- Reduce disparities in student achievement and student access to career pathways based on race, ethnicity, gender, socio-economic status, English Learner-status, special needs-status, and residency status

Impact of COVID-19

This Annual Report provides an overview of how Measure N dollars were used to continue achieving these goals. As you know, 2020-21 represents a critical period of the pandemic in which OUSD provided distance learning to students throughout the school year. At many of our sites, Linked Learning pathway teams were instrumental in activating student support systems that maintained strong student engagement during distance learning.

In fact, from 2018-19 (pre-COVID) to 2020-21, OUSD students fared better in many data categories, especially among target populations, when compared to student data from the State of California. For example, statewide there was a 4.3 percentage point decrease in the African American student four year cohort graduation rate while among OUSD African American students the decrease was only 0.4 percentage points. Among Latinx students statewide, there was a 0.7 percentage point increase in the

four year cohort Latinx dropout rate while among OUSD Latinx students there was a 4.7 percentage point decrease in the cohort dropout rate.

While the educational setbacks brought on by the pandemic are significant, we believe that the pathway structures in place across Oakland high schools have helped to mitigate the effect on educational outcomes. Additionally, Oakland educators have been working hard to counteract the impact of the pandemic on students with support services, credit recovery options, and access to college courses and real world learning and work experiences that align with student interests. Many of these interventions have been funded by Measure N. As suggested by the Statewide comparison data, responses from the 2021 Measure N high school Listening Tour consistently underscored the importance of the Measure N programs in responding to COVID. Continuing to support students in college and career pathways that make learning relevant and rigorous is a critical strategy for re-engaging students and promoting their academic achievement.

Through small learning communities of career-oriented pathways, students receive intensive, individualized support that creates the conditions for them to graduate high school prepared for success in both college and career.

A Note About the COVID-19 Pandemic: During the 2020-21 school year all District and Charter high schools in Oakland provided distance learning classes to students in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. At many of our sites, Linked Learning pathway teams were instrumental in activating student support systems that maintained strong student engagement during distance learning. However, the data in this report also reflect educational challenges brought on by the pandemic. Some data remained relatively the same between 2019-20 and 2020-21, such as the overall high school dropout and graduation rates. Other data points show declines, such as the 11.3 percentage point decrease in 9th graders on track to graduate in OUSD. Oakland educators have been working hard to counteract the impact of the pandemic on students with support services, credit recovery options, access to college courses and real world work experiences that align with student interests. Many of these interventions were funded by Measure N. Continuing to support students in college and career pathways that make learning relevant and rigorous is a critical strategy for re-engaging students and promoting their academic achievement.

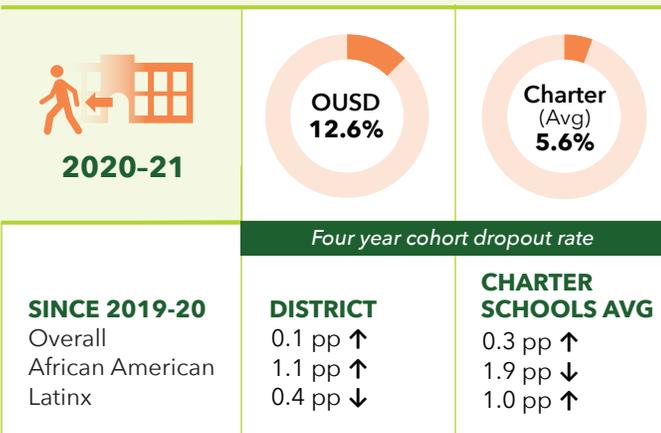

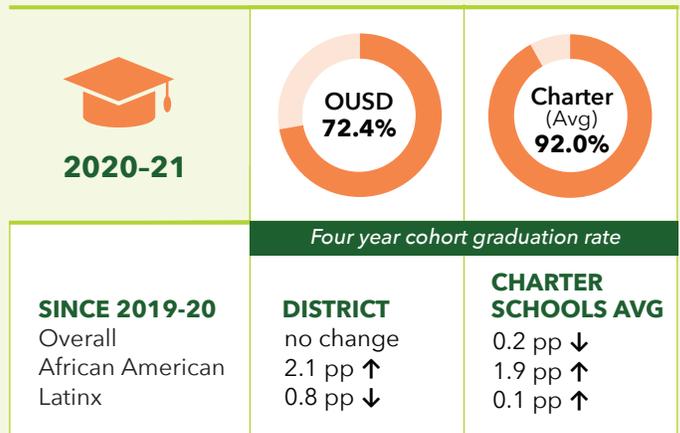

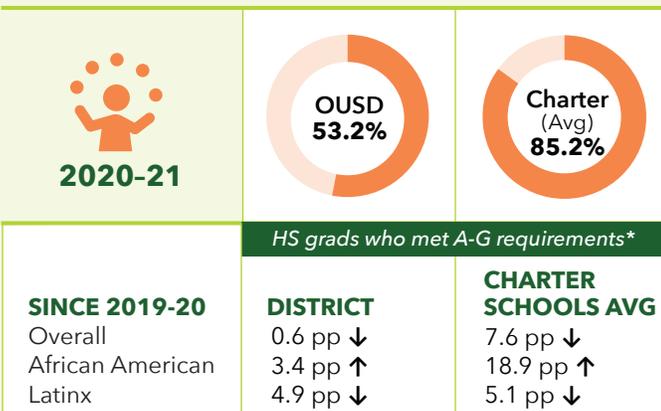
GOAL 1: Decrease High School Dropout Rate



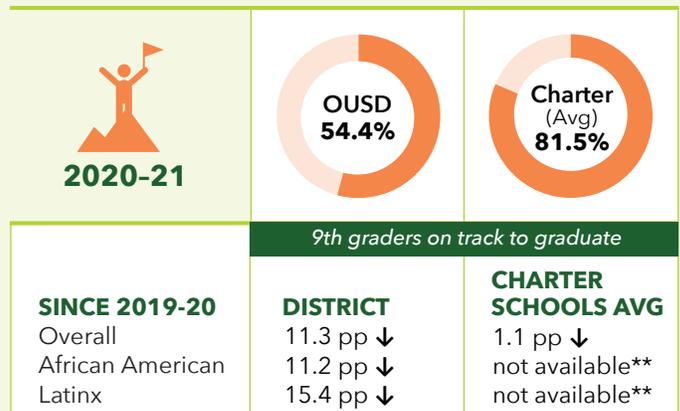
GOAL 2: Increase High School Graduation Rate

GOAL 4: Increase Middle School Students' Successful Transition to High School

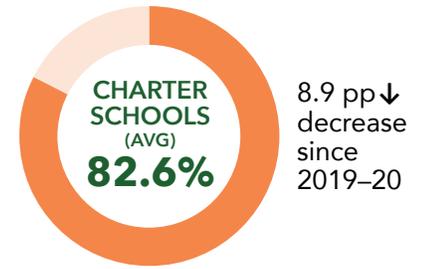
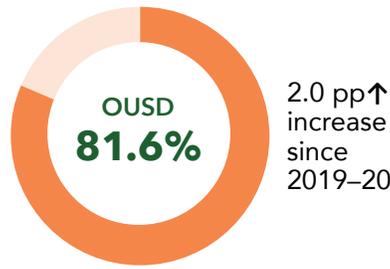

LINKED LEARNING is education organized around industry-sector themes. Students' chosen themes are woven into lessons taught by teachers who collaborate across subject areas with input from working professionals, and reinforced by work-based learning with real employers. Students in these pathways benefit from integrated student supports, early college credit, and a small learning community.

EXPANDED DUAL ENROLLMENT CLASSES

Dual Enrollment is a strategy in which students take community college courses with Community College instructors onsite at their high school or virtually. Classes are free, and students receive both high school and college credit. Students who pass Dual Enrollment classes receive a GPA boost on their high school transcript and fulfill course requirements they can apply towards their college degree.
