A team of Chinese Lion Dancers visited Redwood Heights Elementary to help celebrate Lunar New Year.

The Lion Dance team came from the Yau Kung Moon Kung Fu Sports Association in San Francisco at the invitation of the school's AAPI Parent Group. "We couldn't do this last year or the year before (because of the pandemic), and so we decided to get everyone together and make this a big community symbol of peace and love, and create more visibility around our Asian community. We're really feeling it, everyone's really happy," said Marissa Dominguez, who leads the school's AAPI Parent Group.

Two two-person teams performed to the sounds of a drum and cymbals. Lion dancing is often performed as part of New Year celebrations, to bring good luck and drive away evil spirits. "If someone learns this, I feel happy that they are learning about our culture, and they don't assume just like stereotypes. Stereotypes are so rude. They are so rude," exclaimed Taiden C., a Chinese Redwood Heights 5th grader.




Testing & Vaccines

- Regional testing hubs open
 - 2 locations open each day, M-F. May scale back to 1 per day, depending on demand rates through January.
- Vaccine clinics scheduled at school sites through the fall semester
 - Updated Omicron boosters available at all sites, including pediatric doses
 - COVID + Flu vaccine clinics also being scheduled with ACPHD
- At-home tests available for symptomatic/exposed staff & students at all school sites
 - At-home tests distributed for Winter Break, in stock for Spring Break
 - Additional tests will be delivered before Presidents' Day weekend as well

Case Rates & Masking

- The community level of Covid-19 in Alameda County is Low based on cases and hospitalizations.
- OUSD follows CDPH and ACPHD aligned masking guidance to CDC, per Board Policy 2122-0091.
- High-quality masks, including N95, KN95, KF94, and surgical masks are provided at all District facilities.
- California State of Emergency ends on February 28, 2023.
 National State of Emergency ends on May 11, 2023.

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
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Ongoing Work


