McClymonds High Honors Legendary Graduate, Bill Russell

Before the first varsity football game of the season on Friday, Sept. 2, as McClymonds High hosted Bellarmine Prep, the home team honored McClymonds and NBA Legend, Bill Russell, who passed away on July 31.

Noted alumni stood with a banner that will hang in the school's gym listing Russell's many accomplishments.

After graduating from McClymonds in 1952, Russell attended the University of San Francisco, leading the team to two national championships. He then led the Boston Celtics to 11 NBA titles, including as the first Black head coach in any major sport.

Russell also fought for social justice. He joined Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. for the March on Washington and supported Muhammad Ali, who resisted the draft during the Vietnam War. President Barack Obama awarded him the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

Fans of both teams cheered the brief ceremony.

Alt Ed Enrollment Backed out of Summary:

- Alt Ed seats are funded by **supplemental and concentration** funding and those seats were backed out of the projections.
 - Alt Ed for Maximum Enrollment <u>NOT</u> the 20 day count or Census Day count
 - Sojourner Truth grew significantly above the initial 138 projected enrollment
- <u>33,762 Actual 20-Day Count</u> vs <u>34,199 in our Student Information System (Aeries)</u>
 - Variance of **437 students that we must close in the upcoming week**

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California Community Schools Partnerships Program (CCSPP) Grant

California Community Schools Partnerships Program (CCSPP) Opportunity

- Beginning in 2022, the California Department of Education has launched a statewide effort to increase community schools in CA with \$3.4 Billion in funding.
- This is a great opportunity for OUSD to get closer to achieving its mission to be a Full Service Community School District!
- Oakland successfully applied for and received grants for 53 schools to implement community schools from 2022-2027 expanding our total schools implementing community schools strategies to 67.
- We look forward to using this as an opportunity to scale and implement the shared governance board policy as part of our efforts increase

CCSPP Funding



- Per California Department of Education (CDE) guidelines:
 - OUSD was only eligible for implementation grant.
 - CDE funded Schools with an Unduplicated Pupil Count (unhoused, foster, ELL, low-income) of 80% or more.
 - CDE funded schools based on school enrollment numbers.
- CDE established strict guidelines as to how funds can be used, including:
 - Grantees have to show a 1/3 (33%) match.
 - Grants funds are intended only for the school sites approved by CDE
 - Grant funds must be used for activities above and beyond typical school funds.
 - Cannot fund classroom teachers,
 - Cannot fund expenses typically covered school such as paper, equipment

(Strategic Plan: All four initiatives, Superintendent work plan) *Goal: Strengthen collaborative leadership practices with students, families, teachers, site staff, and community partners.*

Goal: Expand support services to address impacts of poverty, the pandemic, and trauma on students' well-being and learning – with a focus on creating racially just and restorative school climates.

Goal: Expand and improve student supports and enrichment opportunities to close the equity gap, so that all students graduate college, career, and community ready.
