OVERVIEW & OBJECTIVE

Seventeen OUSD district schools, nine charter schools and the District Administrative 10% have unspent Measure N funds from the 2020-2021 fiscal year. For the January 4, 2022 Measure N Commission meeting, three sites have submitted their 2020-2021 Measure N Carryover Justification Form that articulates the context that contributed to the carryover, the amount of carryover, the percentage of Measure N funds that are being carried over, and a clear budget for the carryover funds. The Measure N Commission approved the Measure N Carryover Justification Forms of 23 sites at their November 16, 2021 and December 7, 2021 meetings. The last remaining school will submit its 2020-2021 Measure N Carryover Justification Form to the January 18, 2022 Measure N Commission meeting.

Per Measure N Commission policy, Measure N commission approval is required for all carryover justification forms. Measure N staff have reviewed the submitted 2020-2021 Measure N Carryover Justification Forms and provided feedback to school sites that were addressed before submission to the Measure N Commission.

Teacher Salaries Stipends: Extended Contracts for 10 Teachers to support the 9th & 10th Grade Students in the Summer Bridge Program 10 teachers to support our Summer Bridge Program which focuses on supporting student transitions into Oakland Tech. The Summer Bridge Program was developed specifically out of the need to support students in the adjustment to high school after online learning. During this program scholars will learn about the O-Tech's Pillars that guide our school community and participate in SEL lessons. Scholars will begin to bond with their core teachers, learn about one another and develop a sense of community and belonging prior to the beginning of the year. The key goal of this is to increase student engagement, by intentionally providing opportunities for students to get acquainted with high school and the teachers they will be working with, as well as to get them caught up and ready to be successful as they transition into high school. All signs point to more of our students needing more focused attention to make this adjustment and start high school on track to graduate because of the challenges currently presented to students from the extended distance learning situation. This program will occur during the same block as Summer Learning (Summer School) and will conclude by June 30, 2022. The ECCCO summer teachers will support students in finding and completing summer internships that can be done in person & virtually to provide work-based curriculum that can be completed virtually to ensure that students participate in work-based learning. Number of students served: 120. The summer ECCCO program provides our most marginalized scholars with opportunities to learn appropriate WBL skills, participate in a paid internships, receive mentoring from community and industry leaders which augments self efficacy and engagement. This is a critical need for our scholars in order for them to make logical connections to classroom learning and real-life. Consultant Contract with the Oakland Public Ed Fund to pay-out the Student Internships Stipends for participating in the ECCO (Exploring College and Career Opportunities) Program. The ECCO summer internships will support students in engaging in and completing summer internships that can be done in-person or virtually, which supports work-based learning, career, technical education and college and career readiness. Number of students served: 20. The summer ECCCO program provides our most marginalized scholars with opportunities to learn appropriate WBL skills, participate in a paid internships, receive mentoring from community and industry leaders which augments self efficacy and engagement. Prioritizing the needs of our students to receive stipends for their work and increasing their access to industry partners and work based learning opportunities is an intentional choice to increase student engagement. Additionally, ECCCO provides students with real world experience directly related to their pathway and focused academics, the work directly aligns with pathway development.
