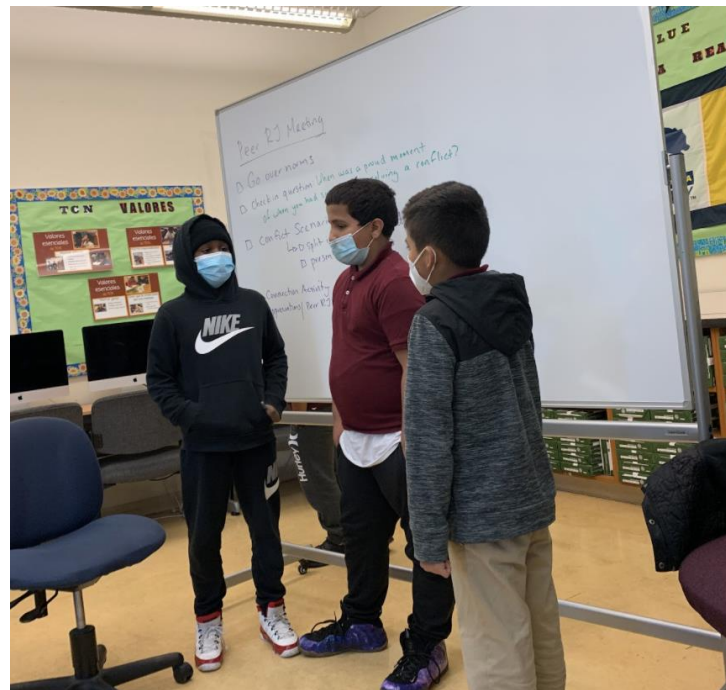


Highlights from Schools

Students Lead the Way with Restorative Justice at TCN

In December, **Think College Now (TCN)** Community School Manager Aurora Barajas, RJ Americorp member Yulez Melendez, and Coach Jamier Malone launched the **Peer Restorative Justice (RJ) Student Leaders Group**.

Many students applied and went through an interview process. Going forward, this group will allow students to build their leadership skills and help manage conflict, making the school a better and safer place to be.



KDA Students Reach for the Stars with Daily “Brain Break”

At **Korematsu Discovery Academy (KDA)** students follow a space themed pathway as they transition between SIPPS reading groups.

This fun pathway supports students in developing confidence, strengthening balance, regulating their bodies, and experiencing joy as they move through the school day. This pathway has increased the positive mood of students entering into reading intervention and is used daily by classroom teachers to offer kids a moving brain break as they reach for the stars!



3rd Graders Get Hands On Learning at “The Center”

So far this school year, 243 third grade students have taken a field trip to The Center, OUSD’s Central Kitchen and Learning Hub. The field trips align with third grade curriculum, and students rotate through garden and cooking stations in the instructional garden, outdoor kitchen, and classrooms.

Students also visit the Central Kitchen, learn about the school meal program, help set up “The Center Cafe” for lunch and enjoy a pizza and salad bar meal provided by Nutrition Services and featuring items harvested from garden!

School-Based Vaccine Pop-Ups at OUSD Schools:

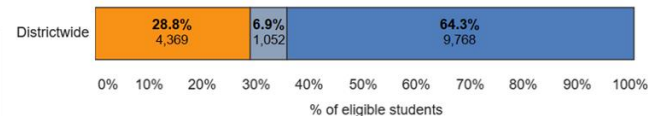

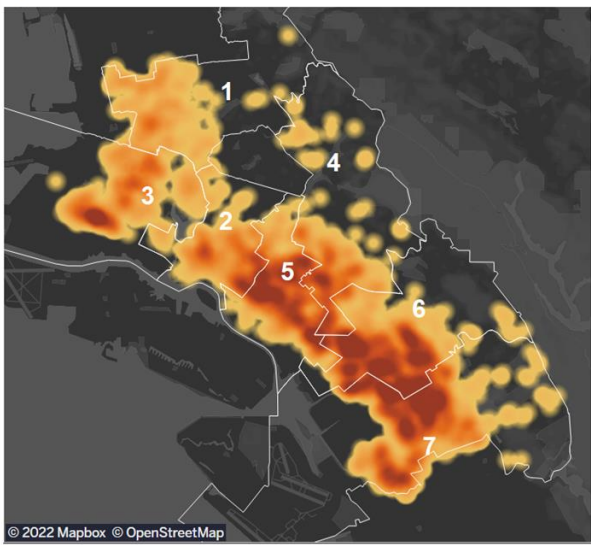
Vaccine-eligible student vaccination rate



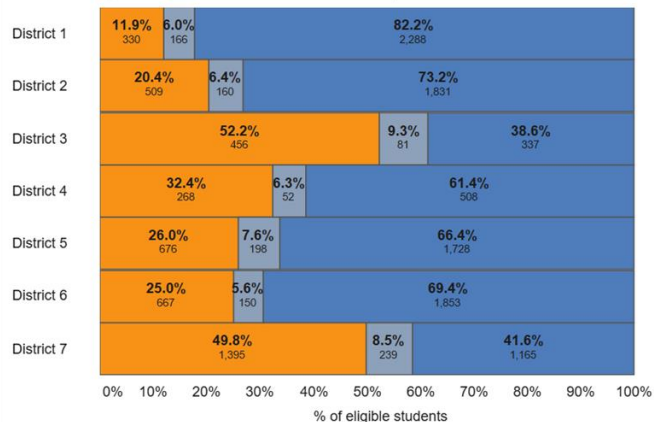
Where are the most students unvaccinated?

Testing Program

- OUSD COVID-19 Testing is successfully testing 10,000+ people every week.
- 2,000 individuals were tested at 6 OUSD sites over the Martin Luther King, Jr Holiday weekend
- The District leveraged support from the state to provide at-home tests to staff and students, including 41,000 test kits that went home before winter break
- In addition to ten regional testing hubs, the District continues to assign tests to schools to conduct onsite tests as frequently as possible, with some schools twice a week and some schools once a week

“We are running, I think, one of the biggest testing operations in the county right now. The week of January 3 we administered more than 21,000 tests, which I think was about one-seventh of all the tests that were administered in Alameda County.” -Sailaja Suresh

Covid Testing Implementation Update

- Weekly Pooled Testing Pilot launched at 39 elementary sites; focus on training and gathering consent at new sites.
- Regular Bi-Weekly Testing at Secondary.
- Successful at-home testing program was expanded to serve more schools for winter holiday.



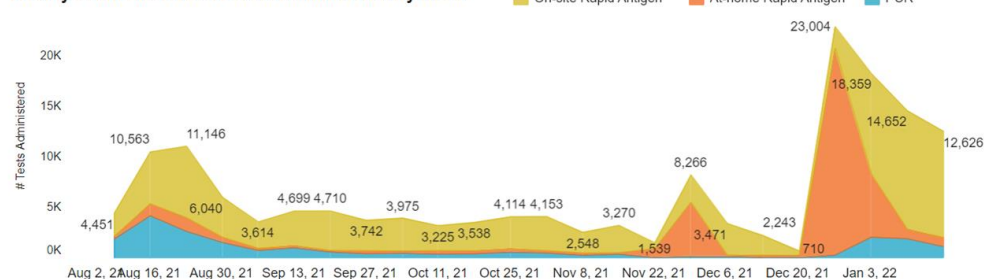
Weekly COVID-19 Testing at OUSD Sites 2021-22

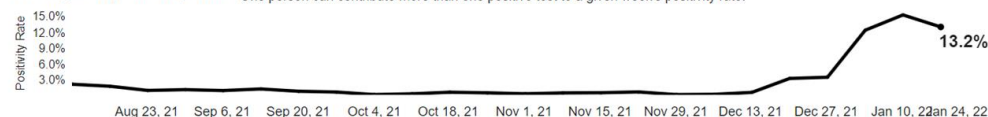

Dashboard last updated on 1/24/2022

Dashboard is updated daily at 7am to include all reported cases with presumed positive dates occurring in the prior week (1/17/2022 to 1/23/2022). Cases for the current week of 1/24/2022 will not be reflected in the dashboard until the following Monday. Counts include cases reported for OUSD school-based staff and students who were physically present on school campuses during their infectious period for COVID-19. Data may be incomplete depending on when the case was reported/confirmed and when contact tracing was completed. The presumed positive date is the earlier of first symptom onset or positive test collection date. Pursuant to updated guidance from ACPHD and CDPH as of 01/10/2022, classroom at-home quarantines will no longer be initiated following multiple cases. Positive cases will continue to isolate, and prolonged close contacts will be provided access to testing at school sites.

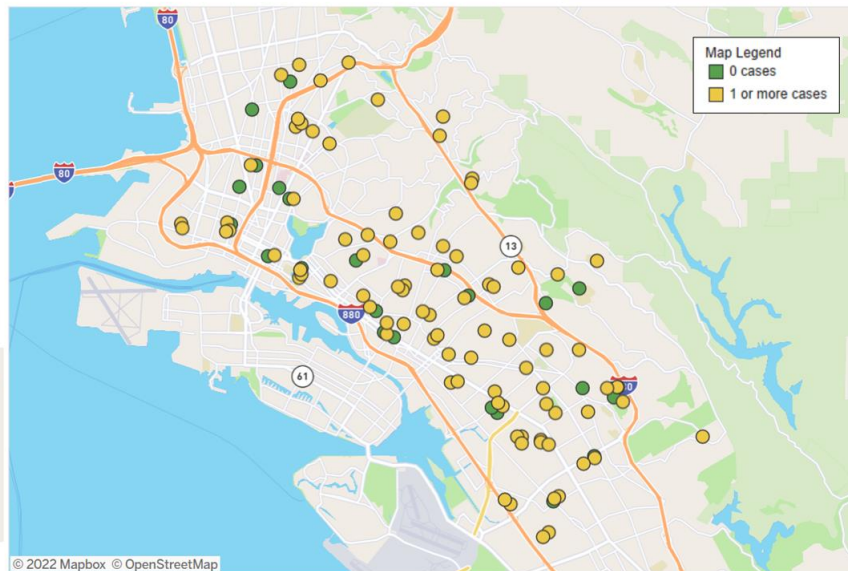

Masks to School Sites

As we returned to school, we have also distributed 10,855 KN95 masks to school sites to ensure staff has upgraded masks

- 50,000 more KN95 masks are arriving for staff
- 200,000 KN95 masks have been distributed to schools for students. They have been handed out to students, on top of some donated KN95 masks that were given to high school students during the week of January 10.
- There have been concerns about “fake” masks or “unapproved” masks. Some of the masks had NIOSH approval revoked, but that means only that they are no longer allowed to be used in medical settings. OUSD does not purchase fake masks.



SupplyBank.org and Kaiser Permanente have been amazing partners and have provided significant donations to the district so that we can continue to invest in our academic programming rather than PPE.

Improved Ventilation

B and G has installed Merv 13 filters in our HVAC units throughout our schools and then continues to replace them as the filters reach their replacement dates.

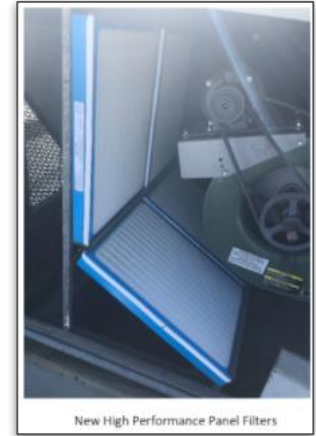

We have installed at least **3 HEPA Filters** in every cafeteria and have **2 large industrial fans** in all of our cafeterias to provide maximum ventilation and filtration.

All classrooms have at least **2 portable HEPA filters** to provide 4 air exchanges per hour in instructional spaces.

- The custodial team has replaced or cleaned filters in 645 units when needed.

- ★ Total MERV 13 Filters: **2,624**
- ★ Total HEPA Filters for Classrooms and Offices: **5,667**
- ★ Total Small Office Air Purifiers: **800**
- ★ Total HEPA Filters for Cafeteria: **311**
- ★ Total Industrial Fans: **295**

Dining tables ordered for all 82 schools with site identified need to increase outdoor dining and increase social distancing.

- Heavy Duty Polyethylene (CDC): 82

B&G teams, custodians and families are supporting the assembly of tables and permanently securing shade structures to tables at sites.

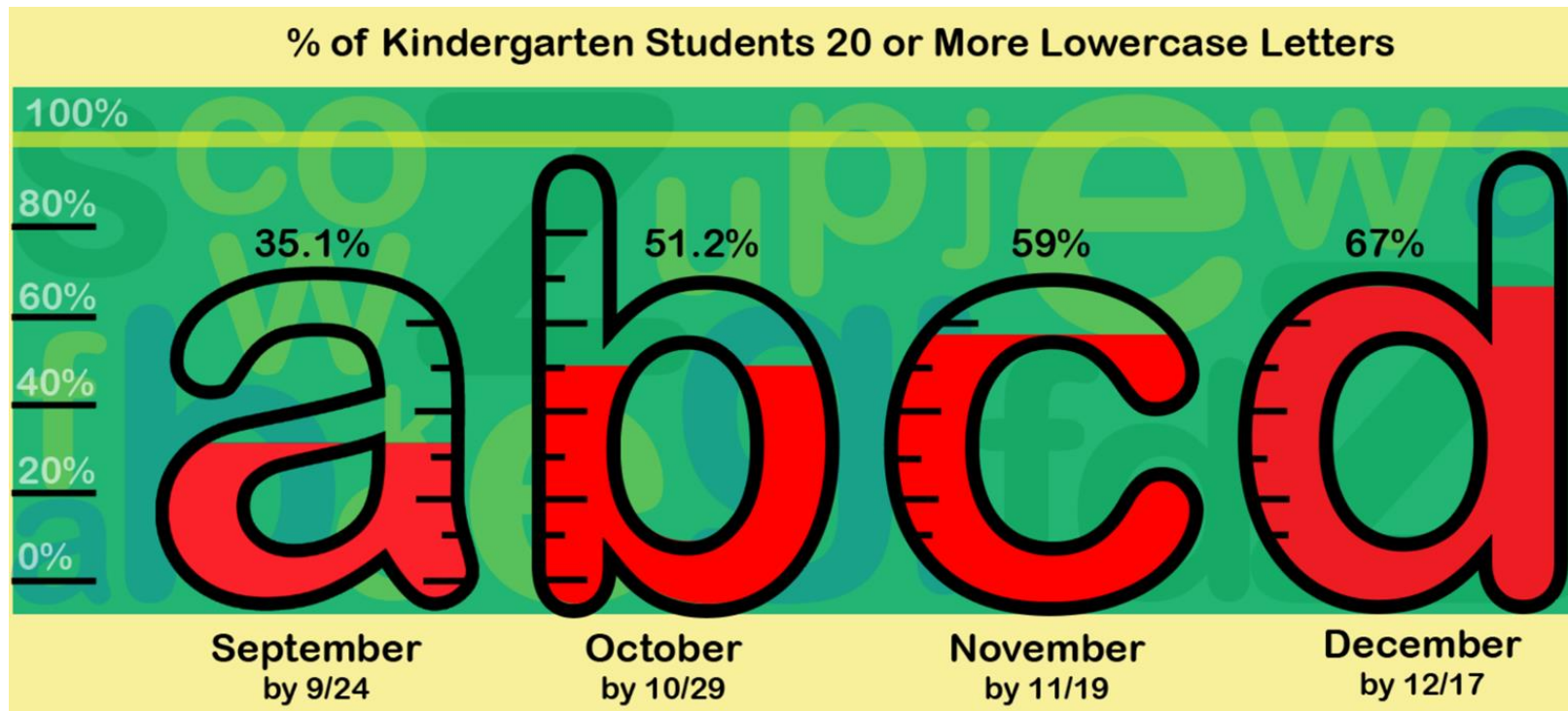

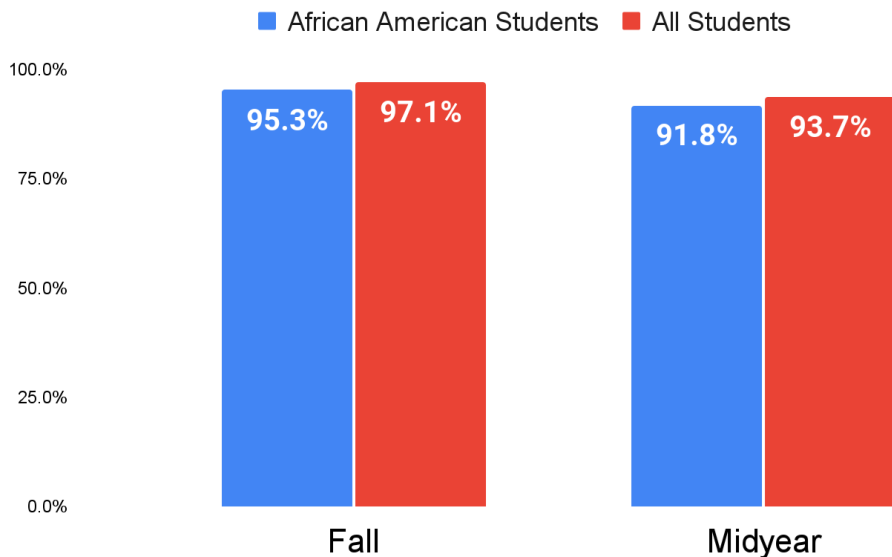

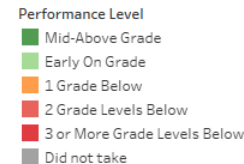

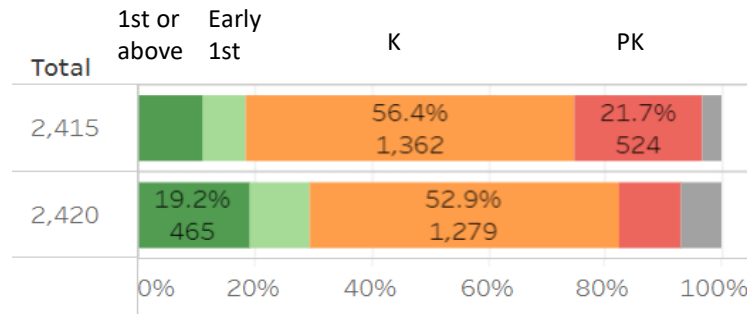

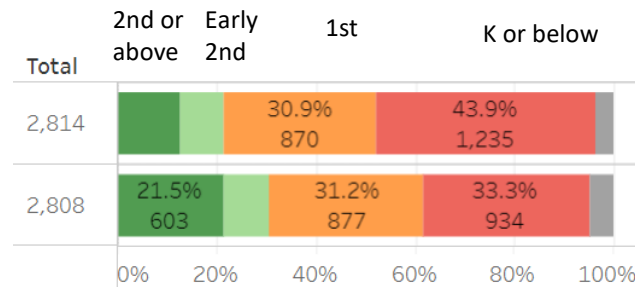

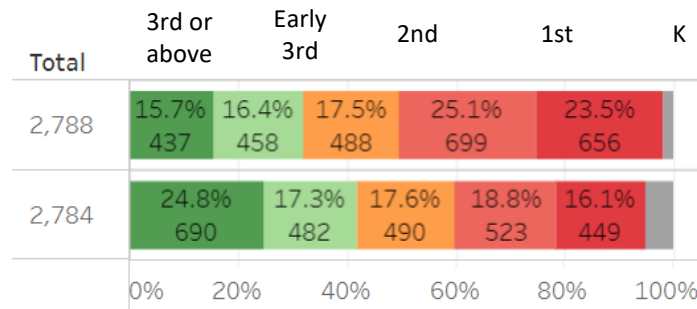

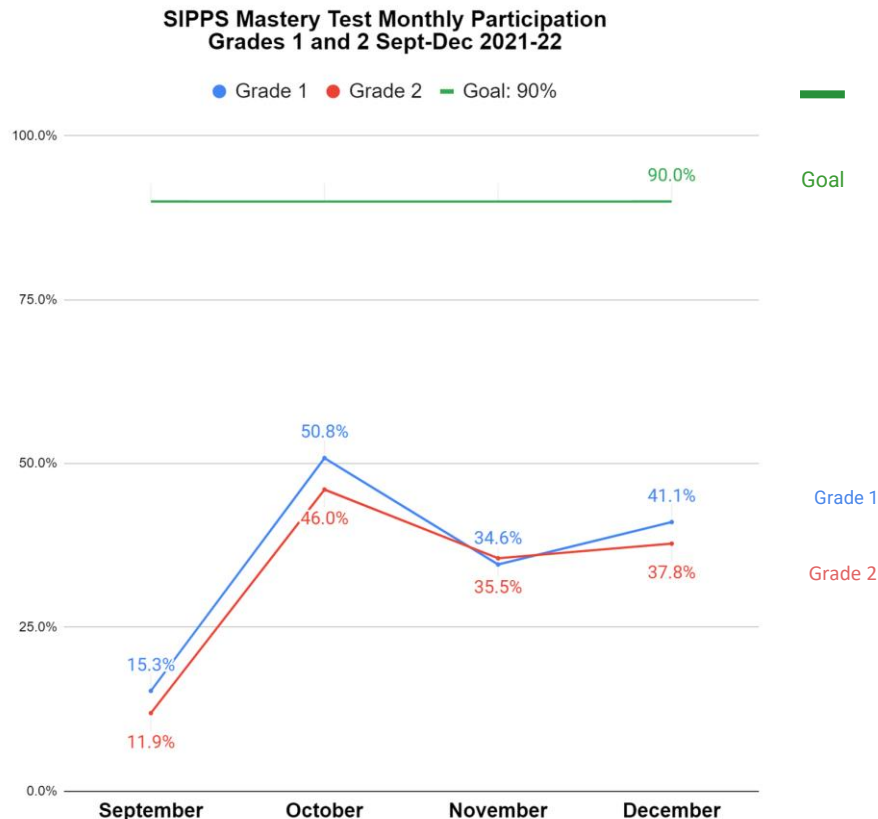

How We Monitor Progress

SIPPS Mastery Tests

- Goal: daily lessons and 1-2 tests passed/month
- Checks student mastery of skills taught (5-10 lessons)
- Strong Predictor of Overall Reading Success

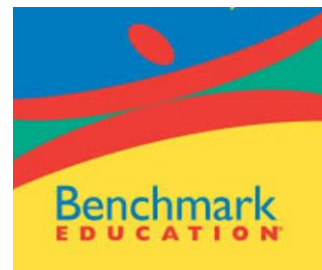

Students, Teachers Engaging with New Curriculum!

44 sites visited, 202 classrooms observed

- Material **used in 97% of classes!**
- 73% advanced levels of planning
- 43% of teachers asking students to cite text (students citing text 33%)



We are Learning Together

Teachers, Coaches, Principals, Central Office

- **Monthly professional learning** for all teachers
- **Site-based Coaching:** 50% of literacy coaches reinforcing monthly PD focus through coaching & PLCs
- **Growing our Coaches:** 96% of returning-to-EL Ed Coaches say training has helped them support teachers in improving student outcomes
- **Early Lit Teacher Leaders:** 93% rate their PD as effective/highly effective

- Collaborative spaces with **grade-level colleagues** from other schools
- **Videos from OUSD classrooms** using curriculum
- Materials, google slides, ELD lessons, etc. on **EL Ed Central & Early Literacy Central**

Challenges:

- Dedicated time for **planning and collaboration**
- Providing small group **differentiation to meet diverse needs in grades 3-5**
- **Absences and vacancies** compromise small groups and pacing
