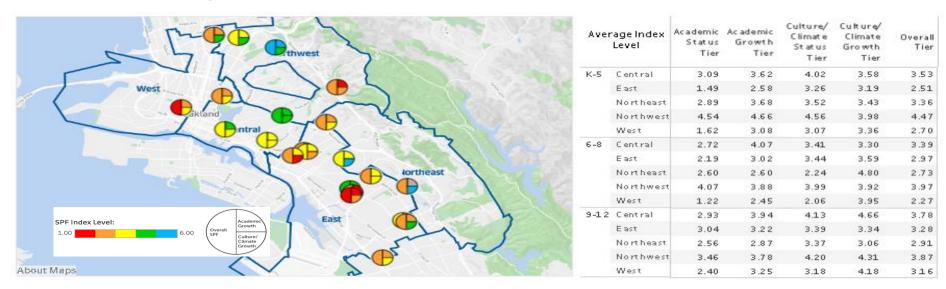

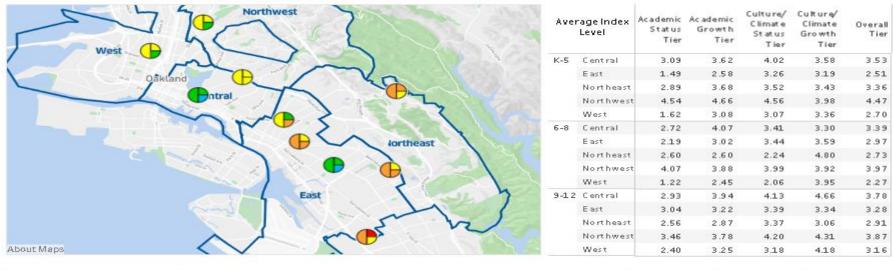

Group 1: Cost of Quality

Essential Questions

What is our standard for quality schools?

- What are the measures we have to define quality?
- Where are current examples of quality in our district?
- What are the resources, staffing and programing needed for quality?
- What is the quality needed at central office to support a quality school?

What does quality cost?

- What can we afford?
- How do we need to prioritize with an equity lens?
- How do we invest in areas of the city (West & East) that have been underserved?
- How would we need to adjust costs of central office?

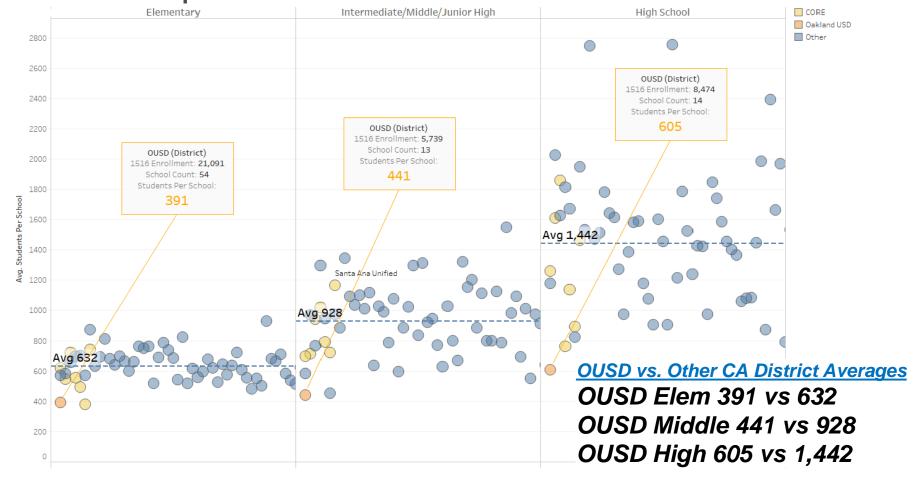


Group 2: Economics of the Number of Schools

Essential Questions

- How do we reorganize central office to support schools?
- How are our schools and central office funded? What are the key factors that impact OUSD funding?
- How many schools is it efficient to operate over time? What are the comprehensive costs of operating schools over time?
- How does OUSD compare to other similarly sized, urban districts with respect to cost/number of schools?
- How many of our schools are sustainable from a cost perspective? (funding vs. cost)
- What is the impact of charters on our decision making process?

Group 3: Learning from the Past

Essential Questions

- How do we learn from past attempts to expand access to quality? What worked and what didn't?
- How do we remain transparent throughout the process?
- How do we keep an equity lens (race, class, access)?
- How do we best involve community in early stages and throughout the process?
- How do we build trust?
- What's the right pace for change (school portfolio/school configurations/central office changes)?

Comprehensive Solutions to Achieve our Goal

Our Goal: To expand and sustain quality schools for ALL students in our city.

Timeframe:

- March-April: Identify the challenges and investing in Learning to solve for them.
- May-Oct: Engage the community in multiple dialogues to inform recommendations for a School Portfolio and Facilities Master Plan.
- Nov: Present School Portfolio and Facilities
 Master Plan will inform important Board
 decisions on educational programs and capital
 investment for the next 5-10 years.

The Facilities Master Plan as a Solution for OUSD

The FMP will be the result of a transparent, data-driven process.

Together we will address many key questions:

- How many students will enroll in OUSD schools for the next five years?
- What kind of schools will best prepare students for the future, and help OUSD adults inspire them to achieve their full potential?
- What is the right number, sizes, and locations of schools to best serve these students?
- Which current buildings should be replaced? expanded? modernized? repurposed?





School Portfolio & Facilities Master Plan

Potential **Program Outcomes:**

- Expand successful programs
- Citywide/regional/school-based specialty programs
- Grade reconfiguration (e.g. preK-5 to preK-8)
- Feeder pattern re-alignment
- Attendance boundaries adjustment
- School consolidations, closures, expansions & repurpose

- Facilitate enhanced educational programs that attract and retain students and faculty
- Prescribe sustainable outcomes, socially, ecologically, and financially
- Be actionable and achievable
- Be trusted by stakeholders and developed in partnership with the community
- Be equitable for all neighborhoods, acknowledging OUSD's unique culture and climate
- Be data-driven and prioritized

- Demographic Research/Analysis (5 & 10 year enrollment projections)
 - Capacity Utilization and Feeder Analysis

OUSD Blueprint Advisory Group

 Who: ~40 member representative cross-section of OUSD schools and community (OUSD staff, youth, parents, community leaders, CBOs, faithbased leaders, community members)

• Purpose:

- Provide oversight of data and process
- Assist in development of community surveys, facility options, and Facilities Master Plan recommendations.
- Facilitate small group discussions at Community Dialog Meetings.
- Assist in communication to local communities.
- Serve as the community ambassadors/champions.

Time Commitment:

- Five 2-hour Community Dialog meetings in Sept-Nov 2017
- Two 2-hour Community Dialog meetings in Sept-Nov 2017



Communication:

- Transparent process
- Intentional & strengthbased
- Communicated widely and openly to the community.
