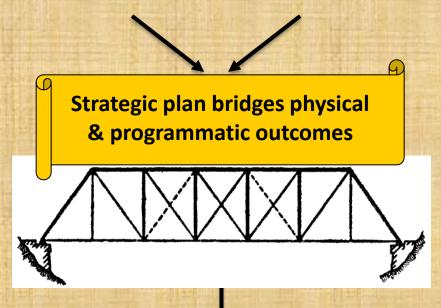

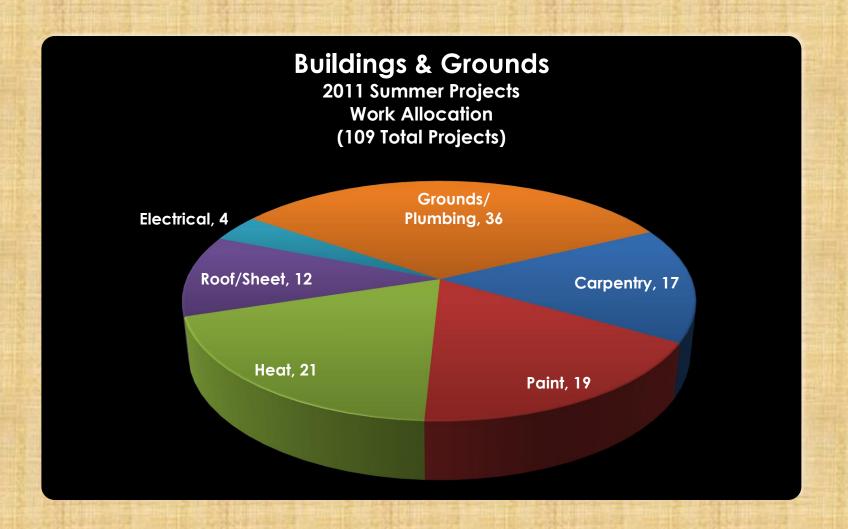
Work Order Requests

- Over 1,500 Work orders submitted for summer work
- Each shop had an average of 70 work orders
- Approximately 900 work orders were closed
- Nearly 130 work orders completed per week
- In excess of 16,000 man hours supported the completion of the work orders

Custodial Services' Department deep cleaned 101 schools across 5.8 million sq.ft (bldg. space)/487 Acres of District property in preparation for the 2011-2012 school year.

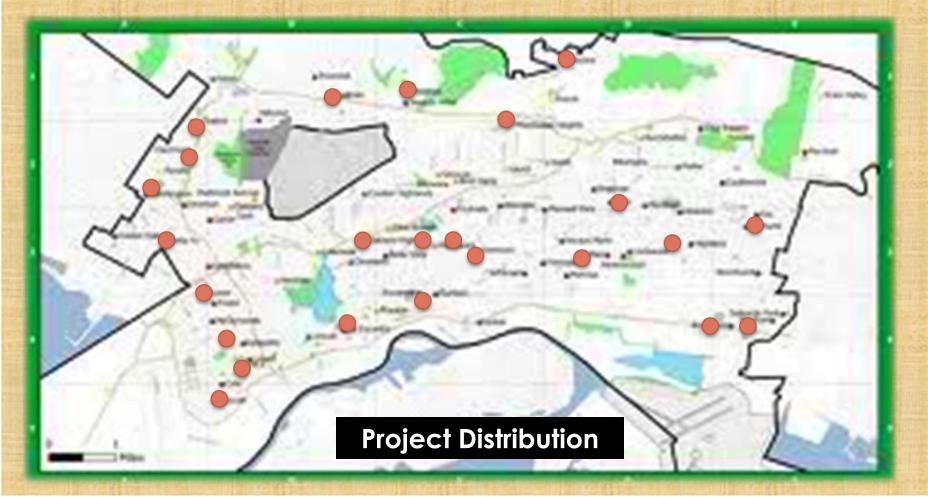

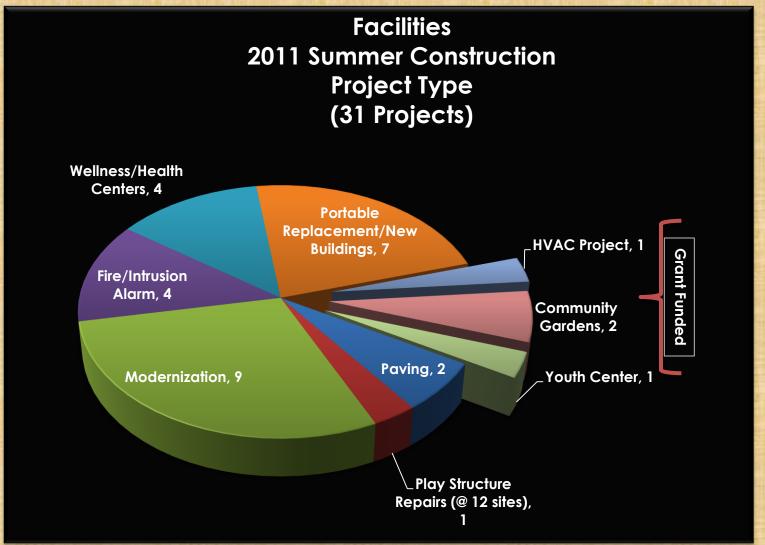


OUSD Capital Program Helps To Stimulate Local Economy

- LBU estimated at 40%
- Approximately \$12 million (of \$30 million) recycled to local businesses
- Approximately 25% of the Projects were led by Local General Contractors
- Of the District's 3 Lease-Leasebacks (LLBs):
 - 65% local business participation
 - All include Joint-Ventures that include a Small, Local Firm
 - La Escuelita Educational Center is 100% Local Joint Venture
 - Over 40 Local Firms will be utilized in LLBs

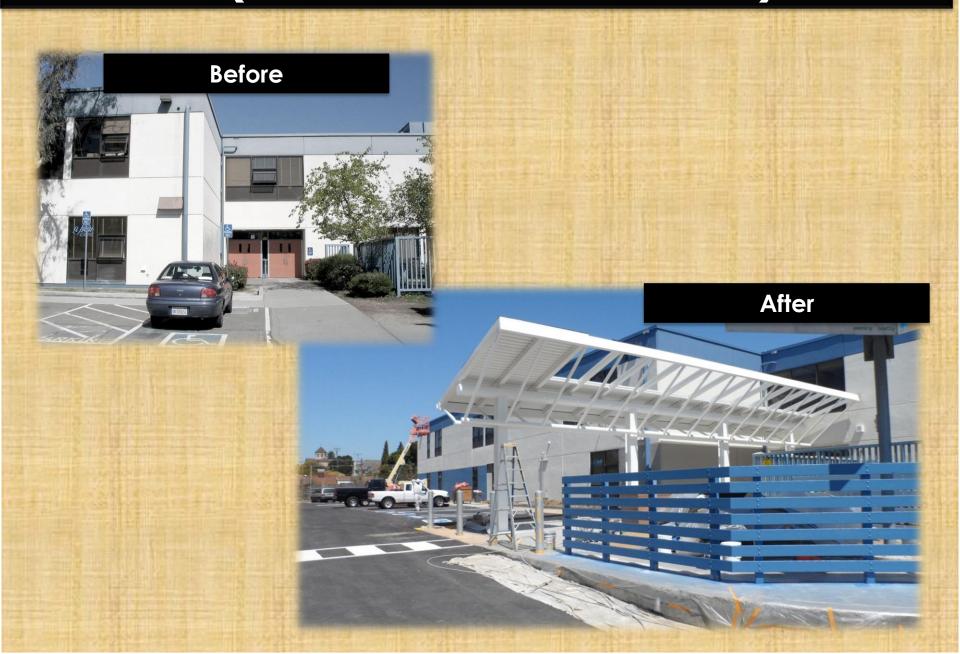

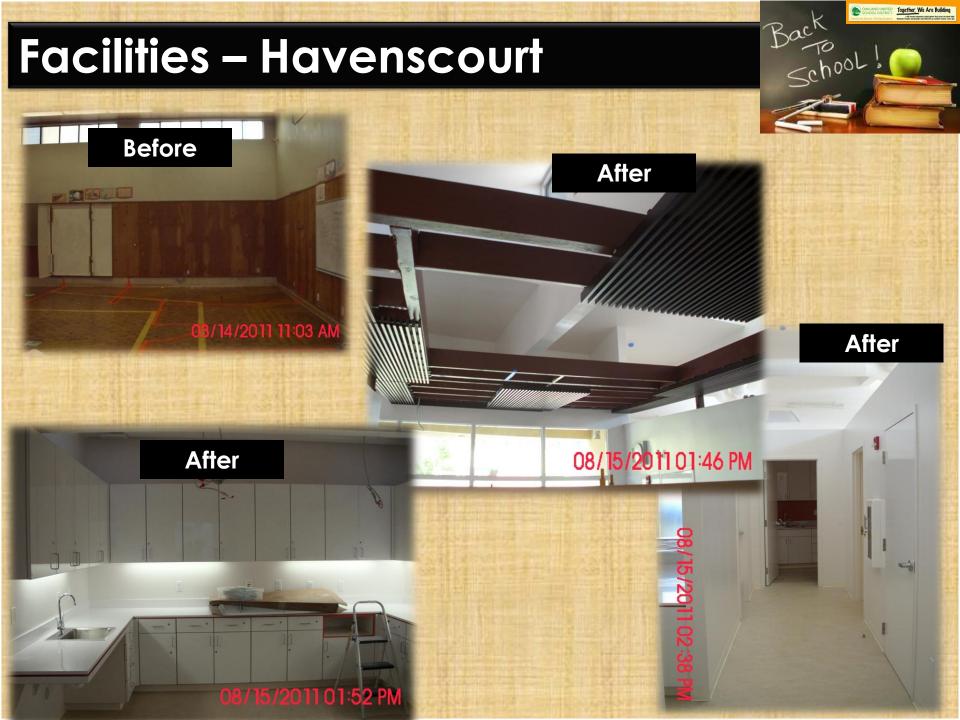
