During Be The Change Consulting was directly funded by the S.D. Bechtel, Jr. Foundation to implement the Building Intentional Communi Initiative for OUSD's elementary after school programs. For this current school year, the S.D. Bechtel, Jr. Foundation and expanded funds for the Building Intentional Communities (BIC) initiative to OUSD. With their expertise in youth development and expanded programming, Be The Change Consulting provides professional development to after school staff and BIC curriculum grounded in values-based character education. BIC has been instrumental in strengthening after school program quality at the 20 elementary sites that have been involved in this initiative. This contract with Be The Change Consulting utilizes the S.D. Bechtel Jr. Foundatio implement a sustainability plan that will build the capacity of after school providers can continue to utilize the BIC curriculum, even as t district 's work with Be The Change Consulting begins to sunset. Amendment to Professional Services Contract

As a result of this Building Intentional Communities sustainability initiative, up to 10 lead agencies will have increased capacity to implement Building Intentional Communities curriculum and strategies at over 50 program sites in upcoming program years. As a result, program sites will be able to strengthen after school program design and instructional quality that supports the social & emotional learning of participating students. Students participating in after school programs that utilize the BIC curriculum and strategies will have increased engagement in the school community (including improved school day attendance), improved relationships with peers and caring adults, and increased opportunities to practice leadership skills. This project supports OUSD's Social and Emotional Learning change strategy, and supports the district's Voluntary Resolution Plan to transform school culture and climate.

Additionally, as a result of this project, the OUSD After School Programs Office will launch its first Request for Qualifications process to set clearly defined, high expectations for all after school lead agency partners. Over 16 partnering community organizations will be held accountable to an evaluation rubric for lead agency partners as a result of the After School RFQ process. Additionally, the After School Programs Office will have an established process to thoroughly vet the capacity of new organizations interested in fulfilling the lead agency role.

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Building Intentional Communities Grant

About Oakland Unified School District

The Oakland Unified School District operates 75 after school programs across the City of Oakland, in partnership with 15 community organizations who serve as lead agency partners. The After School Programs Office within the Community Schools and Student Services department of the school district manages \$14 million of after school grant funds from the California Department of Education. These state grant funds, matched with the City of Oakland's annual investment of \$4 million of Oakland Fund for Children and Youth grant funding for school-based after school programs, represent a significant investment of public grant dollars to provide 18,000 Oakland children and youth with daily after school learning opportunities over the course of the school year and in the summer.

To ensure that all students in OUSD after school programs receive high quality after school services that result in positive youth development outcomes and support students' academic learning, health, and social-emotional well-being, the OUSD After School Programs Office has worked closely with Be The Change Consulting for the past three and a half years to strengthen professional development for after school staff and provide Building Intentional Communities program curriculum grounded in values-based, character education. Building Intentional Communities (BIC) has been instrumental in strengthening after school program quality in Oakland. As a result of the BIC curriculum and intensive professional development from Be The Change Consulting, our elementary after school programs are strengthening students' social and emotional learning skills, integrating restorative practices into after school programs by embedding values into program rituals and practices.

The Building Intentional Communities work aligns well with key school district priorities. BIC directly supports OUSD's Social and Emotional Learning change strategy, as well as the district's Restorative Justice initiative. Additionally, by strengthening students' engagement, leadership, and connectedness in OUSD schools, BIC supports the district' efforts to reduce chronic absenteeism and reduce suspension rates. As students feel more engaged and connected at school, they are less likely to want to miss school. Finally, transforming school culture and climate is a key strategy in the district's Voluntary Resolution Plan to reduce disproportionate suspension rates, especially among African American students. BIC intentionally and successfully works to improve and strengthen the culture and climate of OUSD after school programs so that after school participants experience meaningful learning experiences and develop relationships with caring adults and peers. As such, there are important BIC lessons and strategies that our after school programs can share with school and district leaders to inform OUSD's school culture and climate transformation efforts.

OUSD and our after school partners have been truly grateful for the generous support that the S.D. Bechtel, Jr. Foundation has provided Oakland for the past several years, to enable our partnership with Be The Change Consulting to blossom, and to enable us to see the real impact that Building Intentional Communities has had on our program sites. Because we have seen the value and impact of BIC on our elementary programs, our After School Programs Office and community partners have worked hard to pull together modest contributions of funds so that we could begin implementing BIC in our middle and high school after school programs as well. OUSD is committed to sustaining the Building Intentional Communities work into the future. We recognize the importance and necessity of building the capacity of our OUSD After School Programs Office and our after school lead agency partners to embed deeply the BIC practices into our organizational structures and systems of support for after school programs across the city.

The following proposal focuses on two key priorities to ensure the sustainability of Building Intentional Communities in the Oakland After School field:

- By the end of the 2014-2015 school year, tie off the BIC arc of learning and development for the final two cohorts of elementary program sites who have been involved in the BIC professional learning community. This will result in a critical mass of 20 elementary programs who will be trained in BIC by the end of the 2015 school year.
- 2) By the end of the 2014-2015 school year, build the capacity of the OUSD After School Programs Office and after school lead agency partners to sustain the Building Intentional Communities strategies, practices, and curriculum into the future. Be The Change will support OUSD in accomplishing this goal by providing a 3-part BIC Train-the-Trainer series for a core team of 15 district and agency after school leaders. These 15 practitioners will be trained in the peer coaching model and learn how to replicate a simplified version of the BIC trainings that can be sustained by OUSD after the Bechtel funding sunsets. In addition, Be the Change Consulting will provide technical assistance to OUSD After School staff to create a Request for Qualifications process that will define organizational infrastructure and internal systems required in order for after school partners to be able to implement BIC curriculum and practices effectively.

The following proposal details planned activities to achieve these two key goals.

How the BIC Initiative Intersects with Other OUSD Initiatives

Building Intentional Communities is a research-validated, field-tested approach to transforming learning environments. The model complements OUSD After School's vision to engrain youth program quality standards- defined by the David P. Weikart

Center's Youth Program Quality Assessment (YPQA) tool- deeply into all 75 after school program sites. The YPQA has become our primary assessment tool for program quality. Our external evaluator, Public Profit, conducts annual program observations on point-of-service quality using YPQA tools. Our After School Programs Office is building the capacity of program sites to utilize the YPQA as a self-assessment tool for ongoing continuous improvement. The BIC model aligns well with the YPQA tool and continuous improvement process, and serves to connect concrete strategies to the theory and indicators outlined in the YQPA, to ultimately produce youth of character. Over the past three and a half years, Be the Change Consulting has achieved consistent results implementing this BIC model to create a strong foundation of core values, character and ethics that our other initiatives can rest firmly on. For this reason we request continued funding to complete the three year cycle with the remaining 13 sites currently participating in this initiative as well as receive consulting support from Be the Change Consulting to better integrate this thinking into our long term vision for quality improvement.

This approach is appealing and timely for OUSD. Currently, almost every middle and high school in OUSD has been flagged by the Office of Civil Rights for the disproportionate suspension of African American students, especially boys. High rates of administrative and teacher turnover make maintaining school climate a challenge, and the afterschool programs are greatly influenced by the climate of the school day. We understand that to focus on issues of character development for youth, we must establish peaceful and stable climates. Young people can develop leadership, ethics, and character in these intentional communities.

Research-validated Results from the Building Intentional Communities Model Public Profit's evaluation of Be The Change Consulting's work highlights how the Building Intentional Communities model impacts change through several aspects of a program. Through the BIC Leaders of Today trainings and site-based trainings, a strong program climate emerges, as the diagram below shows.

School climate is student correlated with students' achievement abilities to achieve classroom climate academic goals. Our more engaged, tools will help you uninterrupted establish a climate teaching time grounded in values and student accountability reinforced by behavior guidance strategies to better youth relationship engage youth as critical thinkers. student behavior

How does climate impact student achievement?

Second, the leaders of today class create a core team of empowered youth who receive weekly lessons on character, social emotional learning, and leadership.



As a result, we see a downward trend in bullying by 15% and an increased sense of community.



As the BIC model has developed over the years, we see it as a simple organizing framework that resonates with afterschool line staff, program managers, teachers and principles to connect the many other research-validated principles we strive to apply throughout OUSD. In addition to the YPQA (Youth Program Quality Assessment tool), the district is also promoting initiatives such as social emotional learning, restorative justice, character education, college and career readiness, and common core. Our vision for sustainability is to frame the Building Intentional Communities model to strongly align to our district initiatives. This will create greater ownership, investment and alignment between BIC as a tool to achieve the goals of OUSD and our CBO partners.

In this proposal, we outline our request in two sections.

One: Tie-off the existing cohort

First, we respectfully request funding to tie-off the existing cohort of 13 elementary schools receiving direct training and capacity building from Be the Change Consulting. The continued capacity building efforts will allow Be the Change Consulting to complete a full three years of support to a total of 11 sites who were promised a cohort experience at the beginning of this effort. Four sites graduated from the cohort in the 2012-2013 year, and an additional three graduated in the 2013-2014 year. Four additional sites will graduate from the cohort at the end of the 2014-15 school year. Due to the sunsetting of this grant, the remaining 9 sites involved in this effort will complete 2 years of the BIC learning arc by the end of this school year. We request a total investment of \$193,175 to complete this work this year.

Second: Sustainably and Systems Integration

Secondly, we request a set of funds to be directed towards consulting and training for the OUSD afterschool programs office and key district partners to ensure sustainability of the BIC initiative beyond 2016. This knowledge transfer portion of our efforts will provide key members of OUSD's Stakeholder community with training and coaching by Be the

Change Consulting to embed the BIC model into existing structures, such as on-going agency director meetings, coordinator meetings, program quality trainings, and the August Coordinator Training Institute. We also envision developing a core team of program quality trainers, who will offer BIC trainings throughout the district beyond Be the Change Consulting's tenure. We request a total investment of \$37,825 for this phase of the work.

What Institutionalized Practices Must be In Place to Sustain the BIC Initiative

To build our sustainability plan, we began by first examining the type and level of support Be the Change Consulting has been funded to provide over the past three and a half years. From the outset, this initiative was designed to be largely self-sustaining beyond 2016. We have spent the past few weeks re-thinking the strategies necessary to complete the initiative by 2015. By the end of 2015, with generous support from the Bechtel, Jr. Foundation, The Building Intentional Communities model will be firmly embedded into 20 OUSD elementary schools. This represents almost 50% of the OUSD elementary afterschool programs. We do not envision the OUSD Afterschool Office or partnering CBOs will replicate all aspects of the BIC capacity building model, as we do not have the necessary funds or staffing for this. We can, however, support the maintenance of the initiative by embedding it into school climate and program quality initiatives across the district which we anticipate having even greater long-term impact.

Currently, each afterschool program receives three levels of support, designed to shift one aspect of program climate over three years - Site Leadership, Staff Practices, and Youth Experiences. To successfully sustain this initiative beyond the intensive support Be the Change Consulting provides, we see the need to add an administrative level of support, that is held within OUSD.



In order to support a hand-off of this initiative to internal OUSD staff and CBO partners who run the afterschool programs, Be the Change Consulting will engage our stakeholders in the 2014-2015 school year to begin the knowledge transfer process of the Building Intentional Communities model concluding by August 31, 2015.

Embedding the BIC Initiative Into OUSD Systems & Roles From 2014-2016 In order to transition the implementation and support of the BIC model to OUSD stakeholders, we see the need to:

- 1. **Design** a sustainability plan and supporting tools in partnership with Be the Change Consulting
- 2. Invest OUSD Stakeholders in the BIC Initiative
- **3. Embed** Building Intentional Communities into Leadership of partnering community-based organizations (CBOs)

- 4. Develop BIC Trainers
- 5. Establish Peer Coaches

We describe each of these components in deeper detail below.

1. Design a Sustainability Plan

We realize the need to define and hold our CBO partners accountable for having strong organizational infrastructures in place to support high quality programming. This includes having appropriate systems, structures, and practices that create the conditions for after school staff to engage in continuous improvement practices that strengthen the quality of services they provide daily to students. The organizational structures and practices that support the successful implementation of Building Intentional Communities curriculum are essentially the structures and practices that any strong youth service provider should have in place to provide high quality programming. Thus, we recognize the value of aligning organizational practices needed for BIC implementation with clearly defined organizational expectations that we will hold for our lead agency partners. To do so, we will issue an RFQ to the Oakland After School field in the Fall. The RFQ will ask any CBO partners who intend to run OUSD afterschool and summer programs to engage in a thorough self-study, in which they will analyze their own organizational systems and structures that support program quality (as defined by the YPOA tool) and intentional program design to ensure each afterschool program is creating the right conditions for the BIC initiative to thrive.

Total Investment: \$6,000

2. Invest OUSD Stakeholders in the BIC Initiative

The next step in sustaining the BIC initiative is to identify the existing systemic supports for afterschool program quality. In our initial analysis, we have found the following points of intersection between OUSD's infrastructure and the BIC model.



We see a need to harness each of these stakeholders to broaden our base of champions in the BIC work. Given the reduction in funding, our office will establish champions for this initiative ourselves.

Total Investment: \$0

3. Invest in CBO Leadership

OUSD's afterschool programs are managed and run by a collection of CBO partners, including Bay Area Community Resources, East Bay Asian Youth Center, Girls Inc., Higher Ground, YMCA of the East Bay, and East Bay Agency for Children. Ensuring sustainable change will entail investing the leaders of these CBO agencies in an enhanced definition for program quality, which will combine program climate, linkage to the school day, character development and youth leadership opportunities. In order to create even more traction for our CBO partners to take lifting the bar on program quality seriously, the After School Programs Office will issue an RFQ process, to create transparency and clarity about what we define as program quality. We envision sharing this thinking with our agency leaders. Given the reduction in funding, we will utilize existing agency director meetings and other OUSD leadership meetings to establish this vision for our partners.

Total Investment: \$0

4. Develop BIC Trainers

After identifying stakeholders and aligning BIC theory to existing OUSD structures, we will develop a team of fifteen internal trainers. We will offer this cohort training on BIC theory, supply them with BIC tools, and practice using the tools to support afterschool programs to implement the BIC model. This will include developing a cohort of OUSD

trainers (comprised of CBO partners and OUSD After School staff) to educate more people on the model. We will work with CBO partners to position this trainer network as a leadership ladder for individuals interested in expanding their skill set and capacity building tools. This cohort will engage in a 3-part Training of Trainers' series. The Training of Trainers series (TOT) will be where practitioners learn the theory and principles of the BIC model. We will offer members of this cohort an opportunity to sit in on the Leaders of Today trainings offered by Be the Change Consulting this year, so they can see how the trainings are designed and delivered to line staff. This will allow us to leverage existing capacity building offerings for this cohort. After training, we see utilizing this cohort of trainers to offer BIC trainings and support site-based implementation throughout the district.

Total Investment: \$57,000

5. Establish Peer Coaches

Finally, drawing on the success of the peer coach model developed in the 2013-2014 school year, we will establish another team of peer coaches, drawing from coordinators who have successfully implemented the BIC initiative at their sites. These coaches will support additional schools to implement the BIC model. We see this strategy as a way to create localized leadership for the peer coaches, as well as to incentivize site coordinators who graduated from the BIC model to ensure they continue to apply the BIC strategies at their own sites. We hope to establish 1-3 demonstration sites over the next two years—sites that create a strong foundation of culture and climate and establish youth leaders who can truly drive youth-led social change projects. Offering coordinators these opportunities to demonstrate their skills, share their knowledge and exemplify best practices will support us to drive enthusiasm and excitement for program quality. Coaches will engage in a 1-day retreat, and receive a binder with coaching agendas, program design tools and curriculum strategies to help them replicate the systems and structures needed for a site to replicate the BIC initiative.

Total Investment: \$8,500

Math Consulting

In addition to supporting the Building Intentional Communities work in OUSD after school programs, the S.D. Bechtel Jr., Foundation has also been a strong supporter of strengthening after school math instruction in our programs. The OUSD After School Programs Office respectfully requests \$19,000 of continued foundation support of our after school elementary math work. This investment will enable the OUSD After School Programs Office to continue developing engaging after school math curriculum for students in $1^{st} - 5^{th}$ grades. We will continue partnering closely with the school district's Math Unit in the Teaching and Learning Department to ensure that there is coherence between the after school and school day math curriculum. We will hire an experienced OUSD teacher on extended contract to work with our office to develop 30 weeks of after school math curriculum, aligned with the new Common Core math standards and the OUSD math scope and sequence for elementary schools. This curriculum will be

developed over the course of the 2014-15 school year and 2015 summer. Then beginning in the Fall of 2015, the OUSD After School Programs Office will again offer an After School Math Learning Community to 15 participating elementary program sites. Participants in the learning community will receive training on the math curriculum. They will also be trained on facilitation strategies to effectively support students' math learning and to create a social-emotional environment in the after school classroom that will encourage students to take risks with their math learning, be confident in engaging in academic math discussions with peers, and positively interact with peers on collaborative math projects. These learning community participants will then provide a cohort of 20 students in each of the 15 participating after school program sites with a one-hour, weekly after school math lesson for 30 weeks of the 2015-16 school year. Math learning community participants will receive approximately 6 hours of on-site coaching from an experienced teacher to support their effectiveness in providing after school math instruction.

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES CONTRACT 2014-2015

This Agreement is entered into between Be The Change Consulting, LLC

(CONTRACTOR) and Oakland Unified School District (OUSD). OUSD is authorized by Government Code Section 53060 to contract for the furnishing of special services and advice in financial, economic, accounting, engineering, legal, and administrative matters with persons specially trained, experienced, and competent to perform such services. CONTRACTOR warrants it is specially trained, experienced, and competent to provide such services. The parties agree as follows:

- 1. Services: CONTRACTOR shall provide the ("Services" or "Work") as described in Exhibit "A," attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.
- Terms: CONTRACTOR shall commence work on 09/01/2014 _____, or the day immediately following approval by the Superintendent if the aggregate amount CONTRACTOR has contracted with the District is below \$84,100 in the current fiscal year; or, approval by the Board of Education if the total contract(s) exceed \$84,100 whichever is later. The work shall be completed no later than 6/30/2015 ______.
- Compensation: OUSD agrees to pay CONTRACTOR for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this Agreement. The compensation under this Contract shall not exceed <u>Twenty One, Two Hundred Twenty Five</u>

Dollars (\$21,225.00) [per fiscal year], at an hourly billing rate not to exceed ______ per hour. This sum shall be for

full performance of this Agreement and includes all fees, costs, and expenses incurred by Contractor including, but not limited to, labor, materials, taxes, profit, overhead, travel, insurance, subcontractor costs, and other costs.

If CONTRACTOR will be compensated hourly for services provided under this Contract, CONTRACTOR shall describe in Exhibit "A," attached hereto, the specific scope of services to be delivered on an hourly basis to OUSD.

OUSD shall not be liable to CONTRACTOR for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by CONTRACTOR in performing services for OUSD, except as follows: N/A

Payment for Work shall be made for all undisputed amounts in monthly installment payments within forty-five (45) days after CONTRACTOR submits an invoice to OUSD for Work actually completed and after OUSD's written approval of the Work, or the portion of the Work for which payment is to be made.

The granting of any payment by OUSD, or the receipt thereof by CONTRACTOR, shall in no way lessen the liability of CONTRACTOR to correct unsatisfactory work, although the unsatisfactory character of that work may not have been apparent or detected at the time a payment was made. Work, which does not conform to the requirements of this Agreement, may be rejected by the District and in that case must be replaced by CONTRACTOR without delay.

 Equipment and Materials: CONTRACTOR shall provide all equipment, materials, and supplies necessary for the performance of this Agreement except: N/A

5. CONTRACTOR Qualifications / Performance of Services:

CONTRACTOR Qualifications: CONTRACTOR warrants it is specially trained, experienced, competent and fully licensed to provide the Services required by this Agreement in conformity with the laws and regulations of the State of California, the United States of America, and all local laws, ordinances and,/or regulations, as they may apply.

Standard of Care: CONTRACTOR warrants that CONTRACTOR has the qualifications and ability to perform the Services in a professional manner, without the advice, control, or supervision of OUSD. CONTRACTOR's services will be performed, findings obtained, reports and recommendations prepared in accordance with generally and currently accepted principles and practices of its profession for services to California school districts.

- 6. Invoicing: Invoices furnished by CONTRACTOR under this Agreement must be in a form acceptable to OUSD. All amounts paid by OUSD shall be subject to audit by OUSD. Invoices shall include, but not be limited to: Contractor name, Contractor address, invoice date, invoice number, purchase order number, name of school or department service was provided to, period of service, name of the person performing the service, date service was rendered, brief description of services provided, number of hours of service, hourly rate, total payment requested.
- Notices: All notices and invoices provided for under this Agreement shall be in writing and either personally delivered during normal business hours or sent by U.S. Mail (certified, return receipt requested) with postage prepaid to the other party at the address set forth below:

Notice shall be effective when received if personally served or, if mailed, three days after mailing. Either party must give written notice of a change of address.

8. Status of Contractor: This is not an employment contract. CONTRACTOR, in the performance of this Agreement, shall be and act as an independent contractor. CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partner, or joint venture of OUSD, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of OUSD and/or to which OUSD's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Worker's Compensation. CONTRACTOR shall assume full responsibility for payment of all Federal, State, and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to CONTRACTOR's employees. In the performance of the work herein contemplated, CONTRACTOR is an independent contractor or business entity, with the sole authority for controlling and directing the performance of the details of the work, OUSD being interested only in the results obtained.

9. Insurance:

- 1. Unless specifically waived by OUSD, the following insurance is required:
 - i. If CONTRACTOR employs any person to perform work in connection with this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall procure and maintain at all times during the performance of such work, Workers' Compensation Insurance in conformance with the laws of the State of California and Federal laws when applicable. Employers' Liability Insurance shall not be less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per accident or disease.

Check one of the boxes below:

CONTRACTOR is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the Labor Code which require every employer to be insured against liability for workers' compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that code, and will comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the Work of this Contract.

CONTRACTOR does not employ anyone in the manner subject to the workers' compensation laws of California.

- ii. CONTRACTOR shall maintain Commercial General Liability insurance, including automobile coverage with limits of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence for bodily injury and property damage. The coverage shall be primary as to OUSD and shall name OUSD as an additional insured. Evidence of insurance must be attached. Endorsement of OUSD as an additional insured shall not affect OUSD's rights to any claim, demand, suit or judgment made, brought or recovered against CONTRACTOR. The policy shall protect CONTRACTOR and OUSD in the same manner as though each were separately issued. Nothing in said policy shall operate to increase the Insurer's liability as set forth in the policy beyond the amount or amounts shown or to which the Insurer would have been liable if only one interest were named as an insured.
- iii. If CONTRACTOR is offering OUSD professional advice under this Contract, CONTRACTOR shall maintain Errors and Omissions insurance or Professional Liability insurance with coverage limits of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per claim.

OR

- iv. CONTRACTOR is not required to maintain any insurance under this agreement. (Completed and approved Waiver of Insurance Form is required from OUSD's Risk Management.) Waiver of insurance does not release CONTRACTOR from responsibility for any claim or demand.
- 10. Licenses and Permits: CONTRACTOR shall obtain and keep in force all licenses, permits, and certificates necessary for the performance of this Agreement.
- 11. Assignment: The obligations of CONTRACTOR under this Agreement shall not be assigned by CONTRACTOR without the express prior written consent of OUSD.
- 12. Non-Discrimination: It is the policy of OUSD that in connection with all work performed under Contracts there be no discrimination because of race, color, ancestry, national origin, religious creed, physical disability, medical condition, marital status, sexual orientation, gender, or age; therefore, CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to, the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735 and OUSD policy. In addition, CONTRACTOR agrees to require like compliance by all its subcontractor(s). CONTRACTOR shall not engage in unlawful discrimination in employment on the basis of actual or perceived; race, color, national origin, ancestry, religion, age, marital status, pregnancy, physical or mental disability, medical condition, veteran status, gender, sex or sexual orientation.

- Drug-Free / Smoke Free Policy: No drugs, alcohol, and/or smoking are allowed at any time in any buildings and/or grounds on OUSD property. No students, staff, visitors, CONTRACTORS, or subcontractors are to use controlled substances, alcohol or tobacco on these sites.
- 14. Indemnification: CONTRACTOR agrees to hold harmless, indemnify, and defend OUSD and its officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims or losses accruing or resulting from injury, damage, or death of any person, firm, or corporation in connection with the performance of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR also agrees to hold harmless, indemnify, and defend OUSD and its elective board, officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims or losses incurred by any supplier, contractor, or subcontractor furnishing work, services, or materials to CONTRACTOR in connection with the performance of this Agreement. This provision survives termination of this Agreement.
- 15. Copyright/Trademark/Patent/Ownership: CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that all matters produced under this Agreement shall become the property of OUSD and cannot be used without OUSD's express written permission. OUSD shall have all right, title and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark, and/or patent of said matter in the name of OUSD. CONTRACTOR consents to use of CONTRACTOR's name in conjunction with the sale, use, performance and distribution of the matters, for any purpose and in any medium. These matters include, without limitation, drawings, plans, specifications, studies, reports, memoranda, computation sheets, the contents of computer diskettes, artwork, copy, posters, billboards, photographs, videotapes, audiotapes, systems designs, software, reports, diagrams, surveys, source codes or any other original works of authorship, or other documents prepared by CONTRACTOR or its Sub-CONTRACTORs in connection with the Services performed under this Agreement. All works shall be works for hire as defined under Title 17 of the United States Code, and all copyrights in those works are the property of OUSD.
- 16. Waiver: No delay or omission by either party in exercising any right under this Agreement shall operate as a waiver of that or any other right or prevent a similar subsequent act from constituting a violation of the Agreement.
- 17. Termination: OUSD may at any time terminate this Agreement upon 30 days prior written notice to CONTRACTOR. OUSD shall compensate CONTRACTOR for services satisfactorily provided through the date of termination. In addition, OUSD may terminate this Agreement for cause should CONTRACTOR fail to perform any part of this Agreement. In the event of termination for cause, OUSD may secure the required services from another contractor. If the cost to OUSD exceeds the cost of providing the services pursuant to this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall pay the additional cost.
- Conduct of CONTRACTOR: By signing this Agreement, CONTRACTOR certifies compliance with the following requirements and will
 provide OUSD with evidence of staff qualifications, which include:
 - 1. Tuberculosis Screening: CONTRACTOR is required to screen employees who will be working at OUSD sites for more than six hours. CONTRACTOR affirms that each employee has current proof of negative TB testing on file and TB results are monitored.
 - 2. Fingerprinting of Employees and Agents. The fingerprinting and criminal background investigation requirements of Education Code section 45125.1 apply to CONTRACTOR's services under this Agreement and CONTRACTOR certifies its compliance with these provisions as follows: "CONTRACTOR certifies that CONTRACTOR has complied with the fingerprinting and criminal background investigation requirements of Education Code section 45125.1 with respect to all CONTRACTOR's employees, subcontractors, agents, and subcontractors' employees or agents ("Employees") regardless of whether those Employees are paid or unpaid, concurrently employed by OUSD, or acting as independent contractors of CONTRACTOR, who may have contact with OUSD pupils in the course of providing services pursuant to the Agreement, and the California Department of Justice has determined that none of those Employees has been convicted of a felony, as that term is defined in Education Code section 45122.1. Contractor further certifies that it has received and reviewed fingerprint results for each of its Employees and Contractor has requested and reviews subsequent arrest records for all Employees who may come into contract with OUSD pupils in providing services to the District under this Agreement.

In the event that OUSD, in its sole discretion, at any time during the term of this contract, desires the removal of any CONTRACTOR related persons, employee, representative or agent from an OUSD school site and, or property, CONTRACTOR shall immediately, upon receiving notice from OUSD of such desire, cause the removal of such person or persons.

- 19. No Rights in Third Parties: This Agreement does not create any rights in, or inure to the benefit of, any third party except as expressly provided herein.
- OUSD's Evaluation of CONTRACTOR and CONTRACTOR's Employees and/or Subcontractors. OUSD may evaluate CONTRACTOR's work in any way that OUSD is entitled to do so pursuant to applicable law. The OUSD's evaluation may include, without limitation:
 - Requesting that OUSD employee(s) evaluate the CONTRACTOR and the CONTRACTOR's employees and subcontractors and each of their performance.
 - 2. Announced and unannounced observance of CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR's employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s).
- 21. Limitation of OUSD Liability: Other than as provided in this Agreement, OUSD's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall OUSD be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of, or in connection with, this Agreement for the services performed in connection with this Agreement.
- 22. Confidentiality: CONTRACTOR and all CONTRACTOR's agents, personnel, employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s) shall maintain the confidentiality of all information received in the course of performing the Services. CONTRACTOR understands that student records are confidential and agrees to comply with all state and federal laws concerning the maintenance and disclosure of student records. This requirement to maintain confidentiality shall extend beyond the termination of this Agreement. Contractors will be permitted

access to student data only where permissible under state and federal law and only after executing OUSD's Confidentiality Agreement Regarding Student Data.

23. Conflict of Interest: CONTRACTOR shall abide by and be subject to all applicable, regulations, statutes or other laws regarding conflict of interest. CONTRACTOR shall not hire any officer or employee of OUSD to perform any service by this Agreement without the prior approval of OUSD Human Resources.

CONTRACTOR affirms to the best of his/her/its knowledge, there exists no actual or potential conflict of interest between CONTRACTOR's family, business or financial interest and the services provided under this Agreement, and in the event of change in either private interest or services under this Agreement, any question regarding possible conflict of interest which may arise as a result of such change will be brought to OUSD's attention in writing.

Through its execution of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR acknowledges that it is familiar with the provisions of section 1090 et seq. and section 87100 et seq. of the Government Code of the State of California, and certifies that it does not know of any facts which constitute a violation of said provisions. In the event CONTRACTOR receives any information subsequent to execution of this Agreement which might constitute a violation of said provisions, CONTRACTOR agrees it shall notify OUSD in writing.

- 24. Certification Regarding Debarment, Suspension, Ineligibility and Voluntary Exclusion: CONTRACTOR certifies to the best of his/her/its knowledge and belief, that it and its principals are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by any Federal department or agency according to Federal Acquisition Regulation Subpart 9.4, and by signing this contract, certifies that this vendor does not appear on the Excluded Parties List (https://www.sam.gov/).
- 25. Litigation: This Agreement shall be performed in Oakland, California and is governed by the laws of the State of California. The Alameda County Superior Court shall have jurisdiction over any state court litigation initiated to enforce or interpret this Agreement.
- 26. Incorporation of Recitals and Exhibits: The Recitals and each exhibit attached hereto are hereby incorporated herein by reference.
- 27. Integration/Entire Agreement of Parties: This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties.
- 28. Counterparts: This Agreement and all amendments and supplements to it may be executed in counterparts, and all counterparts together shall be construed as one document.
- 29. Signature Authority: Each party has the full power and authority to enter into and perform this Agreement, and the person signing this Agreement on behalf of each Party has been given the proper authority and empowered to enter into this Agreement.
- 30. Contract Contingent on Governing Board Approval: OUSD shall not be bound by the terms of this Agreement until it has been formally approved by OUSD's Governing Board, and no payment shall be owed or made to CONTRACTOR absent formal approval. This Agreement shall be deemed to be approved when it has been signed by the Board of Education, and/or the Superintendent as its designee.
- 31. W-9 Form: If CONTRACTOR is doing business with OUSD for the first time, complete and return with the signed Contract the W-9 form.
