Action Requested Ratification by the Board of Education approving Oakland USD's support of

School Food FOCUS Letter for Equitable Access to USDA Foods.

Background Oakland Unified School District Nutrition Services has been a member of School

Food FOCUS since 2007. School Food FOCUS is a national collaborative that leverages the knowledge and procurement power of large school districts to make school meals nationwide more healthful, regionally sourced, and

sustainably produced.

Discussion While Oakland Unified School District does not receive USDA Foods (formerly

known as Commodities) it supports the notion that all schools should have equal access to all USDA Foods. The current practice allows States to restrict certain food items including healthier options. Ultimately, changing this practice will benefit Oakland students because increasing access and availability of these products through USDA Foods will increase access commercially. By increasing

demand, supply will follow.

School Food FOCUS is a network of large school districts and child nutrition partners working to bring more healthful, regionally sourced and sustainably produced foods to students. We are proud to be working in partnership with many allies in both the public and private sector on these goals, by improving procurement practices and increasing the availability of more healthful foods in our nation's school meals. We are particularly pleased to note that USDA has made significant strides in improving the quality of the very wide range of foods available through the USDA Foods program. Unfortunately, many school districts across the country have access to only a very limited selection of these nutritious foods.

Given the importance of school food to children's health and the critical role USDA Foods play in helping school districts' meet the new nutrition standards and meal pattern requirements, it is imperative that districts nationwide have the ability to make the best possible use of what the USDA Foods program has to offer.

Therefore, we, the undersigned, urge USDA to:

- 1. Engage state distributing agencies to ensure that school food authorities in all states have more equitable access to the full USDA Foods list, as required in 7 C.F.R. § 250.24 (d) (10), 7 C.F.R. § 250.58(a) and 7 C.F.R. § 250.13 (a)(4).
- 2. Instruct distributing agencies to establish regular, ongoing communications with recipient agencies (i.e., school districts) and facilitate districts' participation in determining priorities for their states' USDA Foods orders as required by 7°C.F.R. § 250.24 (b), 7 C.F.R. § 250.13 (a)(6), and 7 C.F.R. \(250.13 \) (e), and 7 C.F.R. \(250.58 \) (a).
- 3. Many RAs lack the food storage, preparation and cooking facilities to serve more whole and minimally processed foods and are therefore working hard to further process bulk USDA Foods into more healthful end products. USDA should therefore a) require state agencies to inform RAs of all available options for further processing of USDA Foods b) make all value pass-through methods available to RAs, including net off invoicing as outlined in 7 C.F.R. § 250.24 (a)(8) and (g) and c) articulate the reason(s) the state has chosen to restrict any processing or value pass-through options.
