
Celebrating A Decade of Growth

- 2000 Opened with 17 students.
- 2005 Charter renewed and expanded to serve a K-8 population.
- 2006 Acquired permanent home at 1000 42nd Street in North Oakland.



- Current enrollment of 183 students in grades Kindergarten – 7th grade.
- Fall 2010 we complete our growth phase with 210 students in Kindergarten – 8th grade.








A Highly Desirable Public School Option

NOCCS - Application & Admissions Data 2005 - 2010







CST ELA Performance All Students


- Over the past five years, an average of 73% or all NOCCS students have scored proficient or advanced.
- The school has reduced the percentage of students scoring below and far below basic in each of the last two years.



CST – ELA Subgroup Data


- 50% of all for African American/Black students have scored proficient or advanced on the CST over the past two academic years.
- The percentage of students scoring basic, below basic, and far below basic have shown a decrease each of the past three years.





- No Hispanic student scored below or far below basic in 08-09.
- Over 50% of all Economically Disadvantages students have scored proficient or advanced on the CST three of the past five year.
- The percentage of ED students scoring below basic or far below basic has decreased each of the past two years.
- Over 50% of NOCCS students with disabilities scored proficient or advanced three of the past five years.


CST Math Performance All Students



- Over the past five years, an average of 69% or all NOCCS students have scored proficient or advanced.
- The school has reduced the percentage of students scoring below and far below basic in each of the last three years.

CST – Math Subgroup Data

• 60% of all African American/Black students scored proficient or advanced on the CST in the 08-09 academic year.



- The percentage of Hispanic students scoring basic, below basic, and far below basic have shown a decrease each of the past four years, with no Hispanic student scoring below or far below basic in 08-09.
- The percentage of Economically Disadvantaged students scoring below and far below basic fell from approximately 44% in 07-08 to 18% in 08-09.
- In 08-09 55% of students with disabilities scored proficent or advanced.

Progressive & Equitable Education Philosophy and Program



- A NOCCS education seeks to develop in students the ability to think critically, express creatively, and to act thoughtfully in an increasingly complex and interconnected world.
- The NOCCS curriculum, with an emphasis on Teaching for Understanding, is designed to enable students to meet and/or exceed grade level standards through the exploration of indepth, powerful, disciplinary-based skills, ideas, and strategies.
- Our pedagogy incorporates a number of best practices for effectively and equitably building mastery of skills and content as well as critical thinking and reasoning.
- The arts, environment, service-learning, peacemaking, and technology are integrated into our instructional units and strategies

A Thoughtful & Flexible School Structure & Culture

- K-5 multi-age classrooms and 6 8th grade structures include team-taught cored block-scheduled classes, advisory programming, and service-learning cohorts are designed to enable all students to be well know by teacher and peers.
- Classroom schedules are designed to enable teachers to provide targeted, small group and individualized instruction to a range of students.
- NOCCS provides additional programming to support the academic acceleration and/or social/emotional support of students who have yet to master grade level standards and/or expectations.
- One of our key strategies for supporting a safe, positive, and productive school climate and culture is enacted through our peacemaking philosophy, practices, and curriculum.





Active and Engaged Families

- NOCCS was founded by a group of dedicated educators and families who believed in the power of public education
- NOCCS families log over 7,000 volunteer hours per year
- Family members serve in a variety of capacities from handwriting instruction and fundraising to board membership and running the NOCCS Café.
- In our 2006 capital campaign we had 100% family participation that enabled us to become one of the first Oakland charter schools to acquire our own school facilities.
- In March, one of our parents will be recognized as the California Charter Schools Association Volunteer of the Year





A Powerful Professional Learning Community





- Each teacher participates in over 160 hours of site-based professional development per year
- Our professional development programming also utilizes a number of best practices for strong professional learning communities, such as the use of protocols to guide the development and peer-review of curriculum, examining student work, coaching models, and the use of teacher inquiry
- All staff are closely observed and evaluated each year
- NOCCS has maintained over an 85% teacher retention rate over the past two years.

Skilled and Responsible Leadership and Governance

- Five members of this board are elected by stakeholders within the school community. The board also includes two staff members – the director and a teacher as well as other appointed members, often from outside of the school community.
- Our Trustees include a highly diverse group of leaders with broad expertise in a number of critical areas including progressive education, charter school organization and management, finance, legal, business and non-profit operations/management, and fundraising/development.
- NOCCS Board and staff collaborate to create and monitor annual educational and board priorities.

- We hold adequate cash reserves
- Our five year projections show a promising fiscal outlook that will enable us to continue to implement a high quality educational and operational program as well to continue to build our cash reserves.


