Why does access to library services matter?

Studies consistently demonstrate:

- A positive relationship between full-time, qualified school librarians and scores on standards-based assessments
- Students in underachieving subgroups benefit the most
- **Graduation rates improve** where schools employ certified school librarians.



A comprehensive 2018 study of California school libraries found that **student achievement increased with investment in library services**, even controlling for factors like poverty level, ethnicity, and percentage of English language learners.


Measure G Expenditures

\$5.35M in Measure G monies allocated to Libraries in 2024-25



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
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Access to Library Services in OUSD
