The germination of The Lorax Project began with the construction of the 4th bore of the Caldecott Tunnel. A variety of mitigation strategies were considered to reduce the impact of the anticipated increase in vehicle traffic. Planting trees along Highway 24 was proposed first by the 4th Bore Coalition and later through an Adopt-a-Highway initiative, but Caltrans objected. In late 2013, the City of Oakland agreed to permit the planting of redwood trees adjacent to the highway at Chabot Recreation Center Area and Chabot Elementary School. The Lorax Project also plans to offer trees to residents on Miles Ave. between Patton St. and Presley Way.

People who live, work, or attend schools near major freeways experience negative health effects due to increased exposure to air pollution. Children living or attending schools near freeways are at increased risk of asthma, allergies, bronchitis, and impaired lung function growth. Schools and parks located near freeways are particularly hazardous for children as their lungs are fragile and still developing. Long-term consequences from repeated exposure to freeway pollution include compromised adult lung functioning, lung disease, heart disease, and cancer. Studies have shown that trees located near highways can serve as a barrier that can significantly reduce the transmission of pollutants through the air. (See the science.)

New schools are immune to the difficulties faced by Chabot Elementary School and nearby Claremont Middle School; the passage of a 2003 state law Ibanned new school construction within 500 feet of a major freeway. California legislators reviewed the scientific evidence and determined January 7, 2014 - We have received donations for 82 trees! Through Urban Biofilter it looks like we are receiving an in-kind donation of redwood trees that bumps up our total to 96 trees! With donations still trickling in, we are considering our fundraising complete! On to Phase II - planting!

the health risks for children going to schools located within 500 feet of the freeway was unacceptable. The entirety of both the Chabot Elementary and Claremont Middle School campuses are within 500 feet of the highway. Two years ago, Claremont Middle School planted rows of redwood trees on their property adjacent to the highway.

Funding for The Lorax Project is dependent entirely upon community donations. The final number of trees planted will depend upon the amount raised in December 2013. Trees will be planted in mid-January, 2014. It costs an estimated \$125 for one tree. This amount covers the cost of the tree, site preparation, planting, irrigation, and maintenance for the two years needed for the root structure to be established. Donors or two or more trees can chose where the trees will be planted. All donations are tax-deductible. Fundraising for the The Lorax Project is now complete.
