Next, visit the United States Marine Corps War Memorial depicting U.S. Marines raising the American flag at Iwo Jima. On the National Mall, which extends from the Capitol to the Potomac River, get a daytime view of the Washington Monument. Visit the Franklin Delano Roosevelt Memorial and the newly dedicated Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial. Finish your sightseeing with a photo stop at the White House, home of every U.S. president except George Washington.

Excursion to Mount Vernon* • Travel through the Virginia countryside to Mount Vernon, the lovely retreat overlooking the Potomac. George and Martha Washington lived here from 1754 to 1799, aside from Washington's stay in Philadelphia during his presidency. You'll find high-tech immersive exhibits to experience this distinguished life from modest beginnings as a land surveyor to Revolutionary War hero to the first president of the United States of America.

You are assured a view of the Washington Monument from nearly every part of the city thanks to the capital's original urban planners who imposed height restrictions on downtown buildings. DAY 5 * DEPARTURE

The Smithsonian museums • Explore more of the Smithsonian museums unmatched collections. Check out the *Wright 1903 Flyer* on display at the National Air and Space Museum. You can also see the Apollo 11 command module, *Columbia*, which orbited the moon while Neil Armstrong and Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin first walked on the surface in 1969. The National Museum of Natural History reveals objects as varied as the 45.52-carat Hope Diamond and dinosaur skeletons. And to satisfy your artistic side, take in masterpieces by Andy Warhol. Willem de Kooning and Pablo Picasso at the Hirshhorn Museum and Sculpture Garden.

OPTION 2 * New York City

DAY 4 ★ WASHINGTON, D.C. ★ NEW YORK CITY

Transfer to New York City • Travel to New York City, which British explorer Henry Hudson "discovered" in 1609 while searching for a passage to China. Today, the Big Apple is the largest metropolis in the United States. It is a place of considerable history and the pulsing present, of national treasures and international style and of an eclectic mix of denizens all proud to call themselves New Yorkers. This city has an American spirit all its own.

Top of the Rock • Take in an unobstructed panoramic view of New York from atop the famous Rockefeller Center, home to the world's most recognized ice rink and Christmas tree. The excitement starts as you zoom up this National Historic Landmark in an elevator that dazzles with a ceiling light show. Then explore the amazing views of Manhattan from a three-tiered observation deck on the 67th, 69th and 70th floors. The top deck stands 850 feet above street level and provides a perfect place to pinpoint many of the city's favorite landmarks.

DAY 5 ★ STATUE OF LIBERTY ★ NEW YORK CITY

Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island • Travel by ferry to Liberty Island and see the statue as many immigrants did as they arrived by ship. A gift from France in honor of the French-U.S. alliance, the statue's iron skeleton was designed by Alexandre Gustave Eiffel (of Eiffel Tower farme), sculpted by F. A. Bartholdi and modeled on the Colossus of Rhodes. Liberty Enlightening the World, the statue's full title, was unveiled to much fanfare in 1888. Continue on to Ellis Island, which welcomed millions of immigrants to the U.S. around the turn of the century. Ellis Island is now the site of a museum chronicling the history of European immigration.

Guided sightseeing of New York City • A licensed guide leads your sightseeing tour of New York City. Begin your tour at the World Trade Center site and pay tribute to the victims of September 11 at Ground Zero. The area will be home to One World Trade Center, designed to reach a height of 1,776 feet and be the tallest building in the United States. Next, travel through the mosaic of Manhattan neighborhoods. Pass the cast-iron architecture of impossibly trendy SoHo (so-called since it's "SOuth of HOuston Street") and drive through Greenwich Village, New York's province of bohemians, immigrants and students. Make a stop in the 843-acre Central Park, a oasis in the concrete jungle. Here, see Strawberry Fields, a tribute to John Lennon that includes 161 plant species, representing 161 nations of the world. (If you look overhead, you can also see the Dakota apartment building where John Lennon and Yoko Ono lived.) Finish among the bright lights of Times Square, host of America's favorite New Year's Eve bash.

Optional Broadway show • This evening, opt to enjoy the bright lights and big stars of Broadway! Start by exploring the famous Times Square and be dazzled by a dizzying array of towering, electronic billboards, the sounds of street performers and the buzz of the crowds, which make this intersection a one-of-a-kind phenomenon. Then join New York's theater enthusiasts at a Broadway show. Let the talented performers, brilliant sets and magnificent costumes captivate you. (Show depends on availability.)

DAY 6 ★ DEPARTURE

Metropolitan Museum of Art (closed Mondays) • With more than 3 million objects in its collection, the Metropolitan Museum of Art houses one of the most extensive art collections in the world. The museum boasts works from around the globe and throughout millennia. Whether your taste is for African art, the European masters, works from classical antiquity, Islamic art or the art of Asian, the Met's extensive holdings are sure to enchant every visitor. You'll also find impressive collections of weapons costumes, musical instruments and decorative arts.

OPTION 3 * Williamsburg

DAY 4 * WASHINGTON, D.C. * WILLIAMSBURG

Welcome to Williamsburg • Travel south to Williamsburg—where you walk through the streets of colonial times in this authentically re-created 18th-century village. In 1699, a year after Jamestown burned down, the colonial capital moved to a small village known as Middle Kingdom, which the English settlers soon renamed Williamsburg (after King William III). Once the largest city in Virginia—then the most prosperous colony—Williamsburg remained the seat of colonial government and an important center of revolutionary thought for nearly 80 years. At the 301-acre park, which brings colonial Williamsburg to life, you'll be introduced to the ideas and dreams of the colonists—from average citizens to political leaders—on the eve of the American Revolution. In the more than 500 restored and reconstructed buildings, you'll mingle with the townspeople and hear them discuss British taxes, religious freedom and the radical notion of revolting against the mother country. With interpretations by both African and European Americans, you gain a greater appreciation of life in early America and a better understanding of American heritage.

DAY 5 * WILLIAMSBURG

Guided sightseeing of Williamsburg • An expert local guide leads today's tour of Colonial Williamsburg. After steadily fading from American historical memory following the Revolutionary War, Williamsburg received its first major face-lift in the 1920s. when oil tycoon John D. Rockefeller answered the pleas of a local priest to bankroll Williamsburg's restoration. In 1934, Colonial Williamsburg opened as the first U.S. theme park based on American revolutionary history. Touring this working colonial village, you'll visit the Capitol. where Virginia legislators like Thomas Jefferson and Patrick Henry cut their political teeth; Market Square's Courthouse and the Public Gaol (jail). Offenders seldom returned here after being found guilty, since the colonials were less than forgiving: more likely than not, sentences involved flogging, hanging or, at the very least, public ridicule. You might also visit either of two 18th-century taverns: the Raleigh, where colonial upstarts like George Washington and Thomas Jefferson toasted the Revolution; or Wetherburn's, which was also the raucous site of auctions, lectures, balls and gambling. As you stroll through the town, you'll see tradespeople performing colonial vocations. including construction, blacksmithing, bookbinding, shoemaking and metalworking.

Guided visit to the Jamestown Settlement • Even older than Williamsburg, Jamestown—sponsored by King James I, but owned by the Virginia Company—was the first successful English colony in the New World. The settlement was constantly troubled by territorial disputes with the Powhatan American Indians, but it was the colonists themselves who sealed the fate of Jamestown when, in 1675, they burned their fort to the ground to protest the lack of protection offered to them by the crown. On your guided visit to Jamestown Settlement, join Captain John Smith and other costumed interpreters that take you back to 1607, when these Englishmen first landed on the banks of the James River. Explore the three boats that originally carried the men over to Virginia, visit a re-creation of a Powhatan American Indian village or marvel at a 17th-century colonial fort.

Evening activity • Join us for a special evening activity tonight. Possibilities include colonial dances, an interactive story-telling program or a chance to examine archaeological objects.

DAY 6 * WILLIAMSBURG * DEPARTURE

Transfer to Washington, D.C. . Return north to Washington, D.C.

Free time in Washington, D.C. • Depending on your return flight, you'll have a chance to explore more of the capital city. Explore the majestic Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts or any of the Smithsonian museums you may have missed. Watch money being created right before your eyes at the Bureau of Engraving and Printing or marvel at modern artworks by masters like Kadinsky, Picasso, Matisse and van Gogh at the Phillips Collection (where the 1890s mansion that houses the collection is almost as impressive as what it holds). The capital city is packed with sites and activities to excite every traveler.
