SUBJECT: Approval of Oakland SELPA Annual Budget and Service Plan for Fiscal

Year 2011-2012

#### **ACTION REQUESTED**

Approval by the Governing Board of the Annual Budget and Service Plan for Special Education, as required by California Education Code Section 56205 (b) (1), and federal law, 20 USC Section 1413. Each SELPA will adopt the Annual Budget and Service Plan for the 2011-2012 school year by January 31, 2012.

#### BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

Special Education is a program mandated by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) 20 USC Section 1400 et seq. Public education functions under the version of this law passed in 1997, and reauthorized by Congress in 2004.

California has divided regions of the state into Special Education Local Plan Areas (SELPA). SELPAs are large unified districts, or consist of a specific group of local education agencies (LEA), with the responsibility of providing free and appropriate public education (FAPE) to qualified students with special needs within its area. Oakland is a single District LEA, SELPA. Both federal and state special education funds are directed to the SELPA to meet the needs of its students.

#### DISCUSSION

The SELPA must be in compliance with all state and federal special education laws. Failure of a SELPA to remedy required non-compliant items could result in withholding of funds from the entire SELPA and/or a deduction from the superintendent's salary.

Each SELPA will adopt the Annual Budget Plan according to the governance and policymaking process established in the SELPA local plan. The completion of the process will be documented by evidence that a SELPA level public hearing has been held to adopt the Annual Budget Plan.

The Annual Budget Plan may be revised during any fiscal year according to the policymaking process established pursuant to Ed. Code Section 56205 (b) (1).

Each SELPA local plan requires a Service Plan component to be submitted annually. The annual service plan shall include a description of services to be provided by each district and county office, including the nature of the services and the physical location at which the services will be provided, including alternative schools, charter schools, opportunity schools and classes, community day schools, regardless of whether the district or county office is participating in the local plan. This description shall

demonstrate that all individuals with exceptional needs shall have access to services and instruction appropriate to meet the needs of student as specified in their Individual Education Plan (IEP).

#### FISCAL IMPACT

If the Annual Budget and Service Plan is not approved, the District could have funds withheld, but still be responsible for implementing the Federal and State laws.

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended the Governing Board approve the Oakland SELPA Annual Budget and Service Plan.
