What is Linked Learning?

Linked Learning is the term used to describe the type of integrated learning that takes place in our career pathways. A career **pathway** is a career-themed program available at a high school. An **academy** is another term used at individual schools to describe career pathways.

FOUR PILLARS OF LINKED LEARNING

Rigorous Academics

- Students are prepared for college with challenging coursework made relevant through pathways.

Technical Skills

- Students receive hands-on training for high-skills, high-wage employment.

Work-Based Learning

- Students participate in internships and job shadows to work in a professional environment.

Personalized Support

- Students receive career counseling and supplemental instruction to help ensure success.

Building Linked Learning Pathways

- 100% of school sites have participated in an intensive design process to develop Linked Learning pathways and use Measure N funding to improve student outcomes in a continuous cycle of improvement.
- OUSD now has 33 Linked Learning Pathways creating enrollment opportunities for students that are proportional to the high skilled/high wage future employment trends of key industry sectors in health, computer science and education.
- 71.4% of 10th graders are now in Linked Learning pathways with plans to have 90% of 10th students in pathways in the 2017-18 school year.
- Over 50% of high school students completed a Graduate Capstone that measure student performance using common core aligned rubrics that ensure improved research writing and oral presentation quality.
- 100% of schools up for renewal received WASC accreditation this year including Community Day School, Sojourner Truth, Madison Park, MetWest, Oakland International, and Fremont High School.



Improved Student Outcomes

- We now have 5 High Schools that have graduation rates over 80% in Oakland Tech(87.3%), Life Academy(85.5%) , CCPA(87.5%), MetWest(92.9%) and McClymonds (81%).
- **Increased Work Based Learning Opportunities** for all students with student paid summer internships increasing
- Over **300% increase** of Dual-Enrollment classes offered over the past 2 years with 83% of students passing with a C or better.
- Oakland Promise has launched Future Centers at Oakland High, Life Academy, CCPA and Castlemont resulting in 10% increase in student FAFSA completion rate, \$3 M in student scholarships, and a significant increases in the number of students applying to 4 year colleges.



Next Steps

- Maintain the Linked Learning High School Office's focus on Pathway Development by providing ongoing supports to build out the program of study that integrates rigorous academics, personalized student supports, work based learning, and CTE integration.
- Ensure that all schools have clearly articulated pathways that extend from 9th grade to college completion so that students have clear roadmap to college, career, and community readiness.
- Increased focus on the instructional core in pathways through project-based learning to ensure integration of CCSS and real-world pathway learning opportunities into each pathway.
- Align Principal supervision and pathway coaching differentiated supports to pathway development based on differing school contexts.
- Create communities of practice that connect teachers in pathways to calibrate across similar pathways to identify high quality and rigor.
- Build Early Warning dashboard and accompanying protocols that allow pathways and schools to easily identify students that need additional supports.

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(A)(1) Arrests by OSPD on OUSD School Sites for School Related Offenses

- **Possess a Weapon on School Grounds, Black, Male, 17 (Skyline HS)**

Subject was searched by administrative staff for suspicion of having a weapon. During the search, an electronic weapon (stun gun) was found on his person. Further investigation determined the subject violated his probationary status.

- **Domestic Battery, Hispanic, Male, 17 (Skyline HS)**

Subject engaged in a verbal argument with his girlfriend. As his girlfriend began to walk away, the suspect prevented her from leaving by restraining her and placing her in headlock.

- **Poss. Weapon on Campus/ Assault with Caustic Chemical, Black, Female, 14 (Skyline HS)**

Suspect caused a disturbance on the campus. When the suspect was detained by the victim (School Security Officer), a stun gun was found on the suspect. Suspect became angry with the victim and took a bottle of cleaning solution spraying it into the victim's eyes.

(A)(1) Arrests by OSPD on OUSD School Sites for School Related Offenses (continued)



- **Strong Arm Robbery, Black, Male 15 (United For Success)**
Subject robbed (2) fellow students of their cell phones and fled the area. The victims were able to identify the suspect. The following day, staff notified police the subject was at school. After contacting the subject's parents, he was interviewed and confessed to the crime.
- **Poss. a Loaded Handgun on School Grounds, Black, Male, 16 (Skyline HS)**
Suspect was searched by administrative staff for suspicion of having a weapon. As staff searched the suspect's backpack they discovered a loaded handgun. Further investigation revealed that the suspect was in violation of his probation terms.
- **Attempt Murder, Black, Female, 13 (Greenleaf Elementary)**
Officers responded to a report of a student who was stabbed on the chest with a kitchen knife by another student.



(A)(2) Arrest by OSPD on OUSD School Sites for Non-School Related Offenses

- **Unlawful Taking of a Vehicle, Black Male, 15 (Skyline HS)**

Subject was found in possession and in control of a reported stolen vehicle. Further investigation revealed that subject was in violation of his probation terms.
