Student Director Report

ACC Middle School Update:

In November, we had 48 students from 7 schools participate in our second workshop on School Decision Making. We had two guest speakers Directors Hodge and Yee help make the workshop come alive for the students, and inspired them to take on an issue as Middle School ACC. They choose food and cafeteria service as the issue they want to address this year. Student delegates reported the following:

- At Roosevelt, students are happier about the restroom cleanliness, and the new mural painting, but have a long way to go. Leadership class is worked on campus beautification, including trying to get bathroom issue resolved.
- At Frick, students are celebrating cleaner bathrooms, and more sports. They received new
 sports equipment, and they noticed the graffiti was painted over. They are looking forward to
 their winterball dance and sports festival. Leadership class will continue to work on remaining
 concerns with lack of elective classes, the locks on bathrooms, having more food variety, getting
 a traffic light, and more fieldtrips.
- At Montera, leadership students are working with their principal and custodian to set up room 400 as student space for alternative learning, workshops, and other leadership activities. They are looking forward to hosting ACC in February, and doing conflict resolution training at elementary schools. They hope to keep conflict resolution as a permanent program at Montera and in the school district.
- Barack Obama's new leadership class has identified issues they would like to work on such as variety at lunch, uniforms, student lounge, basketball for females, and having a gym.
- Claremont students reported having a stricter principal that has set better consequences for breaking the rules. Their remaining concerns are with healthier lunches, and miscommunication between houses.
- Edna Brewer joined with art class to learn how to draw, and voted on the best idea for the mural, then painted the mural. Now they have a Barack Obama mural, but it still needs to be sealed, and requested our support with that. They have also been able to institute weekly meetings for the college and career club. One outstanding concern is the long lunch lines.
- At Melrose, students are celebrating their garden, and looking forward to their winter dance, movie event, and awards ceremony. They still have not installed lockers for the students.

ACC High School Update:

- At our high school general meeting last month, delegates from 9 schools (Street Academy, Bunche, Best, Excel, Skyline, Oakland High, YES, Sojourner Truth, and Oakland Tech) endorsed the ACC Focus Group Recommendations, which we will present today.
- Best and Excel are reporting cleaner school environment, better overall school coordination and organization, and a nicer gym. Leadership class is working on addressing the restroom issue, and looking forward to pep rally, bowling trip, Yosemite, and the health jam.

- Skyline reported better relationships with company for graduation materials, and better budget management. They are looking forward to their winter ball in January. Their remaining concerns are the budget cuts and how it will affect students at Skyline.
- Oakland High is still concerned with bathrooms being locked and availability of soap, the lack of
 computers available, overcrowding, lack of funding for supplies, and the nazi signs in the
 auditorium that are constantly asked to be removed. (The nazi signs in auditorium were
 removed the day of the ACC meeting). Leadership is looking forward to the teacher luncheon,
 winter ball, winter wonderland.
- Bunche organized their Thanksgiving event "The Spot". They are working on getting more
 activities during lunch, and more food variety. They are very happy with the after school
 program.
- Street Academy students reported liking their school as a whole: the food, the teachers, school appearance, and school materials. No concerns were reported.

Findings & Recommendations

1. Most students have cut school due to Most high schools offer support services, we need to make these personal issues at home, with friends, or at known, and facilitate the process school. They also indicated that they need for students to access services. an outlet for the stress and anger that comes with these personal issues. Make it easier for students to access services via teacher recommendations or self-referrals. Print a "menu" of student services for each high school in youth friendly language. (example: "stress help workshop", or "stress therapy", "you got problems, we've got answers, stop stressing") Each school must have a conflict resolution system of outreach and referrals so all students can solve their conflicts with other students or with staff Leadership project or other student group can take on project of organizing Peer Pressure & Bullying Seminars for staff and students, how can students help change the culture of negative peer pressure to positive peer influence? 2.
