Overview: Purpose

What is a Facilities Master Plan?

- Aligns the district's capital projects with it's strategic plan
- A process by which to plan and communicate long-term change to the district's school facilities
- Provides guidance to accomplish the districts overall vision
- Determines the scope of work to serve future needs
- Assess the variety of funding sources and options available to finance capital projects
- Source of consistent and reliable information about districts assets



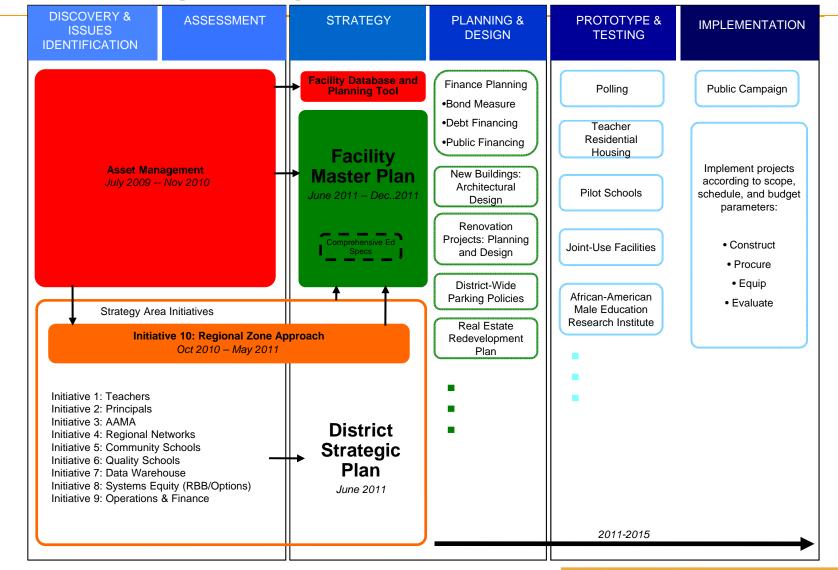
Overview: Purpose

Facilities Planning & Management: Process Framework





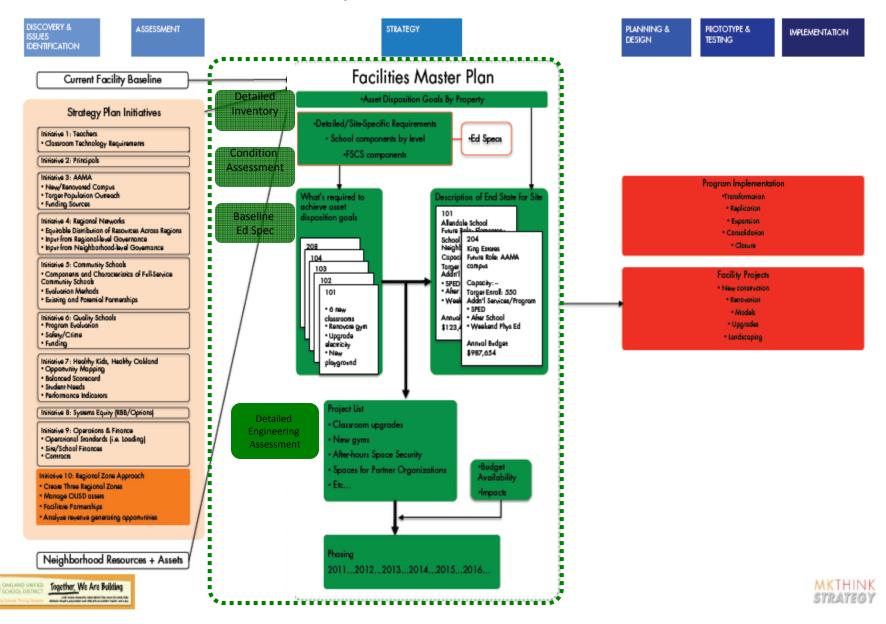








Master Planning Process Diagram How does it fit into our current process?

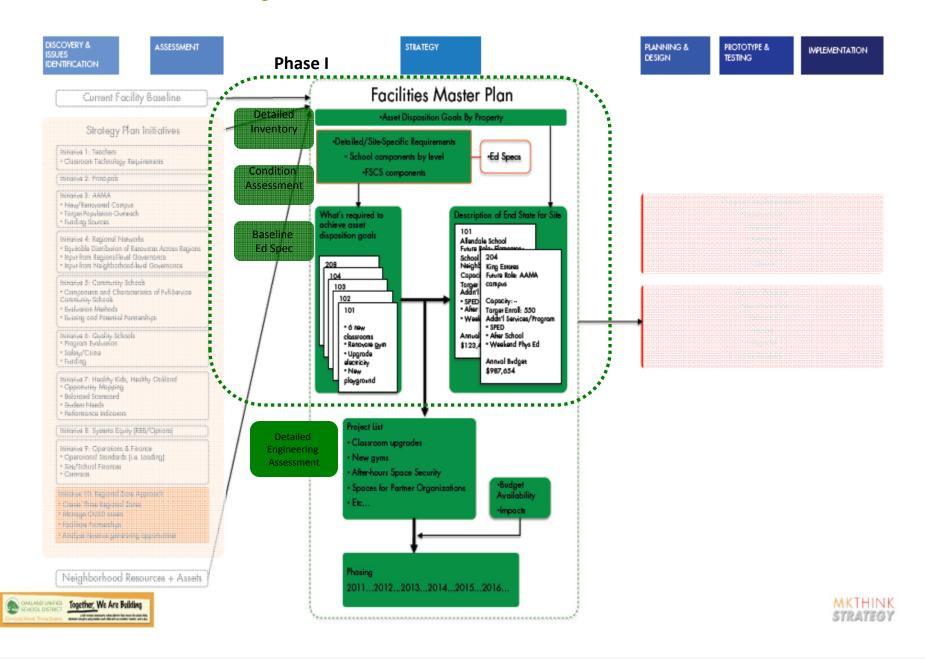

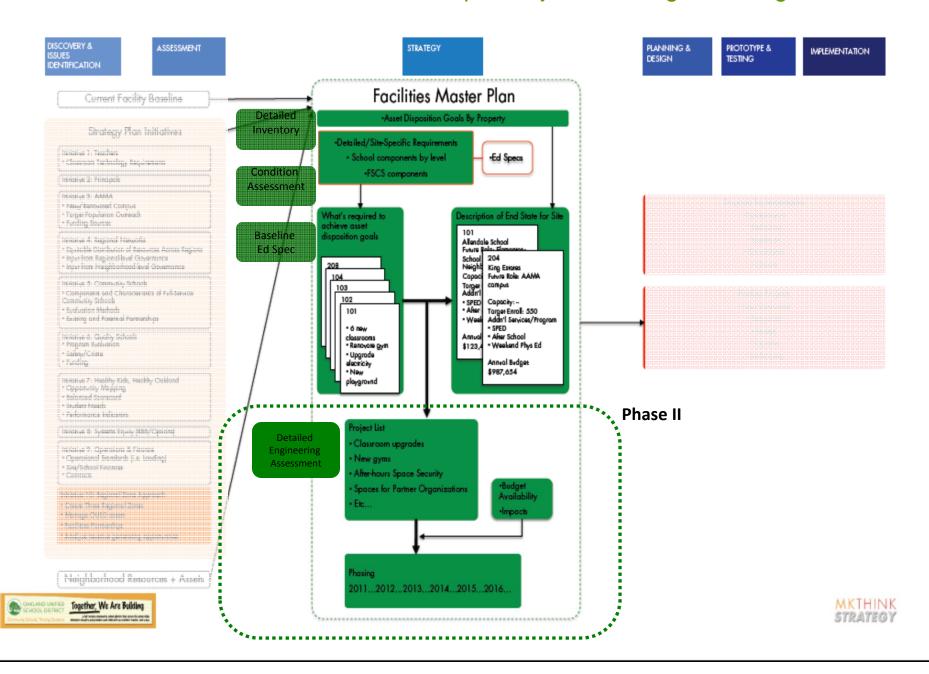

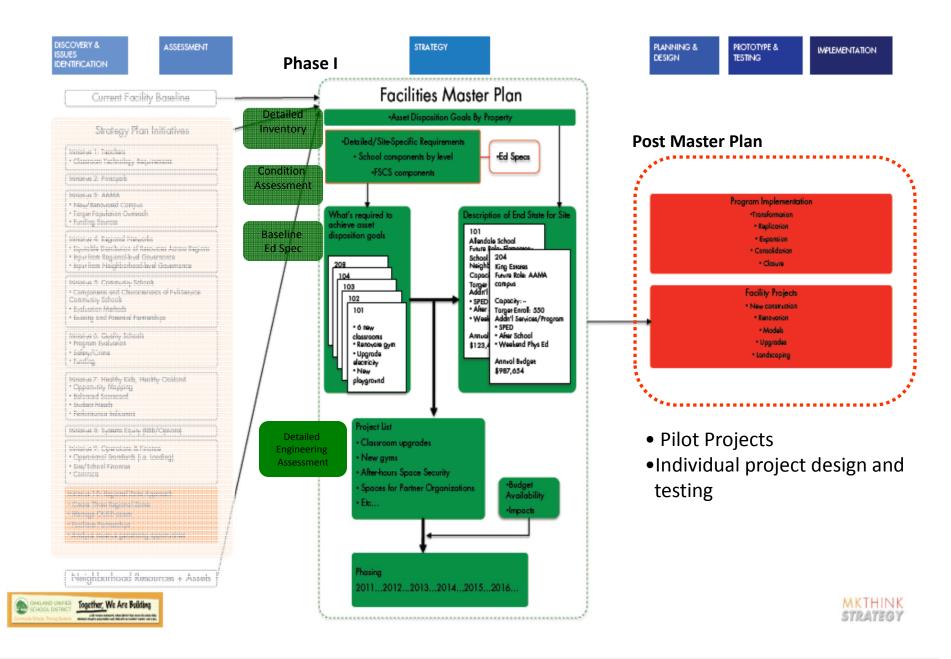
