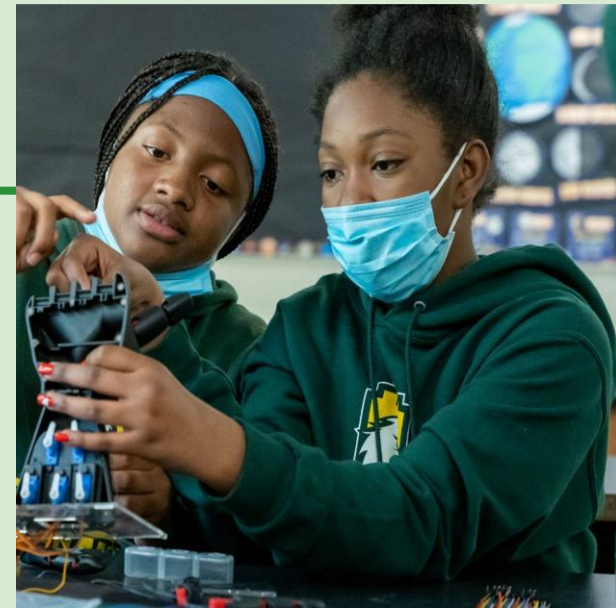
Summer Learning 2023

TK-8 Summer Programs

- Bridge to K at most Elementary Summer Sites
- Small group literacy with weekly family engagement with Springboard Collaborative across 11 elementary sites
- 5 weeks/9 hours of daily programming available includes 3 hours of academic instruction from OUSD teachers, plus enrichment, field trips, games, art and music based activities with Community Orgs/Lead Agencies.

High School Summer Program Highlight

SAILL (Summer Academy for Integrated Language Learning) High School Newcomer School at Oakland International High School is a pilot program for newcomers/emerging English language learners who are entering 9th through 12th grades.

All students can receive ten credits of English and math, and are learning academic English through a humanities course focused on historical court cases and a data science course where students are learning to analyze a dataset connected to education outcomes of students in the Bay Area.

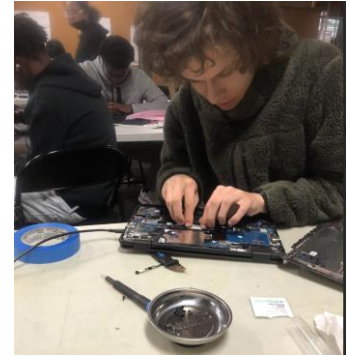
Student learning culminates in presentations where they argue for recommendations to improve educational programs for newcomers in U.S. schools using data and evidence from history and current student outcomes.

Teachers collaboratively plan and engage in a team-teaching model as part of the professional development built into the program.

Students participate in weekly field trips and enrichment activities organized by Girls Inc.



Exploring College, Career & Community Options (ECCCO) – 12th Annual



Approximately 550 high school students interned at nearly 100 internship host sites across Oakland and beyond. Thanks to Measure N and a grant from the City of Oakland's Fund for Children and Youth, as well as some direct payment from industry partners, all internships were stipended. More than 30 teachers and staff from our high schools provided direct instructional and case management support to student interns.

Nearly 100 students participated in the Peralta Institute, exploring careers and earning college credit toward CTE certificates, in fields as diverse as Game Design, Cosmetology, and Diesel Mechanics. Teachers and staff from our high schools provided direct support in Peralta classrooms and case management to ensure student success.

High School Educator Professional Development:

Project Based Learning Institute

- Participation from 7 high schools and 15 pathways
- 32 projects being revised or newly created
- 11 coaches and facilitators (from central and sites)
- 4-day institute outcomes:
 - Develop a pathway-themed project that aligns to pathway student outcomes and/or OUSD graduate profile and reflects at least 2 OUSD PBL framework elements: key knowledge/skills + one other (Consider Authenticity for new projects and Critique & Revision for revised projects)
 - Design a final performance assessment (task) with clear success criteria (rubric) aligned to the learning outcomes of a project
- Essential Question:
 - How can we use PBL as a vehicle for deeper learning?
- Some feedback from the daily surveys:
 - *The criteria for success workshop was brilliantly conceived and executed! What a great set of activities and moves for getting us to really engage with this part of project-based learning. This is an aspect of teaching in general that I sometimes struggle with, and deepening my understanding of criteria for success has been a big takeaway for me.*
 - *I love the peer critique session every year. It is so helpful and so inspiring to be around such creative and wonderful colleagues.*
 - *Just the right amount of light touch with guidance coupled with time to plan and work, then a little more guidance/creating a container for the work. You struck a great balance.*
 - *I really enjoyed the planning tools and structure of the day. I will definitely use them to help think through the newer elements of our joint project.*

High School Educator Professional Development: History Among Us Externship

7 Arts, Media & Entertainment teachers from Skyline and Fremont
High Schools

The 2-week externship guided teachers through all phases of the story development process from research, to “scripting with the landscape,” to audio production, to AR development, to testing . Teachers used Adobe Suite for audio and augmented reality production. Through hands-on experience with the media tools, teachers developed curriculum for use in their CTE media courses during the 2023-2024 school year. Teachers also received coaching from CTE Arts, Media and Entertainment coach Jamie Treacy during project implementation.

Foundational Professional Learning: For the first time, all new teachers received up to 5 hours of [PD on Planning for Strong Classroom Culture from Day One](#).

Enrollment Process*

*Students can enroll in OUSD schools any time throughout the year, this is for budget and planning purposes.

Final Enrollment Established 2022-23

On the first Wednesday of October, OUSD finalizes it's enrollment count that will be used for projections for the following year.

Enrollment Projections Created for 2023-24

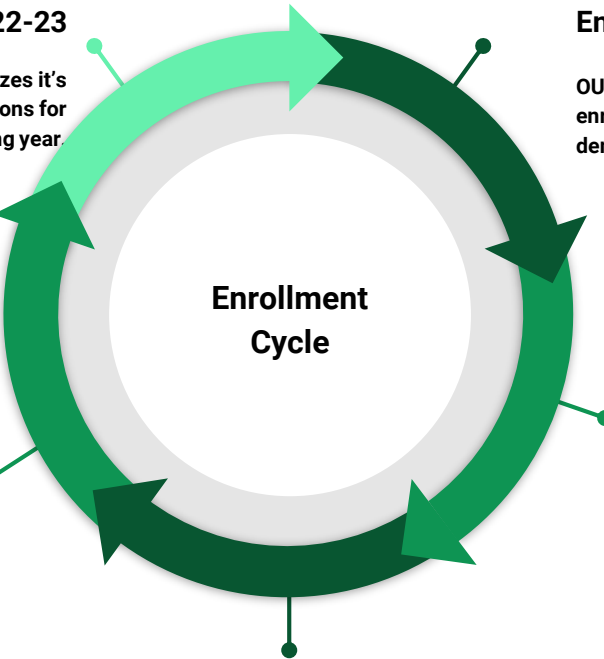
OUSD uses the enrollment from the previous year to set the enrollment projects for the following year based on demographic information and cohort progression modeling

Determining Students Attending 2023-24

During the first 4 weeks of school, on the 2nd, 5th, 10th, 15th and 20th day, OUSD schools count the number of students that have attended school and drop "no-shows". Classes are balanced and staffing levels are shifted depending on available seats.

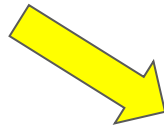
Students are Assigned to Schools

Based on these projections, the Enrollment Office assigns students to schools and grade levels based on the number of "seats" available at each grade level. Students who don't get a seat through our lottery are placed on a waitlist.



Families Confirm Enrollment in Schools

Families "Confirm" that student/s will attend the assigned school. For families that decide to not take the assigned seat, another students is moved into the "seat" from the waitlist.



Enrollment Projections vs Actual

There is significant variance in the first week of school.

- Families are still enrolling their children online and in person.
- Families are leaving the area based on the cost of living in Oakland, but some families are also moving to Oakland from more expensive areas as well.
- Families may be holding seats in both charter schools/private schools and OUSD schools.
- There are families on the waitlist for other schools and may not have shown up to the assigned school.
