Science Literacy Receives Big Boost at Urban Promise Academy

Students and their pursuit of science literacy at Urban Promise Academy received a major shot in the arm on March 10. There was a special check presentation in which the Campos Foundation gave a check to students, teachers, and school leaders to fund the creation of a new SmartLab on campus to support the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) education of the school's 6th-8th graders.

Principal Tierre Mesa welcomed everyone and explained what the event was about and then the team from Campos presented an oversized check to the students.

All told, the grant is for \$178,367.27 and will go to fund the new lab which will include technology such as computers, 3D printers, robotics kits, drones, and podcasting, giving students access to a wide range of tools to enhance their learning experience.

Chabot Space & Science Center was the center of the robotics world in Oakland on March 11. Students from more than a dozen OUSD schools converged on the center to put the robots they created up against other schools' creations. The competition was fierce and educational, and it was especially inspiring to the elementary school learners on hand, as they got to watch the high school and middle school students and their robots battle it out.

The students took part in the day with different challenges for their age groups. The schools were Brookfield Elementary, International Community School, Lockwood STEAM Academy, Claremont Middle, Elmhurst United Middle, Roosevelt Middle, CCPA Middle, and CCPA, Fremont, McClymonds, Oakland, Oakland Tech, and Skyline high schools.

Numerous students said they are interested in robotics as possible future careers.

Best Practices & Areas of Improvement

Best Practices

- Teacher education to build collective responsibility, about the importance of attendance.
- Positive and consistent family engagement.
- Teacher collective efficacy: teams that work together and set each other up for success by doing whatever needs to get done for kids.
- Defining and teaching "good attendance" to students.
- Positive and engaging school culture that engage and re engage students around attendance and school connectedness.

Areas of Improvement

- The executive orders from the President's Office aimed at deporting undocumented children and families has had a negative impact on attendance since the month of January.
 - Understanding how to support families given the real fear that exists in the community, while also encouraging students to continue to attend school is a true dilemma.

All Elementary Sites: Morning Absence Notice

1. ParentSquare Attendance Alert for elementary students.
 2. Mid morning message goes to parents of absent students, daily at 10:00am.
 3. Message asks parents to bring students to school if they are not ill.
1. Alert to ensure students are in school progressing educationally and OUSD receiving more ADA funding.
 2. 2024-25, an increase of 5% of elementary students attending school, with the mid morning message, than last year.

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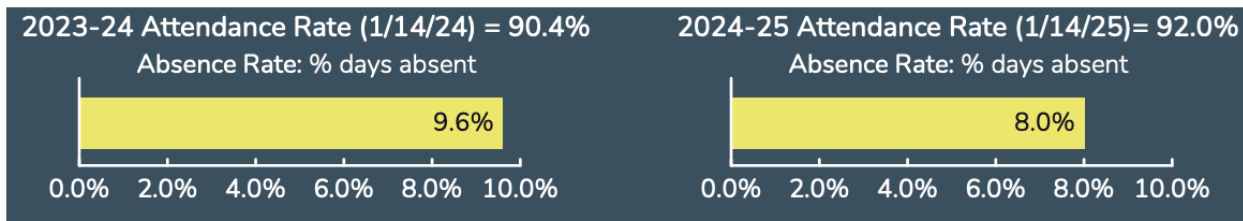

Improving Attendance & Reducing Chronic Absenteeism

We are currently on track to meet our goal of 1% point improvement, with a current attendance increase of 1.6%.

Put simply, students cannot learn if they are not in class. As absences increase - even in the early years of elementary school - the likelihood of a student performing at grade level decreases.

In OUSD, our vision outlines a goal of continuous improvement in the attendance rate year after year, specifically a 1% increase each year starting in 2024-25 and going through 2026-27.



Why is a change of 1% Significant

A 1% increase in attendance is crucial because even small improvements in student presence impact academic achievement, leading to better learning outcomes, increased graduation rates, and a positive ripple effect on overall school and community success.

Furthermore, even a slight improvement in attendance across the district yields increased revenue.

Conservative estimates indicate that OUSD would receive an additional \$4.5M next year for every 1% increase in attendance.

Why is a change of 1% Significant

Fortunately we are on track to exceed our 1% improvement goal for the year. At the midway point of the 2024-25 school year, our attendance rate is 92%, compared to 90.4% at this same point in time last year, a 1.6% increase.

In addition, we set a goal for 100% of teachers to take attendance every day and we are very close to achieving that mark. Since the start of the current school year through mid January 2025, we have a district-wide attendance completion rate of 99.6%! A year ago at this time, we had a completion rate of approximately 97.5%.

Chronic Absenteeism

The Chronic Absenteeism rate captures the percentage of students who were absent for 10 percent or more of the instructional days they were enrolled to attend. This is due to absence for any reason—excused, unexcused absences and suspensions— and can have adverse impacts on students’ learning to read by the third grade, achieving in middle school, and graduating from high school.

In OUSD, we are working toward decreasing the chronic absenteeism rate by 3% each year from now through the end of the 2026-27 school year.

At the midway point of this school year, we have a chronic absenteeism rate of 24.2% compared to 31.9% at this point last year, an improvement of 7.7%.

Visual and Performing Arts Programs (VAPA)

The past 4 years have seen incremental growth in our Visual and Performing Arts (VAPA) programs at all levels providing a variety of art forms including dance, drama, media arts, music and visual art. Beginning this year, all elementary (TK-5) students will receive at least 50 minutes per week of arts instruction by a certificated teacher; this is something OUSD hasn't been able to say since 1988! Moreover, the OUSD VAPA office currently supports 25 schools in developing partnerships with community organizations, provides tailored professional development to elementary teachers on a weekly basis, secondary teachers on a monthly basis and offers new teacher support.

Middle School Computer Science

Thanks to the generous support of Salesforce, Middle School Computer Science has grown from something that was happening for a few students at two schools to a class offered at every middle school across the district. This year there are 1,774 students at 12 schools enrolled in Computer Science. Bringing the total number of students who have taken CS since the start of the Salesforce Grant in 2017 to 12,809. With continued support the course will expand to give students experiences with physical computing, robotics and a variety of programming languages in the coming years.





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
