## **ACTION REQUESTED:**

**Approve** the **charter material revision request** to revise the governance structure of the KIPP Bridge Charter School. The approved charter is amended from the filed petition to incorporate the included revisions, conditions and deadlines below.

# **SUMMARY**

Staff recommends that the State Administrator/Board of Education <u>approve</u> the <u>charter material</u> revision request for KIPP Bridge Charter School, <u>as revised</u>, under the California Charter Schools Act. The material revision request presents a sound educational program; the petitioners are demonstrably likely to successfully implement the materially revised governance structure set forth in the material revision request; and the material revision request contains reasonably comprehensive descriptions of all new requirements of charter schools enacted into law since the charter was originally granted, as required by the California Charter Schools Act. Staff recommends approval based on factual findings, specific to this particular material revision request, detailed in this report.

### PROCEDURAL BACKGROUND

- 1) OUSD approved the KIPP Bridge Charter School charter, governed by KIPP Bay Area on June 19, 2007 to serve students in grades 5-8.
- 2) A material revision request for KIPP Bridge Charter School was submitted on September 10, 2008 at a regularly scheduled Board of Education meeting proposing revise its governance structure through a merger of its local board of directors with its regional board of directors.

- 3) Staff evaluated the material revision request based on the California Charter Schools Act and the application of the OUSD Petition Evaluation Rubric.
- 4) Staff conducted an interview with representative leadership from KIPP Bridge Charter School and KIPP Bay Area.
- 5) A public hearing was held on October 8, 2008.

### STATUTORY BACKGROUND

California Charter law outlines the criteria governing the approval or denial of charter material revision requests. The following excerpt is taken from the California Charter Schools Act, California Education Code §47607.

(a)(2) Renewals and material revisions of charters shall be governed by the standards and criteria in Section 47605, and shall include, but not be limited to a reasonably comprehensive description of any new requirement of charter schools enacted into law after the charter was originally granted or last renewed.

The following excerpt is taken from the California Charter Schools Act, California Education Code §47605. This excerpt delineates charter material revision approval and denial criteria:

Education Code Section 47605 (a)(6)(b) [...] A school district governing board shall grant a charter for the operation of a school under this part if it is satisfied that granting the charter is consistent with sound educational practice.

The following evidence, specific to this particular petition, supports this recommendation for approval.

## **MATERIAL REVISION IMPACT:**

- \* Staff notes that the relative impact of the KIPP Bridge Charter School charter material revision request will be limited.
- o The school's ongoing interaction with the District would remain unchanged.
- o While staff expressed concern regarding the capacity of KIPP Bay Area to address the local needs of KIPP Bridge Charter School, KIPP Bay Area, a California nonprofit public benefit corporation is based in Oakland. The petitioners included a thorough and detailed description of the guidelines to be followed in the case of parent/community complaints. Finally, KIPP Bay Area currently holds the charter for KIPP Bridge Charter School and this will remain unchanged.
- o The proposed charter amendments include an outline the process KIPP Bay Area will follow to engage comments, concerns, and grievances from the stakeholders of KIPP Bridge Charter School.
- o In order to maintain additional vehicles for parent and community input, the proposed charter amendments establish that KIPP will maintain its Parent Council and is encouraged to form an additional Advisory Council.

The material revision request presents a sound educational program, based on an analysis of the request pursuant to  $Education\ Code\ \S47605\ (b)(1)\ above;$  supported by the following evidence:

# **EVIDENCE**

Education Code §47605(b)(5)(A)(i) A description of the educational program of the school, designed, among other things, to identify those whom the school is attempting to educate, what it means to be an "educated person" in the  $21^{st}$  century, and how learning best occurs. The goals identified in that program shall include the objective of enabling pupils to become self-motivated, competent, and lifelong learners.

Analysis of the petition with respect to the material revision of the educational program presents the following sound educational program elements:

	1) The single revision in the program distinguishes the Summer School program, the Saturday school program, and the Afterschool Reading enrichment as optional vs. mandatory for purposes of continued enrollment in the school. The petitioner is demonstrably likely to successfully implement the revised program set forth in the material revision request, based on an analysis of the request and research on the school and its management organization pursuant to Education Code §47605 (b)(2) above; supported by the following evidence:

## **EVIDENCE**

- 1) As of 2008, KIPP Bridge Charter School ranks within the top 20% of all District and charter middle and high schools with respect to API (Academic Performance Index) performance. (2008 API Growth Score 760).
- 2) KIPP Bridge Charter School does not currently have pending grievances or issues of non-compliance with the District.
- 3) KIPP Bridge Charter School has completed timely submissions of all mandatory reporting for the 2007-08 school year, including all financial and attendance reporting.
- 4) KIPP Bridge Charter School has developed within its material revision request comprehensive procedures for the handling of Parent Grievances to ensure that KIPP Bay Area, their parent organization located in Oakland, will be responsible and accountable to the needs and concerns of families.
- 5) KIPP Bridge Charter School will maintain the operation and support of the Parent Council, known as the Team & Parent Association, to ensure that the change in governance structure through the proposed governing board merger does not have a negative impact on the school's operation.
- 6) The proposed merger is designed to increase the ability of the School Site Administrator to increase the focus of time and energy towards instruction. This is to be accomplished by transferring the majority of the business operation of the school to KIPP Bay Area. This includes the financial reporting, fiscal management, and programmatic oversight.
- 7) The merger proposed herein is being sought with all seven Bay Area KIPP schools in an effort to further develop their network of schools that will work collaboratively towards successful implementation of their educational programs. This network includes regular monthly meetings among site administrators, as well as increased direct oversight by the KIPP Bay Area Executive Director.

The material revision request contains reasonably comprehensive descriptions of the 16 required charter elements, based on an analysis of the petition pursuant to Education Code §47605 (b)(5) above; supported by the following evidence:

## **EVIDENCE**

#### RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Oakland Unified School District's State Administrator/Board of Education approve the charter material revision request by KIPP Bridge Charter School under the California Charter Schools Act. The factual findings illustrated in this report demonstrate that the request satisfies the standards and criteria of *Education Code § 47605*.

This approval is for the charter program and operation in its entirety as proposed and revised herein. Any subsequent material revision of the provision of this charter may be made only with the approval of the District as charter authorizer ( $Education\ Code\ \S47607(a)(1)$ ). Any material revision to any charter component must be proposed and considered according to the standards and criteria in Education Code  $\S47605$  ( $Education\ Code\ \S47607(a)(2)$ ).

The term of this charter will remain from July 1, 2007, through June 30, 2012. The District will not accept a charter renewal request more than 270 days prior to the expiration of the charter.

A charter may be revoked by the authority that granted the charter if the authority finds that the charter school committed a material violation of any of the conditions, standards, or procedures set forth in its charter ( $Education\ Code\ \S47607(c)(1)$ ).
