Action Requested	Approval of updates to the Oakland Unified School District Board Policy BP 5131.2 Bullying
Background	The revision to Board Policy 5131.2 incorporates the definition of bullying from Section 48000(r) of the Education Code. In addition, the revision addresses recent legislation that places limits on when students can be suspended. As a result, the proposed modifications align the board policy with the Education Code and provide clarity to schools about the definition of bullying.
Discussion	The revision provides clarity regarding the definition of bullying, which will help schools respond to and investigate complaints of bullying. The modifications have been reviewed and vetted by the General Counsel.

BP 5131.2 – Bullying Students

The Governing Board recognizes the harmful effects of bullying on student learning and school attendance and desires to provide safe school environments that protect students from physical and emotional harm. The Governing Board affirms that all students and staff have a right to safe and supportive school environments, free from threat, harassment, humiliation, intimidation or any type of bullying behavior. District employees shall establish student safety as a high priority and shall not tolerate bullying of any student.

Education Code 234.1 requires the Board to adopt a policy prohibiting discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying.

Bullying is defined in Education Code 48900(r) as any severe or pervasive physical or verbal act(s) or conduct, including electronic communications, committed by a pupil(s) that has, or can be reasonably predicted to have, the effect of one or more of the following:

- (1) Reasonable fear of harm to person or property.
- (2) Substantially detrimental effect on physical or mental health.
- (3) Substantial interference with academic performance.
- (4) Substantial interference with the ability to participate in or benefit from school services, activities, or privileges.

No student or group of students shall, through physical, written, verbal, or other means, harass, sexually harass, threaten, intimidate, cyberbully, cause bodily injury to, or commit hate violence against any other student or school personnel. <u>Conduct rises to the level of bullying only if it is severe or pervasive</u>. As examples only, bullying may include, but is not limited to, the following: *Physical* (pinches, slaps, hits, damage to belongings); *Verbal* and *Non-Verbal* (threats, insults, teasing, menacing); *Relational* (rumors, social exclusion); *Cyber Bullying* (defined more fully below); and/or *Retaliation* (intimidation, reprisal, or harassment directed against a person who witnesses, reports and/or aids in the investigation of bullying).

Cyberbullying also includes breaking into another person's electronic account and assuming that person's identity in order to damage that person's reputation.

Bullying Prevention

To the extent possible, District and school strategies shall focus on prevention of bullying by establishing clear rules for student conduct and strategies to establish a positive, collaborative school climate. Students shall be informed, through student handbooks and other appropriate means, of District and school rules related to bullying, mechanisms available for reporting incidents or threats, and the consequences for perpetrators of bullying.

The District may provide students with instruction, in the classroom or other educational settings, that promotes effective communication and conflict resolution skills, social skills, character/values education, respect for cultural and individual differences, self-esteem development, assertiveness skills, and appropriate online behavior.

School staff shall receive related professional development, including information about early warning signs of harassing/intimidating behaviors and effective prevention and intervention strategies.

(cf. 4131 - Staff Development) (cf. 4231 - Staff Development) (cf. 4331 - Staff Development) Based on an assessment of bullying incidents at school, the Superintendent or designee may increase supervision and security in areas where bullying most often occurs, such as classrooms, playgrounds, hallways, restrooms, and cafeterias.

Intervention

Students are encouraged to notify school staff when they are being bullied or suspect that another student is being victimized. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall develop means for students to report threats or incidents confidentially and anonymously.

School staff who witness bullying shall immediately intervene to stop the incident when it is safe to do so. (Education Code 234.1)

As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians of victims and perpetrators. He/she also may involve school counselors, mental health counselors, and/or law enforcement.

Complaints and Investigation

Students may submit to a teacher or administrator a verbal or written complaint of conduct they consider to be bullying. Complaints of bullying shall be investigated and resolved in accordance with site-level grievance procedures specified in AR 5145.7–Sexual HarassmentAR 5131.2 Bullying.

When a student is reported to be engaging in bullying off campus, the Superintendent or designee shall investigate and document the activity and shall identify specific facts or circumstances that explain the impact or potential impact on school activity, school attendance, or the targeted student's educational performance.

When the circumstances involve cyberbullying, individuals with information about the activity shall be encouraged to save and print any electronic or digital messages sent to them that they feel constitute cyberbullying and to notify a teacher, the principal, or other employee so that the matter may be investigated.

If the student is using a social networking site or service that has terms of use that prohibit posting of harmful material, the Superintendent or designee also may file a complaint with the Internet site or service to have the material removed.

Discipline

Any student who engages in bullying on school premises, or off campus in a manner that eauses or is likely to cause a substantial disruption of a school activity or school attendance, shall be subject to discipline, which may include suspension or expulsion, in accordance with district policies and regulations. Further, progressive discipline (including alternative to suspension) may also be applied when appropriate, <u>School</u>

administrators will respond to bullying with appropriate interventions and/or progressive discipline (including alternatives to suspension) to restore safety and repair the harm caused by bullying. Suspension shall be imposed only when other means of correction fail to bring about proper conduct except for cases involving violation of Education Code Section 48900 (a), (b), (c), (d), (e), (m), or (n). Education Code 48900.5. To the extent possible other means of corrective discipline must have been tried and failed prior to any decision to suspend for first time offense. Unless pupil has violated EC 48900 (a), (b), (c), (d), or (e) or if the "pupil's presence causes a danger to person." EC 48900.5.
