ACTION REQUESTED:

Approve the charter material revision request to expand the grade configuration of the existing Berkley Maynard Academy charter from serving students in grades K-5 to serving students up to and including grade 8. The approved charter is amended from the filed petition to incorporate the included revisions, conditions and deadlines below.

SUMMARY

Staff recommends that the State Administrator/Board of Education <u>approve</u> the material revision request for Berkley Maynard Academy, <u>as revised</u>, under the California Charter Schools Act. The material revision request presents a sound educational program; the petitioners are demonstrably likely to successfully implement the materially revised program set forth in the material revision request; the petition contains the required signatures and affirmations; and the material revision request contains reasonably comprehensive descriptions of all of the 16 elements required by the California Charter Schools Act. Staff recommends approval based on factual findings, specific to this particular material revision request, detailed in this report.

PROCEDURAL BACKGROUND

1) OUSD approved the Berkley Maynard Academy charter, operated by Aspire Public Schools on March 29, 2005 to serve students in grades K-5.

- 3) Staff evaluated the material revision request based on the California Charter Schools Act and the application of the OUSD Petition Evaluation Rubric.
- 4) Staff conducted an interview with representative leadership from Berkley Maynard Academy and Aspire Public Schools on June 17, 2008.
- 5) A public hearing was held on June 25, 2008.

STATUTORY BACKGROUND

California Charter law outlines the criteria governing the approval or denial of charter material revision requests. The following excerpt is taken from the California Charter Schools Act, California Education Code §47607.

(a)(2) Renewals and *material revisions of charters shall be governed by the standards and criteria in Section 47605*, and shall include, but not be limited to a reasonably comprehensive description of any new requirement of charter schools enacted into law after the charter was originally granted or last renewed.

The following excerpt is taken from the California Charter Schools Act, California Education Code §47605. This excerpt delineates charter material revision approval and denial criteria:

The governing board of the school district shall not deny a petition for the establishment of a charter school unless it makes written factual findings, specific to the particular petition, setting forth specific facts to support one or more of the following findings:

- (1) The charter school presents an unsound educational program for the pupils to be enrolled in the charter school.
- (2) The petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition.
- (3) The petition does not contain the number of signatures required.
- (4) The petition does not contain an affirmation of each of the conditions described in Education Code §47605(d).
- (5) The petition does not contain reasonably comprehensive descriptions of the 16 required charter elements.

The following evidence, specific to this particular petition, supports this recommendation for approval.

MATERIAL REVISION IMPACT:

- * Staff notes that the relative impact of the Berkley Maynard Academy charter material revision request will be limited.
- Aspire currently operates an approved K-5 charter for Berkley Maynard Academy, which opened in 2005.
- Aspire currently operates an approved 6-12 charter for its California College Preparatory Academy (Cal-Prep) school, which opened in 2005.
- o Berkley Maynard Academy and Cal Prep are <u>co-located</u> and operate in the district's Golden Gate Elementary facility.
- o Beginning in the 2008-09 school year, Aspire intends to relocate its Cal-Prep program to within the attendance boundaries of Berkeley, CA through a County-benefit charter under review by ACOE.
- o If approved by ACOE; and if the District approves the material revision request for Berkeley Maynard Academy charter; Aspire intends to submit a <u>letter of closure</u> for its Cal-Prep charter operating in Oakland.
- The sum total enrollment of students served between the two Aspire charter schools; Berkley Maynard Academy and Cal-Prep, would <u>reduce by 224</u> from the currently approved <u>744</u> <u>students</u> in grades K-12 to <u>520 students</u> in grades K-8 at Berkley Maynard Academy only.
- The Golden Gate facility is sufficient to house the expanded K-8 program proposed by Berkley Maynard Academy, once the Cal-Prep program transitions to its newly acquired facility in Berkley, CA beginning 2008-09.
- o If the material revision request for Berkley Maynard Academy is not approved by the district, students currently served by the Cal-Prep charter in grades 6-8 would continue to be served under that charter at the Golden Gate campus.

The petitioner is demonstrably likely to successfully implement the revised program set forth in the material revision request, based on an analysis of the request and research on the school and its management organization pursuant to Education Code §47605 (b)(2) above; supported by the following evidence:

EVIDENCE

Petitioner **Findings** Capacity 1) Aspire Public Schools, founded by Don Shalvey, launched its first two schools in fall, 1999 in California's Central Valley. 2) In 2003 Aspire's first two schools ranked a 9 and 10 on the state Academic Performance Index. 3) A 2008 Bridgespan Group report stated that in 2003 "more than 90 percent of Aspire parents rated their children's school an 'A' or 'B', and 97 percent of teachers expressed satisfaction in their job." 4) In 2005 all fourteen Aspire schools exceeded their state target on the California state testing program, with an average increase of 50 points. 5) A 2006 report by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation states that "Aspire's first campus, University Public School, was in the top three percent of all California schools in three-year growth on the state's Academic Performance Index." 6) Two of Aspire's schools, University Public School and University Charter School received the California Distinguished School award in their first year of eligibility. 7) In 2006 all eighteen Aspire schools exceeded their state target on the California state testing program, with an average increase of 45 points. 8) In 2007, Aspire's Summit Charter Academy, operating as a K-8 school achieved an API of 822. 9) In 2007, Aspire's Capitol Heights Academy, operating as a K-8 school achieved an API of 757. 10) In 2007 Aspire schools improved by an average of 30 points on the state's Academic Performance Index. 11) In 2007 seven Aspire schools have exceeded the state's performance target of 800; University Charter School in Modesto crossing 900. 12) Based on a 2007 report by Fast Company a web-based business, through June, 2007, 99 percent of Aspire graduates earned admission to one or more four year universities. 13) In 2008, Aspire school in Oakland, Monarch Academy, received the California Distinguished School award.

The chart above reflects the performance of Aspire Public Schools in Oakland for 2007. All schools made AYP. All schools improved ELA performance with an increase as high as 18.8%. Four out of five schools improved in math performance with an increase as high as 22.9%.

Petition Signatures

Pursuant to CA Education Code Section 47605(a)(1)(B), the material revision request contains the signatures by a number of teachers that is equivalent to at least one-half the number of teachers that the charter school estimates will be employed at the school during its first year of operation under the revised charter.

Required Affirmations

Pursuant to CA Education Code Section 47605(b)(4) the material revision request contains an affirmation of each of required conditions contained in CA Education Code Section 47605(d)(1).

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Oakland Unified School District's State Administrator/Board of Education approve the material revision request for Berkley Maynard Academy under the California Charter Schools Act. The factual findings illustrated in this report demonstrate that the petition satisfies the five legally required categories of *Education Code § 47605*:

- (1) The charter school presents a sound educational program for the pupils to be enrolled in the charter school;
- (2) The petitioners are demonstrably likely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition;
- (3) The petition contains the number of signatures required;
- (4) The petition contains an affirmation of each of the conditions described in Education Code §47605(d);
- (5) The petition contains reasonably comprehensive descriptions of the [16 required charter elements.]

This approval is for the charter program and operation in its entirety as proposed and revised herein. Any subsequent material revision of the provision of this charter may be made only with the approval of the District as charter authorizer (*Education Code §47607(a)(1)*). Any material revision to any charter component must be proposed and considered according to the standards and criteria in Education Code §47605 (*Education Code §47607(a)(2*)).

The term of this charter will remain from March 29, 2005, through June 30, 2010. The District will not accept a charter renewal request more than 270 days prior to the expiration of the charter.

A charter may be revoked by the authority that granted the charter if the authority finds that the charter school committed a material violation of any of the conditions, standards, or procedures set forth in its charter (Education Code §47607(c)(1)).
