Oakland's SBHCs are a product of a cross-agency collaboration between our public agencies, including OUSD, Alameda County, the City of Oakland, funding and technical assistance to school-based health centers, as well as a number of community-based organizations that operate and staff the institutions are committed to maintaining support for school-based health centers. A Master Agreement between OUSD and Alameda County Health which administers health services contracts to SBHC lead agencies throughout Alameda County, was developed in 2005 and renewed earlier this year. This cross-agency commitment to sustain and support Oakland's SBHCs. This agreement also outlines each agency's roles and responsibilities. In addition to technical assistance, OUSD provides utilities, daily maintenance and repair for the SBHCs in-kind.

The TechniClinic will fund the additional services resulting from the additional square footage with increased third party reimbursement and utilize alternatives such as interns (e.g. Nurse Practitioner interns, social work and public health interns). Currently, 60.1% of the TechniClinic's yearly operating budget is through third party revenue. The TechniClinic has the capacity within its current operational budget to sustain additional services with this additional funding by the size of its current facility. The EHR system will be maintained through patient revenue and supplemented through fundraising efforts. The cost will also be absorbed into La Clínica's indirect rate charged to all grants received. There will be no capital debt related to the proposed projects. All costs are covered through the project or other funding sources that have already been secured.

The proposed projects will be managed by a cross-agency team, comprised of experts in facilities development, information and technology, as well as Mr. Tadashi Nakadegawa, Director of Facilities and Planning for Oakland Unified School District, will serve as the lead for the construction project. The purchase and modification of an additional 960 square foot portable building will double the square footage of the existing clinic space current TechniClinic SBHC. The total cost for the 960 square foot project is \$204,000, which brings the cost per square foot to \$212.50. Key clinical and non-clinical spaces to be constructed from the project include the following:

- 3 Additional confidential offices (12' x 10' or 120 square feet each)
- Large conference space for groups, workshops or meetings (12' x 40' or 480 square feet)
- 1 Unisex Bathroom (12' x 10' or 120 square footage)

Electrical, fire alarm, intrusion alarm and intercom/clock will be installed. Additionally, the portable will be equipped with water/sewer connection bathroom with a sink and toilet, as well as a kitchenette with a sink and counter.

OUSD has adopted green building standards in accordance with the Collaborative for High Performance Schools (CHPS) and designs all projects to meet these goals.

The cost to renovate existing space in the school was not feasible. Additionally, the only existing space available for renovation is in the basement and the potential for water infiltration would make appropriate renovations cost prohibitive. Because of the tremendous need for additional space capacity that could be leveraged with relatively low cost in dollars and time, the portable building was selected as the most feasible option. There is a portable to place another portable for a SBHC annex. All facilities bond dollars were allocated to building 10 new SBHC facilities. Because of the high cost in Oakland, this funding was primarily allocated for new SBHC sites to expand health services in key underserved areas of the city. The District is using the TechniClinic at this time. This project is well within the max capital request for this grant and could provide an immediate and durable solution.

In alignment with Board policy, all contractors including architects and construction firms are identified through a competitive bid process. A competitive bid is required for specialty goods such as purchase of a portable building. The District will request multiple proposals to ensure the lowest cost for this project.

Tadashi Nakadegawa, Director of Facilities and Planning for Oakland Unified School District, will serve as the lead for the construction project. Mr. Nakadegawa has 15 years of experience managing school facilities projects, including a number of large SBHC facilities projects. Under Mr. Nakadegawa's direction, on-site Facilities Project Managers will be assigned to oversee the key milestones for the construction project. Fernando Cortez is the Chief Information Officer for Oakland Unified School District. Mr. Cortez has served in this capacity for 7 years and is overseeing the implementation of Electronic Health Records for the entire organization. Ms. Raza is the Program Manager for SBHCs for Oakland Unified School District. Ms. Larsen-Fleming was hired in 2009 to oversee the development of Oakland Unified School District's increase integration of these health centers within the school communities they serve. Prior to her current position, Ms. Larsen-Fleming supervised the development of five health centers for five years. Mary Peifer-Moore is the interim SBHC Manager for La Clinica. La Clinica is in the process of hiring someone to permanently fill this position. She has 11 years of experience as the lead for the SBHC at San Lorenzo High School in San Lorenzo, CA.

4. Project Need

There are 8 staff operating within the existing TechniClinic space, including:

- 2 - Nurse Practitioners at 0.8 FTE total (0.6 FTE + 0.2 FTE)
- 1 - Health Educator at 1.0 FTE
- 1 - Mental Health Clinician at 1.0 FTE
- 1 - Medical Assistant at 0.9 FTE
- 1 - Human Services Specialist at .9375 FTE
- 1 - Clinic Supervisor at 1.0 FTE
- 1 - Associate Medical Director at 0.1 FTE

The current TechniClinic facility is severely impacted in its capacity to serve the large school community optimally because of the limited clinical space. The TechniClinic portable has the following spaces:

- Two exam rooms
- Two confidential offices
- Two administrative offices
- One lab
- One bathroom
- One waiting room
- One curtained cot area
- One storage room

Because of space limitations, students experience long waiting lists for Sports Physicals required to be eligible to play sports. These physicals are a comprehensive examination that adolescents receive. This is particularly true for young men, who typically underutilize health services. Sports physicals provide an opportunity to screen students for a range of health issues and refer students to additional services at the clinic as needed. With more space, the TechniClinic could establish Sports Physical clinics able to serve a larger number of student athletes. The TechniClinic would also like to explore the feasibility of conducting health education days focused on young men. Additional space would allow for the TechniClinic to partner with the Alameda County Public Health Department for immunization drives. Additional space would allow the TechniClinic to recruit interns (e.g. Nurse Practitioner interns, mental health interns, social workers, etc.), who could provide mental health and health education services. The TechniClinic has identified students who would benefit from mental health support groups, but does not currently have the space to provide these services. With additional space, the TechniClinic could also leverage existing space to provide more health education workshops designed around topics that students and parents are interested in learning more about (e.g. adolescent nutrition, etc.). The TechniClinic needs more confidential space to conduct insurance enrollment and registration, which would enable the clinic to receive reimbursement.

It is also important to note that the District is undergoing a transformation to a Full Service Community Schools District, and would like to explore the TechniClinic to serve students from nearby schools, including feeder and alternative education schools. The TechniClinic and Oakland Technical High School recently entered an agreement with a nearby alternative high school for the clinic to serve students from this campus. As this is the only SBHC location in Oakland, we would like to explore other opportunities to expand the reach of this clinic. Without additional space, this will not be possible. The numbers of students outside of the Oakland Tech student body will increase third party revenue and the bottom line for the clinic. Currently, 60.1% of the budget comes from third party revenue. Increasing this percentage will decrease the TechniClinic's reliance on grants and contracts to sustain and

With 1800 students, Oakland Tech has one of the largest student bodies of any school in Oakland. The TechniClinic staff have made great use of the existing facility to serve the needs of this large student body. Doubling the footprint of the health center would create the appropriate amount of space for a school and staff of this size.

TechniClinic leadership intends to immediately utilize the additional square footage to more efficiently organize clinic staff and resources. The TechniClinic will like to house health education and/or mental health services in the new space. More planning is required to develop new protocols that will ensure the clinic does not become fragmented when separated out from the main clinic portable.

The design for the new building is minimal. As soon as funding is received, the District can prepare a bid to engage an architect for the project. At the time the floorplans will already have been developed, which will cut down the time to prepare the plans for submission to the Division of the State Architect (DSA) approval for portable facilities can often be obtained through an over-the-counter approval process, which can expedite the project. The scope of this project will also eliminate the likelihood change orders and construction delays; however, should construction delays occur, the project can be completed within the 2 year project timeline.

The TechniClinic will fund the additional services resulting from the additional square footage through increased third party reimbursement and utilize staffing alternatives such as student interns and volunteers. This SBHC has the capacity within its current operational budget to sustain additional services at its current facility.

The school community highly values the TechniClinic and the services that the clinic provides. The Oakland Tech administration has worked closely to ensure integration and sustainability of the TechniClinic since it opened its doors in 1996. Sheilagh Andujar, Oakland Tech's Principal for over five years, has a need for additional space in order to better serve the school and has partnered with SBHC and District leadership to identify additional space for the clinic. Students consistently express that they feel supported by the clinic. According to 2009-10 administration of the custom SBHC module of the California Health Services Survey (CHKS), students believe SBHC helps them access services that they would not otherwise receive and helps them in school. The vast majority of parent consent forms for their children to receive services through the SBHC, demonstrating that they value the services that the SBHC provides.

The scope of work for this equipment-only project will focus on the identification, purchase, and installation of electronic health record (EHR) equipment at school-based health center (SBHCs) within the Oakland Unified School District (OUSD). The purchase and installation of EHR equipment will improve the care of all five of the school-based health centers operated by La Clínica in OUSD by improving quality, safety, efficiency and reducing health disparities; ensuring families in their health care; improving care coordination; and ensuring adequate privacy and security protections for personal health information. Improvements will result in the alteration and enhancement of clinical and non-clinical spaces, specifically medical exam rooms including registration, triage and lab operatories; health education and mental health/ case management offices.

NextGen has been pre-selected as the EHR vendor for this project. In keeping with Federal requirements for simplified acquisition, no competitive EHR vendor to supply software licenses as the total cost is under \$100,000. Specifically, major improvements shall entail upgrade of personal computer staff across all five health centers to meet minimum hardware requirements for implementation of EHR software for our Medical, Dental, and Mental health management; software licenses for EHR Software (NextGen Electronics Medical Records (EMR) software, Electronic Dental Record Software (Media packages), and Echo Shareware behavioral health record software. In addition to PCs and EHR software licensing costs, printers and scanners shall be purchased to facilitate the scanning of previous medical records and patient records, and the facilitation of patient decision support through technology.

These improvements shall be accomplished by the identification, purchase and installation of equipment. It is not anticipated that this project will have a significant adverse impact on the environment. The most adverse impact anticipated will be in the recycling of electronic equipment such as computers, printers, etc. due to replacement of equipment that does not meet the minimum specifications for compatibility with EHR software and programs. La Clínica de La Raza, Inc. (La Clínica) is a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) recognized as one of the largest Latino-serving community health centers in the San Francisco Bay Area. Since 1971, it has provided comprehensive, high quality, affordable healthcare to underserved, primarily Latino communities, including obstetrics, gynecology, pediatrics, adolescent and adult medicine, dental, vision care, mental health, case management, nutrition, health education, laboratory services, and radiology.

La Clínica has managed complex, federal projects with rigorous evaluation components in the past, and has successfully led those projects utilizing a cross-agency project team that brings together individuals with extensive experience in designing and implementing small and large-scale projects and services including clinic and school operations, service design, delivery and evaluation, strategic planning, financial management, and program implementation and management. This project will be managed by a cross-agency team led by the Oakland Unified School District under Tadashi Nakadegawa, Director of Facilities and Information Technology, and experts in facilities development, information and technology, as well as SBHC operations. Mr. Nakadegawa will be supported by Mara Larsen-Fleming, Program Manager for SBHCs for Oakland Unified School District, Ms. Larsen-Fleming oversees the development and implementation of all SBHC initiatives and supports increased integration of these health centers within the school communities they serve. La Clínica's subject matter expert and Project Manager will be Fernando Cortez, Chief Information Officer. Mary Peifer-Moore is the interim SBHC Manager for La Clínica and will support site-based operations at the five health centers. Our current management system does not have the capacity to connect to outcomes and manage patient information in as meaningful way as a CCHIT (Certified Health Information Technology). SBHC sites connect to our practice management system, and observe minimum hardware requirements for these systems. Each site exists in a different physical state - however, each site maintains local, state and federal licensing, building and fire code requirements. The following is a summary of the number of staff and patients at each site.

The Havenscourt Health Center, our newest SBHC site, will be entering the construction process in March 2011 and has an anticipated opening of April 2011. We do not currently see medical visits, our staff are engaged in group health education and health promotion. We anticipate we will see approximately 400 of the total student population of 609 students by the end of FY 11-12. If funded, this project would dovetail with the opening of the health center and the implementation of its first clinic initiatives.

The Hawthorne Family Resource Center, is currently operational and serves 321 students with a staff of 6. Neighboring two community schools, this site would allow site staff to maximize human resources through efficiencies in EHR as it continues to establish linkages to serve a higher number of students.

Despite serving one of the largest high schools in Oakland, with 1800 students, the TechniClinic SBHC at Oakland Technical High School has one of the most severely limiting its capacity to serve the health needs of students. Currently 524 students at Oakland Tech are served, and 8 staff support the center. The space expansion proposed herein, electronic health records will allow the TechniClinic to reach a larger student population.

The Roosevelt Middle School Health Center has recently been expanded and moved into an upgraded facility within their campus. Although the most modern SBHC, it has not adopted technology needs to anticipate EHR. The Roosevelt Health Center serves 560 students with a staff of 7. If funded this project is a state of the art facility with state of the art health information technology.

The Tiger Clinic at the Fremont Federation of High Schools serves 380 students with a staff of eight. Serving three schools on one campus, the Tiger Clinic advances to effectively and efficiently manage patient records at all schools, and maximize its presence at all three school communities on campus.

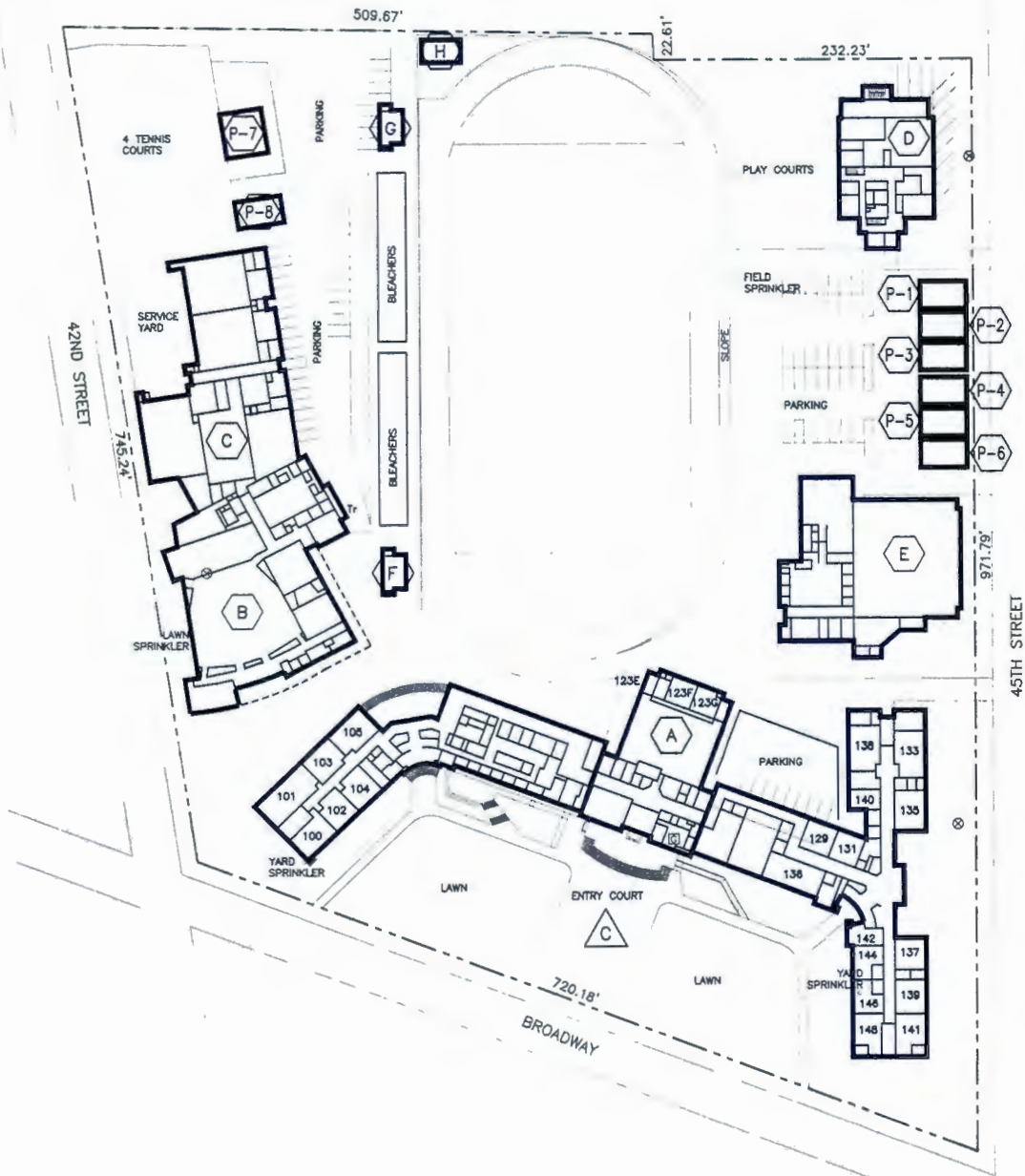

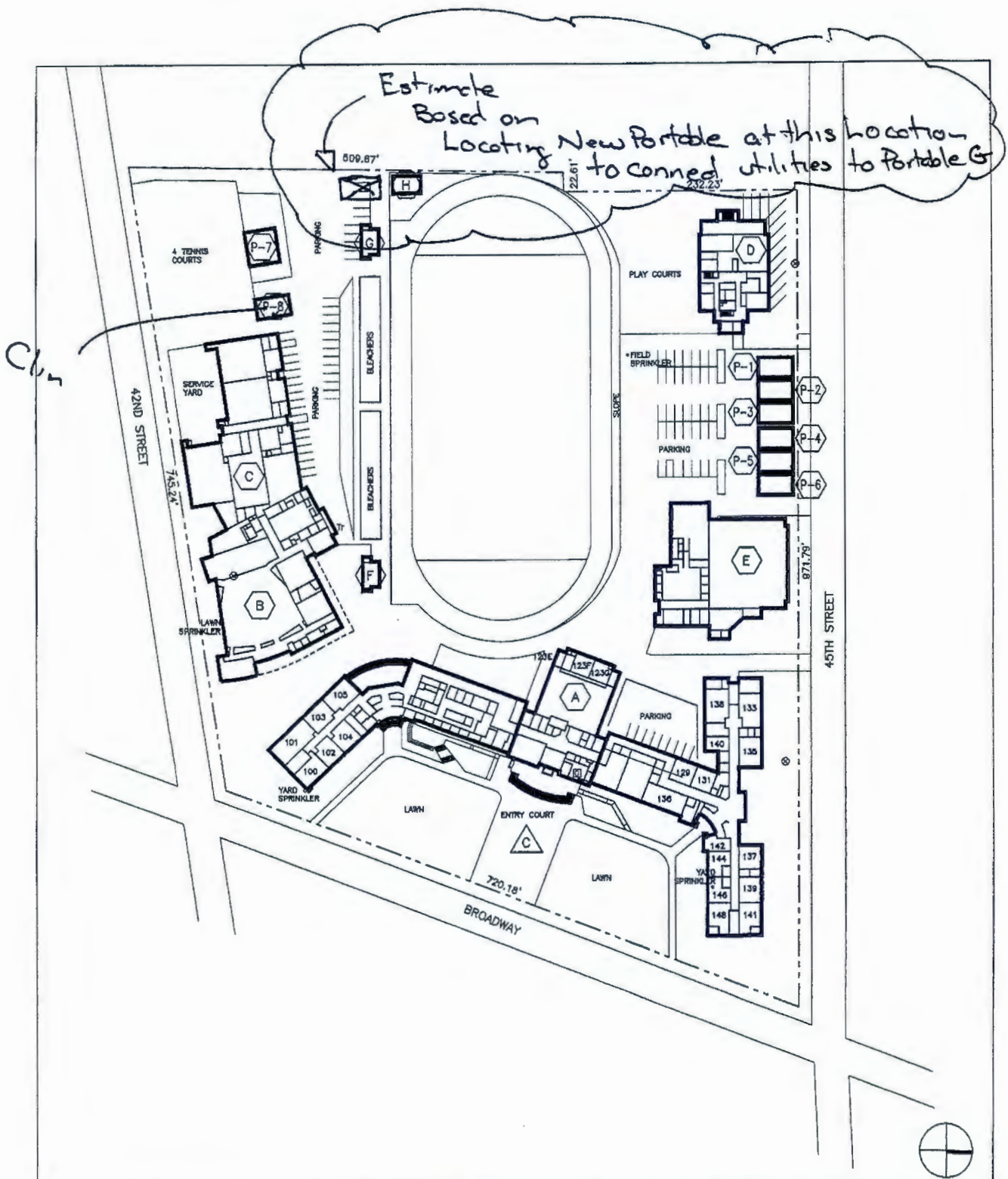

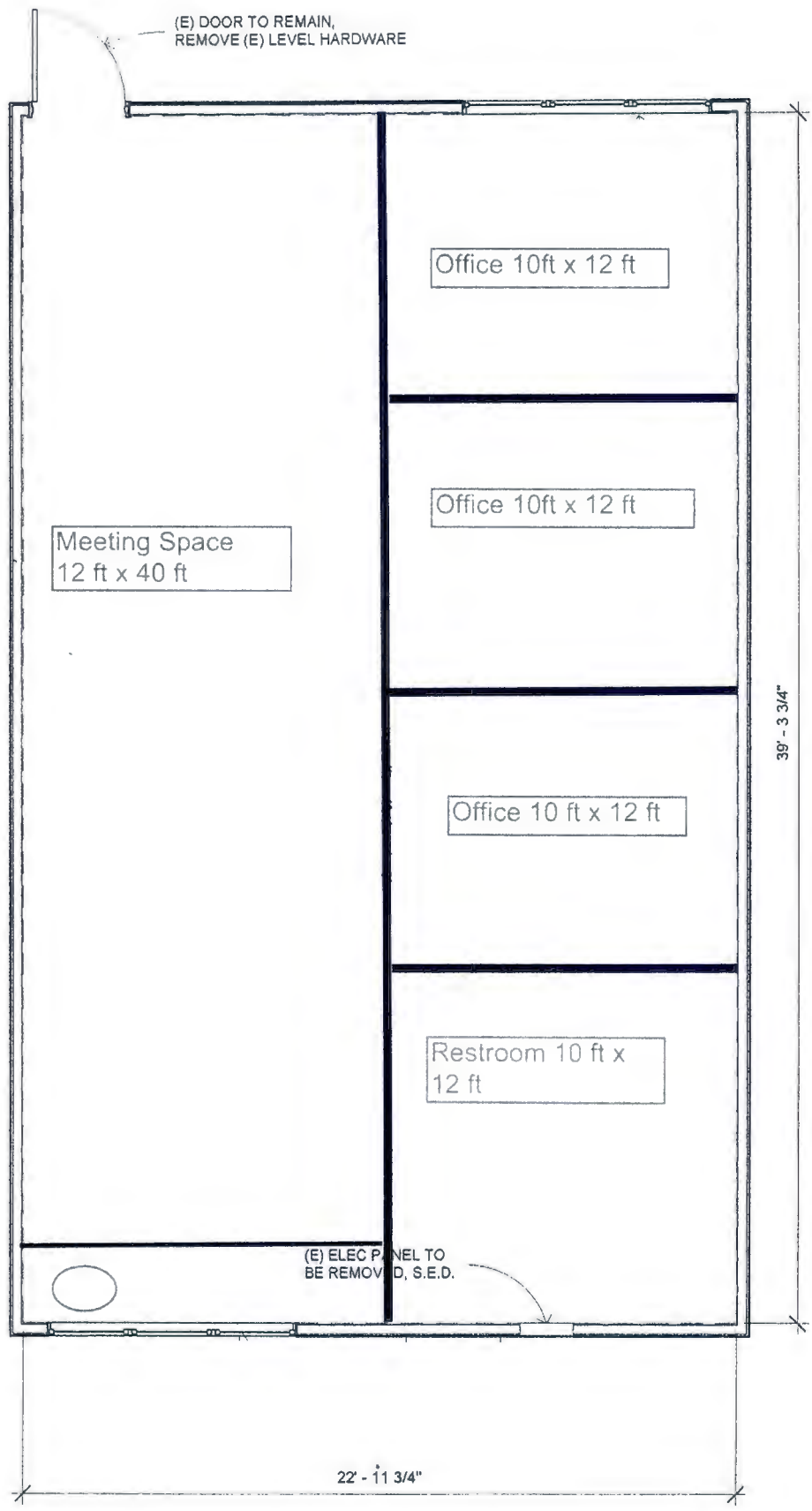
