Montclair Elementary School Celebrates 100 Year Anniversary

The student body, school staff, families, and even some alumni came together at Montclair Elementary on May 2 to celebrate the school and its remarkable history.

The community was celebrating Montclair's 100th anniversary as an Oakland school. When it opened in 1925, it had four classrooms and 71 students. Now, the school has 25 classrooms and 560 students. Student leaders shared school facts with the crowd, and then various grades performed songs including "What a wonderful world."

One guest speaker was well-known alumna, Superintendent Dr. Kyla Johnson-Trammell, who shared that when she was a student there, she was known as the "four square queen."

Board President Jennifer Brouhard also spoke and congratulated the school community for such a remarkable anniversary.

Oakland Tech Hosts College Signing Ceremony for Two Star Athletes

Oakland Technical High School had a special lunchtime ceremony on April 30 for two of its student-athletes. Senior basketball players, ArDarius Grayson and Xander Meyer-Plettner both committed to attending and playing basketball for four-year universities in the fall. In the gym in front of a crowd of teammates, classmates, coaches, school staff, and family, the pair signed their letters of intent.

The two players led their Bulldogs to a Division II State Championship in 2024. Now, Grayson will be playing and studying kinesiology next year at Weber State University and Meyer-Plettner will be playing and studying either kinesiology or animal biology at California State University, Chico. Both say they will proudly represent Tech and the city of Oakland at the next level.

Oakland-Based Comedian Supports Teachers with Jeopardy Jackpot

W. Kamau Bell visited Castlemont High after his big win on Celebrity Jeopardy!. As champion, the Oakland-based comedian received \$1 million for the charity of his choice, and he chose DonorsChoose, for which he sits on the board.

DonorsChoose is a fundraising platform similar to GoFundMe, but specifically for educators. Teachers who use DonorsChoose post a project or equipment they want to purchase for their students and/or classroom, and after the funds are raised, DonorsChoose purchases the item or items and has them delivered to the school.

Castlemont High teachers currently have 19 of these projects, and Bell announced all of them will be funded, and then he said all DonorsChoose campaigns in the District will be funded. We thank W. Kamau Bell for supporting our teachers, students, and schools!

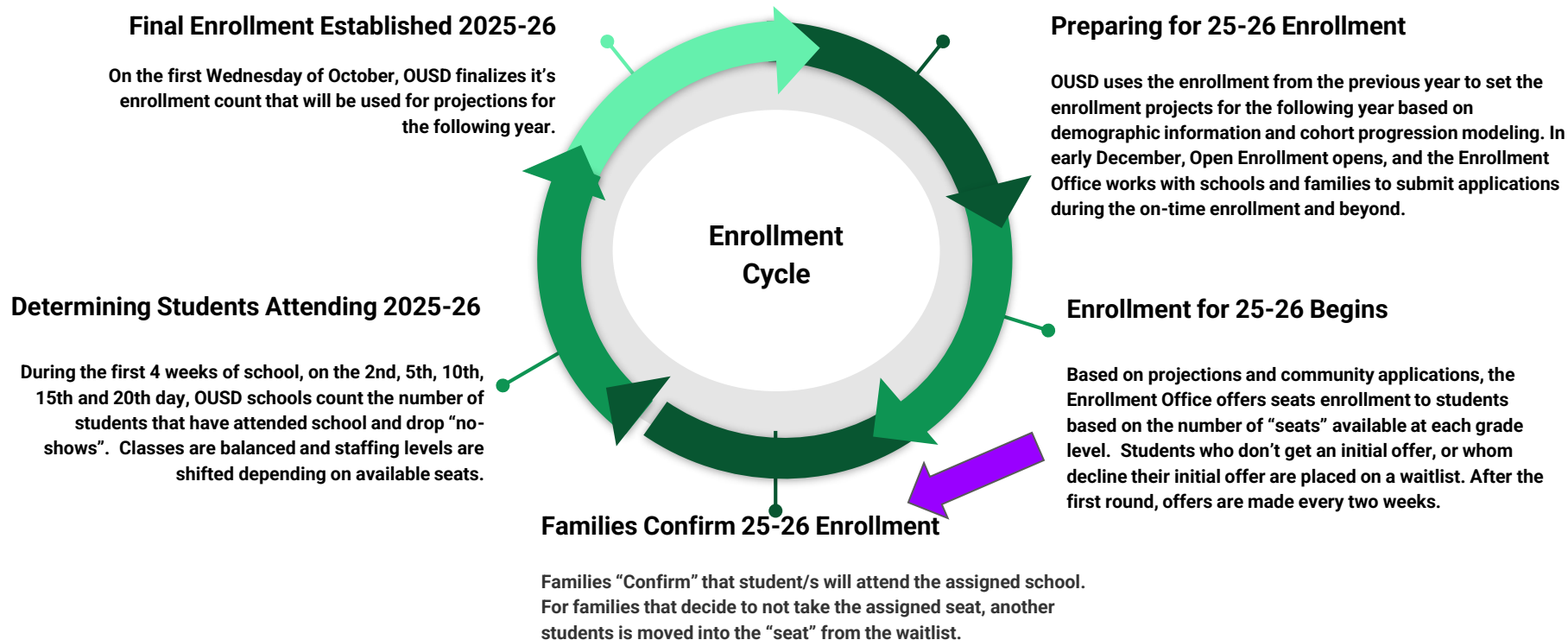

Enrollment Update

Enrollment Process*

*Students can enroll in OUSD schools any time throughout the year, this is for budget and planning purposes.



Enrollment Milestone	Date	Description
On-time application window opens	12/4/2024	We encourage all families to apply in the on-time window, as this gives families the best opportunity to access their preferred school.
On-time application window closes	2/9/2025	This is the deadline for an application to be considered on-time. Any application submitted during this time period is considered on-time.
Late application window opens	2/10/2025	Families who did not submit an application during the on-time window can begin submitting applications at this point.
On-time offers released	3/5/2025	Families will be offered a place at a school and/or be placed on a waitlist at this time.
Intent to Return Forms	3/19/2025	On this date, families will be asked to confirm whether or not they are returning to their current school for the following school year.
Deadline to accept on-time offers	3/26/2025	Families must accept their offer by this date. Offers that are not accepted will be withdrawn, and seats will be offered to other families.
Late offers released	4/2/2025	Families will be offered a place at a school and/or be placed on a waitlist at this time. Deadline 4/20
Bi-weekly late offers begin	4/21/2025	Starting on this date, the enrollment office will make offers for schools with space to families on the waitlist, and to families submitting late applications every two weeks on Monday.

Enrollment Cycle

- ❑ The enrollment office is making **bi-weekly offers** to students in grades TK-12 and **rolling** (e.g. ongoing) offers to PK students
- ❑ Intent to return forms are sent monthly to families who have not responded by either 1) completing the form; 2) communicating directly with the school; 3) accepting a new school offer in Enrollwise
- ❑ Ongoing outreach efforts to target groups
 - ❑ 5th & 8th grade students without application
 - ❑ Students who not accepted a 25-26 offer of enrollment, and are not otherwise enrolled at OUSD

District-wide acceptances for the on-time window



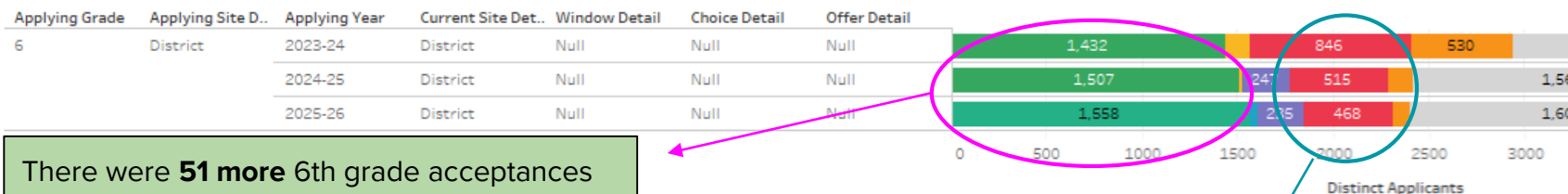
There were **316 more** TK acceptances during the on-time window this year than last year.

For data analysis and strategy purposes, we divide the enrollment period into three windows:

- 1) On-time:** March
- 2) Late:** April-May
- 3) Summer:** June-15th day of school (end of open enrollment)

District-wide acceptances for the on-time window

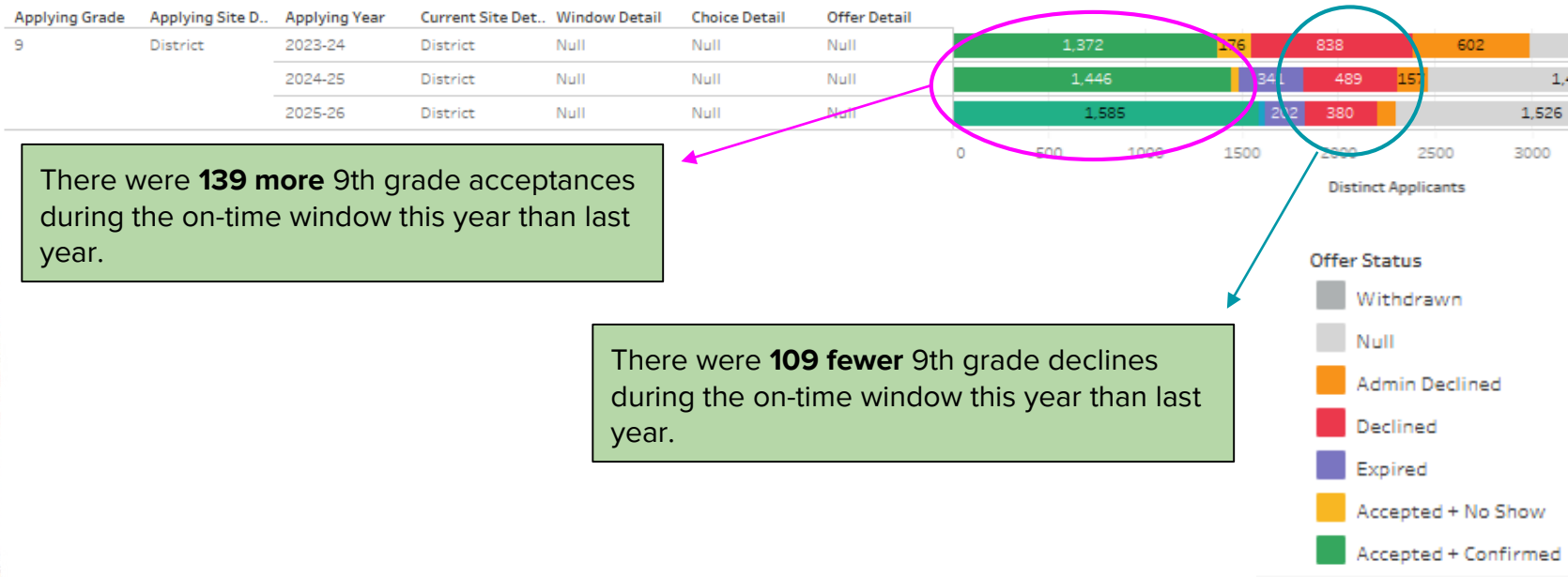


There were **51 more** 6th grade acceptances during the on-time window this year than last year.

Enrollment Stabilization

We funded direct mailers for five elementary schools that have enrollment numbers behind last year's enrollment pace.

- Design compelling enrollment postcard
- Send postcard to all 3-5 year-olds in the school's dedicated attendance boundary
- Depending on other factors, we may send the postcard to families outside the neighborhood boundary.

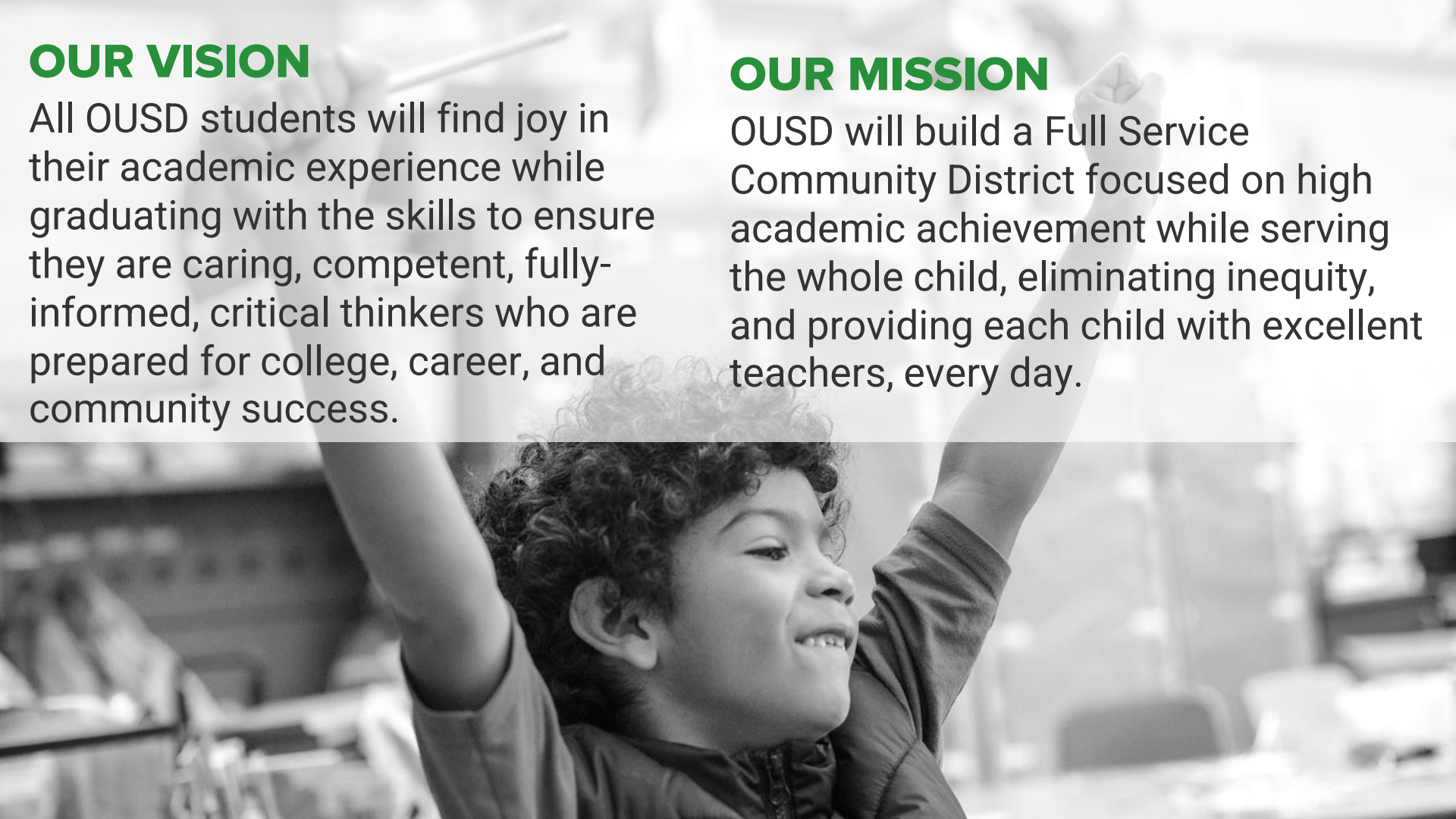

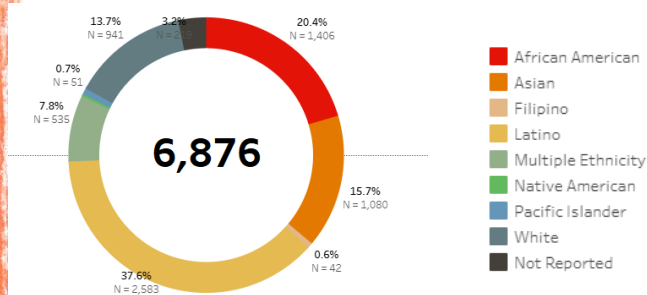

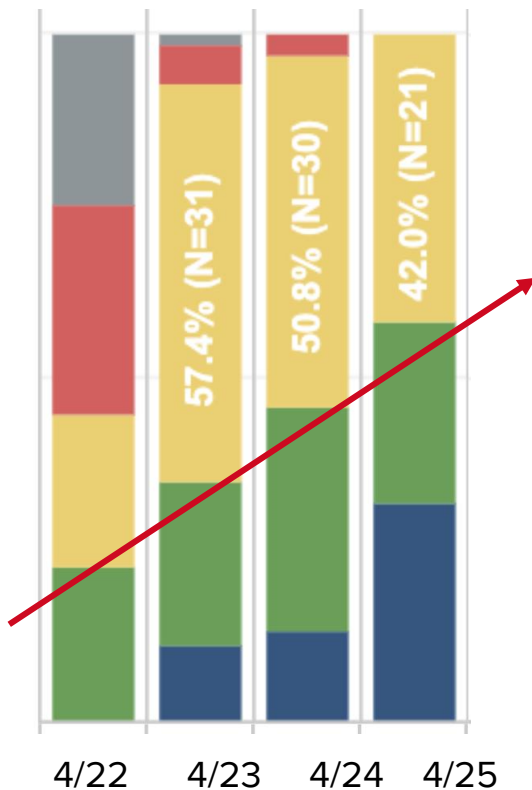

Foundational Literacy: % of students meeting grade level standards

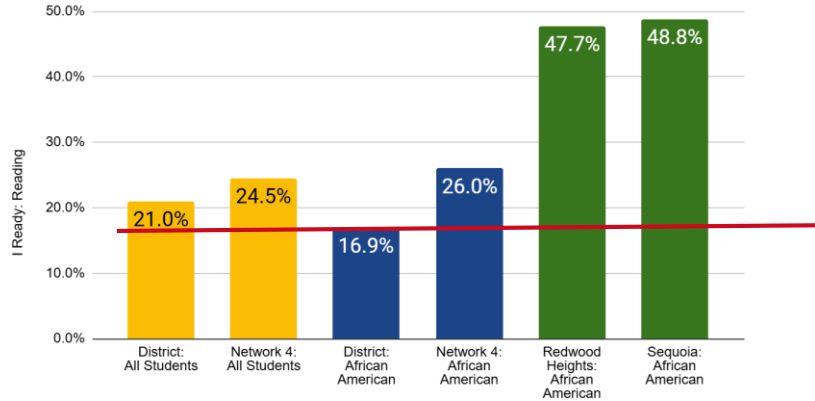


Focal school Allendale's 2nd graders showing gains year over year

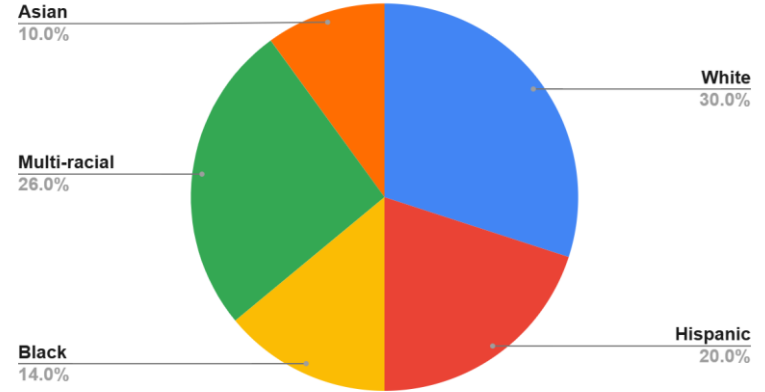
Two N4 Schools Lead in Literacy for Black Students

i-Ready Reading: Percent of Students at Grade Level

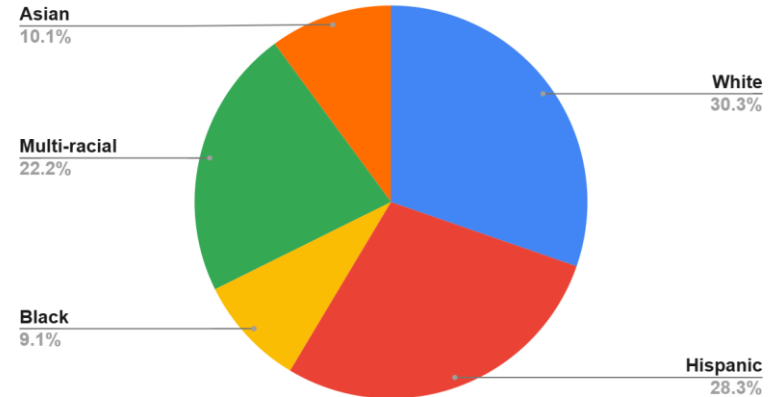


Two diverse Title I schools, one an EL Education Lab School, in Network 4 have made significant strides in literacy—achieving outstanding outcomes for Black students.

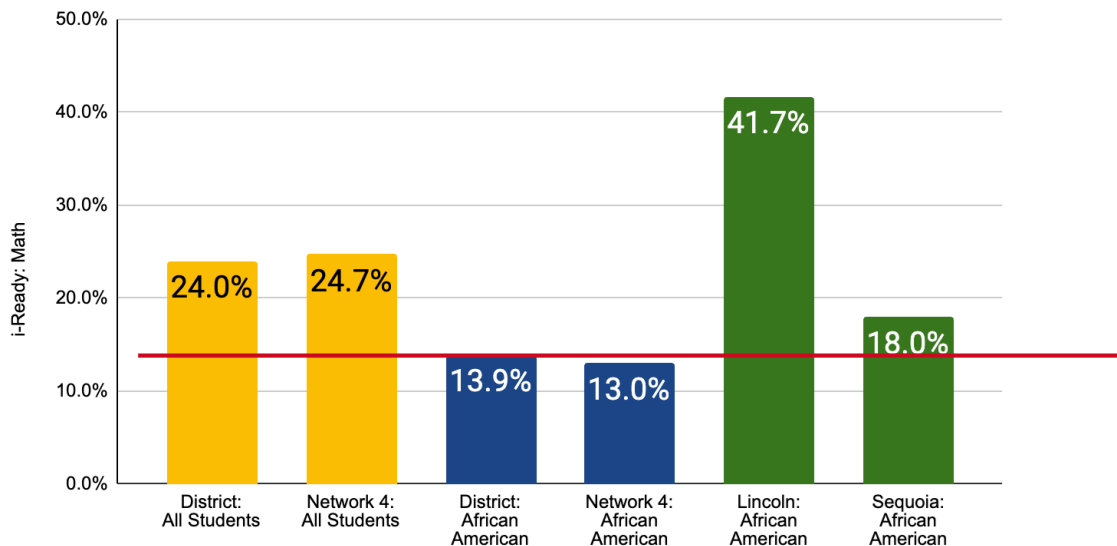

Adult Ed Update

OACE Continues to Increase Enrollments and Expected Outcomes

- **Program Growth and Outcomes:** Since 2020-21, adult student enrollment has increased 33% to 1936 students in 2024-25; and student learning gains have increased 77%. The exponential increase in student outcomes is due to Professional Learning Communities' focus on student learning outcomes and analysis

Alignment and District Initiatives

- **Adult Education Services:** OACE instructional programs include High School Equivalency (HSE),
- Credit recovery/HSD,
- Adult Basic Education (ABE),
- Career Technical Education (CTE) for young adults with disabilities,
- 6 Healthcare Pathways leading to employment as well as
- two different English as a Second Language (ESL) programs: Family Literacy and College and Career Readiness Pathways (CCRP); a total of 40 class offerings.
- Classes are accessible to the community in 21 locations throughout Oakland: 13 at OUSD school sites, 4 at Laney College, 2 community-based organizations and through an online Distance Learning program.
- Adult Education provides support services including GED/HiSet testing, transition support to college and career, transcript services and babysitting in Family Literacy.

Regional Alignment

- **Adult Education Regional Consortium:** OACE is a part of the Northern Alameda Adult Education Collective (NAAEC), created to provide regional coordination of Adult Education services. This is the first time in Adult Education history that adult schools and community colleges are working together to develop programming, co-locate classes, create bridge courses and career pathways to better serve adult learners in the region.

Impact Data

- 130 completed CTE programs
- 70 students were employed so far
- Added 3 more healthcare pathways
- 73 ESL students enrolled in Healthcare pathways
- Received \$1.9 m in partnership with Linked Learning to strengthen the relationship and expand the Highway to Work Program and broaden OACE CTE offerings.

A Tribute to Mr. Oscar C. Wright, Sr.

Oscar had numerous great accomplishments in his life, but his greatest accomplishment was being the uncompromising morally driven man he always spoke of. Being a father that not only provided, but educated, encouraged, and loved his children, and a committed husband who acknowledged his love for his wife every single day. Charity starts at home with how you treat yourself and family. Oscar took this same energy and commitment and shared it with the people he touched with his sincere words and actions. His messages, though tough at times, were heartfelt by those who cared to listen to his message. His compassion, empathy, and willingness to fight for what he felt was right and for those who could not fight for themselves helped so many people in so many positive ways. Oscar had several sayings/proverbs he would share often, one that comes to mind is “if you don’t stand for something, you’ll fall for anything.” A strong Black man, father, husband, leader, mentor, visionary, an inspiration to others all describe Oscar C. Wright but do not even come close to encompassing the man Oscar was and will be remembered as.
