Director London said the Board had some concerns about this vendor which had a contract last year. The contract was approved last year and afterwards we got feedback that the training was not useful for some of our teachers. She is concerned about the quality of the vendor, why we are unable to deliver this closer to home or in house altogether; and she has severe problems paying for travel costs for consultants from Montana.

Maria Santos, Deputy Superintendent, Instruction, Leadership, and Equity-in-Action, said she has looked into this contract which originated from the High School Network. Paragon has created a series of professional development (PD) offerings for the high schools. The high schools chose a particular area of focus for their schools. Three schools, including Met West, Dewey, and Y.E.S., opted to work with this service provider in the area of assessment for learning. The provider has previously worked with the Middle School Network, focusing on creating learning targets and assessments; and how teachers build programs to target the standards and align their assessments to it.

Ms. Santos said she also looked at the evaluations for Paragon which were very supportive. The schools that selected this program had an interest in focusing this type of improvement for their curriculum. It is part of the PD growth opportunity.

Ms. Santos indicated she has spoken to staff about building capacity to facilitate this kind of activity. It is an opportunity to build the capacity of the math and ELA leaders to look at standards, develop assessments, and align instruction.

Chairperson Yee said Dewey Academy is connected to this. Last semester, he met with Dewey which used National Equity Project. This is an exercise for us to get feedback from the High School Networks as to the primary PD supports used by our high schools. The National Equity Project was referring to the achievement gap and expectation processes.

Ms. Santos said principals and teachers from schools chose the vendor for this particular activity. When we had to do budget cuts, significant resources were diminished from our Curriculum and professional development office. We need to build capacity as we attend to serving the schools at the same time.

Chairperson Yee said it still gets to our being better able to assess and evaluate the overall PD suite of activities that are supported by schools. The Committee is in support of the effort to get a complete and comprehensive picture of high school reform.

Chairperson Hodge said the SEAN Task Force can answer the bulk of questions. Ms. Santos said the SEAN Task Force will have priorities around PD and areas of improvement with the attendant capacity development that we need to put in place.

Director London stated her ongoing concern about the After school Program evaluation being only for the 21st Century and the After School Education and Safety (ASES) Programs and it does not appear that we are doing anything with the \$30,000 to better define After School Program in our schools. We are not identifying standards and we are not determining whether these vendors are meeting the standards that we wish to see in our after school programming. We have a number of schools with after school programs and there is no evaluation.

Chairperson Hodge said there have been presentations and people have done a lot of due diligence in the selection of their after school program vendors.

Director London said we still have programs where there is no evaluation component. There are parents who pay to send their children to these programs and we do not know if the programs are addressing the needs of students. Now that we have a semester's worth of experience with a 21st Century Program, her concerns are greater, not less. She has grave concerns about the quality of the programming and whether they are monitoring each student and whether they know of the participation level.

Maria Santos, Deputy Superintendent, responded by saying we have a variety of after school programs funded by different sources. Some of the funding sources have criteria that have to be followed and many of the evaluations are linked to the requirements for the programs. What she is hearing is that for any program that is offered in our schools, there should be standards across the board for the programs and that our evaluations or considerations should be against those standards that holds all accountable, independent of the funding source. That is something we need to investigate. It is part of the work of the full service schools and of the quality work we are doing under the Strategic Framework. We define full service community schools by identifying the criteria for quality across the board. In the absence of that, we need to take a look at areas that are not grant funded for evaluation.

Director Yee asked about the appropriateness of using District funds to evaluate after school programs that are supported by parents which represent child care, i.e., Adventure Time? Should that be our responsibility to pay District resources to evaluate?

Director London said she is very familiar with Adventure Time. They come in and demand to be the only provider at a school site and parents have no choice. There are parents at

the school who cannot afford Adventure Time or there is not enough capacity to take in all the kids who wish to participate.

Chairperson Hodge asked Ms. Santos to verify the process used at school sites in selection of the after school programs.

Director Yee said Adventure Time broke off from another vendor when they first started and each of them wanted an exclusive contract at the school so that they were not competing with someone else. The PTA ultimately made the decision and the contract is probably rolling over every year. That does raise the question of criteria for District endorsement, as many PTAs have after school language and instruction programs.

Director London said she does not have a particular vendetta against the vendor we have been discussing. Personally, she views it as child care and she does not expect much academic enrichment from that program. There are programs that were organized by parents. We need to be clear about what we offer and to have some standards in place. In her two years on the Board, she has not seen that discussion.

Director Yee said a bigger discussion would be the S.E.S. Programs which are primarily in our Title I schools. He would rather invest some time in what could be the utilization of the ASES 21st Century evaluation in creating a standards model for our S.E.S. Programs and he is unclear about the funding for the evaluation(s). Two of the vendors were willing to hold their own programs up to some evaluation standard if we were willing to engage in that discussion. He does not know if there would be a good faith effort on our part that they would undertake that evaluation at their own cost, or if we would have to participate by adding resources. To evaluate, in the same way, that ASES and 21st Century are evaluating their program would cost a significant amount of money. They have their own evaluation system and it does not relate to academic achievement.

Director London said she has a problem with a program being offered at a school and not being able to accept all the students who need a place to be after school. That does not fit into any of the quality standards. For her, if it is into the "Where are the kids between 3:00 P.M. and 6:00 P.M." box; are they meaningfully engaged in something; and, is there adequate capacity at all of our campuses for the kids who need a place to be after school?

Raquel Jimenez, All City Council Advisor, spoke to the revised version of the Resolution that was presented last summer to the Board. They took into account the questions that were raised by Board Members and they consulted with the College and Career Readiness Office. The Committee was asked for its support and to move the item to the full Board.

Chairperson Hodge said she is in support of the resolution and it goes alongside A-G. She requested clarification on the contextual framework as it relates to the Secondary Achievement And Network (SEAN) process and as it relates to counseling in the District. Collective bargaining issues might surface, She has a concern around a resolution that might land in an environment where it is not conducive for implementation. She wants to know more about the context.

Ms. Jimenez stated instead of having a full fledged student action research project as we did last year, we are implementing a district-wide youth survey called Youth Truth to provide feedback to the SEAN Task Force around the Strategic Plan and the key inquiry questions. We are also incorporating the feedback that we collected last year from students that led to the writing of the resolution.

Ms. Santos said part of this is all working with the advisory and gearing up for college readiness so the students are well advised on the need to succeed--to work with SEAN plan, and through the resolution and activities going on in Career Readiness and the work of the high school department, to bring all of these pieces together so that we are looking at all of the components that are going to enable students to enter ninth grade, graduate, and meet the A-G requirements.

Ms. Santos said we have been bringing the different units together to discuss areas of work, then looking to where there is interdependence, and where things create a stronger cohesive network, as well as looking at the areas where we need to bolster up support. As we look at the SEAN plan, we are going to be looking at areas in place within our system that will enable our students, and identify areas that we still have gaps in work going forward.

Ms. Santos said we are carefully reviewing the area of advisement of students and the structures within the schools to advise students; structures in existence which are human intensive where we have staff working with students; and other structures and supports that can be more student generated and places where we have potential to use resources that can maximize resources for kids.

Ms. Santos stated we know that within the system, we have limited counseling capacity and we need to think creatively to afford advising for students so that they are on track to graduation as they move through the high school grades. One of the things we look to come back to this committee is a preliminary assessment; as we get ready for the SEAN, the committee is cognizant of what we are finding as baseline. Then, as we look towards what we envision in the SEAN, determine what needs to be put in place to get there. A lot of this work is bringing together units that traditionally had not been working together.

Ms. Santos said the high school units include Family & Community Office, Complementary Learning, High School Network, Leadership Curriculum & Instruction. Each of the offices have pieces of the high school agenda, in addition to Adult Education and they are now all working together, looking at all of the components to ensure we are looking at all of the high school students.

Director Yee asked why this initiative around peer assistance and academic support system needs a resolution from the Board, as we have the SEAN group and we have people working on this. Why is this not an administrative recommendation that requires no resolution? The resolution requires secondary schools to establish a Peer Academic Support Program. Is the Resolution's purpose to insist that schools implement a particular form of support? Or, is the Board resolution process one that establishes broad parameters for students to have academic support? He understands that the resolution also relates to some funding stream. He heard Ms. Santos recognize the relationship to our College and Career and SEAN portfolio.

Ms. Jimenez said the Resolution carries a lot of weight by mandating high schools to have a peer academic support program. We have also tried to get external funding streams for this so that the cost will not totally come from the school district.

Director Yee said he is not sure whether a Board resolution puts us in the position of mandating a particular administrative activity for peer assistance. He appreciates the fact that it came from students. How do we know that a high school is not already providing adequate student service support for its students without this peer academic support program? He is unsure about the cost to implement. Is it the establishment of another department or is it something that is going to be covered within the work stream of the counseling department at a high school? He asked Ms. Jimenez if she had an approximate cost to implement?

Ms. Jimenez said a peer academic support system currently does not exist. The resolution refers to research that was conducted last year that shows young people do not currently have sufficient support at their schools. There is a program that does work which is the peer-to-peer program operated by Oakland Kids First. They have raised \$80,000 for this program, but cannot access the funds if the District does not show that this is something that we want to implement at all of our high schools.

Director Yee asked if the \$80,000 is sufficient to fully fund the program? Ms. Jimenez said it would cover the first year. It is an incremental program. If the resolution is approved, then they would come back with a report detailing the implementation costs for Years 1 through 5.

Director Yee stated if the implementation committee determined that the program would require a more substantial cost to fully implement across the District, does the resolution bind the District to fully fund the program no matter what the other funding streams are?

Ms. Jimenez said it does not bind the school district; rather it gives them a tool to figure out how to implement peer academic support at every high school.

Director Yee said this resolution, by its wording, takes priority over spending strategies that the District might request.

Chairperson Hodge asked Director Yee of his opinion if the peer academic support came via the administrative work of SEAN and other programs, would there still be a cost element. Director Yee said he would expect Ms. Santos to tell him that it is cost effective to do it this way and within the funding of a high school. The Resolution does not say that the Board supports peer assistance in the form of the program at Oakland Tech. It mandates that we establish the program at every high school and the Board is responsible for oversight of the implementation of its own program, and if we fail to fund it, then we are overturning our own resolution.

Director Yee stated the requirement part of implementation at all schools would take priority over the SEAN work itself because the SEAN work is not the umbrella; it is a particular programming that is the umbrella. We have not had any resolution yet that says we believe that college and career advising is essential to our schools and here are the pieces to it.

Director Yee said he is reacting to the requirement that we put in Board policy an administrative requirement to do a particular program for support.

Ms. Santos said we plan to create a counseling and advisory program in the area of peer support and the SEAN Task Force activity will result in a variety of recommendations. If the language in the resolution is restrictive, then we need to go back to the drawing board. The intent is not to be restrictive, but to create an option for schools to take advantage of and to explore ways we can involve students in this area. We can determine if it needs to be presented to the SEAN group, then come back within that umbrella.

Director London asked about the role of our I. T. Department. The Resolution calls for students to have on-line access. She has not heard anything about the cost to do programming and their involvement in the discussions. Some of the large comprehensive high schools instituted a house system in ninth grade. What is the status of the house system? She thought that program was going to be a similar peer support and a small group approach. How do we insure the effectiveness of our peer counselors? She said some of our students participate in College Summit which assists students to become peer counselors. How does that program fit in?

Chairperson Hodge summarized the questions as dealing with cost, quality control, peer counselors, and involvement of I.T.

Director London asked if the Resolution is duplicative or complementary of other programs in which our schools are already participating?

Adrian Kirk, Director, Family and Community Services Office, said this resolution was borne in a very different climate. It grew out of student leadership development and it predates the SEAN Task Force and the Strategic Plan. It was and was born in an environment where there was no action and no conversation around adequate college advising. The resolution would empower students to be a part of the whole process. They fully accept the recommendations of this Committee. Director Yee said committee members were endorsing the direction of the resolution. It is discomforting to use the resolution process to direct staff to do something without seeing the whole picture. He recalls there was a healthy debate on whether this was the formal Certificated counseling work or some other. The A-G discussion at one time included lowering the counseling load and adding more counselors. He personally saw the resolution as a healthy alternative to adding counselors. He is very cautious about going too far ahead. He would rather be able to support something which he endorses, and he appreciates the work of the peer advising that is going on. It encourages more exploration of the possibility of this as an important component to SEAN. It surprises him that the resolution is asking for the implementation of the program prior to the SEAN report.

Mr. Kirk stated it is clear that the implementation piece is not fully spelled out and there is much more work to bring this into coherence with work of the SEAN Task Force. He is hearing an endorsement of the ideas in general and a request to take the item back to the current task force to be embedded in the current context.

Ms. Santos said directing this effort and these ideas to the SEAN Task Force would be an appropriate way to proceed, given that the work was initiated last year, at some point, when we did not have a SEAN Task Force and we were not looking at high schools in a comprehensive way. Now that we are doing that and looking at particular areas of student advisement, that would be an appropriate place to forward these ideas for consideration and to figure out how they fit in the overarching plan.

Chairperson Hodge said SEAN should come out with a recommendation on how the training actually happens.

Director London requested staff to work on the resolution and consult with the General Counsel, as required, to revise the resolution.

Chairperson Hodge said it needs to be determined if the SEAN task force is going to support the resolution. She recommending tabling of this item and staff will bring the resolution back, if appropriate.

I. Superintendent of Schools or Designee's Committee Liaison Report

Maria Santos, Deputy Superintendent, Instruction, Leadership, and Equity-in-Action, reported on the work of last fall. She said we have initiated a focus on academic language and literacy, an area that is very important to prepare our students to be college and career ready. Institutes for principals were initiated with a strategic design to build capacity. She said it is important to build strategies so that students are more engaged in the classroom. This series of professional development will help tool our teachers and principals.

Director Yee asked if the institutes were expensive? Ms. Santos said it is local and makes significant difference in academic performance. The significant investment in this work is to build our own capacity. We are looking to create internal capacity in the kinds of strategies that we need to serve our students. It is a major departure from how we have traditionally been doing professional development by starting with the principals and getting them to understand activities of teachers and giving them a lens into what a classroom that has rich academic language and literacy discourse looks like.

J. Introduction of New Legislative Matter

Committee Members asked about a Resolution that Director Gallo had introduced at a recent meeting. Chairperson Hodge said she would follow up with Director Gallo.

Chairperson Hodge said Director Dobbins is doing some work around the OAL. About a year ago, we did not have a very good presentation at all from the OAL to Teaching and Learning. It was not effective and it did not go anywhere. The questions were around the Resolution that mandated OAL in the work they were supposed to be doing. Some of that is academic or ensures there is tutoring and a standard around academic performance in order to actually play in the OAL. The Committee wishes to hear more about the OAL and its infrastructure development to support the academics of student athletes. She would prefer, as we go through agenda building with Maria Santos, to return to the work plan and talk about that. She said it did not get much leverage. If we are going to pump it back up and do some work around OAL, she would like us to be clear academically where we are standing in our support with her department.

Director London said the after school programs are in many forms. For a large majority of them, because they are funded externally, they require an evaluation.

Director Yee asked if it improves the likelihood of a student graduating? Chairperson Hodge noted that is our purpose.
