East Oakland PRIDE Elementary is an elementary school that serves approximately 437 students that had over 200 office referrals during the 2013-2014 school year and 24 out-of-school suspensions. While investing heavily in a School Culture Plan that addresses Tier 1 Behavior Management across the school, we must also ensure that we are supporting the social-emotional development of our scholars. While we strive to tighten up systems and expectations, we seek to provide students with the social-adaptive behavioral skills needed to respond appropriately during conflict or challenges with peers. Higher Ground will provide lessons in Caring School Community. Second-Step and will develop and foster Social Skills Groups, Service Learning Projects and mentorship for our most needy students while promoting empathy and caring across the school.

Scope of work will include: 1) School climate workshops that focus on teaching children caring school community curriculum and second step problem solving. The objective of these workshops is to expand children's exposure to concepts of empathy, cooperation, reciprocity, and stewardship 2) Classroom support to therapeutically modify the environment, helping reduce the barriers to optimal behavioral functioning. 3) Behavioral Skill Building Group Rehabilitation for identified students to learn coping mechanisms that will help scholars control and manage anger, non-compliance, impulse control, pro-social skills, grief and loss. 4) Individual Behavioral Intervention for students that include 30-40 minute sessions once a week working on target behaviors and appropriate supports, replacement behaviors and relationship building.

CONTRACTOR's services will be performed, findings obtained, reports and recommendations prepared in accordance with generally and currently accepted principles and practices of its profession for services to California school districts.

- 6. Invoicing: Invoices furnished by CONTRACTOR under this Agreement must be in a form acceptable to OUSD. All amounts paid by OUSD shall be subject to audit by OUSD. Invoices shall include, but not be limited to: Contractor name, Contractor address, invoice date, invoice number, purchase order number, name of school or department service was provided to, period of service, name of the person performing the service, date service was rendered, brief description of services provided, number of hours of service, hourly rate, total payment requested.

Notice shall be effective when received if personally served or, if mailed, three days after mailing. Either party must give written notice of a change of address.

8. Status of Contractor: This is not an employment contract. CONTRACTOR, in the performance of this Agreement, shall be and act as an independent contractor. CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partner, or joint venture of OUSD, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of OUSD and/or to which OUSD's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Worker's Compensation. CONTRACTOR shall assume full responsibility for payment of all Federal, State, and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to CONTRACTOR's employees. In the performance of the work herein contemplated, CONTRACTOR is an independent contractor or business entity, with the sole authority for controlling and directing the performance of the details of the work, OUSD being interested only in the results obtained.

9. Insurance:

- 1. Unless specifically waived by OUSD, the following insurance is required:
 - i. If CONTRACTOR employs any person to perform work in connection with this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall procure and maintain at all times during the performance of such work, Workers' Compensation Insurance in conformance with the laws of the State of California and Federal laws when applicable. Employers' Liability Insurance shall not be less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per accident or disease.

Check one of the boxes below:

- CONTRACTOR is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the Labor Code which require every employer to be insured against liability for workers' compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that code, and will comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the Work of this Contract.
- CONTRACTOR does not employ anyone in the manner subject to the workers' compensation laws of California.
- ii. CONTRACTOR shall maintain Commercial General Liability insurance, including automobile coverage with limits of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence for bodily injury and property damage. The coverage shall be primary as to OUSD and shall name OUSD as an additional insured. Evidence of insurance must be attached. Endorsement of OUSD as an additional insured shall not affect OUSD's rights to any claim, demand, suit or judgment made, brought or recovered against CONTRACTOR. The policy shall protect CONTRACTOR and OUSD in the same manner as though each were separately issued. Nothing in said policy shall operate to increase the Insurer's liability as set forth in the policy beyond the amount or amounts shown or to which the Insurer would have been liable if only one interest were named as an insured.
- iii. If CONTRACTOR is offering OUSD professional advice under this Contract, CONTRACTOR shall maintain Errors and Omissions insurance or Professional Liability insurance with coverage limits of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per claim.

OR

- iv. CONTRACTOR is not required to maintain any insurance under this agreement. (Completed and approved Waiver of Insurance Form is required from OUSD's Risk Management.) Waiver of insurance does not release CONTRACTOR from responsibility for any claim or demand.
- 10. Licenses and Permits: CONTRACTOR shall obtain and keep in force all licenses, permits, and certificates necessary for the performance of this Agreement.
- 11. **Assignment**: The obligations of CONTRACTOR under this Agreement shall not be assigned by CONTRACTOR without the express prior written consent of OUSD.
- 12. Non-Discrimination: It is the policy of OUSD that in connection with all work performed under Contracts there be no discrimination because of race, color, ancestry, national origin, religious creed, physical disability, medical condition, marital status, sexual orientation, gender, or age; therefore, CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to, the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735 and OUSD policy. In addition, CONTRACTOR agrees to require like compliance by all its subcontractor(s). CONTRACTOR shall not engage in unlawful discrimination in employment on the basis of actual or perceived; race, color, national origin, ancestry, religion, age, marital status, pregnancy, physical or mental disability, medical condition, veteran status, gender, sex or sexual orientation.

- 13. Drug-Free / Smoke Free Policy: No drugs, alcohol, and/or smoking are allowed at any time in any buildings and/or grounds on OUSD property. No students, staff, visitors, CONTRACTORS, or subcontractors are to use controlled substances, alcohol or tobacco on these sites.
- 14. Indemnification: CONTRACTOR agrees to hold harmless, indemnify, and defend OUSD and its officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims or losses accruing or resulting from injury, damage, or death of any person, firm, or corporation in connection with the performance of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR also agrees to hold harmless, indemnify, and defend OUSD and its elective board, officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims or losses incurred by any supplier, contractor, or subcontractor furnishing work, services, or materials to CONTRACTOR in connection with the performance of this Agreement. This provision survives termination of this Agreement.
- 15. Copyright/Trademark/Patent/Ownership: CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that all matters produced under this Agreement shall become the property of OUSD and cannot be used without OUSD's express written permission. OUSD shall have all right, title and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark, and/or patent of said matter in the name of OUSD. CONTRACTOR consents to use of CONTRACTOR's name in conjunction with the sale, use, performance and distribution of the matters, for any purpose and in any medium. These matters include, without limitation, drawings, plans, specifications, studies, reports, memoranda, computation sheets, the contents of computer diskettes, artwork, copy, posters, billboards, photographs, videotapes, audiotapes, systems designs, software, reports, diagrams, surveys, source codes or any other original works of authorship, or other documents prepared by CONTRACTOR or its Sub-CONTRACTORs in connection with the Services performed under this Agreement. All works shall be works for hire as defined under Title 17 of the United States Code, and all copyrights in those works are the property of OUSD.
- 16. Waiver: No delay or omission by either party in exercising any right under this Agreement shall operate as a waiver of that or any other right or prevent a similar subsequent act from constituting a violation of the Agreement.
- 17. **Termination**: OUSD may at any time terminate this Agreement upon 30 days prior written notice to CONTRACTOR. OUSD shall compensate CONTRACTOR for services satisfactorily provided through the date of termination. In addition, OUSD may terminate this Agreement for cause should CONTRACTOR fail to perform any part of this Agreement. In the event of termination for cause, OUSD may secure the required services from another contractor. If the cost to OUSD exceeds the cost of providing the services pursuant to this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall pay the additional cost.
- 18. Conduct of CONTRACTOR: By signing this Agreement, CONTRACTOR certifies compliance with the following requirements and will provide OUSD with evidence of staff qualifications, which include:
 - Tuberculosis Screening: CONTRACTOR is required to screen employees who will be working at OUSD sites for more than six hours. CONTRACTOR affirms that each employee has current proof of negative TB testing on file and TB results are monitored.
 - 2. Fingerprinting of Employees and Agents. The fingerprinting and criminal background investigation requirements of Education Code section 45125.1 apply to CONTRACTOR's services under this Agreement and CONTRACTOR certifies its compliance with these provisions as follows: "CONTRACTOR certifies that CONTRACTOR has complied with the fingerprinting and criminal background investigation requirements of Education Code section 45125.1 with respect to all CONTRACTOR's employees, subcontractors, agents, and subcontractors' employees or agents ("Employees") regardless of whether those Employees are paid or unpaid, concurrently employed by OUSD, or acting as independent contractors of CONTRACTOR, who may have contact with OUSD pupils in the course of providing services pursuant to the Agreement, and the California Department of Justice has determined that none of those Employees has been convicted of a felony, as that term is defined in Education Code section 45122.1. Contractor further certifies that it has received and reviewed fingerprint results for each of its Employees and Contractor has requested and reviews subsequent arrest records for all Employees who may come into contract with OUSD pupils in providing services to the District under this Agreement.

In the event that OUSD, in its sole discretion, at any time during the term of this contract, desires the removal of any CONTRACTOR related persons, employee, representative or agent from an OUSD school site and, or property, CONTRACTOR shall immediately, upon receiving notice from OUSD of such desire, cause the removal of such person or persons.

- 19. **No Rights in Third Parties**: This Agreement does not create any rights in, or inure to the benefit of, any third party except as expressly provided herein.
- 20. OUSD's Evaluation of CONTRACTOR and CONTRACTOR's Employees and/or Subcontractors. OUSD may evaluate CONTRACTOR's work in any way that OUSD is entitled to do so pursuant to applicable law. The OUSD's evaluation may include, without limitation:
 - Requesting that OUSD employee(s) evaluate the CONTRACTOR and the CONTRACTOR's employees and subcontractors and each of their performance.
 - 2. Announced and unannounced observance of CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR's employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s).
- 21. Limitation of OUSD Liability: Other than as provided in this Agreement, OUSD's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall OUSD be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of, or in connection with, this Agreement for the services performed in connection with this Agreement.
- 22. Confidentiality: CONTRACTOR and all CONTRACTOR's agents, personnel, employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s) shall maintain the confidentiality of all information received in the course of performing the Services. CONTRACTOR understands that student records are confidential and agrees to comply with all state and federal laws concerning the maintenance and disclosure of student records. This requirement to maintain confidentiality shall extend beyond the termination of this Agreement. Contractors will be permitted.

- 23. Conflict of Interest: CONTRACTOR shall abide by and be subject to all applicable, regulations, statutes or other laws regarding conflict of interest. CONTRACTOR shall not hire any officer or employee of OUSD to perform any service by this Agreement without the prior approval of OUSD Human Resources.
 - CONTRACTOR affirms to the best of his/her/its knowledge, there exists no actual or potential conflict of interest between CONTRACTOR's family, business or financial interest and the services provided under this Agreement, and in the event of change in either private interest or services under this Agreement, any question regarding possible conflict of interest which may arise as a result of such change will be brought to OUSD's attention in writing.
 - Through its execution of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR acknowledges that it is familiar with the provisions of section 1090 *et seq.* and section 87100 *et seq.* of the Government Code of the State of California, and certifies that it does not know of any facts which constitute a violation of said provisions. In the event CONTRACTOR receives any information subsequent to execution of this Agreement which might constitute a violation of said provisions, CONTRACTOR agrees it shall notify OUSD in writing.
- 24. Certification Regarding Debarment, Suspension, Ineligibility and Voluntary Exclusion: CONTRACTOR certifies to the best of his/her/its knowledge and belief, that it and its principals are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by any Federal department or agency according to Federal Acquisition Regulation Subpart 9.4, and by signing this contract, certifies that this vendor does not appear on the Excluded Parties List (https://www.sam.gov/).
- 25. **Litigation**: This Agreement shall be performed in Oakland, California and is governed by the laws of the State of California. The Alameda County Superior Court shall have jurisdiction over any state court litigation initiated to enforce or interpret this Agreement.
- 26. Incorporation of Recitals and Exhibits: The Recitals and each exhibit attached hereto are hereby incorporated herein by reference.
- 27. Integration/Entire Agreement of Parties: This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties.
- 28. Counterparts: This Agreement and all amendments and supplements to it may be executed in counterparts, and all counterparts together shall be construed as one document.
- 29. **Signature Authority**: Each party has the full power and authority to enter into and perform this Agreement, and the person signing this Agreement on behalf of each Party has been given the proper authority and empowered to enter into this Agreement.
- 30. Contract Contingent on Governing Board Approval: OUSD shall not be bound by the terms of this Agreement until it has been formally approved by OUSD's Governing Board, and no payment shall be owed or made to CONTRACTOR absent formal approval. This Agreement shall be deemed to be approved when it has been signed by the Board of Education, and/or the Superintendent as its designee.

ACTIVITY SUMMARY GOAL

SCHOOL CLIMATE WORKSHOPS

HG School climate workshops conducted by collaborative time coaches serve as a mechanism to give teachers more individual and grade level planning time as well as expose students to projects and inquiry based learning opportunities. School climate workshops focus on teaching children caring school community, second step problem solving, as well as S.T.E.M based lessons. The goal is to expand children's exposure to concepts of empathy, cooperation, reciprocity, and stewardship.

90% of students who attend class 95% of the time will state that they have a greater understanding of S.T.E.M concepts after participating in classroom climate workshops with HG coaches.

IN-CLASS SUPPORT

10 students of the 20 students that make up a typical caseload will receive no less than three hours of in class support per week in 8 week intervals. Children receiving the in-class support mode of treatment are high intervention level participants. Upon the conclusion of 8-week sessions, progress is evaluated a data report created with recommendations around increasing, decreasing, or maintaining time spent. All students receive support the entire year. In-class support assists children in becoming successful in the classroom setting. The goal is to help therapeutically modify the environment helping to reduce the barriers to optimal behavioral functioning. Increasing the amount of time students spends on task and in class is our goal. 40% decrease in behaviors resulting in referrals from the classroom among students receiving in-class support.

GENDER SPECIFIC

BEHAVIORAL SKILL BUILDING GROUP REHABILITATION

20 Students will participate in group rehabilitation. Working with identified students to learn coping mechanisms that help them control and manage: anger, non compliance, impulse control, pro social skills, grief and loss will help increase students social and emotional functioning while increasing the feeling of being in a healthy, safe, and supporting environment.

30% change in one or more behaviors being worked on in group within the larger setting by end of contract period. INDIVIDUAL BEHAVIORAL INTERVENTION AND CRISIS INTERVENTION

Children not responding to tier I of school wide RTI along with HG's first two levels of care, which are skill building groups and in-class support will receive additional individual rehabilitation 1 X per week for a minimum of 30 to 45 minutes in an attempt to get at the deeper issues preventing progress or addressing sudden Trauma affecting desired behavioral outcomes. 90% of students receiving crisis intervention will stabilize in the school setting by the end of the service contract.

TEACHER COACHING

The teachers of children receiving in-class support will receive coaching on ways to implement individuals HG behavior plans in their classrooms. Behavior plans are critical to helping teacher reach and manage every behavior they may encounter in the classroom setting. With teachers and students working together using the same language, behavioral cues, and shared expectations treatment concepts can be consistently implemented. HG led parent engagement and purposeful interactions will increase one to one parent/teacher interactions around student achievement and behavioral goals. HG works to assure that students, parents and teachers have a common understanding of treatment goals and everyone's responsibility and roles within the student's treatment. The goals are for students, parents and teachers to work as a team for the entire 38 weeks of school. 20% of teachers whose students receive in-class support will utilize behavior plan strategies and express better relationships with the parents of students receiving in-class support.

An evaluation will be presented by Hg detailing data based on stated outcomes, results, satisfaction, and information about the successes and challenges of programming are all included in Hg self assessment. An end of the year evaluation revealing the site's level of satisfaction with Hg programming and our ability to meet out stated outcomes from impacted daytime faculty and staff.

Greetings Jacqueline,

From our initial conversations it seems that you have a few things brewing. You mentioned that your overall school climate needed some work but that your biggest need right now is for your teachers and students to be supported in the classroom with social/emotional work in the classroom setting as well as release time for you and your teachers to collaborate. Based on that I have pulled together components of our Strong Behavior program that meet the needs as I understand them to be based on listening to what you needed and the kind of support you desire for your teachers. Higher Ground's daytime support services follow the districts Response to Intervention Model (RTI). Higher Ground fits into the model at each tier depending on the other services you may have at the school. If you have a mental health provider like Ann Martin we fit into Tier's 2 and 3. If no mental health provider we act as Tier 1, 2, and 3 making referrals to sever Tier 1 students as needed.

Katie and Lorena have the entire Strong Behavior Program on their campus. Working together by leveraging their budgets they have 5 Higher Ground team members working side by side with them and teachers to transform the school climate and culture. The Strong Behavior program has a few components. The components that Lorena and Katie have are Developmental Recess (DR), Collaborative time Coach (CC) and Behavior health (BH) programming. The components of DR are therapeutic recess in which we work with all children having behavioral challenges in the greater school community learning cooperation and mutual respect through service projects with Coach Archie around the school. DR also provides therapeutic recess prevention play and supervision (yard support/general or specific). The yard support part of the team is responsible for the greater supervision of the yard and school climate. They assure that all playground and school building rules are being followed in affirming ways, they conduct cooperative games and intervene in a therapeutic way when problems occur teaching students how to problem solve in the moment. Lastly DR coaches push into the classrooms during identified transition working with children to get them back into the academic environment after being outside for recess or loosely structured activities. Some students have a hard time transitioning and DR coaching help students and teachers with this. Our Collaborative Time Coaches(CC) provide programming to children in the classroom while teachers meet for collaborative time. During this collaborative time children are taught social/emotional learning using second step and caring school community's lessons as well as S.T.E.M.S component that builds on the social/emotional learning. This workshop time is also used to teach the entire student body the language and behavior of caring school communities. Because the CC interacts with all the children in the school teaching them the same school climate language and behaviors new skills can be taught the same way so all children remains on the same page as far as behavioral expectations within the greater school community. Behavioral Health is our intensified program that works with Tier 1 and 2 students. 20 identified students and their teachers receive support from restorative justice coaches. Coaches work with student showing them how to engage in the classroom environment with mutual respect. Coaches work in the classrooms with children and teachers helping understand, digest, and perform in ways that enhance student achievement and self esteem in both parties. Behavioral health programming provides you with in-class, themed pro social group, yard shadowing for identified students, field trip participation, and scaffolding support for identified students during the most loosely structured activities. Higher Ground comes with its own behavioral health and S.T.E.M.S curriculum, teachers, and equipment. All we request is a room with a computer if available and a phone for behavioral health programming. We handle the rest.

Out of these options I have created a budget that speaks to your need for collaborative time coaches (CC) and behavioral health coaches (BH). The scope of work is what your secretary should use to fill in the contract and the budget narrative lays out the services you would be purchasing. Hope this makes since.
