# **Strategic Goals for OUSD Family Engagement**

1) Convene family engagement collaborative to create student, family, and community engagement standards.

4) Engage parents, families, and communities in creating healthy school cultures, to include positive discipline norms and practices.

Family Engagement Standards & Policy 2) Convene family engagement advisory committee to advise and support OUSD in the creation of family engagement structures.

3) Establish parent leadership support structure to recruit, develop and train parents to serve on site, district, and regional decision-making bodies.

Anne Henderson and Karen Mapp: A New Wave of Evidence: The Impact of School, Family and Community Connections on Student Achievement

 One Key Finding: Programs and interventions that engage families in supporting their children's learning at home are linked to improved student achievement

Harvard Family Research Project: Seeing is Believing: Promising Practices for How School Districts Promote Family Engagement

 One Key Finding: Schools would have to spend \$1,000 more per pupil to reap the same gains in student achievement that an involved parent brings

# Los Angeles Unified School District: Parents as Equal Partners Board Resolution

A Board Member's Commitment  Need to create the infrastructure, incentives, and accountability needed to realize a true culture of parent engagement

December 2010 Board Resolution

- Resolution required that a taskforce of parents, staff, community members, and district committee leaders convene to develop:
  - District Parents' Bill of Rights and Responsibilities
  - A Parent & Family Center Curriculum and Accountability Matrix
  - A framework and menu of viable delivery models for Parent & Family Centers
  - Implementation of a District Family Support Network as a key component of Parent Centers

Impact

- Board approved \$20M from a facilities bond to enhance 250-300 parent centers
- Slimmer and more viable committee structure; reallocated misused Title
   1 and EIA/LEP funds towards professional development

Current Work

- Developing a strategic plan/performance management plan that is informed by the task force recommendations
- The plan will include how the Bill of Rights will "roll out to all schools" and the level of expectation/accountability
- Developing a curriculum for parent centers around the Bill of Rights because without one "we will not achieve success"





## Successful Family Engagement Models Can be Sustained Over Time

# Oceanside Unified College Bound Saturday Workshops

- Up to 200 students and parents attend workshops one Saturday a month
- District contracted with outside consultants to develop program that addressed articulated parent needs
- Targets underperforming student groups in grades 9-12
- Funded through Title 1
- Parent workshops sustained for four years
- Positive Impact:
- Increase in attendance rates and GPA of students enrolled in program
- Parent feedback: "It motivated her to go to a four year university"

## Coachella Valley Unified Parents Empowering Parents (PEP) Volunteer Program

- Parent volunteer group of 20 parents offering workshops to other parents
- School Principal identifies PEP parents to represent site
- Parents receive training from Parent Resource Center
- Sustained for over six years
- Overall response is positive

# San Diego Unified Parent University

- Provides classes and workshops for parents of students in Title 1 schools
- •Classes held at school site or at District Parent Center
- Certificated teachers
- Buses for classes with 10-15 parents
- •Child care
- Some targeted programs:
   Project Ujima for African
   American parents, South East
   Asian and Somali Program,
   American Indian Education
   Program
- Parent University Program sustained for 15 years
- Overall response is positive
- •Increased level of engagement
- Testimonials from parents and students on improvements

## San Francisco Unified Family Liaisons

- Family Liaisons at 40 sites are funded through Title 1 and PI funds; about 20 additional sites are funded through site funds
- Positions are attached to Title
   1 or PI school site
- One centralized staff support person for ongoing support
- Monthly professional development and newsletters
- Liaisons create monthly action reports for specific families of students with the highest needs
- Sustained for over nine years
- Beginning to track impact this year, including a video series about the program

# STANDARDS FOR MEANINGFUL FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

### Standard 1 Parent/Caregiver Education Program

Families are supported with parenting and child-rearing skills, understanding child and adolescent development, and setting home conditions that support children as students at each age and grade level. Assist schools in understanding families.

## Standard 2 Communication with Parent/Caregiver

Families and school staff engage in regular, two-way, meaningful communication about student learning.

#### Standard 3 Parent Volunteering Program

Families are actively involved as volunteers and audiences at the school or in other locations to support students and school programs.

#### Standard 4 Learning at Home

Families are involved with their children in learning activities at home, including homework and other curriculum-linked activities and decisions.

#### Standard 5 Shared Power and Decision Making

Families and school staff are equal partners in decisions that  $\bar{a}$  ffect children and families and together inform, influence, and create policies, practices, and programs.

#### Standard 6 Community Collaboration & Resources

Coordinate resources and services for families, students, and the school with businesses, agencies, and other groups, and provide services to the community.





## Vision

Through meaningful family engagement, we envision a transformed school system that has directly confronted and actively addressed inequity and injustice so that every OUSD student graduates and becomes a fully engaged member of our community.

### Mission

The mission of meaningful family engagement is to inspire, engage, and support the students, families, and communities of OUSD to become authentic co-owners of our schools who share responsibility for every student becoming college and career ready. Through community organizing, and by building OUSD capacity, we will expand participation in learning, leadership, and advocacy that results in high levels of academic achievement and life opportunities for individual students, and for entire school communities.


