Ask of the Board Discussion

Background Currently, there are few opportunities for the OUSD Board and charter schools coming up for renewal to interact outside of Prop 39 decisions, material revisions, and renewals. In order to address this gap, the Office of Charter Schools will coordinate charter school presentations to take place at Charter Committee Meetings, per the Charter Committee Chair's request. These presentations will provide an opportunity for Charter Committee members to develop a deeper understanding of the charter schools authorized by the District, as well as to discuss any successes and growth areas in advance of the 2025-26 renewal cycle.

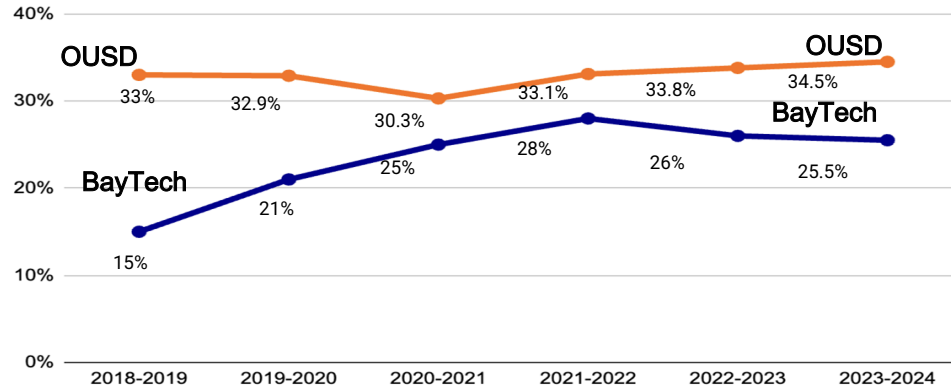

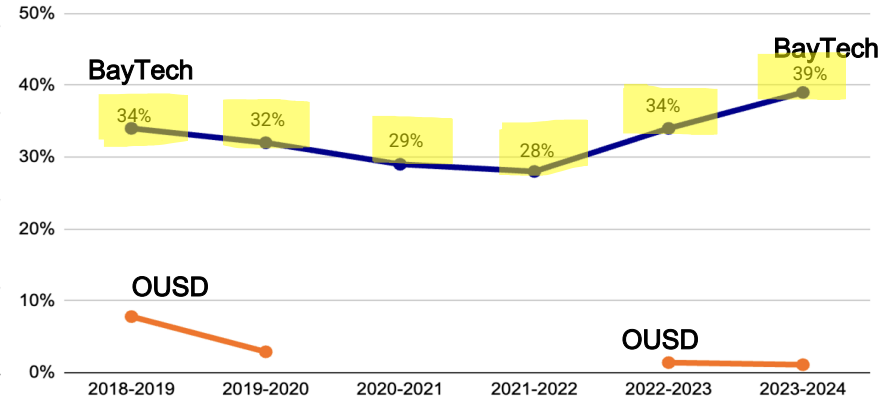
BayTech ELD Population



ELD Student Population



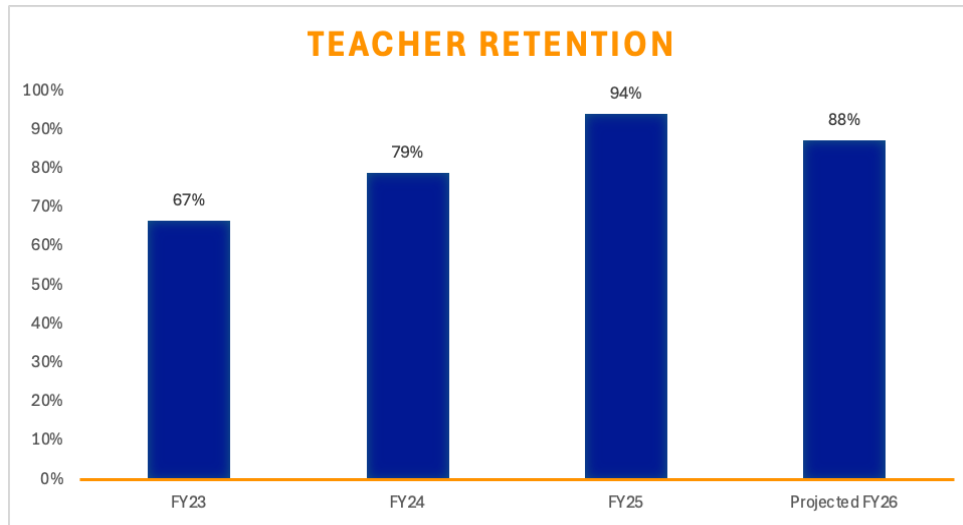

BayTech: Areas for Improvement



Test Scores & Class Selections:

- BayTech needs to get back to the pre-shooting test scores in ELA. BayTech's focus needs to be on the continued implementation of its new all-school math curriculum (Carnegie Learning).
- BayTech needs to continue its college going culture by increasing our SAT & ACT scores. Currently, we score at the national average on the SAT and ACT, we need to be beyond.
- BayTech's College Pathways have just started and will need further refinement.
- BayTech needs to grow its offerings of higher- level math. Calculus A/B starts this fall.

Recreating Culture and Community:

- BayTech is moving into its FOREVER home this Spring. We will need to recapture the magic and community feel that we previously created..
- Safety and Security Plans will need to be created and tested.
- Student Development and opportunities for student activities are now available to the student body.
- Connecting with our new community and becoming GREAT neighbors is essential.
