| RE: | Epic Charter School (Education For Change) Charter Petition Request | |

ACTION REQUESTED

Approve the petition and charter to establish Epic Charter School as an OUSD authorized charter school that serves grades 6th -8th. The petition presents a sound educational program; the petitioners are demonstrably likely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition; the petition contains the required signatures and affirmations; and the petition contains reasonably comprehensive descriptions of all of the 16 elements required by the California Charter Schools Act.

SUMMARY

Staff recommends that the OUSD Board of Education approve the petition for Epic Charter School to serve students in grades $6^{th} - 8^{th}$, to begin operation as an OUSD authorized charter school on July 1, 2014. Staff recommends approval based on the following:

- 1) The Education for Change Charter Management Organization currently operates elementary schools that outperform district schools in the same area (Fruitvale) as the proposed Epic Charter School
- 2) The blended learning model proposed extends beyond math instruction (which is the only current offering within Oakland USD) and encompasses all core content (English/History/Science)
- 3) Due diligence conducted to ensure that the establishment of the charter is consistent with sound educational practices

PROCEDURAL BACKGROUND

- 1) The lead petitioner submitted a petition for the Epic Charter School on August 28, 2013, at a regularly scheduled Board of Education meeting.
- 2) A public hearing was held on September 25, 2013.
- 3) Staff conducted Petitioner Interviews on September 19, 2013.

STATUTORY BACKGROUND

Pursuant to Education Code §47605:

Charter law outlines the criteria governing the approval or denial of charter school petitions. The following excerpt is taken from the Charter Schools Act, Education Code §47605. This excerpt delineates charter approval and denial criteria:

A school district governing board shall grant a charter for the operation of a school under this part if it is satisfied that granting the charter is consistent with sound educational practice. The governing board of the school district shall not deny a petition for the establishment of a charter school unless it makes written factual findings, specific to the particular petition, setting forth specific facts to support one or more of the following findings:

- (1) The charter school presents an unsound educational program for the pupils to be enrolled in the charter school.
- (2) The petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition.
- (3) The petition does not contain the number of signatures required.
- (4) The petition does not contain an affirmation of each of the conditions described in Education Code §47605(d).
- (5) The petition does not contain reasonably comprehensive descriptions of the 16 required charter elements.

DISCUSSION

Staff convened a petition review team comprised of leadership within the District, which subsequently conducted an evaluation of the petition pursuant to the Charter Schools Act and with the application of the Oakland Unified School District Petition Evaluation Rubric.

Following the petition review process, staff conducted Petitioner Interviews in an attempt to clarify various aspects of the petition, as well as to evaluate the capacity of the petitioners to successfully implement the program as set forth in the petition.

Epic Charter School proposes to open a middle school in the Fruitvale are in the Fall of 2014. The school will serve approximately 168 students in grade 6 in 2014-15, 336 students in grades 6-7 in 2015-16, and 504 students grades 6-8 in 2016-17.

The petitioners are from Education for Change and will replicate some portions of the school models currently being implemented at four (4) of their other charter schools authorized by Oakland Unified School District.

The staff report and charter petition evaluation contained herein describes the educational program, proposed school operations, as well as an articulation of strengths and foreseeable challenges, pursuant to the petition review process.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Oakland Unified School District's Board of Education **approve** the petition for Epic Charter School under the California Charter Schools Act. The factual findings illustrated in this report demonstrate that the petition satisfies the five legally required categories of *Education Code §* 47605:

(1) The charter school presents a sound educational program for the pupils to be enrolled in the charter school;

(2) The petitioners are demonstrably likely to successfully implement the program set forth in petition

(3) The petition contains the number of signatures required;

(4) The petition contains an affirmation of each of the conditions described in Education Code §47605(d);

(5) The petition contains reasonably comprehensive descriptions of the 16 required charter elements.

This approval is for the charter program and operation in its entirety as proposed and revised herein to include all terms and conditions set forth in this report. Any subsequent material revision of the provision of this charter may be made only with the approval of the District as charter authorizer (*Education Code* $\frac{547607(a)(1)}{2}$). Any material revision to any charter component must be proposed and considered according to the standards and criteria in Education Code $\frac{547607(a)(2)}{2}$.

The term of this charter will be from July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2019, the maximum period allowed under the California Charter Schools Act (*Education Code* §47607(a)(1)). The District will not accept a charter renewal request more than 270 days prior to the expiration of the charter.

A charter may be revoked by the authority that granted the charter if the authority finds that the charter school committed a material violation of any of the conditions, standards, or procedures set forth in its charter (*Education Code §47607(c)(1)*). The Board of Education's approval of this charter shall incorporate the conditions on opening and associated deadlines as a condition of the charter.

The District retains the authority to delay opening for a period of up to one year, if any of the conditions on opening are not satisfactorily met by the associated deadlines. Not meeting any one of the conditions on opening and associated deadlines set forth in this approval may be grounds for revocation as set forth in the California Charter Schools Act (Education Code \$47607(c)(1)).

Pursuant to OUSD Governing Board Policy, BP 0420.4, if the school does not open on or before September 30, 2014, it will be considered a demonstration of petitioners' lack of capacity to implement the program set forth in the petition and the District will initiate charter revocation procedures.

Recommendation:

Approval of the Epic Charter School charter petition, as revised, to reflect the terms and conditions set forth in this report, to begin operation July 1, 2014, and to expire June 30, 2019. Staff recommends approval of a full five-year term of operation. If conditions set forth here-in are not met as of August 1, 2014, and/or the petitioner and the Board of Education of the Oakland Unified School District mutually agree that success of the program would benefit from a delayed opening, the charter term will reflect the actual operation of the school to allow for a full five-year term of operation.

Brief description of the kind of school to be chartered.

"Students will be organized by house – House Pallidin, House Meta, House Icon, and House Paragon. All houses will be multiage and will grow until the school is full-sized. Each house will be led by a teacher representative and a guide. There will be approximately 42 students per house per grade level in year 1, growing annually by 42 students until the school is full-sized at 504 students with 126 students per house. As a gradual release blended learning model, students in the first four levels will experience the most traditional approach...guides will be in classrooms with the teacher supporting students who working on individualized programming online in a classroom rotation model. As students advance in their years, they will spend increasing amounts of time self-directing their learning in a separate room called the Sandbox under the supervision of coaches. Teachers will pull small groups of students throughout the day for lessons. This is a transition from the self-contained classroom rotation model to a school wide rotation/self-blend model as students mature and demonstrate their ability to manage their own learning and work." 

D. SPECIAL POPULATIONS: SPECIAL EDUCATION

Federal law requires charter schools, like all public schools, to provide a free appropriate education in the least restrictive environment to students identified with disabilities who are enrolled at the school. A plan for serving students with disabilities excels if it has the following characteristics:

- Demonstrated understanding of state and federal special education requirements including the fundamental obligation to provide a free, appropriate education to students identified with disabilities and obligations held under Section 504 of the ADA;

Strengths

Education for Change (EFC) has a record of performance gains in other Oakland charter schools they operate. The blended learning model and cited software provide an innovative option to students of Oakland to experience blended learning across all core content areas. The gaming elements, and rationale for their use, provides a compelling hook to engage the youth of Oakland and cognizantly disrupt the "street" narrative through the heroic journeys of the students' avatars. The proposed leader and EFC support staff have a high level of expertise related to the use of innovative technology and instructional methods, as well as a history of serving the complex needs of the children of Oakland. The petition as submitted provides evidence of a comprehensive, coherently described, and aligned educational program that is sound and likely to meaningfully benefit the target population. The assessment system is comprehensive and includes structured use of data for improving individual student performance and informing program improvement.

Concerns and Additional Questions

The African American student population needs to be explicitly named and considered when describing and addressing challenges faced by the community. In terms of Measureable Pupil Outcomes, the pupil performance increases of 5% across all assessments does not indicate whether that is a cumulative 5% annually, or after each assessment is administered. Though explicit ELD is cited as being offered, it is not indicated as a discrete course in a student schedule. The teacher to student ratio in the intervention courses should be kept at the optimal level cited by petitioners in interviews (1:12), as the petition only describes a general ratio of 1:42 with a guide (aide). A plan for adjustments to the sequence of Common Core Standards delivery in 6th and 7th grade Math needs to be made in light of the petitioners' plan to offer Algebra in 8th grade.
