Needs Assessment Findings

- Inconsistent trainings (i.e. Perishable Skills) and updated training resources (i.e. 2000 manual)
- Supervisory structure lacked organization
- SSOs unfamiliar with "Use of Force" policies and procedures
- Unclear role description to support SSO assignments from school to school
- Lack of leadership from OSPD

Expectations for 2015-2016

- Develop targeted recruitment/training process for OSPD staff (i.e. career path, Use of Force Reporting, etc.)
- Update training manual to include appropriate interactions with disruptive parents/staff/students, intervention strategies, use of handcuffs, documentation, roles & responsibilities, discipline, etc.
- Engage with site based committees to assess specific needs

OSPD Responsibilities and Obligations

District Goals Aligned to BP 5145



- Prioritize alternative discipline approaches to improve student behavior and promote a safer school climate
- reduce disproportionate minority contact with police and the juvenile justice system
- reduce the rate of school-based arrests and citations while maintaining a safe school climate.
- Use of law enforcement as last resort in relation to student conduct
- Inform District personnel of the role of OSPD



OUSD Board Policy 5145.13 requires...

Administrators

- Enforce school rules consistently and discipline students
- Prioritize alternative to police involvement for student conduct
- Contact OSPD for serious threats to school safety
- Inform guardian of student arrest immediately
- Obtain parental consent prior to OSPD interviewing students

OSPD

- Allow non-OSPD staff to defer school discipline matters to site administrator/site staff
- Interview suspected child abuse victims without parental/guardian consent
- Notify site administration of presence and purpose of visit, when visiting a site
- OSPD officers not to interview students or collect evidence for only OUSD disciplinary purposes
