Youth Together operates student organizing clubs on high school campuses to develop student leadership skills, multiracial solidarity and to improve school conditions. Through the operation of our multi-service collaborative youth is centralized at one OUSD high school, we can provide regional programming to core youth leaders and a variety of after-school programming focusing on social justice, academic enrichment, and arts.

- More about BACR: Additionally, BACR programs promote social-emotional development, following best practices in youth development, such as youth voice and restorative circles. Our programs are customized to each school community to ensure a culturally relevant design. As we serve our schools' most vulnerable students, we specialize in professional development and proven observation tools to guide our continuous improvement and high-quality services.
- More about EBAC: Through a child-centered approach, EBAC's teachers help children discover their individual strengths, build healthy peer and adult relationships, and develop skills to regulate emotion, cope with everyday challenges, and counter the impacts of trauma. EBAC after-school programs create a safe environment for students to experience and develop new skills. Busy parents/caregivers benefit from their children's increased school attendance, engagement, and confidence in knowing their children thrive after school. Our programs promote equity, inclusion, and values and embrace students' diversity. EBAC afterschool programs serve the whole child, connecting students and their families to internal and external wellness, educational, and safety net services to address individual challenges and meet basic needs.
- More about Envisioneers: We focus on building our scholars' academic and social skills and providing hands-on learning experiences for students. We bring community mentors for 11 weeks each semester to teach their passion or profession, with a scholar teach-back event at the end of each semester—WOW! We open their eyes to the opportunities that are available to them and connect the relevance of education to career pathways.
- More about Girls Inc.: Girls Inc.: after-school programs provide literacy intervention one
 hour daily for elementary students and two times per week for middle school students. For
 elementary, the goal is to increase student's reading levels by at least one year as measured



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by SRI, iReady, or other school-day assessments. For middle school, the goal is to support students in navigating complex text, to increase confidence to persist academically, and to increase their skills to navigate academic systems.

Students will engage with Common Core-aligned, culturally responsive, and data-informed literacy activities to provide targeted support that meets their individual literacy and social-emotional needs. Students become more engaged, confident, and capable readers and writers by participating in activities such as read-aloud, literacy centers, Reader's Theater, academic discussions, and guided reading. Our component lessons have English Language Learner supports that can be modified depending on group needs. Students are developing comprehension and analysis skills across the grades. Students engage in academic discussions using sentence starters (academic talk stems). Our internal assessment (DIBELS) informs student grouping for instruction differentiation for Kinder - 5th grade. For students in 4th - 8th grade, the book club model allows for additional support for struggling readers such as scaffolded content and opportunities for instructor-led close readings.

• More about Oakland Kids First: The mission of Oakland Kids First (OKF) is to create leadership opportunities for young people to transform their schools so that all youth graduate with the skills and motivation to reach their dreams. OKF partners with Oakland Unified School District (OUSD) to ensure that high schools are places where youth are empowered to use their leadership skills through academic peer mentoring, meaningful leadership opportunities, and youth organizing to create a culture of peer support and mutual accountability that improves learning and achievement for all students.

By building strong partnerships between school staff (including principals, teachers, and community school managers), students, and families, OKF builds the capacity of OUSD adults and youth to work together, create positive culture change in schools through meaningful engagement of students and families, ensure the voices of youth of color are treated with dignity in schools and improve academic achievement and equity. OKF's mission and vision are closely aligned with OUSD's focus on academic achievement while eliminating inequity and serving the whole child. For twenty years, OKF has partnered with OUSD to ensure that students develop the skills and motivation to be prepared for college, career, and civic engagement in their communities.

More about Oakland Leaf: Oakland Leaf supports youth in building their social and
emotional skills with mindfulness and resiliency practices, team-building exercises, creative
expression and movement activities, and restorative justice circles. We invest in the
leadership development of young people by facilitating strength-finding activities,
skill-building workshops, and Rites of Passage retreats focused on social awareness and
community impact. Our 5th and 8th-grade students also participate in transition readiness
activities.



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• More about Safe Passages: Through multiple funding streams, Safe Passages has led the effective development and sustainability of full-service community schools across the Oakland flatlands. Initially, this work began as the Safe Passages Middle School Strategy, a multi-pronged approach to creating positive school climates and providing students and their families the support needed to be successful in school and life. Over time the strategy expanded to schools K-12. Extended learning programming was a major prong of the strategy from the beginning. The initial seven highest-need middle schools were selected as partners in 2000 to implement the strategy: Havenscourt (CCPA) and Calvin Simmons (UFSA) were part of the first cohort of implementation schools and 20 years later continue in sustained partnership to work towards improved outcomes for students and families.
