Background: COVID Relief Funding

A myriad of federal agencies have received funding. For the most part, the largest segment of federal funding for education has gone towards to the K-12 sector.

At the outset, the funds were intended to help the U.S. educational system "prevent, prepare for, and respond to coronavirus."

Overview: Congressional ESSER Funding

To date, K-12 funding has primarily come from three legislative acts:

(1) CARES, (2) CRRSAA, and (3) the American Rescue Plan.

CARES Act Sometimes referred to as "ESSER I" \$13.2 billion for K-12 (CA) Mar \$1.5 billion for California LEAs 2020 **CRRSAA** \$13.2 billion for K-12 (CA) "ESSER II" Dec • \$6.0 billion for California LEAs 2020 **American Rescue Plan** "ESSER III" \$13.2 billion for K-12 (CA) \$13.6 billion for California LEAs. 2021










Total ESSER Relief for Oakland Charters (1 of 2)















Total ESSER Relief for Oakland Charters (2 of 2)
















Eligible Uses of ESSER Funds

In general, ESSER funding was intended to: support remote learning, provide support services, protect education jobs, provide institutional support, and provide postsecondary grant aid.



FUNDS COULD BE USED FOR A VARIETY OF OVERLAPPING PURPOSES, INCLUDING:

- COVID Preparedness
- Technology Acquisition
- Mental Health Services
- Activities related to Summer Learning
- "Any activity authorized by the ESEA of 1965..." and other various federal education laws

Funds provided to LEAs under the ESSER Fund can be used for a multitude of purposes. Under the ARPA, however, LEAs must reserve at least 20% of their funds to address learning loss before using funds for other activities.











Total ESSER funding: Per-Student Basis

In order to better understand and compare relief funding among charter schools, the total amount of funding received is presented here in a per-student basis.












ESSER Funding: Per-Student Basis (1 of 2)












ESSER Funding: Per-Student Basis (2 of 2)











Overview: Paycheck Protection Program


Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loans provided an additional source of funding for charter schools during the pandemic. This program was established by the CARES Act.

PPP was a loan program designed to help organizations continue to pay their workers during the pandemic through a low-interest loan.

 18 of the 28 OUSD-authorized charter schools received loans (and were all fully forgiven).









OUSD Charter Schools: ESSER III Expenditures

The largest category for ESSER III Fund expenditures was "Personnel" with "COVID Safety" (including cleaning supplies, HVAC upgrades, and PPE) as the second largest.










ESSER III Expenditures: Personnel Spending



Of Charter ESSER III Funds were slated to be spent on Personnel (Approximately \$17.6 million on new staff, temporary staff, or stipends for current staff)

ESSER III Expenditures: Other Themes

11 schools planned to use ESSER III funds to address 01 **SEL and Mental Health** student mental health and well-being through counselors, curriculum, professional development, and programming. 12 schools planned to use ESSER III funds for expanded 02 **Expanded Learning** learning opportunities. Summer School programming was particularly common among middle/high schools. 13 schools planned to use ESSER III funds for technology 03 **Technology** including both equipment and methods for integrating technology into the physical classroom.
