Overview of School

- 414 students
- 100% students of color
- Majority students qualify for FRL
- 97.6% graduation rate last year
- ~40% of students are enrolling in two and four year schools

Reflections on Past 3 Years

What are you most proud of in terms of Pathway development?

- We are most proud of our shift and commitment to a single pathway
 - Teachers are excited about collaboration and cohorting
 - Students are excited to expand beyond graphic design
- Our work-based learning model has been very successful
 - Grown into school year internships
 - Increased our partnerships
- Displays of student work has grown
 - We now host an annual CTE Expo on-site for the community
 - Seniors participating in the winter market and other community events



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Reflections on Past 3 Years

What have been some of the challenges?

- Shifting from two pathways to one pathway
 - It has been difficult to say goodbye to a pathway, but it was a move that we had to make
 - We are offering dual enrollment classes related to engineering and STEM
- With increase of graduation rates, struggle to support our alumni
 - There is a need for a career transition specialist, but we want to maintain the investments we currently have



Reflections on Past 3 Years

What have been your biggest learnings?

- Students are excited about pathways and workbased learning
 - We have great engagement related to our media pathway and WBLL
 - Semester 1 Media had a pass rate of
 - We have X student engaged in WBLL during the school year
- Student supports have played a major role in continuing education and bringing back students
 - We currently have 3 alum employed as paraeducators
 - We have had many students pursue media and engineering majors



Looking Ahead

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What have you learned through creating this new plan for the next 3-year cycle?

- Building in structured time for teachers to begin utilizing media in their classrooms
- Continuing to utilize advisory to positively impact academic structures and community building
- Prioritizing college field trips to ensure all students are able to see themselves in two and four year institutions
- Partnering with EBC and METS Trio to provide personalized supports for students and families

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Looking Ahead

What are your biggest challenges moving forward?

- Turnover is a consistent issue at MPA and within OUSD
 - Many of the goals we have require teachers to stay to have major impacts and growth within our pathway development
- Meeting the needs of all learners

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- With an increase of newcomer students, we must spend more time building language and literacy development into CTE classes
- Supporting our SpED students to be successful through the full pathway sequence

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How are your Pathway(s) helping to close equity gaps in your school? (through the lens of your LCAP focal groups)

- We currently utilize whole staff PD as language and literacy development time
 - This has allowed CTE to focus on different language strategies and consider how to make CTE classes more accessible to students
- Media also allows students to reflect on their own stories
 - Students are building confidence within their own strengths and interests, which has had a positive impact on the community

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
