The Measures N and H - College and Career Readiness Commission is pleased to release the attached **2021-22 Measure N Annual Report** to the public. The Commission appreciates this opportunity to share the exciting, transformative work that is helping to strengthen the college and career readiness of Oakland students.

In 2015, the *Oakland College & Career Readiness For All Fund* was established to pay for the implementation of a comprehensive approach to high school education, which Oakland is doing through the model of Linked Learning. Linked Learning integrates challenging academics with career-based learning and real-world work experiences. Through small learning communities of career-aligned pathways, students receive intensive, individualized support that creates the conditions for them to graduate high school prepared for success in both college and career. The goals of Measure N are to:

- Decrease the high school dropout rate
- Increase the high school graduation rate
- Increase high school students' readiness to succeed in college and career
- Increase middle school students' successful transition to high school
- Reduce disparities in student achievement and student access to career pathways based on race, ethnicity, gender, socio-economic status, English Learner-status, special needs-status, and residency status

This *Annual Report* provides an overview of how Measure N dollars were used to continue achieving these goals during the COVID-19 pandemic. The 2021-22 school year was the first year that students physically returned to school sites after 13 months of distance learning. Data in this report reflect the educational challenges brought on by the pandemic, including a 3.0 percentage point increase in the student dropout rate since 2018-19.

While the educational setbacks brought on by the pandemic are significant, we believe that the pathway structures in place across Oakland high schools have helped to mitigate the effect on educational outcomes. Additionally, Oakland educators have been working hard to counteract the impact of the pandemic on students with support services, credit recovery options, and access to college courses and real world learning and work experiences that align with student interests. Many of these interventions have been funded by Measure N.





The dedication of the Oakland community—teachers, students, parents and administrators—ensures that Linked Learning, backed by taxpayer dollars, supports Oakland students as they prepare and transition towards success in college and their careers. We look forward to continuing to oversee the Measure H taxpayer funding over the next 14 years.



A Note About the COVID-19 Pandemic:


The 2021-22 school year was the first year that students physically returned to school sites after 13 months of distance learning over the course of the 2019-20 and 2020-21 school years. The data in this report reflect the educational challenges brought on by the pandemic, including decreased student engagement and reduction in credits earned for many of our scholars. Oakland educators have been working hard to counteract the impact of the pandemic on students with support services, credit recovery options. access to college courses and real world work experiences that align with student interests. Many of these interventions were funded by Measure N. Continuing to support students in career pathways that make learning relevant and rigorous is a critical strategy for re-engaging students and promoting their academic achievement.

GOAL 1: Decrease High School Dropout Rate




GOAL 3: Increase High School Students' Readiness to Succeed in College & Career


Measure N Investments: Linked Learning College & Career Pathways

Measure N funds the infrastructure to implement Linked Learning (college and career pathways) including staffing (such as CTE teachers, counselors, case managers, work-based learning liaisons, post-secondary transition specialists, and pathway coaches); professional development and teacher collaboration; early college credit; student internships; college and career exploration visits; credit recovery programs; supplies and equipment for industry-specific projects; and consultant contracts for student supports, pathway-related enrichment and industry certifications.

LINKED LEARNING PATHWAYS

Oakland high schools are organized into small learning communities around industry-sector themes. Pathway-aligned teachers, counselors, and staff collaborate across subject areas, including career technical education, and coordinate student interventions in service of college, career, and community readiness. The top five industry sectors represented in Oakland high school pathways include Arts, Media & Entertainment; Health Science & Medical Technology; Information Technology; Engineering & Design; and Business & Finance.

CAREER TECHNICAL EDUCATION (CTE)

The state of California defines 15 industry sectors. Students in Linked Learning pathways enroll in Career Technical Education (CTE) courses in an industry sector that aligns with local high-wage, high-demand opportunities. Students' learning in CTE classes prepares them to develop informed post-secondary plans and to practice and master professionalism skills.

DUAL ENROLLMENT CLASSES

In Dual Enrollment, students take community college courses with Community College instructors at their high school or virtually. Students receive both high school and college credit, and courses are completely free to students.

WORK-BASED LEARNING

A key component of career readiness is internships. Intensive internship experiences, supported and monitored by school staff who know students well, build relevance into schooling and provide students with skills, knowledge, relationships, and social skills that inform and prepare them for life after high school.
