Early Childhood Student Information in OUSD 2014-2015

- Child Development Center (CDC) Classrooms (PreK) - 60 across OUSD serving 1,668 students.
 - 16 CDC (PreK) Classrooms are located on the Elementary school campus.
 - 44 CDC (PreK) Classrooms are not located on the Elementary School Campus and are in satellite location across OUSD.

Early Childhood Student Information in OUSD 2014-2015

Transitional Kindergarten

- 2014-2015 15 Elementary schools with TK classrooms.
- 2015-2016 24 Elementary schools with TK Classrooms.
 - Support for new TK Classrooms
 - OUSD District Policy for TK is being developed.

Priority 1 – Quality and Safety

OUSD Strategic Plan Priority 3:

Every student deserves the right to attend a quality community school in their neighborhood.

Quality Rating and Improvement System (QRIS)

- Every CDC PreK will have an Early Childhood Environment Rating Scale (ECERS) baseline score by the end of the 2014-2015 school year.
- This data will provide us with the needs to improve environmental quality across all district CDC's during the 2015-2016 school year.

Priorities 2 – Alignment of Resources – Instruction and Professional Development

OUSD Strategic Plan:

By 2020, the percentage of 3rd grade students who are reading on grade level will increase to 85 percent.

- Selection of a PreK curriculum
- Grade level expectations for PreK and TK

Priority 3: Balancing the CDC-PreK Budget

Issues/Challenges

ECE Expenditures are greater than earnings and this has been reality for several years.

ECE attendance drops approximately 40% during the summer which results in a significant impact on the overall budget resulting in a loss of funds.

Recommendations



Establish over 3 years, high quality PreK programs that are fiscally solvent

Recommendations

Proposed ECE Programming

- Consider different options for the ECE programs calendar
 - Work in collaboration with all stakeholders in OUSD to develop a plan that would establish an Early Childhood calendar that would meet the needs of students and families while fitting within the budget.

Advantages

- Consistency provided for families with Pre-K and K-12 children
- Reduction in sub costs.
