Charter Petition Request

ACTION REQUESTED

Approve the petition and charter to establish Lodestar as an Oakland Unified School District (OUSD) authorized charter school that serves grades TK-12th. The petition presents a sound educational program; the petitioners are demonstrably likely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition; the petition contains the required signatures and affirmations; and the petition contains reasonably comprehensive descriptions of all of the 16 elements required by the California Charter Schools Act.

SUMMARY

Staff recommends that the OUSD Board of Education approve the petition for Lodestar to serve students in grades TK-12th and to begin operation as an OUSD authorized charter school on July 1, 2016. Staff recommends approval based on the following:

- 1) The Lodestar founding team is comprised of educators with a successful track record serving students in OUSD at Lighthouse Community Charter Schools (LCCS).
- 2) In addition to the Home Office support and resources of LCCS, four full time employees (including teachers) have been allocated to Lodestar for Year 0 (2015-16) staffing; allowing for critical educational design work to take place in the "startup" planning year.
- 3) The proposed school model provides a personalized and differentiated course of study for each student, with "Learning Expeditions" suited for robust Common Core implementation.
- 4) LCCS is collaborating with OUSD through participation in, and meeting of, the Fall Call requirements.
- 5) Due diligence conducted ensured that the establishment of the charter is consistent with sound educational practices and that the petitioners are demonstrably likely to successfully implement the proposed program.

Lodestar petitioners have agreed that the following terms and conditions are incorporated by reference into its charter, and shall have the force and effect as if set forth in the charter:

Quality Community Schools Commitments					
Upon Approval		Unified Enrollment Lodestar commits to participation in creating a unified recruitment and enrollment process* that ensures equitable access to educational opportunities for all students of all demographic backgrounds and academic abilities. Lodestar will align enrollment timelines with Oakland Unified School District enrollment due dates (i.e. application and enrollment packet submission dates). Lodestar commits to establishing recruitment and enrollment strategies that will support achieving a student demographic that is aligned to the demographics of Oakland. *At this time, Oakland Unified School District does not have a unified enrollment system, but should Oakland Unified School District adopt one, the expectation would be that Lodestar fully participate in the design of such a system.			
Upon Approval		Special Education Given the shared commitment of district-run and district-charter schools to serve all students of all demographic backgrounds and academic abilities, Lodestar will partner with Oakland Unified School District to ensure that all families are aware of, and able to, access enrollment and a Free and Appropriate Public Education at Lodestar. Lodestar commits to targeted recruitment of students with severe disabilities, with the goal of more closely reflecting the percentage of Oakland Unified School District's severe special education population, which is 1.98% of total enrollment.			
Upon Approval	0	Expulsion Lodestar will provide advanced notification (in alignment with parent notification) of expulsion hearings to the Oakland Unified School District Office of Charter Schools, so that an Oakland Unified School District representative may attend. Lodestar will provide to the Oakland Unified School District Office of Charter Schools for review, all documentation of findings/evidence related to expulsions; including an audio or video recording, or authenticated written transcript, of the hearing. All documentation needs to be submitted to the Oakland Unified School District Office of Charter Schools within 1-2 business days of the expulsion hearing decision.

"Severe": including, but not limited to, a primary disability of autism (if on the severe end of the spectrum), moderate/severe intellectual disabilities, deaf, blind, emotional disturbance, and multiple disabilities.

"Targeted Recruitment": recruitment documents that highlight commitment to provide services to pupils with severe disabilities; and engagement with pre-K-12 and/or K-12 programs or special education services that meet the needs of students with severe disabilities.

PROCEDURAL BACKGROUND

- 1) The lead petitioner submitted a petition for Lodestar on September 9, 2015 at a regularly scheduled Board of Education meeting.
- 2) A public hearing was held on September 24, 2015. Representatives from the lead petitioning group, including parents of prospective students, presented.
- 3) Staff conducted Petitioner Interviews on September 18, 2015.

STATUTORY BACKGROUND

Pursuant to Education Code §47605:

Charter law outlines the criteria governing the approval or denial of charter school petitions. The following excerpt is taken from the Charter Schools Act, Education Code §47605. This excerpt delineates charter approval and denial criteria:

A school district governing board shall grant a charter for the operation of a school under this part if it is satisfied that granting the charter is consistent with sound educational practice. The governing board of the school district shall not deny a petition for the establishment of a charter school unless it makes written factual findings, specific to the particular petition, setting forth specific facts to support one or more of the following findings:

- (1) The charter school presents an unsound educational program for the pupils to be enrolled in the charter school.
- (2) The petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition.
- (3) The petition does not contain the number of signatures required.
- (4) The petition does not contain an affirmation of each of the conditions described in Education Code §47605(d).
- (5) The petition does not contain reasonably comprehensive descriptions of the 16 required charter elements.

DISCUSSION

Staff convened a petition review team, which subsequently conducted an evaluation of the petition pursuant to the Charter Schools Act and with the application of the Oakland Unified School District Petition Evaluation Rubric.

Following the petition review process, staff conducted Petitioner Interviews in an attempt to clarify various aspects of the petition, as well as to evaluate the capacity of the petitioners to successfully implement the program as set forth in the petition.

Lodestar proposes to open in Fall 2016 in East Oakland. The school will serve approximately 216 students in grades K-2nd and 6th in Year 1 of operation; growing to 800 TK-12th grade students at full capacity in 2023-2024.

The staff report and charter petition evaluation contained herein describes the proposed educational program and school operations, as well as an articulation of strengths and foreseeable challenges.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Oakland Unified School District's Board of Education **approve** the petition for Lodestar under the California Charter Schools Act. The factual findings illustrated in this report demonstrate that the petition satisfies the five legally required categories of *Education Code § 47605*:

- (1) The charter school presents a sound educational program for the pupils to be enrolled in the charter school;
- (2) The petitioners are demonstrably likely to successfully implement the program set forth in petition
- (3) The petition contains the number of signatures required;
- (4) The petition contains an affirmation of each of the conditions described in Education Code §47605(d);
- (5) The petition contains reasonably comprehensive descriptions of the 16 required charter elements.

This approval is for the charter program and operation in its entirety as proposed and revised herein to include all terms and conditions set forth in this report. Any subsequent material revision of the provision of this charter may be made only with the approval of the District as charter authorizer (*Education Code* \$47607(a)(1)). Any material revision to any charter component must be proposed and considered according to the standards and criteria in Education Code \$47605 (*Education Code* \$47607(a)(2)).

The term of this charter will be from July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2021, the maximum period allowed under the California Charter Schools Act (*Education Code §47607(a)(1)*). The District will not accept a charter renewal request more than 270 days prior to the expiration of the charter.

A charter may be revoked by the authority that granted the charter if the authority finds that the charter school committed a material violation of any of the conditions, standards, or procedures set forth in its charter ($Education\ Code\ \S47607(c)(1)$). The Board of Education's approval of this charter shall incorporate the conditions on opening and associated deadlines as a condition of the charter.

The District retains the authority to delay opening for a period of up to one year, if any of the conditions on opening are not satisfactorily met by the associated deadlines. Not meeting any one of the conditions on opening and associated deadlines set forth in this approval may be grounds for revocation as set forth in the California Charter Schools Act (*Education Code §47607(c)(1)*).

Pursuant to OUSD Governing Board Policy, BP 0420.4, if the school does not open on or before September 30, 2016, it will be considered a demonstration of petitioners' lack of capacity to implement the program set forth in the petition and the District will initiate charter revocation procedures.

Definition of Terms

"Severe": including, but not limited to, a primary disability of autism (if on the severe end of the spectrum), moderate/severe intellectual disabilities, deaf, blind, emotional disturbance, and multiple disabilities. "Partner": participation in the Office of Charter Schools' working groups related to Special Education. "Targeted Recruitment": recruitment documents that highlight commitment to provide services to pupils with severe disabilities; and engagement with pre-K-12 and/or K-12 programs or special education services that meet the needs of students with severe disabilities.
