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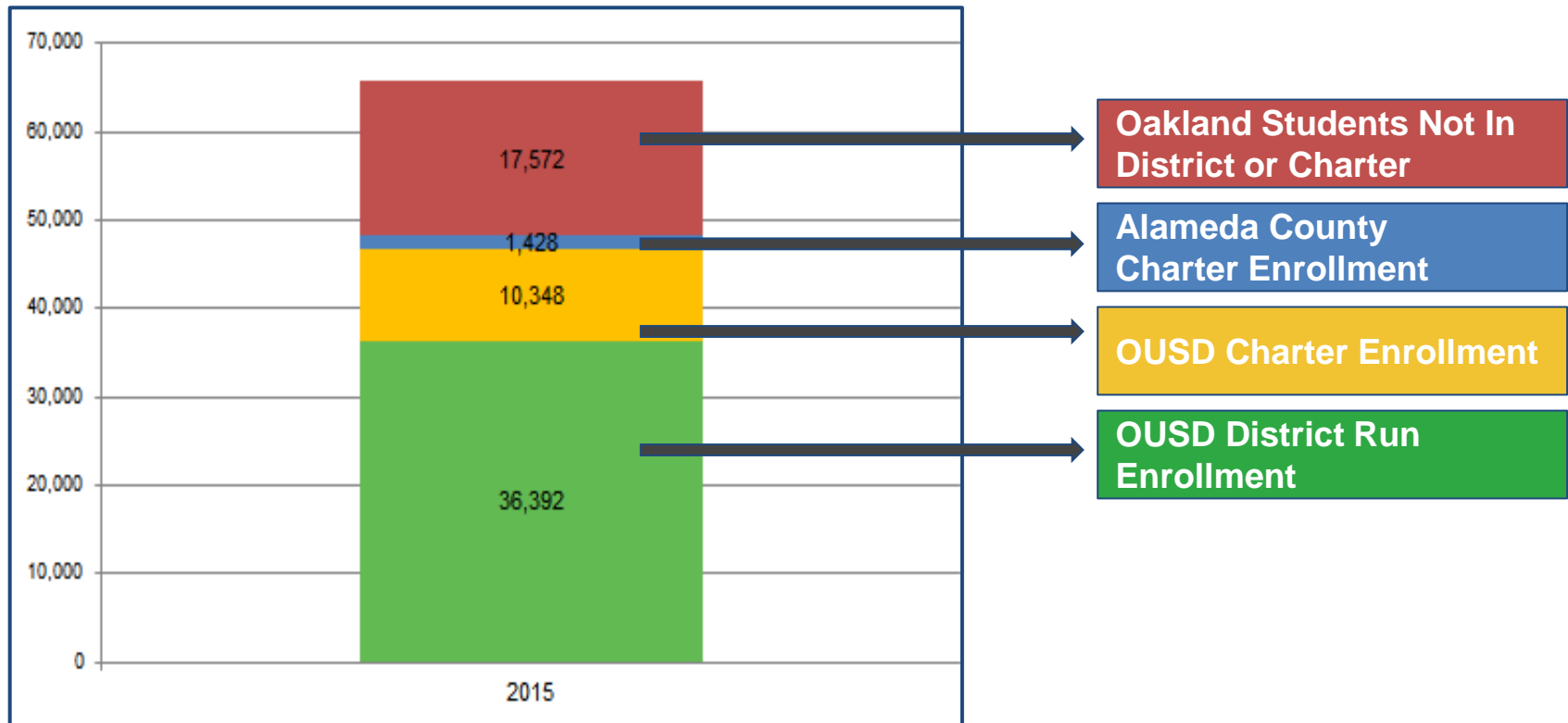


Today's Asks of the Board

Where Do Oakland Students Go To School?



Current District & Charter: **73.3 %**

Current Pool of Oakland School
Age Children: **65,740**

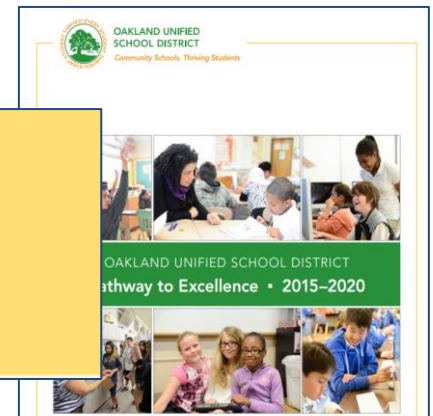

Priority 2

Accountable School District

Current Enrollment System in Oakland



Same
Centralized Enrollment System
Since 2006

- **One** central enrollment center; relocated **Three** times in **Seven** years.
- Given the geography of Oakland it leaves **remote communities** underserved

- 2 Managers
- 1 Counselor (TSF)
- 2 Admin Assistants
- 12 Language Testing & Placement Specialists

- 1 Sibling
- 2 Neighbor
- 3 Open Lottery

Policy

OUSD and charter schools are not coordinated, parents have to apply independently

Current Budget -----> Costs \$1.8 Million

What's Not Working?

For Families

- Lack of information
- Multiple processes difficult to navigate
- No supports to help make a good choice
- Lack of Feeder Patterns
- Location inaccessibility

For Schools

- Roster instability
- Students moving between

For The Community

- Lacks transparency
- No system-wide data
- Fragmented access to schools, transportation

“Our enrollment process is too difficult to navigate...especially for families who don’t have access”

How Do We Know These Problems Exist?

January

Independent Listening Tour

Very few individuals interviewed last winter felt the current system was equitable for all families.

Conducted by Institute for Innovation in Public School Choice (IIPSC)

3 focus groups including 20 **parents**

23 interviews with **OUSD** leaders and staff

10 interviews with **charter school** leaders and staff

10 interviews with **community organizations**

September

Parent & Community Meetings

We have **researched and engaged** our community in discussions about enrollment

October

Enrollment Survey

450 submissions with **representation from every district and school level** (preschool, elementary, middle, high).

Survey Results Citywide Enrollment System



38% of parents would not or did not choose their neighborhood school option

49% applied only to OUSD District schools



73% prefer one application for all Oakland public schools

66% were accepted in their top school choice in first round

77% believe current enrollment system should be updated or replaced

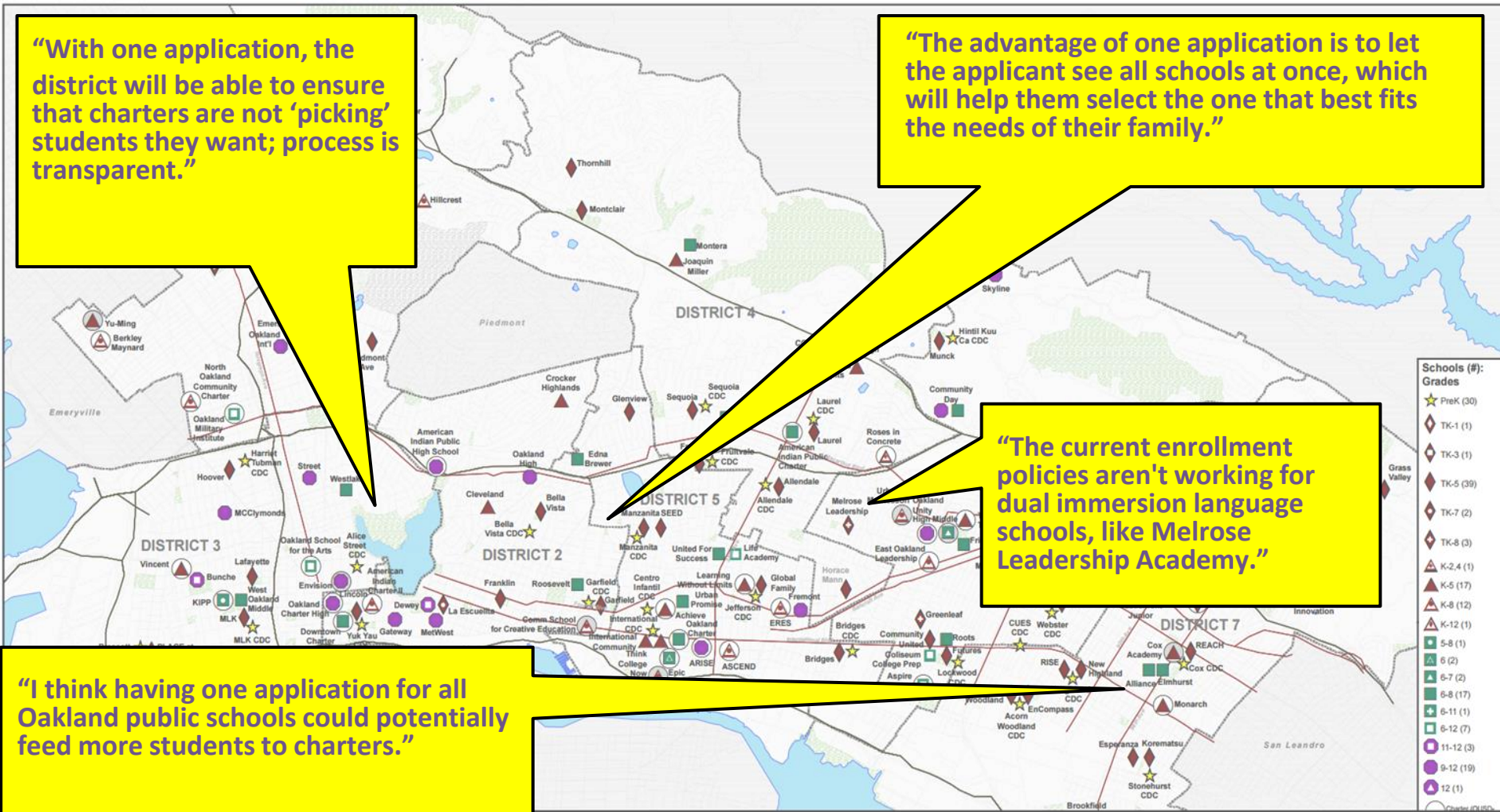
Survey Results Citywide Enrollment System

"With one application, the district will be able to ensure that charters are not 'picking' students they want; process is transparent."

"The advantage of one application is to let the applicant see all schools at once, which will help them select the one that best fits the needs of their family."

"The current enrollment policies aren't working for dual immersion language schools, like Melrose Leadership Academy."

"I think having one application for all Oakland public schools could potentially feed more students to charters."



What Work Has Been Done?

Tasked by the Superintendent, teams have been providing input, designing, and gathering feedback **since early 2015** to draft a blueprint for an improved enrollment:

- ❑ Parent Advisory Group
- ❑ Steering Committee
- ❑ Executive Committee

Theses diverse committees spent over 450 person-hours working together to create Oakland's Improved Enrollment Blueprint

How Do We Plan To Address These Issues?

Improve our current enrollment system over 2-3 years

A new enrollment process and system must meet the following requirements:

Equitable – for ALL families

Transparent – with clear and timely information

Universal – to include all public schools

User-friendly – to support all families

Two Streams Of Parallel Work

OUSD Enrollment Policy & Operations

Enrollment Prioritization Policy:

- “My child travels across the city to attend school because our neighborhood school is full.”
- “I think there should be an enrollment priority for kids who attend our neighborhood high school’s feeder school.”

Operations:

- “The Student Assignment Center location is inconvenient for me.”
- “The OUSD Options process is not fair.”



Citywide Public School Enrollment Improvements

Available Information and Outreach:

- “I am not fully informed about the public school options available to my child.”
- “It is challenging to find unbiased information about schools.”

Enrollment Process:

- “No one can explain to me how and why my child did not get into our most-preferred school.”
- “Our school had many students withdraw in late August because they got called in off the waitlist of another public school.”





Phases Of Work

Phase I – Fall 2015 for 2016/17 SY

Technology Changes: Online School Finder Tool

Realignment of Resources: Ensure current enrollment office and all school sites are aware of new resources available to families

Phase II – Fall 2016 for 2017/18 SY

Technology Changes: Integrated application and enrollment software

Better Citywide Coordination: Single timeline, single application, single lottery, single set of enrollment rules. Move from LEA-specific enrollment operations to one enrollment operation

Realignment of Resources: Cost budgeting, groundwork for implementation

Phase III – Fall 2017 for 2018/19 SY

Better Targeted Support: for ECE, Special Education, and other specific populations

Feeder Patterns



A New Priority for Oakland Students

- Within a geographic boundary parents have access to **multiple feeder patterns** for Elementary, Middle or High
- Feeder Patterns: Creating robust options for students
- Providing **continuity** and articulation of curriculum (language, Intl Baccalaureate program, etc.)
- Articulation of programming from Elementary → Middle → High School
- Parents may **exercise choice transportation** within the geographic boundary.

Transportation



- Current transportation is only for special ed students and some re-directed students.
- School choice options for all students without transportation support, choices are not accessible for most.
- Transportation is a great barrier to access and integration
- Options:
 - Create feeder patterns
 - Transportation study
 - Need, Options, Cost
 - Providing transportation will eliminate inequity in our choice system and reduce chronic absence.
 - Creating overlapping boundaries

Future State → Winter Prior to School Year:

- LEAs responsible for:
 - ✓ Marketing & recruiting
 - ✓ Determining number of students to enroll
 - ✓ Determining school-specific enrollment priorities
- Proactive outreach conducted each December to transitioning students (i.e., those entering kinder, middle, or high school)
- Online and paper-based school finder tools available to families
- Citywide and regional school expos and tours available to families
- Media/PR campaign conducted to alert families of upcoming enrollment window



Oakland's Blueprint

Future State → Spring Prior to School Year:

- Enrollment window #1: opens in December and closes in mid-February
 - One application, including all public schools, will be used → families may rank up to 6 school choices (exact number TBD)
 - Applications may be submitted at an Enrollment Center or any participating school
 - Number of enrollment offers to give at each school will be determined by each LEA
 - One combined lottery will be used to match each student to a school
 - Families will be notified by early March of their child's school assignment
- Enrollment window #2: open during the month of April to any student who is new-to-Oakland, who did not participate in the first enrollment window, or who is not satisfied with his/her school assignment from the first enrollment window
 - One application will be used for all participating schools → families may rank up to 6 school choices (exact number TBD)
 - Applications may be submitted at an Enrollment Center or any participating school
 - Number of enrollment offers to give at each school will be determined by remaining space available
 - One combined lottery will be used to match each student to a school
 - Families will be notified by late May of their child's school assignment

Oakland's Blueprint

Future State → Summer Prior to School Year:

- Students who are new to Oakland and current students who did not participate in either of the two enrollment windows must visit an Enrollment Center, where they will be presented with school options (based on space availability)
 - When/if a school's enrollment number drops below its self-determined target, the Enrollment Management System flags the school as being "open" for new students, at which point an Enrollment Team member may offer it as a choice to a student in need of a school assignment
- Each school manages its own registration activities (e.g., collection of required documents, emergency contacts, orientation, etc.)



Oakland's Blueprint

Future State → During the School Year:

- Students who are new to Oakland must visit an Enrollment Center, where they will be presented with school options
 - When/if a school's enrollment number drops below its self-determined target, the Enrollment Management System flags the school as “open” for new students, at which point an Enrollment Team member may offer it as a choice to a student in need of a school assignment
- Current students who want to transfer to a new public school mid-year must submit a Transfer Request at an Enrollment Center
 - While mid-year transfers are strongly discouraged, some extreme circumstances may warrant a transfer approval, if the student's ability to thrive is in jeopardy
 - Transfer Requests are decided-upon based on input from the parent, the student's current school, the school where the student wants to attend, and others
- Student withdrawals are monitored by the Enrollment Team and will require rigorous documentation on the part of the student's current school

Oakland's Blueprint

The Steering Committee's Blueprint focuses on equity, transparency, and efficiency

Future State → Miscellaneous:

- One common timeline for all schools and families
- Participating schools are held accountable for adhering to one set of enrollment, withdrawal, and transfer “rules”
- Elimination of waitlists to ensure equitable access
- Multiple enrollment centers open year-round throughout the city
- Each student may be on the roster at only one public school at any given point in time

Oakland's Blueprint

Families will only fully realize benefits if all public schools participate

Why Include Charter Schools?

- OUSD is responsible to support all kids in Oakland, ~12,000 of whom are currently choosing charter options
- At most schools, roster instability cannot be solved unless charter schools are part of the system
- By agreeing to participate in a common system, charter schools will be held accountable to the same enrollment “rules” and etiquette as district-run schools

How Applicants Are Prioritized

What The Survey Told Us



- Survey results show that respondents prefer sibling and neighborhood as the top two priorities
- Respondents voiced a desire for feeder patterns, both school and program based
- Respondents also valued “Oakland Students First”
- How to translate these results into action
- Options for the board to consider

Prioritizing Applicants

Option A: Prioritizing applicants to OUSD schools

- Current prioritization structure would remain unchanged:
 - 1) Siblings
 - 2) Neighborhood Students
 - 3) Oakland Residents
 - 4) Non-Oakland Residents
- Cap enrollment at schools
- Eliminate waitlists

Benefits: more Oakland residents would get their most-preferred school; parents are acclimated to current process/tribulations

Risk: possibility of continuing enrollment dip in middle school grades

Prioritizing Applicants

Option B: Prioritizing applicants at OUSD schools

- Implement new prioritization structure:
 - 1) Siblings
 - 2) Neighborhood Students
 - 3) Students Attending a Feeder Pattern School
 - 4) Oakland Residents
 - 5) Non-Oakland Residents
- Cap enrollment at schools
- Eliminate waitlists

Benefits: more Oakland residents would get their most-preferred school; Students would have incentive to remain in OUSD for 6th grade

Risk: families who don't get in at a feeder school may be "edged out" for opportunity to attend next school

OUSD has evaluated costs based on necessary updates to our own systems - Part of the budget planning (2016-2017)



Benefits To Improving Enrollment

Equitable – ALL families will have easy access to an enrollment center, robust academic programming, enriched feeder pattern options, transportation and more integrated schools

Transparent – with clear prioritization, timely information and auditable results

Universal – to include all public schools, every family fills one application for all public schools

User-friendly – to support all families, easy to use, one process for Oakland



What Happens Next?

Providing equitable enrollment processes for our families

- Launching online school finder tool by mid December 2015
- Defining system requirements for Enrollment software and issuing RFP
- Asking Board of Education to support OUSD's participation in and administration of Oakland's new enrollment system
 - Presentation of Resolution → Jan. 11, 2016
 - Vote on Resolution → Jan. 27, 2016
 - Researching possible locations for regional site
- Board to decide if Feeder Pattern should be included in Board Policy
 - Feeder Patterns Resolution → Jan. 11, 2016
 - Based on resolution, study and creation of patterns for board approval/enaction.

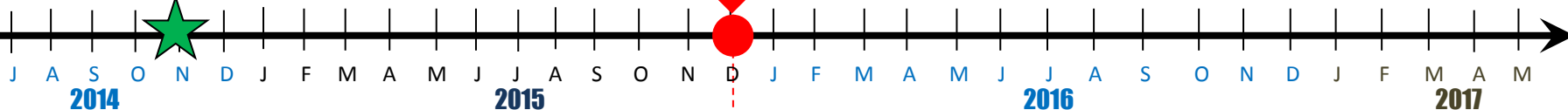

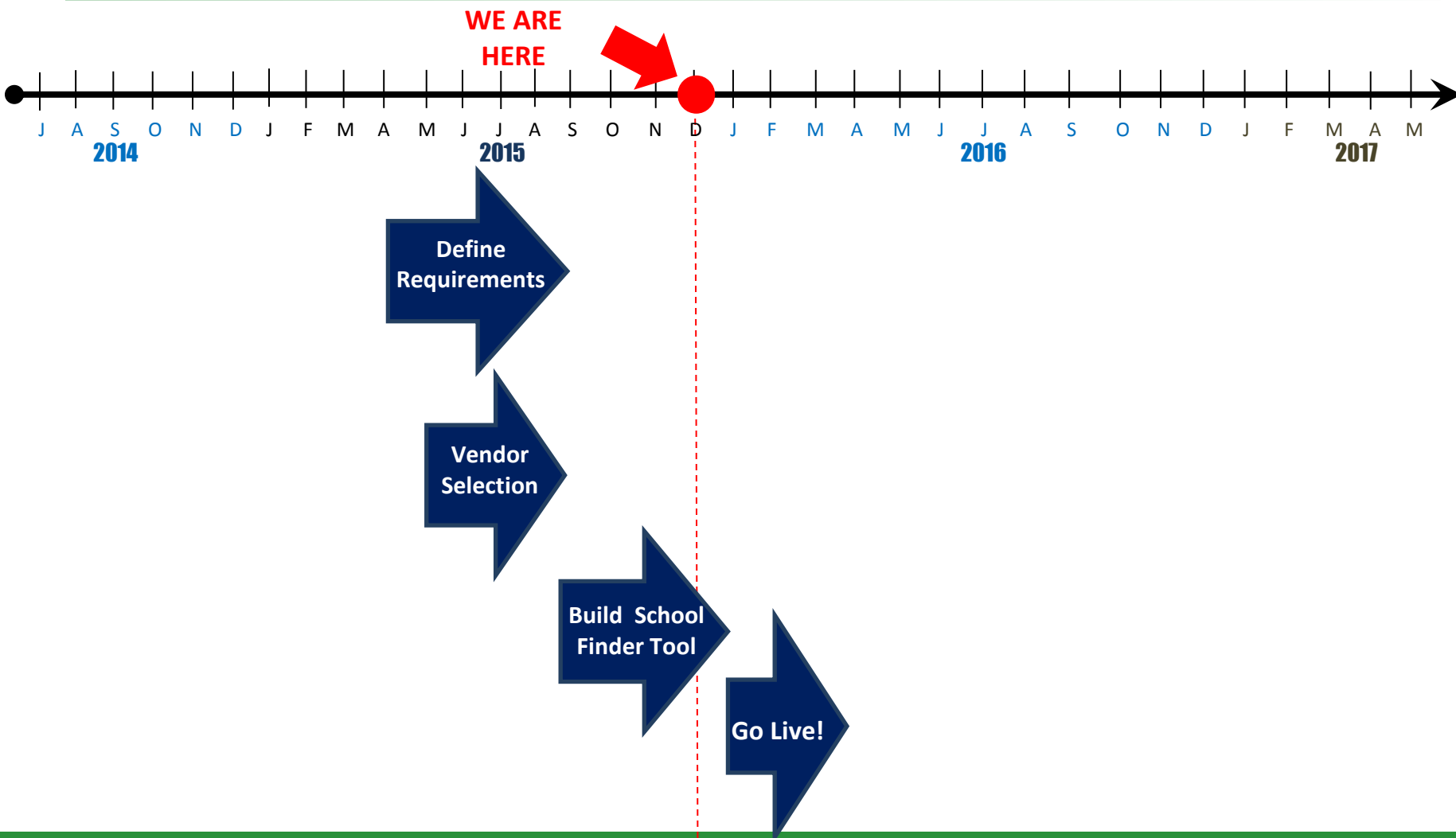
