In order to fulfill the grant requirements, OUSD is contracting with existing after school lead agency partners to provide enhanced and increased summer services at schools that will operate Title 1 funded morning academic programs. The community partner will serve up to 100 students and provide an additional 3 hours of afternoon enrichment so students can participate in a full day, 6 hour program.

Alternatives in Action Extended Day and Community Programs offer youth and their families a broad range of after school and summer programming along with other school-linked services that prepare young people for success in college, career and community leadership in alignment with Life Academy's vision of implementing a full service community school vision. Our comprehensive community school initiatives are based out of three East Bay school sites: Life Academy of Health and Bioscience in East Oakland, McClymonds High School in West Oakland, and Alternatives in Action's own charter high school in West Alameda, which is open to students from other surrounding Alameda and Oakland high schools. We also serve as the lead agency for after school programs at Fremont High School. Through our Community Programs, we partner with school staff, youth, parents and organizations to create powerful, real-world learning opportunities for over 900 high school youth in our "Six Pillars of Collaborative Programming". These include After School Community Projects, Academic Support and College Preparation, Career Development, Parent Engagement, Health and Wellness, and Cascading Leadership. We offer a place and supports that meet the needs of the whole child, from leadership to tutoring to physical check-ups. As youth progress and grow, they may take on roles of greater influence in the school and co-lead programs with other youth.

As a well-established local youth-serving non-profit, Alternatives in Action's effective management and ability to infuse cascading leadership and a community-school approach into out-of-school time programs has led to a fruitful and mutually beneficial collaboration between Life Academy and the organization in recent years. Alternatives in Action lead staff and Life Academy administration work very closely during the school year to develop and maintain responsive, high -quality programming. All summer program plans were made collaboratively by school administration and lead agency directors. Additionally, Alternatives in Action supports school-based staff through organization-wide professional development in youth development and job-embedded coaching throughout the school year and summer. All site coordinator and agency director staff members participate in OUSD professional learning communities throughout the year. Alternatives in Action's Life Academy 2013-2014 Public Profit YPQA scores for middle (4.3) and high school (4.5) show that the established infrastructure and systems of support at Alternatives in Action can lead to the implementation of highly successful youth development and out-of-school time programming at Life Academy.

Alternatives in Action inspires Bay Area youth to realize their leadership potential and prepares them for college, career and community life through dynamic educational, skill-building and real-world experiences. Our schools, leadership programs and partnerships provide opportunities that help youth become successful contributing adults. We envision generations of young adults inspired and prepared to take meaningful action that positively transforms their lives and their communities.

Serving as the summer lead agency for Life Academy's summer programs is an excellent opportunity for Alternatives in Action to continue fulfilling our organizational mission, vision, and goals. First and foremost, we believe that providing free, high quality summer programming to low—income students who otherwise lack access to such programs is an issue of equity and is connected to the cycle of poverty in urban locales. We view the cycle of poverty as one of the key barriers to fulfilling our organizational mission, vision, and goals. Therefore, by offering such programming, our organization can help limit summer learning loss and play a role in addressing the cycle of poverty.

Specifically, through summer afternoon programming with Life Academy middle school students, we will offer cascading leadership and college readiness-related programming, much of which will include experiential and hands-on learning activities. This type of instructional program is directly aligned with our mission to prepare students for college, career, and community life. The cooperative learning, STEM, arts, and fitness foci of our summer bridge programs for incoming 6<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> grade students will help prepare students for academic and extracurricular culture and climate of Life Academy. We believe that students who participate in summer programming alongside peers and school staff with whom they will be spending the upcoming academic year will feel more supported and motivated and will have a higher likelihood of success as high school students and, eventually, college scholars.

Alternatives in Action @ Life Academy summer staff will have participate in pre-program professional development from June 16-June 20. Two of these dates will consist revisiting and expanding upon past training in youth development topics such as group development, opportunities for youth planning, reflection, and reframing conflict. The other three dates will consist of summer staff developing curriculum, finalizing program schedules and procedures, and collaboratively planning program-wide learning events. In order to ensure high-quality program implementation and communication among instructors, staff will also have approximately one hour of planning and meeting time per day while summer program is in session.

Summer staff leading academic activities will meet with Life Academy day school teachers in May and early June to get additional resources and ensure that group activities in this domain accurately reflect and prepare students for the work students they will be completing in the following grade at Life Academy.

Planned enrichment activities include courses and daily rotations in art, college exploration, and leadership. Through these courses and rotations, students will:

- Practice teamwork during physical & sports activities
- Learn new athletic skills in a variety of physical activity areas

We plan to use and adapt fitness and nutrition curriculum previously developed and used by our organization, Alternatives in Action. Additionally, summer staff will have one week of planning time prior to the start of program to create new curriculum in this domain.

  - Our summer program staff will be comprised entirely of current, school year after school program staff. Therefore, we will not need to recruit additional individuals for our summer programs.
- b) Please summarize some of the key qualifications and characteristics your agency will look for in hiring highly qualified summer program staff.

In hiring highly qualified summer and after school program staff, we look for individuals who hold college degrees in education, youth development, or related fields and/or have extensive youth development program experience. 3 of our 5 summer staff have Bachelor's degrees and our STEM instructor has a Master's degree. All of our summer program staff members have experience planning and implementing youth development programs with middle school students. We also highly value individuals' cultural fluency and experience working with students and families from minority and low-income backgrounds. Therefore, we intentionally construct a diverse summer program staff in order to best serve our students, the majority of which come from minority and low-income backgrounds. The majority of our summer program staff members are Latino or African-American.

The After School Education and Safety (ASES) Program is the result of the 2002 voter approved initiative, Proposition 49. This proposition amended California Education Code 8482 to expand and rename the former Before and After School Learning and Safe Neighborhood Partnerships Program. The ASES Program funds the establishment of local after school education and enrichment programs. These programs are created through partnerships between schools and local community resources to provide literacy, academic enrichment and safe, constructive alternatives for students in kindergarten through ninth grade. The ASES program is defined within the language of SB 638 and Education Code (EC)

sections 8482 through 8484.6.

The general purpose of the 21st Century Community Learning Center (21st CCLC) program is to establish or expand community learning centers that provide students with academic enrichment opportunities along with activities designed to complement the students' regular academic program. California Education Code (EC) Section 8421 further defines the purpose of the 21st CCLC High School ASSETs program as (1) creating incentives for establishing locally driven after school enrichment programs that partner schools and communities to provide academic support and safe, constructive alternatives for high school pupils in the hours after the regular school day, and (2) assisting pupils in passing the high school exit examination for public school programs.

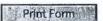

In addition, OUSD may terminate this MOU for cause should AGENCY fail to perform any part of this MOU. In the event of termination for cause, OUSD may secure the required services from another contractor. If OUSD's cost of procuring services from another contractor exceeds the cost of providing the services pursuant to this MOU, AGENCY shall pay the additional cost.
4.	Compensation. The ASESP and 21st CCLC grant award amount for 335/Life Academy (6-7) is \$213,115.00 . AGENCY shall be entitled to compensation from these funds in accordance with the following terms and conditions:
	4.1. Total Compensation. Subject to the provisions of 4.2 Positive Attendance and the provisions of 4.3 Administrative Fee, AGENCY shall receive the amount of the grant award less OUSD's administrative fees and other site costs agreed to by the Site Administrator and AGENCY.
	4.2. Positive Attendance. Payment for services rendered related to the ASESP and 21st CCLC grants shall be based on actual student attendance rates (\$7.50 a day per student), not estimates, as those programs are "positive attendance based." OUSD reserves the right to modify the annual core allocation based on reported attendance. In the event that payments made to AGENCY exceed the reported attendance for the Core grant, the AGENCY will return payments to OUSD at the rate of \$7.50 a day per student. Documentation of attendance must be submitted through the OUSD/OFCY attendance systems in order for invoices for payment of services for the ASESP and 21st CCLC grants to be processed. Exhibit A (Attendance Reporting Schedule 2013-2014")
	4.2.1. Reconciliation Process for Positive Attendance Based Grant Funds. OUSD will adjust the payment of the "positive attendance based" grants based on quarterly review of monthly invoices and attendance for services rendered related to the ASESP, 21ST CCLC (Core Grant) for any adjustments resulting from the reconciliation of the attendance reports for that quarter's months. The attendance reconciliation process will assess the program's

performance with respect to the required compliance with the grant mandated attendance rates. Based on the review, financial adjustments of additional payment or additional withholding will be made. Any remaining balance(s) will be forwarded to AGENCY or OUSD. Any adjustment required in excess of the withholding will necessitate additional adjustments to future invoices and payments.

- 4.2.2. Administrative Charges and Reconciliation. Reconciliation process for positive attendance based grants must factor in the subtraction of administrative and other OUSD central charges, as outlined in section 4.3, from any grant amounts earned through attendance (OUSD indirect, custodial, evaluation, and After School Programs Office administrative and training/technical assistance fees).
- **4.3. OUSD Administrative Fees.** OUSD shall charge and withhold up to 14% from the overall ASESP and 21<sup>st</sup> Century grant awards for central indirect, administrative, custodial, evaluation, and direct service training and technical assistance.
- 4.4. AGENCY Administrative Fees. AGENCY understands and agrees that it may not charge more than 4% of the total contract amount as administrative fees and that its administrative fees must be set at an appropriate dollar amount to keep the ASESP and 21<sup>st</sup> Century grants within the grant-mandated allowable 15% for total indirect/administrative costs. The agency administrative fees charged to the ASESP and 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC grants must be used for direct administrative costs and cannot be used for agency indirect costs. Direct administrative costs consist of expenditures for administrative activities that provide a direct benefit to the ASESP and 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs. Indirect costs consist of expenditures for administrative activities that are necessary for the general operation of the agency, but that cannot be tied to the ASESP and 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs.
- 4.5. Program Budget. Due to result-based budgeting, the grant will remain as part of the site budget. Funds will be encumbered from the site budget on behalf of AGENCY for the school year 2013-2014 and will not exceed \$213,115.00 in accordance with Exhibit B ("ASESP/21st CCLC Planning Tool/Comprehensive After School Program Budget for AGENCY 2013-14").
- 4.6. Modifications to Budget. Any modifications to the approved grant budget must be approved by OUSD, AGENCY, and CDE before expenditures of funds for modified line items are authorized. Except as expressly set forth herein, OUSD shall not be liable to AGENCY for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by AGENCY in performing services for OUSD. The granting of any payment by OUSD, or the receipt thereof by AGENCY, shall in no way lessen the liability of AGENCY to correct unsatisfactory work, although the unsatisfactory character of that work may not have been apparent or detected at the time a payment was made. Work, which does not conform to the requirements of this Agreement, may be rejected by OUSD and in that case must be replaced by AGENCY without delay.
- 4.7. Program Fees. The intent of the ASESP and 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs is to establish local programs that offer academic assistance and enrichment for students in need of such services regardless of their ability to pay. Though it is not against the rules to charge fees for participation in programs, the CA Department of Education discourages it because it could exclude students in need from attending and taking advantage of the after school program. Fees should not create a barrier to participation in the after school program. After school services must be equally accessible to all students targeted for services regardless of their ability to pay. Programs that propose to charge fees may not prohibit any family from participating based on their inability to pay and must offer a sliding scale of fees and scholarships for those who could not otherwise afford to participate. Any income collected from fees must be used to fund program activities specified in the grant application. AGENCY shall do full accounting of fees collected, and documentation shall be kept for 5 years for auditing purposes. If AGENCY decides to charge fees, this decision shall be made collaboratively with the Site Administrator, and AGENCY shall work collaboratively with the Site

Administrator and parent leaders to develop an appropriate program fee structure for the school community. AGENCY shall provide the OUSD After School Programs Office with written documentation of the program fee structure prior to charging any program fees, and shall provide OUSD with additional documentation upon request, to ensure grant compliance.

- 5. Scope of Work. AGENCY will serve as lead agency at 335/Life Academy (6-7), will be responsible for operations and management of the ASESP, 21st CCLC, OFCY, and private grants contracted to AGENCY by OUSD for fiscal year 2013-2014. This shall include the following required activities:
  - 5.1. Student Outcomes. AGENCY shall achieve the student outcomes as described in the grant application narrative and articulated in documents from the program evaluation team. AGENCY agrees to develop school specific outcomes, as defined in partnership with the principal. AGENCY recognizes that the principal is the chief decision maker for after school and summer programs, and ensures that school site objectives are met.
    - 5.1.1. Alignment with Community School Strategic Site Plan (CSSSP). AGENCY will ensure the after school program aligns with OUSD and 335/Life Academy (6-7) and objectives to ensure the success of students as articulated in the Community School Strategic Site Plan (CSSSP). AGENCY will work in partnership with the school principal to ensure that the program components are aligned with and complement OUSD standards and school site curriculum.
  - 5.2. Oversight. AGENCY will provide oversight, fiscal management, payroll services, technical assistance, and facilitation of collaboration with other service providers. Agency must ensure compliance with ASESP and 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC funding guideline requirements and follow OUSD after school policies and procedures. This includes compliance with OUSD staffing requirements and policies including No Child Left Behind and other legislative mandates.
  - 5.3. Enrollment. AGENCY will enroll 6th through 7th grade students at 335/Life Academy (6-7), to serve sufficient number of students and run services for a sufficient number of days to earn the full core grant allocation of funding.

### 5.4. Program Requirements

- 5.4.1. Program Hours. The program shall be offered Monday through Friday, every regular school day annually, commencing immediately upon the conclusion of the regular school day, operating a minimum of 15 hours/week, and until 6:00 pm daily. Instructional activities must include a balance of both academic and enrichment/recreation components.
- 5.4.2. Program Days. The program shall be offered a minimum of 177 180 days during the 2013 2014 school year. AGENCY will close the ASESP and 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC program no more than a maximum of 3 days in the 2013-14 school year for staff professional development, as permitted by Education Code. Programs that receive 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC Supplemental grant funds or private funding for summer shall additionally operate a sufficient number of days and hours in the summer, on weekends, and during intercession in the manner prescribed by the grant legislation and/or funder, in order to meet attendance goals required by the CA Department of Education and/or the funder.
- 5.4.3. Program Components. AGENCY agrees to provide programming that supports the guidelines as outlined in the ASESP and 21st CCLC grants for students at 335/Life Academy (6-7). AGENCY acknowledges and agrees to provide programming consistent with grant guidelines including, but not limited to:

- Educational and Literacy. An educational and literacy element that must provide tutoring and/or homework assistance designed to help students meet state standards in one or more of the following core academic subjects: reading/language arts, mathematics, history and social studies, or science. A broad range of activities may be implemented based on local student needs and interests.
- Enrichment. The enrichment element must offer an array of additional services, programs
  and activities that reinforce and complement the school's academic program. Enrichment
  may include but is not limited to arts, youth development, leadership, recreation, sports,
  music, career awareness, college interest, service learning and other youth development
  activities based upon student needs and interests. All programs must offer both enrichment
  and recreation/physical fitness activities as core components of the after school program and
  summer program.
- Family Literacy Services. In all programs receiving 21st CCLC grant funds, AGENCY shall
  assess the need for family literacy services among adult family members of the students to
  be served by the program. All programs will, at a minimum, either refer families to existing
  services or coordinate with local service providers to deliver literacy and educational
  development services.
- Supplemental and Summer Services. In all programs receiving 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC Supplemental
  grant funds or private funding for summer, AGENCY will provide educational and enrichment
  programming in the summer, on weekends, and/or during intercessions. A broad range of
  activities may be implemented based on local student needs and interests, and district
  guidelines for summer programming.
- **5.4.4. Staff Ratio.** The staff to youth ratio shall not exceed 1:20, with no more than 20 youth for each qualified, adult staff supervisor.
- **5.5. Data Collection.** AGENCY will work with OUSD to collect and analyze data on student enrollment, student attendance, student academic performance, student satisfaction, and parent satisfaction. This includes, but is not limited to:
  - **5.5.1. Accountability Reports.** Providing OUSD with the following set of program accountability reports:
    - Financial reports
    - Activity reports
    - · Outcomes reports: behavioral and academic
  - 5.5.2. Attendance Reports. Providing OUSD with attendance reports using the OUSD/OFCY attendance systems and maintaining required attendance records utilizing the OUSD/OFCY attendance systems, including completion of mandatory monthly reports. Original written documentation of all daily attendance records, including all daily sign in/out sheets, will be maintained by Agency for 5 years for auditing purposes.
  - **5.5.3.** Use of Enrollment Packet. AGENCY will use OUSD After School Program Parent Permission and Student Information enrollment packet, including early release waiver, for all after school participants. (**Exhibit C**) AGENCY will seek approval from the OUSD After School Programs Office for any modifications to the OUSD enrollment packet, in advance of distribution.
- 5.6. Maintain Clean, Safe and Secure Environment. Maintaining clean, safe, and secure program environments for staff and students in conjunction with OUSD guidelines. AGENCY, as they view necessary, will initiate and establish additional cleanliness, safety, and security policies and protocol sufficient to ensure staff, student and family member safety.
- 5.7. Meeting Participation. AGENCY will participate in technical assistance, training, orientation, monthly meetings and other support and resource development activities provided by OUSD and

collaborative partners in conducting program planning, implementation, and evaluation. These include required regular meetings with the school principal or other identified designee to ensure collaboration with the school vision. AGENCY staff will participate in meetings facilitated by the OUSD After School Programs Office to address program quality, program improvement and general troubleshooting.

- **5.8. Relationships.** AGENCY will maintain six essential collaborative relationships to ensure partnerships towards effective program implementation:
  - Administration, faculty, and staff of 335/Life Academy (6-7)
  - OUSD After School Programs Office
  - OUSD central administration departments
  - Parents/Guardians
  - Youth
  - Community organizations and public agencies
- **5.9.** Licenses. AGENCY shall obtain and keep in force all licenses, permits, and certificates necessary for the performance of this Agreement.
- 6. Field Trip Policy. FIELD TRIPS, OFF SITE EVENTS AND OFF SITE ACTIVITIES:
  - AGENCY shall provide each Site Administrator and the OUSD After School Programs Office
    with a schedule of all after school program field trips and/or off site events and/or off site
    activities by the first day of each semester, and a schedule of all summer field trips and/or off
    site events and activities by the first day of the summer program, if AGENCY is providing
    summer services (Exhibit D)
  - AGENCY hereby certifies that after school and summer program staff and/or subcontractors will
    comply with the following procedures for all field trips, off site events and off site activities:
  - 6.1. Licenses Permission Slips/Acknowledgement. Field trip/excursion permission slip must be signed by parent(s)/guardian(s) of all student participants and an acknowledgement must be signed by all adult chaperones both of which shall include the following information:
    - 6.1.1. a full description of the trip and scheduled activities
    - 6.1.2. student/adult participant health information
    - 6.1.3. "Notice of Waiver of All Claims: Education Code § 35330 provides that all persons making a field trip or excursion shall be deemed to have waived all claims against any school district, charter school, or the State of California for injury, accident, illness or death occurring during or by reason of the field trip or excursion, regardless of who holds the claims. If the field trip or excursion to which this permission slip applies is out-of-state, I hereby knowingly waive all of my and my daughter's/son's/ward's claims against any school district, charter school, and/or the State of California for injury, accident, illness or death occurring during or by reason of the out-of state field trip or excursion."
  - **6.2.** After school and summer program staff or subcontractors leading trip must have a written list of students attending trip.
  - 6.3. No student shall be prevented from making a trip due to lack of sufficient funds.
  - 6.4. After school and summer program staff or subcontractors leading trip shall have a sufficient first aid kit in his or her possession or immediately available. If the trip is conducted in areas known to be infested with poisonous snakes, this first aid kit shall contain medically accepted snakebite remedies.

6.5. Health Conditions/Medication: Trip participant health information will be gathered and reviewed in advance of trip and any needed revisions to supervision plan made, including making sure that chaperones understand relevant information (eg food allergies). A plan will be developed to collect, secure, and dispense prescription medications from their original containers only and consistent with physician's instructions.

### 6.6. Supervision

- 6.6.1. AGENCY Executive Director must review and approve supervision plan.
- 6.6.2. Trip as structured is appropriate to age, grade level and course of study.
- 6.6.3. Chaperones are all AGENCY employees or subcontractors, parent(s)/guardian(s), or other authorized chaperones and are 21 or older. After School and Summer Program Coordinators and lead trip staff are satisfied that all chaperones are willing and able to perform required duites, including understanding and implementing instructions, understanding health information for students in their group, and responding effectively in the event of an emergency. Trip attendees shall be limited to assigned school or early childhood education or after school program staff, students and authorized chaperones. Guests, including but not limited to friends and other family members, are strictly prohibited absent prior written approval of the after school program coordinator or AGENCY executive director. Before the trip, after school and summer program staff leading trip shall provide any adult chaperones who may accompany the students with clear information regarding their responsibilities. Chaperones shall be assigned a prescribed group of students and shall be responsible for the continuous monitoring of these students' activities. Chaperones shall not consume alcoholic beverages or be under the influence of controlled substances while accompanying and supervising students on a trip.
- **6.6.4.** When a trip is made to a place of business or industry, staff shall arrange for an employee of the host company to serve as conductor.
- **6.6.5.** Adult:Student Ratio is at least 1:10 or higher if swimming or wading or high risk trip. If the trip involves water activities, this ratio shall be revised to ensure closer supervision of elementary grade or younger students, appropriate to their ages. The ratio of adults to students on field trips and excursions shall be reasonable under the circumstances.
- 6.6.6. Safety requirements have been met (eg: current First aid/CPR training of at least one chaperone, first aid kits, emergency contact and health info, instructions for chaperones, staff and chaperones have cell phones which are charged and available for communication).
- ensure compliance with all state laws and may transport by the use of its own equipment, contract to provide transportation or arrange transportation by the use of other equipment to enrolled after school and summer participants provided that: (A) parent/guardians' written permission has been obtained in advance; (B) After School Program Coordinator and/or Summer Program Coordinator has confirmed that: transportation arrangements are safe and appropriate; (C) all drivers have valid California driver's license; (D) all drivers have received fingerprint clearance; (E) provided that such transport is covered under driver or registered owner's personal automobile insurance or AGENCY automobile liability insurance policy for at least \$100,000 per individual and \$300,000 per occurrence for liability for bodily injury; and \$50,000 per occurrence for liability for property damage; (F) all drivers and registered owners of private or rented vehicles used shall complete and sign declaration of driver forms assuring that: (i) the driver is at least 21 years of age and holds a current valid California driver's license; (ii) the driver has not been convicted of reckless driving or driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol within the past five years; and (iii) the driver provides proof

of sufficient insurance; (G) if after school or summer program arranges and/or contracts with a third party to provide this transportation, the organization or company with whom they contract must be licensed as a transportation provider, be certified to transport students (e.g., School Pupil Activity Bus certification) and have at least \$5,000,000 automobile and \$1,000,000 General Liability insurance; (H) arrangements have been made for additional vehicle for use in event of illness or emergency; and (I) students receive instruction in safe conduct on bus or other transport; and (J) drivers shall receive safety and emergency instructions and information which shall be kept in their vehicle, including health and emergency information for each student riding in his/her vehicle.

- 6.8. AGENCY must have reasonable confirmation that all organizations involved in the trip have demonstrated expertise and exhibit reasonably safe and reputable operating procedures and business practices appropriate to student trips.
- 6.9. Vendor is licensed to provide all proposed activities.
- **6.10.** Voluntary Student Accident Insurance must be <u>made available</u> for purchase (required for all trips). All student participants on higher risk activities (e.g. swimming, snow trips, horseback riding, sailing, rafting, etc) must be covered by medical or accident insurance.
  - 6.10.1. Parents/guardians must be informed that there is no District insurance for the trip;
  - **6.10.2.** Program fees must include coverage for accidents or injuries to participants by an insurance carrier authorized to do business in California.

### 6.11. ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR HIGH RISK, OVERNIGHT, OUT OF STATE TRIPS:

### 6.11.1. Definition of High Risk Activities

- 6.11.1.1. Because of concerns about the risk to student safety, the after school program coordinator shall not permit the following activities on campus or during AGENCY sponsored after school or summer program trips, events and activities unless the activity is properly supervised, students wear protective gear as appropriate, and each participant has insurance coverage:
  - Amusement Parks
  - Interscholastic Athletic Activities
  - Bicycle riding
  - Circus Arts
  - Hiking (Moderate to rigorous terrain or length) vs short nature "walks"
  - Hang gliding
  - Horseback riding
  - Ice Skating
  - In-line or Roller Skating
  - Rock climbing, climbing walls
  - Skateboarding or use of non-motorized scooters
  - Snow sports of any kind
  - Trampoline; Jumpers
  - Motorcycling
  - Rodeo
  - Target Shooting
  - Water Activities including but not limited to: swimming, snorkeling, scuba diving, sailing, boating, kayaking, river rafting, water slides, water skiing etc.
  - Outdoor active, experiential programs (Ropes course, pulley, etc.)

- Other activities determined by the school principal to have a high risk to student safety
- **6.11.1.2** The cost of insurance coverage for such activities shall be borne by the student and/or AGENCY.
- **6.11.1.3** Students who operate or ride as a passenger on a bicycle, non-motorized scooter or skateboard upon a street, bikeway or any other public bicycle path or trail shall wear a properly fitted and fastened bicycle helmet that meets the standards of law. Students also shall be required to wear such helmets while wearing in-line or roller skates.
- 6.11.2. Department of Justice and FBI fingerprinting and fingerprint clearance must be obtained for all non-District employee chaperones. Chaperones who continue beyond one school year will need to get fingerprint clearance once every three years from the time they begin chaperoning on after school program trips. Chaperones shall act in accordance with district policies, regulations and school rules. A person who is required to register as a sex offender pursuant to Penal Code 290 shall not serve as a chaperone on any field trip.
- 6.11.3. No chaperone shall be assigned to provide supervision or instruction of students unless he/she has submitted evidence of an examination within the past 60 days to determine that he/she is free of active tuberculosis. Chaperones whose skin test negative shall thereafter be required to take tuberculosis test every four years or sooner if deemed necessary by AGENCY.
- 6.11.4. Letter must be sent to parent(s)/guardian(s) and a meeting must be held for staff, chaperones, parent(s)/guardian(s) and students in advance of trip to discuss trip and safety related procedures, itinerary and questions.
- 6.11.5. Sleeping arrangements and night supervision are safe and appropriate.
- **6.11.6. Vendor Proof of Insurance:** After School Program Coordinator and/or Summer Program Coordinator has obtained proof of insurance from all private vendors including:
  - Facility
  - Program

### 6.12. Additional Requirements for Field Trips/Excursions Which Include Swimming or Wading

- 6.12.1. No swimming or wading shall be allowed on trips unless planned and approved in advance.
- 6.12.2. When wading in the ocean, bay, river or other body of water as part of a planned, supervised outdoor education activity, after school program staff shall provide for a number of chaperones to exceed the normal one to ten ratio and shall instruct both chaperones and students of the real and potential risks inherent in such activities and the precautions necessary for their safety.

#### 6.12.3. Swimming Activities

- 6.12.3.1. Parents/guardians must provide written permission for the student to swim and must indicate the student's swimming ability. Students whose parents do not give permission for their child to swim shall be identified in advance of trip and a tracking system designed to ensure they do not enter pool or swim area.
- **6.12.3.2.** Swimming facilities, including backyard pools, must be inspected by the AGENCY Executive Director and after school program staff before the trip is scheduled.

- **6.12.3.3.** Owners of private pools must provide a certificate of insurance, designating OUSD and AGENCY as an additional insured, for not less than \$2,000,000 in liability coverage.
- 6.12.3.4. Lifeguards must be designated for all swimming activities. If lifeguards are not provided by the pool owner or operator, the AGENCY Executive Director shall ensure their presence. The AGENCY Executive Director shall ensure that lifeguards are Red Cross certified or equivalent and must be at least 21 years old. A swim test must be administered before any student is permitted in the deep end of the pool or swim area. A tracking system shall be designed in advance of trip to identify those students who have and have not passed the swim test.
- 6.12.3.5. The ratio of adult chaperones to students shall be at least one to ten. In grades 4-6, this ratio shall be at least one to eight. In grades K-3, this ratio shall be at least one to four.
- **6.12.3.6.** Specific supervisory responsibilities shall be determined in advance to accommodate the varying swimming abilities of students. These responsibilities shall be clarified in writing and reviewed verbally before the trip.
- **6.12.3.7.** Emergency procedures shall be included with written instructions to adult chaperones and staff.
- **6.12.3.8.** Staff and chaperones assigned to supervise students must wear swim suits and know how to swim and be at each side of the pool or swim area actively monitoring students at all times.
- 6.12.3.9. The After School Program Coordinator and/or Summer Program Coordinator may require students to wear flotation devices, depending upon their age and swimming ability.
- **6.12.3.10.** A buddy-system or other means of surveillance shall be arranged in advance and strictly enforced during swimming activities.
- 6.13. Additional Requirements for trips to East Bay Regional Park District Bodies of Water (swimming pools, lagoons, shoreline parks and lakes) and Related Facilities
  - 6.13.1. At least 2 weeks prior to trip date, all persons attending trip, including, but not limited to, each and every student, teacher, instructor, chaperone, supervisor, parent, administrator, volunteer, or aide (hereinafter "participant") will provide to the School District Office of the General Counsel an original, properly completed, signed and dated East Bay Regional Park District Waiver (attached as Exhibit E), executed by either the participant if he or she is 18 years of age or older, or the participant's parent or legal guardian if the participant is under 18 years of age
  - 6.13.2. Should AGENCY fail to provide an original, properly completed, signed and dated East Bay Regional Park District Waiver for each trip participant as defined in Section 6.13.1 above, AGENCY agrees to hold harmless, defend and indemnify OUSD, its officers, employees, volunteers and agents from all claims and actions resulting therefrom.
- 7. Financial Records. AGENCY agrees and understands that OUSD is responsible for fiduciary and programmatic oversight for the expenditure of the ASESP and 21st CCLC grant funds contracted to AGENCY by OUSD for fiscal year 2013-2014. AGENCY will function as a sub recipient of funding and as such will follow all required fiscal guidelines and meet outlined standards as referenced in applicable

Federal and State sub recipient guidelines. AGENCY will ensure that all contracted funds of this MOU are expended as per grant guidelines.

- 7.1. Accounting Records. AGENCY will maintain its accounting records based upon the principles of fund accounting.
- 7.2. Disputes. AGENCY shall make all records related to ASESP, 21ST CCLC available to OUSD for review. OUSD and AGENCY shall meet and confer regarding any disputes as to the amount of actual expenses before taking any action to collect funds.

### 8. Invoicing

- 8.1. Billing Structure. AGENCY shall only invoice for actual expenditures incurred. Supporting documentation must be presented along with monthly invoices upon request. Billing details must be provided upon request to OUSD to ensure compliance with related sub recipient and grant guidelines.
- **8.2. Unallowable Expenses.** AGENCY may not purchase computers or capital equipment using ASES, 21<sup>st</sup> Century Core Grant, 21<sup>st</sup> Century Direct Access, or 21<sup>st</sup> Century Family Literacy funds.
- 8.3. Invoice Requirements. AGENCY will submit invoices with evidence of the following staff qualifications for each AGENCY employee and AGENCY agent, including employees of subcontracting agencies and volunteers: TB Clearance, current CA Department of Justice and FBI fingerprint clearance, and Instructional Aide requirement. AGENCY will utilize the required OUSD invoicing and staff qualifications form (Exhibit F) for regular invoice submission.
- 8.4. Submission of Invoices. AGENCY must submit invoices to OUSD on a timely and regular basis for services rendered. OUSD will not accept invoices submitted more than thirty days beyond the end of each fiscal quarter. No invoices will be accepted more than 30 days past the end of June 30 of the contractual fiscal year. AGENCY must also submit invoices according to specific invoicing deadlines as outlined by OUSD to ensure timely processing. (Exhibit G)
- 8.5. Submission of Invoices for ASESP and 21st Century Grants. For services rendered related to the ASESP and 21st Cele grants, OUSD shall pay AGENCY, on a monthly basis, for appropriately documented expenses related to the ASESP and 21st cele grants, with a cumulative total for 2013-14 not to exceed \$213,115.00 in accordance with the attached Exhibits to this Memorandum. Invoices for payment of services shall be submitted by the 10<sup>th</sup> of each month to the OUSD After School Programs Office, utilizing the required OUSD invoicing and staff qualifications form (Exhibit F). OUSD will strive to adhere to second Accounts Payable check run per the published schedule of monthly payments if invoices are submitted in accordance with the deadlines and requirements set forth in this section and the accompanying Exhibits.
- 9. Ownership of Documents. AGENCY agrees that, pursuant to California law, it shall maintain program and fiscal documentation for the ASESP and 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC programs for a minimum of five years. All documents created by AGENCY pursuant to this MOU, including but not limited to reports, designs, schedules, registration packets, early release waivers, and other materials prepared, or in the process of being prepared, for the services to be performed by AGENCY, are and shall be at the time of creation and thereafter the property of OUSD, with all intellectual property rights therein vested in OUSD at the time of creation. OUSD shall be entitled to access to and copies of these materials during the progress of the work. Any such materials in the hands of AGENCY or in the hands of any subcontractor upon completion or termination of the work shall be immediately delivered to OUSD. If any materials are lost, damaged or destroyed before final delivery to OUSD, AGENCY shall replace them at its own expense and AGENCY hereby assumes all risks of loss, damage or destruction of or to such materials. AGENCY may retain a copy of all materials produced under this MOU for its use in its general business activities.

### 10. Changes

- 10.1. Agency Changes. AGENCY may, at any time, by written order, make changes consistent with Section 5 Scope of Work of this MOU. If such changes cause an increase or decrease in the budgeted cost of or the time required for performance of the agreed upon work, an equitable adjustment as mutually agreed shall be made in the limit on compensation as set forth in Section 4 or in the time of required performance as set forth in Section 5.4, or both. In the event that AGENCY encounters any unanticipated conditions or contingencies that may affect the scope of work or services and result in an adjustment in the amount of compensation specified herein, AGENCY shall so advise OUSD immediately upon notice of such condition or contingency. The written notice shall explain the circumstances giving rise to the unforeseen condition or contingency and shall set forth the proposed adjustment in compensation. Such notice shall be given to OUSD prior to the time that AGENCY performs work or services related to the proposed adjustment in compensation. Any and all pertinent changes shall be expressed in a written amendment to this MOU and signed by OUSD prior to AGENCY's implementation of such changes.
- 10.2. Changing Legislation. AGENCY understands that changes in Federal, or state legislation or District policy may impact funding levels, grant requirements, and responsibilities of AGENCY during an academic school year. This MOU may be amended during the 2013-14 fiscal year to reflect additional changes resulting from such legislation.

#### 11. Conduct of Consultant

- 11.1. Child Abuse and Neglect Reporting Act. AGENCY will comply with the Child Abuse and Neglect Reporting Act (CANRA) guidelines as Mandated Reporters to report suspicions of possible child abuse to the appropriate reporting agency as stated in California Penal Code § 11164 – 11174.
- 11.2. Staff Requirements. AGENCY will adhere to the following staff requirements for each AGENCY "agent", including employees, staff of subcontracting agencies, and volunteers. AGENCY will provide OUSD with evidence of staff qualifications, consistent with invoicing requirements outlined in Section 8.3 which include:
  - 11.2.1. Tuberculosis Screening. Current documentation of negative TB Test (PPD) on file for each AGENCY agent working with students.
  - 11.2.2. Fingerprinting of Agents. Current California Department of Justice (CDOJ) fingerprint clearance and FBI fingerprint clearance for each AGENCY agent working with students. AGENCY shall not permit its agents to come into contact with students until CDOJ and FBI clearance is ascertained, and AGENCY shall certify in writing to OUSD that none of its agents who may come into contact with pupils have been convicted of a violent or a serious felony. AGENCY shall further certify that it or its subcontracting agencies have received and reviewed fingerprint results for each of its agents, and Agency or its subcontracting agencies shall request and review subsequent arrest records for all agents who may come into contact with OUSD pupils in providing services to the District under this Agreement.
  - 11.2.3. Minimum Qualifications. AGENCY staff and agents who directly supervise students and are included in the 1:20 staff to student ratio must meet the following minimum qualifications for an instructional aide: a high school diploma or its equivalency and one of the following: (a) an AA degree; or completion of 48 semester units in college; or (b) successful completion of the Instructional Assistant exam, administered by the Alameda County Office of Education.

- 11.3. Removal of Staff. In the event that OUSD, in its sole discretion, at any time during the term of this MOU, desires the removal of any AGENCY related persons, employee, representative or agent from OUSD school site and/or property, AGENCY shall immediately upon receiving notice from OUSD of such desire, cause the removal of such person or persons. In the event OUSD requests the removal of any AGENCY related persons, employee, representative or agent from OUSD school site and/or property, the OUSD site administrator shall provide to the AGENCY written, supporting rationale for the decision. OUSD After School Program Office, after conferring with Legal and the Executive Officer supporting the site, shall decide, taking all the facts and circumstances into account, if AGENCY may reassign an employee or agent to another OUSD site. Prior to the removal or change of any AGENCY staff member who is a regular part of the after school program, AGENCY shall inform the Site Administrator with as much natice as passible, and will work with the Site Administrator to ensure a smooth transition in staffing.
- 11.4. Conflict of Interest. AGENCY shall abide by and be subject to all applicable OUSD policies, regulations, statutes or other laws regarding conflict of interest. AGENCY shall not hire any officer or employee of OUSD to perform any service by this Agreement. AGENCY affirms to the best of his/her/its knowledge, there exists no actual or potential conflict of interest between AGENCY's family, business or financial interest and the services provided under this MOU, and in the event of change in either private interest or services under this MOU, any question regarding possible conflict of interest which may arise as a result of such change will be brought to OUSD's attention in writing.
- 11.5. Drug-Free / Smoke Free Policy. AGENCY understands that OUSD does not permit drugs, alcohol, and/or smoking at any time in any buildings and/or grounds on OUSD property. AGENCY agrees to adhere to this policy for its students, staff, visitors, employees and or subcontractors.
- 11.6. Non-Discrimination. Consistent with the policy of OUSD in connection with all work performed under Contracts, AGENCY shall not engage in unlawful discrimination in employment on the basis of actual or perceived race, color, national origin, ancestry, religion, age, marital status, pregnancy, physical or mental disability, medical condition, veteran status, gender, sex or sexual orientation. AGENCY agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to, the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735 and OUSD policy. In addition, AGENCY agrees to require like compliance by all its subcontractor(s).
- 12. Indemnification. AGENCY shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend OUSD and each of its officers, officials, employees, volunteers and agents from any loss, liability, fines, penalties, forfeitures, costs and damages (whether in contract, tort or strict liability, including but not limited to personal injury, death at any time and property damage) incurred by OUSD, AGENCY or any other person and from any claims, demands and actions in law or equity (including attorney's fees and litigation expenses), arising or alleged to have arisen directly or indirectly out of performance of this MOU. AGENCY's obligations under the preceding sentence shall apply jointly and severally regardless of whether OUSD or any of its officers, officials, employees, volunteers or agents are actively or passively negligent, but shall not apply to any loss of liability, fines, penalties, forfeitures, costs or damages caused solely by the active negligence or by the willful misconduct of OUSD. If AGENCY should subcontract all or any portion of the work or activities to be performed under this MOU, AGENCY shall require each subcontractor to indemnify, hold harmless and defend OUSD, its officers, officials, employees, volunteers or agents in accordance with the terms of the proceeding paragraph.
- 13. Insurance. Throughout the life of the MOU, AGENCY shall pay for and maintain in full force and effect with an insurance company(s) admitted by the California Insurance Commissioner to do business in the State of California and rated not less than "A/VII" in Best Insurance Rating Guide, the following policies of insurance:

- 13.1. Commercial General Liability insurance which shall include contractual, products and completed operations, corporal punishment and sexual misconduct and harassment coverage, and bodily injury and property damage liability insurance with combined single limits of not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence.
- **13.2. Worker's Compensation** insurance, as required by the California Labor Code, with not less than the statutory limits.
- 13.3. Property and Fire insurance shall provide to protect: Real Property, against risk of direct loss, commonly known as Special Form and Fire Legal Liability, to protect against liability for portions of premises leased or rented; Business Personal Property, to protect on a Broad Form, named peril bases, for all furniture, equipment and supplies of AGENCY. If any OUSD property is leased, rented or borrowed, it shall also be insured the same as real property.

The above policies of insurance shall be written on forms acceptable to the Risk Manager of OUSD and endorsed to name the OUSD, its officers, employees, volunteers or agents, as additional insured. Said Additional Insured endorsement shall be provided to OUSD upon AGENCY's execution of this MOU and before work commence under this MOU. If at any time said policies of insurance lapse or become canceled, this MOU shall become void. The acceptance by OUSD of the above-required insurance does not serve to limit the liability or responsibility of the insurer or AGENCY to OUSD. Exhibit H ("Certificates of Insurance").

#### Description and Rationale for Selection of Lead Agency

Alternatives in Action's Community and Extended Day Programs offer youth and their families a broad range of after school programming and school-linked services that prepare young people for success in college, career and community leadership in alignments with Life Academy's vision of implementing a full service community school vision. Our comprehensive community school initiatives are based out of three East Bay High School sites: Life Academy of Health and Bioscience in East Oakland, McClymonds High School in West Oakland, and Alternatives in Action's own charter high school in West Alameda, which is open to students from other surrounding Alameda and Oakland high schools. Through our Community Programs, we partner with school staff, youth, parents and organizations to create powerful, real-world learning opportunities for over 900 high school youth in our "Six Pillars of Collaborative Programming". These include After School Community Projects, Academic Support and College Preparation, Career Development, Parent Engagement, Health and Wellness, and Cascading Leadership. We offer a place and supports that meet the needs of the whole child, from leadership to tutoring to physical check-ups. As youth progress and grow, they may take on roles of greater influence in the school and co-lead programs with other youth.

Alternatives in Action's approach to promoting youth voice and social change has been highlighted in toolkits on best practices, profiled in Public Profit's Youth Evaluation Team Findings Report March 2013, numerous news outlets and national publications such as "Growing to Greatness" and the Fifth Discipline: The Art and Practice of the Learning Organization. Alternatives in Action's effective management and ability to infuse cascading leadership and a community-school approach have led to an effective collaborative between Life Academy and Alternatives in Action.

Improving school day attendance for all students and reducing chronic absenteeism is one of the key OUSD strategic goals. The district goal is that all students will attend school at least 95% of the required school days or more, thereby achieving satisfactory attendance. Students who attend school 90% or less of required days are considered chronically absent. Students whose attendance falls in the "grey zone" between 90% - 95% are considered at risk of chronic absenteeism.

In partnership with the school day, after school programs can play an important role in supporting student attendance by doing things like celebrating good attendance, informing parents about the importance of attendance, uncovering what challenges students/families are facing that cause them to miss school, regularly monitoring student attendance data, contacting families to let them know their child was missed at school, etc., in addition to providing meaningful after school learning experiences that help keep students engaged and coming.

#### Academic Liaison/Quality Support Coach
