### **Project Description**

Please describe the project or purpose for which your organization is seeking funds.

The OUSD After School Programs Office is seeking funding from the Rogers Family Foundation in order to implement an Early Literacy Learning Community for after school program staff from 10-15 different schools. The purpose of this learning community is to provide curriculum, professional development, and coaching to support elementary after school programs in integrating one hour per week of literacy instruction for students in grades K-3rd grade. This project builds upon progress that OUSD has made over the past two years, with support from the Rogers Family Foundation, in increasing the academic focus of our 42 elementary after school programs on literacy, academic discussions, and intentional supports for English language learners. Last year, as part of our funded project, OUSD After School Programs Office (ASPO) staff worked in partnership with a credentialed teacher from Manzanita SEED elementary school to develop an after school literacy curriculum for students in Grades K-5, consisting of 18 weeks Proposed Project & of literacy lessons that after school programs could implement with students for one hour per Purpose week. This year, we seek to intensify the training that elementary after school staff receive on early literacy, so that they can successfully implement the literacy curriculum for their youngest participants in Grades K-3. Additionally, by increasing after school workers' understanding of the early literacy and social-emotional developmental needs of this age group, this project also seeks to strengthen the quality of enrichment service delivery in general across the entire after school curriculum, and to support program staff in creating literacy-rich after school learning

environments for all students. Finally, by providing learning community participants with training and support to implement a family literacy night at each program, this project will deepen after school programs' family engagement efforts. This project aims to directly support the Oakland Reads 2020 goal of having all OUSD 3rd grade students reading at proficient levels by 2020 by leveraging the critical after school hours when expanded learning can occur.

Please describe how you are planning to implement the proposed project.

The OUSD After School Programs Office will work in partnership with Girls Inc. of Alameda County to implement this project. We will conduct outreach to OUSD after school elementary programs in Sept/Oct to secure participation of 10-15 program sites in this project. On October 16, OUSD's Professional Development non-student day, we will launch this project with a 4 hour Early Learning/Early Literacy Institute open to any after school program staff working with students in grades TK-3. This initial training institute will ground program staff on the early literacy and social-emotional developmental needs of younger elementary students. We will share Oakland data on early literacy rates, and engage after school program staff in discussions about the role they can play in supporting children's literacy development in the context of after school. Participating staff will gain an understanding of foundational concepts such as phonemic awareness. We will open this initial training up to our entire Oakland elementary after school community, and use it as an opportunity to promote the upcoming 6-session Early Literacy learning community.

In November we will launch our first of six learning community sessions. Early Literacy learning community sessions will last 2 hours each, and will take place from November through May. Each session will increase participants' understanding of how they can support early literacy, and will provide participants with guidance on how to effectively implement the after school literacy curriculum that was developed last year as part of this project. Each learning community participant will be given the full 18 week curriculum that was developed by Priscilla Parchia, Manzanita SEED teacher, specifically for the after school context. The curriculum focuses on facilitating opportunities for students to engage in academic discussions and practice language production. Below is a tentative schedule of the six learning community sessions and the content of each session:

November 17: Increasing academic language production in after school programs; prepare after school instructors to implement weeks 1-4 of literacy curriculum

December 17: Using effective reading strategies; prepare after school instructors to implement weeks 5-8 of literacy curriculum

January 21: Selecting age-appropriate reading; academic language; prepare after school instructors to implement weeks 9-12 of literacy curriculum

Project Implementation February 18: Focusing on student experience; guidance to agencies on integrating literacy into upcoming program plans as a mandatory program component; prepare participants to implement weeks 13-16 of literacy curriculum

March 17: Preparing to organize a family literacy night; prepare participants to implement final literacy lessons

April 21: Sharing and reflecting on successes and challenges in implementing literacy curriculum

The above content will be modified and augmented to meet the specific needs of learning community participants.

In addition to learning community sessions, participating sites will receive one Winter and one Spring on-site coaching visit. Instructors implementing the literacy curriculum will be observed, and then receiving coaching and feedback to strengthen their delivery of the literacy curriculum. Coaching will be provided by Girls Inc. staff who will be facilitating the learning communities, as well as credentialed teachers on extended contract. 10/18/2015

In the Spring, during program planning season for the upcoming 2016-17 program year, we will hold planning sessions with participating program sites and lead agencies on intentionally structuring a literacy component into program schedules and plans for the upcoming program year. This planning will support programs' implementation of the new OUSD After School requirement that all elementary after school programs offer one hour per week of literacy instruction for students in grades K-5.

In the Spring, participating programs in the learning community will also receive training on family engagement around literacy. Programs that consistently attended all 6 sessions of the learning community and implemented the after school literacy curriculum at their sites will be awarded with \$300 to support a family literacy night, and \$200 for the purchase of books to distribute to students. They will receive guidance ono selecting age appropriate books and tapping into free and low cost community resources for the acquisition of books.

At the close of this year's project, we will survey after school staff who participated in the learning community and provided the literacy instruction in their programs, to assess the effectiveness of this project, and gather baseline data on the impact of the literacy curriculum on K-3rd grade students in their programs.

What do you foresee as some of the challenges of implementing this project?

Potential challenges may include getting consistent attendance at all 6 learning community sessions by all participants. Another challenge may be effective follow through by sites in implementing the literacy curriculum with fidelity and consistency from Nov - May.

Project Challenges We have structured an incentive into this project to encourage consistent attendance and follow through with implementation of the curriculum: all participating sites that attend all 6 learning communities and follow through with implementing the 1 hour/week of literacy instruction for after school students will receive the following stipends: \$300 to support a family literacy night; \$200 to purchase books.

We will meet with program leaders and agency directors before the start of the first learning community session to go over project expectations with them.

The OUSD After School Programs Office is pleased to work in partnership with Girls Incorporated of Alameda County (Girls Inc.) to execute this project. Girls Inc. is currently one of 17 after school lead agency partners for OUSD. Girls Inc. has distinguished itself as a high quality after school service provider with a strong academic focus on literacy, and successful alignment with the regular school day. Girls Inc. serves nearly 8,000 Alameda County girls, boys, and families and community members annually, with programs at two service centers in Oakland, and 17 public schools throughout Alameda County. Girls Inc. has over fifteen years of experience implementing literacy intervention.

### **Collaboration with Other Organizations** Girl Inc. will co-lead this project with the OUSD ASPO. They will design and facilitate the Early Literacy learning community sessions and provide on-site coaching to 10 of the 15 after school programs involved in this project. They will also serve as an invaluable thought partner with the ASPO, helping us plan central office supports to our 42 elementary after school programs as they work to fulfill our new requirement that all elementary programs offer at least 1 hour of literacy instruction for students in grades K-5 by the 2016-17 school year.

By collaborating with Girls Inc. on this project, the ASPO will leverage the expertise of Girls Inc. to strengthen the quality of elementary after school literacy instruction across our entire Oakland after school system.

#### Renewal 1

We have been grateful to receive Rogers Family Foundation funding for the past two years. As a result of this funding, the OUSD After School Programs Office succeeded in developing an 18 week literacy curriculum specifically designed for the after school workforce to be able to implement in programs. In past years, RFF funding supported two learning community strands: a learning community for program staff focused on supporting students' literacy and academic language development; as well as a learning community for program leaders focused on understanding the needs of English language learners. In this third year of RFF funding, we will continue the program staff learning community, and intensify the focus and support on early literacy and academic language production for students in grades K-3. We have decided to Last Year's Grant partner closely with Girls Inc., an organization with demonstrated expertise in implementing literacy programming in the after school setting, to support us in intensifying these early literacy efforts. Supporting English Language Learners is still a priority for OUSD and our After School Programs Office; thus, we have decided to invest our own resources to support an ELL learning community focused on secondary after school program sites this year. (Salary savings from ASPO staff vacancies enable us to have the funds to support this endeavor this year.) We are working closely with the district's English Language Learner and Multilingual Achievement Office to ensure that this Secondary English Language Learner learning community is aligned to the goals of OUSD's new English Language Learner strategic plan.
