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MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN OAKLAND UNFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AND East Bay Asian Youth Center

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is to establish a relationship between Oakland Unified School District and East Bay Asian Youth Center (EBAYC) pertaining to the operation of Shop 55 Wellness Center at Oakland High School.

WHEREAS, EBAYC's services or program described in this MOU will be provided at no out of pocket cost to OUSD students served through the Shop 55 Wellness Center, or their parents (though providers may bill third party insurance to cover the cost of services provided); and

BOTH PARTIES HEREBY enter into this MOU to enable EBAYC to provide said services/program on school(s), site(s) ("Schools") selected in Section II of the MOU.

II. SCOPE OF SERVICES

Through its school-based health center, **East Bay Asian Youth Center** partners with Oakland High School to help meet the health education and youth development needs of the students, as well as coordinate medical health, dental health, and mental health services through the Shop 55 Wellness Center. **East Bay Asian Youth Center** will partner with other service providers on these campuses to provide a holistic set of wrap-around services that remove barriers to leaning and ensure increased access to care. Delivery of the following services is dependent on the availability of funding to sustain services.

- A. School-based health centers will provide the following services:
 - 1. Mental health counseling
 - 2. Physical exams/sports physical
 - 3. Diagnosis and treatment of minor illness, injury and medical conditions
 - 4. STD screening and treatment
 - 5. Dental Screening and Treatment
 - 6. Health education and health promotion for students and families
 - 7. Youth development programs (funded by OUSD 21st CCLC)
 - 8. Case management, including appropriate follow-up and referrals to health and social service providers on and off site (funded by Oakland High and OFCY)
- B. Unless otherwise agreed to in writing by the parties, the School(s) served by this agreement is/are the following:
 - Oakland High School: 1023 MacArthur Blvd., Oakland, CA 94610
- C. For the term of this MOU, the expectations or goals that are in agreement with the program's services are:
 - Develop student's social health/skills
 - Improve student's emotional health
 - Improve student's physical health
 - Help ensure, create, and/or sustain safe, healthy and supportive schools
 - Create accountability for quality
 - Help create full service community schools in OUSD

III. EBAYC RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. **Policies**—Ensure that all **EBAYC** personnel, including subcontractors, will comply with any policy and systems in place at OUSD and School(s). This includes, but is not limited to the following:
 - Drug and Smoke Free—No drugs, alcohol, and/or smoking are allowed at any time in any buildings and/or grounds on OUSD property. No students, staff, visitors, EBAYC, or subcontractors are to use drugs at these School(s).
 - 2. Anti-Discrimination—It is the policy of OUSD that in connection with EBAYC services in this MOU there shall be no discrimination against any employee engaged in the work because of race, color, ancestry,

national origin, religious creed, physical disability, medical condition, marital status, sexual orientation, gender, or age. Therefore, **EBAYC** agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws.

Conflict of Interest— EBAYC shall abide by and be subject to all applicable OUSD policies, regulations, statutes or other laws regarding conflict of interest. EBAYC shall not hire any OUSD employee to perform the services in this MOU, and affirms that to the best of its knowledge no such conflict presently exists.
 EBAYC agrees to alert OUSD in writing if and when a potential conflict does arise.

 Family Education Rights and Privacy Act— EBAYC shall observe District policies and regulations, and state and federal laws, including the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, commonly known as

FERPA, related to the confidentiality of pupil and personnel records.

- 5. Field Trip Policy: Field Trips, Off Site Events and Off Site Activities EBAYC shall complete the OUSD field trip application for any field trips and/ or off site events and/or off site activities that take place during the school day. EBAYC shall provide each Site Administrator with a schedule of all field trips and/ or off site events and/or off site activities that take place outside of the school day (i.e., after school, weekends, summer).
- B. Required Documents—Ensure that all EBAYC personnel who will be on OUSD premises have been: (a) fingerprinted; (b) submitted to a criminal background check via Livescan or a similar service as required by the Education Code; and (c) taken a tuberculosis test.
- C. Insurance—Provide evidence of general liability insurance that names OUSD as an additional insured, for operation students, volunteers, and personnel at location where EBAYC provides programs/services with at least \$1M in coverage, and furnish certificate of said insurance to OUSD.
- D. Communication—Communicate with School(s) and OUSD staff, both formally and informally, to ensure, to the best of the program's ability, that EBAYC services are aligned with the School(s) and OUSD's mission and objectives and are adequately meeting student's needs. At the request of School(s) or OUSD staff, and to the extent allowed by HIPAA and state privacy laws, provide data about student participation in EBAYC's program.
- E. Confidentiality— EBAYC shall maintain strict confidentiality of all information about individual students received under this MOU and will not disseminate such information without the express written consent of OUSD. EBAYC will comply with FERPA, and will be allowed to use the data received to solicit funding to continue to expand its services/program, so long as there is no information from which the identity of any student in EBAYC program as a participant could be made.
- F. Site-Based Agreements— EBAYC shall complete an annual site-based agreement with each school where services are provided to outline program vision, description of services, staffing, schedule, shared goals and objectives, and mutual expectations.

IV. OUSD RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. **Space**—Provide suitable space at Oakland High School, to be agreed upon by School(s), OUSD Staff, and EBAYC.
- B. **Janitorial Service**—Provide necessary services to maintain this space, including janitorial services, maintenance, utilities, and technology support.
- C. Data—Ensure that EBAYC has reasonable access, to the extent allowable by FERPA and state privacy laws, to provide its services consistent with EBAYC's program, support the educational success and goals of students, and to evaluate the impact of its program on students at School(s).

V. DURATION

The term of this MOU is from 07/01/2015 to 06/30/2019

VI. TERMINATION

Either party may terminate this MOU at any time, without cause, with 30 day written notice to the other party. This agreement may be amended by mutual consent of the parties. All amendments must be in writing and signed by both parties.

VII. HOLD HARMELSS/INDEMNITY

Each party to this MOU agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the other for and from any claims, causes of action, or any other proceeding of any type or kind that is made against the other where such claim, cause of action or other proceeding arises from the conduct, act, omission, or commission by the other party.

Dear Ms. Ma,

This letter explains the East Bay Asian Youth Center (EBAYC) policy for tuberculosis testing, fingerprinting and child abuse and neglect reporting.

EBAYC employees are not permitted to come into contact with students at any OUSD school sites until EBAYC receives their negative TB test results, fingerprint clearance and re-arrest records from the State of California - Department of Justice, and from the Federal Bureau of Investigation pursuant to Section 11105.3 of the California Penal Code and Section 15660 of the California Welfare and Institutions Code. No EBAYC employees who have been convicted of a violent or serious felony may come into contact with students.

EBAYC employees fully comply with the California Child Abuse and Neglect Reporting Act guidelines to report suspicions of possible child abuse and neglect to the appropriate reporting agencies.

Overview

East Bay Asian Youth Center (EBAYC) is a nonprofit organization that was founded in 1976 in Berkeley by Asian American high school youth who were sons and daughters of Japanese, Chinese and Filipino immigrants. In 2012, EBAYC merged with the Oakland Asian Student Educational Services (OASES), a volunteer program that provides individualized academic assistance, to become one organization. Today, EBAYC seeks to support youth to be safe, smart and socially responsible and serves a racially and culturally diverse membership of nearly 2,000 youth (51% API, 24% Latino, and 21% African American) who reside in the Chinatown, Eastlake and San Antonio neighborhoods of Oakland.

Services

EBAYC builds strategic partnerships with schools, city and county governments, and community organizations; and establishes trusting relationships with families to provide seamless services to support youth. Our partnerships with ten neighborhood schools support our students to achieve academic success by providing extended summer and after-school learning opportunities.
