Therefore, the CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws.
- 3. Conflict of Interest—CONTRACTOR shall abide by and be subject to all applicable OUSD policies, regulations, statutes or other laws regarding conflict of interest. CONTRACTOR shall not hire any OUSD employee to perform the services in this MOU, and affirms that to the best of its knowledge no such conflict presently exists. CONTRACTOR agrees to alert OUSD in writing if and when a potential conflict does arise.
- 4. Family Education Rights and Privacy Act—CONTRACTOR shall observe District policies and regulations, and state and federal laws, including the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, commonly known as FERPA, related to the confidentiality of pupil and personnel records.
- C. TB and Fingerprinting Clearance—Ensure that all CONTRACTOR personnel, including subcontractors, who will be on OUSD premises have been: (a) fingerprinted; (b) submitted to DOJ and FBI criminal background check via Live Scan or a similar service as required by the Education Code, and (c) taken a tuberculosis test during the current fiscal year. Please see Section IV for the relevant documentation that is required.

D. Insurance

- 1. General Liability: EITHER (a) CONTRACTOR maintains general liability insurance that names OUSD as an additional insured, for operations, students, volunteers, and personnel at location where CONTRACTOR provides programs/services with at least \$1 Million in coverage, and furnish certificate of said insurance to OUSD OR (b) CONTRACTOR is not required to maintain general liability insurance under this agreement if the Risk Management Officer signs a waiver of insurance. Please see Section IV for the relevant documentation that is required.
- 2. Workers' Compensation: If CONTRACTOR employs any person to perform work in connection with this MOU, CONTRACTOR shall procure and

maintain at all times during the performance of such work, Workers' Compensation Insurance in conformance with the laws of the State of California and federal laws, when applicable. The CONTRACTORS' Employers' Liability Insurance shall not be less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per accident or disease. Please see Section IV for the relevant documentation that is required.

- E. Communication—Communicate with School(s) and OUSD staff, both formally and informally, to ensure, to the best of the program's ability, that the CONTRACTOR'S services are aligned with the School(s) and OUSD's mission and objectives and are adequately meeting student's needs. At the request of School(s) or OUSD staff, provide reasonable data and information to students participating in the CONTRACTOR's program.
- F. Confidentiality—CONTRACTOR shall maintain strict confidentiality of all information about individual students received under this MOU and will not disseminate such information without the express written consent of OUSD. CONTRACTOR will comply with FERPA, and will be allowed to use the data received to solicit funding to continue to expand its services/program, so long as there is no information from which the identity of any student in the CONTRACTOR's program as a participant could be made.
- G. Register With/Update Community Partner Platform—Contractor shall register in OUSD's Community Partner Platform database and perform annual updates by August 31 of each year, to maintain full and complete up-to-date information.

IV. Required Documents

CONTRACTOR CANNOT commence the services agreed to in this MOU until it has submitted the following documents:

A. TB and Fingerprinting Clearance:

Attach clearance letter from Agency/Community-Based Organization/Non-Profit Organization on agency letterhead verifying all personnel, including subcontractors, have been Fingerprinted/Criminal Background Checked and have TB clearance for this current fiscal year and signed by authorized personnel.

B. Insurance:

Students identified may be protected by the use of ID numbers.
 - Provide CONTRACTOR with any other student information reasonably necessary to provide its services consistent with the CONTRACTOR's program and to evaluate the impact of its program on students at School(s).

Scope of Work

SEEK is a three-week engineering immersion program designed to expose students from underrepresented communities to STEM fields. Its mission is to increase elementary school students' aptitude in math and science and their interest in pursuing engineering careers. SEEK students engage in interactive, team-based engineering projects led by NSBE collegiate students and industry professionals, who serve as instructors and program facilitators. This summer, the program will be available for students in grades 3–5. Students will work in teams, using their knowledge to solve problems and create products while discovering the underlying math and science principles involved in these processes. Each week, the student participants will take on a new project, culminating with a presentation, design competition and physical competitions on the concluding Friday.

Activities and Curriculum:

Curriculum provided by the Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE). SAE International's A World In Motion® (AWIM) is a teacher-administered, industry volunteer-assisted program that brings science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) education to life in the classroom for students in Kindergarten through Grade 12. Benchmarked to the national standards, AWIM incorporates the laws of physics, motion, flight and electronics into age-appropriate hands on activities that reinforce classroom STEM curriculum. Some activities include but are not limited to the following;

The Catapult:

Students have the opportunity to construct a medieval trebuchet from balsa wood. Students will design and experiment with different counterweights and lever lengths, all the while learning the mathematics that apply



to moving projectiles. The students will also learn concepts like horizontal and vertical motion as well as energy transfer.

Gravity Cruiser:

Student teams design and construct a vehicle that is powered by gravity. A weighted lever connected to an axle by string rotates on its fulcrum; as the weight descends it causes the axle attached to the string to rotate, propelling the cruiser forward. Concepts explored include potential and kinetic energy, friction, inertia, momentum, diameter, circumference, measurement, graphing, and constructing a prototype.

Fuel Cell:

Using a PEM Fuel Cell as the primary power source, student teams design, build, and test prototype vehicles which they must then present to an audience. The AWIM Fuel Cells Challenge requires students to explore physical science concepts such as force, friction and energy transformations as well as environmental concepts such as green design, and incorporates mathematics concepts as student teams collect, analyze and display data.

Tracking and Measurement:

NSBE measures each seek camper's pre/post program knowledge with brief tests developed for each grade. The tests consist of:

- Open-ended questions about student' interest in math and science and knowledge of what engineers do, to begin a profile of student participants.
- Questions based on math and concepts that students should have learned in their previous school year, to assess participants' academic standards
- Questions based on the SEEK program curriculum (multiple choice and vocabulary matching questions) to serve as an indicator of the academic impact of the program

The research will allow NSBE to create a valuable academic profile of SEEK campers' STEM abilities and interest in engineering, as well as gauge any impact on their academic performance.



Statement of Qualifications

The National Society of Black Engineers (NSBE) created the Summer Engineering Experience for Kids (SEEK) to address the underrepresentation of African-American students in STEM fields, so that the United States may remain competitive in today's global economy. NSBE provides early STEM exposure to students beginning in 3rd grade through the 12th grade. Aligning with the NSBE mission statement "to increase the number of culturally responsible Black engineers who excel academically, succeed professionally and positively impact the community."

The SEEK Program succeeds in providing:

- Positive, African-American, collegiate NSBE members as role models
- Early exposure to math, science and engineering concepts
- Group-based learning projects, designed to maximize creativity and ingenuity
- Annual engagement
- No eligibility requirements

In 2007, the Battelle Memorial Institute awarded NSBE a founding grant that established the Summer Engineering Experience for Kids. The program's mission was to increase minority elementary school students' knowledge in math and science, interest in pursuing engineering careers, and educational aspirations. It currently has expanded to 17 sites in 16 cities across the United States and served more than 15,000 students. NSBE's long-term goal is to contribute to producing 10,000 black bachelor's degree recipients in engineering annually by 2025.

The Summer Engineering Experience for Kids (SEEK) program is one of the National Society of Black Engineers' (NSBE) contributions to increasing the representation of black students in the Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math fields. This 3-week program is designed to expose black children to STEM fields as early as the 3rd grade and through 12th grade. Students participate from 8:30am – 3:30pm daily, giving each student 105 contact hours per summer. The program utilizes NSBE collegiate members as student mentors, the majority of whom are black and majoring in STEM fields.

The mission of the Summer Engineering Experience for Kids is "To increase elementary school students' aptitude in math and science and their interest in pursuing STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) career fields, by having them engage in interactive, team-based engineering projects."

The Summer Engineering Experience for Kids (SEEK) was started in 2007 in Washington, DC and has since expanded to 19 cities, in total, across the USA and has served more than 15,000 students since its inception. We currently have been able to reach students in the following cities:

SEEK recruits NSBE collegiate and alumni members to serve as Mentors. Our Mentors are tasked with teaching engineering concepts in a fun and motivating environment. They are part friend, part counselor, part teacher, and the foundation upon which the SEEK program is built. Approximately 85% of mentors are undergraduates majoring in engineering or other STEM disciplines. All Mentors are required to go through a week of training and preparation prior to the program starting. Training focuses on child and program safety, leadership, classroom management, and curriculum implementation. All staff are active members of the National Society of Black Engineers who have completed medical screening and criminal background checks.

The SEEK Program has had notable impact on several levels some including;

- 100% Parent recommendation
- 81% of students indicated their participation in the SEEK camp made them more interested in engineering
- Expansion of vocabulary use focused on engineering curriculum
- Parents indicated exposure to African American role models was a positive impact fort their children
- Parents indicated students gained self confidence
- 98% of parents indicated they would send their child to another SEEK camp
