About McKinney-Vento

McKinney-Vento is a federal law that provides immediate enrollment to homeless students. The program provides supplemental educational services and social supports to youth and families who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence. This means students sharing housing with one or more families, living in emergency or transitional shelters, staying in hotels/motels, trailer parks/campgrounds, or somewhere not designated for sleeping. This can also include unaccompanied youth (students not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian).

The services provided by our program include enrollment assistance, school supplies, tutoring, backpacks, advocacy, housing referrals and assistance with transportation.

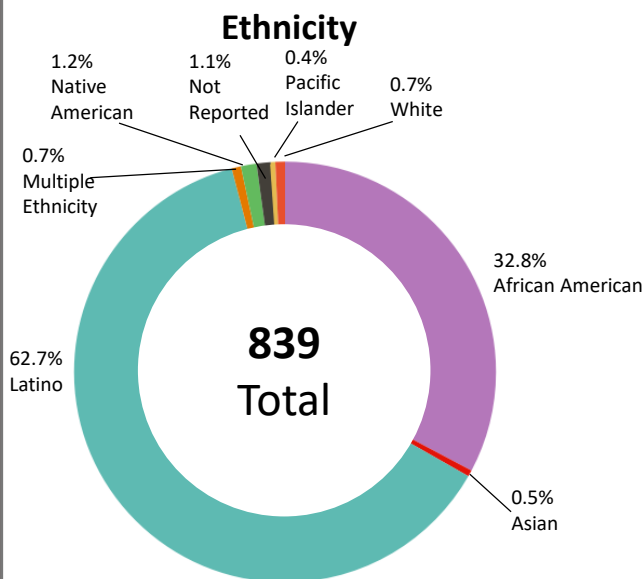

Housing



90% of homeless students were temporarily doubled up. Other students lived in temporary shelters (3.8%), hotels/motels (2.7%), or were temporarily unsheltered (3.2%).

17 families were housed.

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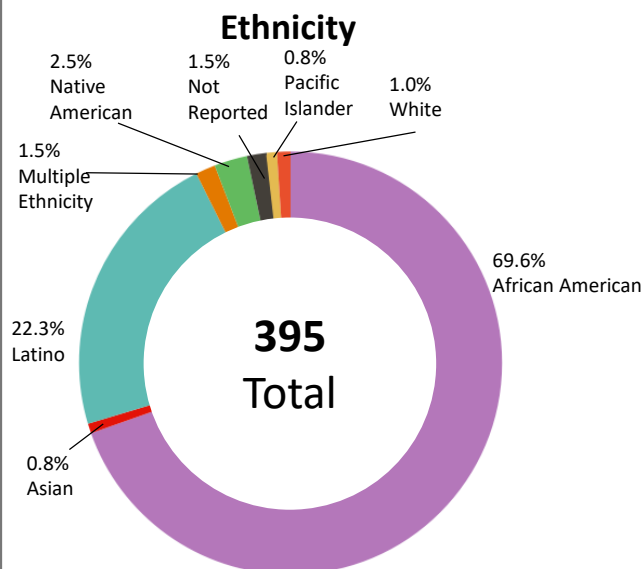

A Newcomer is defined as a student who has been in the United States for less than 3 years and who speaks a language other than English at home.

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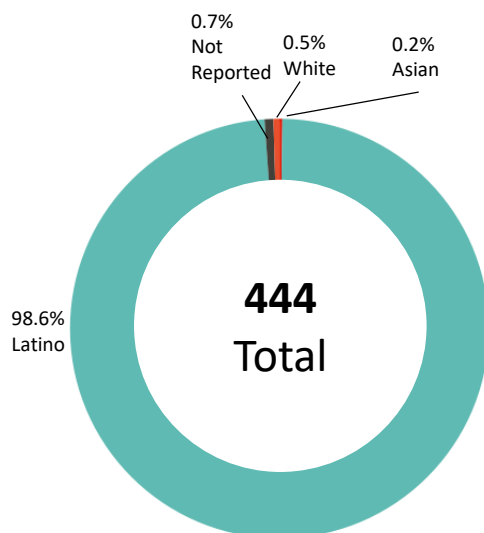
