OUSD Charter Renewal Standards

- I: The school is academically sound
- II: The school is demonstrably likely to be able to implement the proposed program
- III: The school's plan for a future charter term are "reasonably comprehensive"
- Evidence considered by OUSD staff:
- Comparison Schools and Comparison Student Group Analysis
- School Performance Analysis: State Dashboard data and CORE growth
- School Quality Review site visit
- Operations and Compliance: enrollment, financials, Notices of Concern, other

Note: Pursuant to the requirements of SB 1290, the District "shall consider increases in pupil academic achievement for all groups of pupils served by the charter school as the most important factor in determining whether to grant a charter renewal."

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Strengths and Challenges

Strengths


- Outperformed comparison school in both ELA and Math in the majority of years for which there is data.
- Strong A-G graduation rates of 100% for the two years with available data.
- African American students at COVAH have substantially higher test scores and a higher graduation rate than the district average, based on limited available data.
- Unique instructional program provides students with exposure to the arts as well as opportunity to participate in college classes for college credit.

Challenges

- Consistently low enrollment and slow enrollment growth school remains under 100 students despite serving grades 9-12.
- Lack of COVAH Board focus on sustainability and viability
- Student body could more closely reflect the demographics of OUSD




Comparison School Analysis – Test Scores

Low-income	1 of 1	+35	1 of 1	+2

Due to the small size of the school, COVAH did not serve statistically significant numbers of Latinx students, students with disabilities, and English Learners to have reportable data. 2016-17 was the only year for which there was data available for African American students and low-income students.




Enrollment Over Time
