### **OVERVIEW & OBJECTIVE**

Twenty-two OUSD district schools and charter schools have unspent Measure N funds from the 2019-2020 fiscal year. During the November Measure N Commission meeting, the 2019-2020 Measure N Carryover Justification Form for six schools were approved.

Of the remaining sixteen schools seeking approval, eight have submitted their 2019-2020 Measure N Carryover Justification Form that articulate the context that contributed to the carryover, the amount of carryover, the percentage of Measure N funds that are being carried over, and a clear budget for the carryover funds. Schools also indicated if their budgets reflected already approved expenditures and the rationale for seeking additional funds. The remaining eight schools with carryover funds have requested for additional time to develop their budgets and will submit their 2019-2020 Measure N Carryover Justification Form to the January Measure N Commission meeting.

Seven of the eight schools who have submitted their 2019-2020 Measure N Carryover Justification Form for approval have carryover funds that are ten percent or more than the Measure N funds received. Per Measure N Commission policy, these nine schools require direct Measure N commission approval of the carryover justification form.

Measure N staff have reviewed the 2019-2020 Measure N Carryover Justification Forms and provided feedback to school sites that were addressed before submission to the Measure N Commission.

| Consultant Contract: Work-Based Learning (WBL) stipends for students in the Architecture and Media Academies participating in Work Based Learning career preparation and training experiences. Students will participate in interships throughout the year and through June 30, 2021. (40 stipends x \$1,000 per student = \$40,000) WBL stipends will be facilitated through our existing partnership with Bay Area Community Resources (BACR).  This past summer we had 42 students in interships from both Media and Architecture academies. Students participated in the Media Summer Institute, Laney courses, and with internship host sites. We will be able provides mall group internships on campus in the Spring 2021 and follow Alameda County Health Guidelines. OUSD has the legal basis pending the academies designing the projects and getting site admin and district approval. Working in the wood shops or outdoors with distancing, as well as setting up the new CTE classroom spaces and working on client based media productions. This past summer our Media director brought small group to campus to facilitate student work on campus and they won feature in the Fruitvale Film Festival. This allocation is not an existing allocation anywhere in our 2020-2021 school budget. Student interest is high and we are confident we can spend these funds to support 40 students. We are particularly hopeful about the paid internship opportunities students can benefit from during the school year that allow them to develop and demonstrate pathway relevant skills and knowledge. Students will be able to complete media or architecture internships related to the pathway field by completing client work for school-based and external clients. In many cases they may be able to complete this client work online, thorugh remote desktops and use of industry applications online (i.e. Adobe Premier). | Computers: Media Academy will purchase computers to support the CTE pathway exposure classes for ninth graders. Each student will use their computer to complete media projects, to support students in having access to industry-grade digital media technology and software to be able to complete industry-level design tasks and projects. These computers will be added to another bulk of computers being purchased to equal a class set for incoming 9th graders. 10 computers @ \$1,609.00 = \$16,090.00 + \$3,777.86 for sales tax and recycle fee = \$19,867.86 (additional amount needed for additional fees will be covered by other site resources). Allocation for computers that exist in media and architecture academy will be used for students in grades 10-12 already registered into those academies.
