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Work-Based Learning Continuum

Career Awareness

Learning ABOUT work.

Build awareness of the variety of careers available and the role of postsecondary education; broaden student options.

Sample Student Learning Outcome

Student can articulate the type of postsecondary education and training required in the career field and its importance to success in that field.

Experience Defined by:

- One-time interaction with partner(s), often for a group of students
- Designed primarily by adults to broaden student's awareness of a wide variety of careers and occupations

Experiences might include:

Workplace tour

- Guest speaker
- Career fair
- · Visit parents at work

Career Exploration

Learning ABOUT work.

Explore career options and postsecondary for the purpose of motivating students and to inform their decision making in high school and postsecondary education.

Sample Student Learning Outcome

Student can give at least two examples of how the student's individual skills and interests relate to the career field and/or occupations.

Experience Defined by:

- One-time interaction with partner(s) for a single student or small group
 Personalized to connect to emerging
- student interests. • Student takes an active role in selecting and shaping the experience

Depth in particular career fields.
Builds skills necessary for in-depth

work-based learning Experiences might include:

Informational interview

• Job shadow

· Virtual exchange with a partner

Career Preparation: Practicum and Internships

Learning THROUGH work.

Apply learning through practical experience that develops knowledge and skills necessary for success in careers and postsecondary education.

Sample Student Learning Outcome

Student builds effective collaborative working relationships with colleagues and customers; is able to work with diverse teams, contributing appropriately to the team effort.

An Experience Differentiated by:

- · Direct interaction with partners over time
- Application of skills transferable to a variety of careers
- Activities have consequences and value beyond success in the classroom.
- Learning for student and benefit to partner are equally valued

Experiences might include:

- Integrated project with multiple interactions with professionals
- Student-run enterprise with partner involvement
- Virtual enterprise or other extended online interactions with partners
- Projects with partners through industry student organizations
- Service learning and social enterprises with

Career Training

Learning FOR work.

Train for employment and/or postsecondary education in a specific range of occupations.

Sample Student Learning Outcome Student demonstrates knowledge and skills specific to employment in a

range of occupations in a career field.

An Experience Differentiated by:

- Interaction with partners over extended period of time
- Benefit to the partner is primary and learning for student is secondary
- Develop mastery of occupation specific skills
- Complete certifications or other requirements of a specific range of occupations

Experiences might include:

- Internship required for credential or entry to occupation
- Apprenticeship
- Clinical experience




Highlights: Career Awareness



Different Approaches:

- Future Focused Fridays (no direct cost)
 - District wide audiences focusing on specific populations.
- NEPRIS (Perkins)
 - o Virtual Guest Speaker Network
 - Teachers can request specialized speakers or to virtually visit their class
 - Provide students feedback on industry aligned classroom projects
- Academy Career Days (no direct cost)
 - Pathways students engage with speakers through zoom sessions hosted by academy leads




Highlights: Career Exploration

- 2020 Virtual Oakland MFG Week: Highlighted 5 different Manufacturers in the Bay Area and 5 Laney CTE Programs
- O Presentations to Schools
- Partner with agencies to host events



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Highlights: Career Preparation



- "Reimagining Public Safety in Oakland" High-quality PBL with deep partner engagement
- Law & Social Justice Academy students surveyed the community, researched alternative responses to major categories of current police calls (mental health crises, homelessness, traffic/vehicles, gender violence, etc) and produced industry-aligned products to present their findings to the **Oakland City Council's** *Reimagining Public Safety Task Force* for how the city should reinvest money from OPD to better address safety needs in the community

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- Project partners served as guest speakers, an authentic audience, and project consultants:

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- Councilmember Loren Taylor and staff

 - d. Building from a job toward a career plan




Student stipends funding from Walter & Elise Haas Fund

Highlights: Career Training

Virtual: Youth Workforce Readiness Sessions

- Bi-weekly Sessions are designed to:
 - Assist students in honing their employment search and preparation skills
 - Support student success while in the job
 - Connect students with local youth development agencies funded to provide individualized case management, employment placement, and supportive services
 - Provide opportunities for students to engage in meaningful conversations with local employers regarding their hiring process for





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Highlights: Career Training

- Cypress Mandela, Summer 2020: 1st week of June received Approval from OUSD Legal and Board to moved forward with In-Person Training
 - o 12 of 13 students complete the program
 - 7 of the 13 were graduates, 3 stayed to complete the 16 week program.
 - The 4 graduates that didn't stay went on to get jobs in construction field

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- 10 of the 13 received OSHA 10 Certifications
- Training Included:
 - Confined spaces
 - Self Contained Breathing Apparatus
- Summer 2021 Goals:

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- o 25-35 students at CMTC
- o 5-10 students at Rising Sun Center for Opportunities
- o 5 Students at West Oakland Job Resource Center







