What is A - G?

To meet minimum admission requirements for California's CSU and UC system schools, high school graduates must complete 15 year long high school courses with a letter grade of C or better — at least 11 of them prior to your last year of high school.









What is A - G?

At a minimum scholars must complete the following:

English - 4 Years

Math - 3 Years

Social Studies - 3 Years

Science - 2 Years

World Language - 2 Years

Visual and Performing Arts - 1 Year

Elective - 1 Year












% of Students passing all A-G Courses taken in the year










% of Students receiving A, B or C in all A-G Courses taken in the year










Cohort Graduation and Dropout Rate

Grades/Evaluation Of Student Achievement

Grades for Achievement

Grades for achievement for secondary students shall be reported for each marking period as follows:

Α	(90-100%)	Outstanding Achievement	4.0 grade points
В	(80-89%)	Above Average Achievement	3.0 grade points
С	(70-79%)	Average Achievement	2.0 grade points
D	(60-69%)	Below Average Achievement	1.0 grade points
F	(0-59%)	Little or No Achievement	0 grade points
I		Incomplete

Current Grading Policy

OAKLAND UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT Board Policy

BP 5121

The teacher of each course shall determine the student's grade. The grade assigned by the teacher shall not be changed by the Board or the Superintendent except as provided by law, Board policy and administrative regulation. (Education Code 49066)









No D Policy

OEA BA

Article 9 - ACADEMIC FREEDOM 9.1 General 9.1.3

Teachers shall have the responsibility for determining grades for students in the Oakland Unified School District in accordance with the standards for grading as established by District policy. Such grades shall not be changed except as permitted in Section 49066 of the Education Code.

Teachers shall evaluate a student's work in relation to standards which apply to all students at his/her grade level. Teachers shall inform students and parents/guardians how student achievement will be evaluated in the classroom.









HSLLO 21-22: Stakes in the Ground

If we:

- Know what anti-Blackness looks like and are able to identify the practices, procedures, and structures in our schools that are consistent with our understanding of anti-Blackness, and are able to identify and implement culturally relevant alternatives.
- Create the conditions that motivate all scholars to attend school every day
- Develop and implement a 21st century grading policy (Dump the D)
- Integrate literacy instruction across the curriculum in grades 9 - 12

Then we will:

- Increase the number of 9th grade students earning a C or better in A-G courses
- Increase graduation rates
- Increase the number of scholars graduating A-G ready
- Increase the number of scholars transitioning to technical, 2-year and 4-year colleges, apprenticeships, career and earning certifications



Implementing the 4 pillars of Linked Learning with fidelity

Strategy to Increase Graduation/A - G

Strategy

- 21st Century grading inquiry
- Master Schedule assessment and support
- Transcript evaluation and education
- Require all scholars to take and pass A-G classes to graduate
- Credit Recovery
- Quarterly transcript communication with families
- Increase Dual Enrollment participation
- Comprehensive supports

Outcome

- New grading policy that doesn't include the D category
- All scholars are programmed to meet A
 G
- All stakeholders know what A G is and how to read a transcript
- A G aligned scholar schedules
- Failed classes are retaken ASAP
- Informed advocates
- More competitive scholars
- Our scholars reach their full potential

No D Policy

One example of a No D Policy:

- Eliminating the D category
- Lowering the C- threshold to 65%
- Notable exceptions:
 - Students with significance attendance problems
 - Students that were failing at the time we went to SIP and didn't participate beyond that point
- All teachers expressed confidence that the policy was helpful overall
- A 90 100
- B 80 89
- C 65 79
- I/F 64 0 (Incompletes should be changed within 6 weeks)











No D Policy

Another example of a No D Policy:

A: 90 - 100

B: 80 - 89

C: 70 - 79

ABC School does not assign D's in order to align with the UC/CSU A-G course requirement grading policies.

Incompletes are assigned in place of an "F" if there is a possibility to improve the grade to passing. Incompletes should be changed within 6 weeks.

Student's grades may be "bumped up" at a teacher's discretion (examples: improvement over the semester, rounding, curving, etc). But you may not assign a grade lower than what a student earned numerically.
