President London reported the District received two Golden Bell Awards at the CSBA Conference in San Diego for our Meaningful Student Engagement (MSE) Program and

Custodial Services.

We were recognized for invigorating high schools in Oakland, our youth and adult partnerships, our emphasis on student action research, and the outstanding structure for our young people to voice their concerns.

Superintendent Smith said information is being shared tonight from schools that have exited Program Improvement and we are celebrating the good work of the schools and their great staff.

Carolyn Howard, Principal, Howard Elementary School, used a powerpoint to share information on number of students in proficient and advanced since 2007 in English Language Arts and Math and the improvement in the school's API. Ms. Howard said their goals were accomplished through intervention strategies for their targeted students and

through student engagement strategies, peer tutors, classroom instructional strategies and practices aligned with their after-school program's goals, professional development, and team work.

Superintendent Smith said there have been questions on the status on the transition in supporting families and students from the schools that are closing into other schools. He introduced Denise Saddler.

Denise Saddler, Director of Transitions, provided an update on team activities. She said, since October 27, staff, has been supporting more than 906 families through the transition process and meeting with students who would have to move on to another school because of the five schools that are closing. Staff has met with 235 parents at Lakeview, 100% of the Lazear and Marshall parents, and 99% of the parents from Maxwell Park, At Santa Fe, they met with 152 of the 158 parents.

Ms. Saddlerr reviewed the meeting process for parents at the five sites. She said District staff were at school sites from 7:30 A.M. to 7:30 P.M. on most nights. Community meetings were held and they interfaced with after-school programs. Ms. Saddler said the next steps in the process included the scheduling of bus tours for schools to welcome students to their new schools. Staff will be following the students through the remainder of the school year and onto the first day of school.

Superintendent Smith introduced staff to provide an update on the mutual match conversation following the school closures and how we will take care of staff that are in those schools. We have been having conversations about increasing the ability for all of our schools to protect the autonomy at the site level and to be included in the selection of staff. We are in the conversation with teachers at the closing schools and with the OEA.

Brigitte Marshall, Associate Superintendent, Human Resources, used a powerpoint for her update on facilitated mutual matching. She stated there is a much broader-based strategy in the process of Mutual Matching which is an indication of one of the core concepts that are working to maximize the fit or the matching of all individuals with the District and is central to positioning our staff to be successful and to thrive which is particularly true with teachers who work with our children every day.

Ms. Marshall said our desire is to maximize the potential of teachers to find themselves in a position to be successful. She reviewed the objectives of mutual matching, including the assurance that all students have well-qualified teachers in every classroom and have a process that honors and respects teachers as education professionals. Our current practice has resulted in consolidated teachers sometimes being received at school sites with less than enthusiasm. She said we envision a process that allows school communities and teachers to come together in a way that demonstrates shared desire to work together and build on the successes of a school community. We would like to retain our effective teachers, however, due to current practice, the District has experienced a late declaration of vacancies and not being competitive in the engagement of teachers who are looking for jobs.

Ms. Marshall reviewed information on Round 1 on the mutual matching process which begins on March 12 to open external hiring for hard to staff areas and to simultaneously engage in an internal only hiring match period for most of the credentials areas and for

school communities and teachers to learn about each other. We have talked about providing an opportunity for teachers to engage in a voluntary transfer process which will result in additional vacancies being created. She said the District has thought to provide teachers with the opportunity to create a profile on their credentials and skills, interests, experience; and for schools to develop a profile on their school culture and condition to give teachers as much information about opportunities that exist; and to have a event to showcase all schools simultaneously to provide teachers with the opportunity to learn about school cultures and conditions. The District proposes to offer teachers five days of sub coverage to visit school sites of potential interest. She said we have had conversations about school sites having the opportunity to visit teachers at the teacher's home school site to get a sense of the teacher's teaching style and interaction with students. At the end of Round 1, all teachers in the talent pool would be asked to indicate between 5 and 10 choices of schools where they could be successful and schools would be asked for a list of 5 and 10 teachers who they would be enthusiastic about welcoming into their school community. Based on those two lists, we would then look for matches. There have been discussions about seniority being a factor in conversations and being used as a tie breaker where more than one teacher indicated the same school as a preference. Ms. Marshall said we have a sense that few teachers will not experience a match. In cases of no match, we have thought about other options, including the possibility of offering teachers years of service credit being purchased on their behalf or early retirement possibilities.

Ms. Marshall said the operational pieces include providing a cash incentive to teachers to declare early their intent to retire or resign to get clarity on vacancies; to have leadership aligned around the need to communicate clearly on all aspects of this process to get clear declaration of vacancies through budget planning process; to provide support to teachers; and to remove any kind of budgeting incentive that might encourage school sites to hire less senior teachers out of a concern that they cost less.

Director Yee asked about March 15 letters which seem to be in the same time period as the initial phase of the mutual matching process.

Director Gallo asked for information from staff on the number of parents at Lazear that were granted their first request, second choice, or did not get any of their choices? Where did they end up? If they had to travel, who is covering the cost to the new school? He said the goals were to place a student in a school setting better than the one than they left and that the process would result in savings.

Regarding teaching staffing, Director Gallo said we are trying to get away from the subs in the classroom. Now we are recommending 5 days per 60 teachers to check out other sites to ensure there is a good fit. There is a cost factor to both the child, as well as the budget. Director Gallo requested data from Lazear and Lakeview on where did the children end up. We made big promises and commitments at the beginning of the process.

Vice President Hinton Hodge asked what did not work in the process and what is our plan to do better? She noted there are contractual issues in the mutual matching process and the District needs to be responsible in any policy work that needs to be done.

Director Spearman asked about student transportation and stated the District needs to be responsible to ensure students are able to get to the school.

Director Spearman asked about the State mandate of March 15 letters. Ms. Marshall said we are engaged in an analysis of hiring trend data to include budget projections and school site planning to inform a decision about whether any kind of precautionary layoff noticing is necessary. We are not at the point yet of making a determination. Superintendent Smith said we are mandated to give letters by March 15.

PUBLIC COMMENTS ON THIS ITEM

Emily Sacks, resouce specialist, Redwood Heights, said direct supervisors and colleagues are not involved in the interview process for teachers. School sites make the decision about who is right for their school. It is an issue of trust for teachers and school staffs to make good decisions who would be a good fit for their school and their students. We need to ensure that all voices are heard.

Mercedes Harrison said the 98 out of 99 were forced to sign the options paper by last Friday. That wasn't contacting the parents. At Lakeview they got notice of having a bus tour in 24 hours before it occurred and it did not include all the schools that were available. She asked about the cost of the transition.

Leo Fuchs stated we need to be fair to children if there are layoffs again and we need a policy that involves school communities in the hiring decisions for teacher vacancies.

Carmelita Reyes, principal, Oakland International High School, stated a group of principals were asked by the Superintendent what they needed to be successful. She said 100 percent of them were in support of site based control of personnel and part of that is a mutual match situation. There have been principal meetings and principal surveys. They need mutual match in order for their school sites to move academic achievement of kids. They have more data on professional development and evaluation.

Marva McInnis, teacher, Encompass Elementary School, stated she sees the importance of seniority in placement of teachers, but she would welcome the opportunity to compete for her job if that is what best serves the students.

Benjie Actenberg, 8th grade teacher, Melrose Leadership Academy, and OEA Executive board member, spoke in support about the mutual matching process which would bring back conversation within a school site about who works at the site, including the principal and teachers and would create stable school environments in which all teachers can thrive. He asked how we would deal with giving teachers time off to visit other school sites and support teachers that do not find a match.

Kay Swenson, OEA officer and teacher, Sankofa Academy, spoke on the mutual matching process for new hires and possible voluntary transfers. She said when teachers are consolidated, there is a stigma that follows the teacher. Some people may assume the teachers are undesirable because they come from a school that failed. She said seniority is the only objective measure that protects teachers from discrimination.

Betty Olson-Jones, OEA president, stated autonomy over staffing is a distraction and is being pushed by folks that want to turn schools into charters. She said one cannot guarantee a good fit. She said we need to take teacher salaries out of the mix. Any teacher going to a new school should know all about the school. Teachers will self-select out of a

school that they do not think they would fit into. She said having a popularity contest and calling it mutual match is not going to work, but is a way to get rid of seniority and is union busting.

Morris Tatum, AFSCME Local 257, stated labor contracts built the District and it seems the District wishes to forget about seniority and people's right. He said the mutual match is another merit system to pick and choose. He said it is union busting and will result in more discrimination charges against the District.

Ben Tapscott, New McClymonds Committee, said the District is closing 4 more Black schools and the subjective criteria was not a criteria at all. There is a total of 8 Black schools and 1 Latino schools closed in Oakland. He said his group presented a proposal to save the District \$14 million by consolidations.

Jim Mordecai said the mutual match discussions left out the Education Code. He said education trust got passed which says that Title I principals have the power. A Title I principal that does not wish to stay in the District has the power to decide on his personnel.

Public Comments on All Non-Agenda Items Within the Subject Matter Jurisdiction of the District - Up to 45 Minutes - December 14, 2011.

Josh Velasquez, Lakeview parent and spokesperson for Concerned Parents and Community Coalition (CPACC), distributed notices of intention to recall Board Members Kakishiba, Yee. Dobbins, Hodge, and President London. The people of Oakland seek to recall Board Members in Districts 1, 2, 3, and 4 and 6 due to their willful disregard for public safety of our children and their inability to engage affected community and decisions concerning school closures. He said the proponents of the recall petition demand election for successors. He said the Education Code was ignored in the closure process. He said no competent explanation on the selection criteria and budget evaluation were given regarding the targeted schools. Community input and proposals initiated by the public that included other alternatives to the budget and closing criteria were ignored. He stated provisions were not made for students who are currently in the after-school programs or

students with special needs. Oakland residents demand to have a Board with a strong leadership and sensitivity to our students and that take into consideration the impact on their lives by the decisions to close schools. He said the community must be involved in the decisionmaking to keep our students thriving with quality schools in every neighborhood. He said this is an opportunity for Board Members not to turn their back to the community. He said the rights of the parents and community have been taken away during the process of closing schools.

Edward Samaniego, Maxwell Park International Academy community, urged the Board to keep all Oakland schools open and find other means of saving money. Mr. Samaniego submitted a paper on the issue of closing public schools in Philadelphia.

Etha Jones, CPACC/NAACP, stated the Superintendent made a remark that the longer students stay at a school, the better they will do which is ironic because five schools are being closed. She said it is regrettable to recall the Board for not listening to parents.

Ben Tapscott, New McClymonds Committee, noted in 2005 McClymonds had 800 students and they went to the small school concept and struggled for four years. The school enrollment is now at 283. They are requesting one-half million dollars to energize the school and they want the grading policy consistent with other schools. They are requesting the school revert to its 2005 curriculum. They need to get ready for STEM and the school needs rewiring and AP classes.

Cora Harrison, Lakeview Elementary School community, asked why the District is closing Lakeview. She said people need this school.

Mikayla Harrison asked why the District is closing Lakeview? People need these schools.

Clifton Harrison, CPACC, commented on the transition process saying it was not going well. The District needs to re-evaluate the school closing process.

Relena Ellis spoke in support of the charter petition submitted by 100 Black Men.

Jack Gerson stated the root cause on failure of student achievement is due to poverty. He said budget cutting destroys in-school factors which penalize the poorest communities and affects class size and teacher longevity. He said closing schools will increase instability.

Tania Kappner, teacher, BAM representative, and OEA site representative, said deceit is unacceptable and will not fly anymore. She said the movement will continue to keep the 5 schools open and the movement wishes to get rid of any school board member that stands in the way of the Oakland community.

Evelia Villa, submitted a proposed charter renewal petition for Oakland Charter High School.

An unidentified speaker said closing schools should be the District's last choice. Closing schools should not be an option. Regarding Raheim Brown, he said the District has police working in the schools with guns that make \$90,000 and when the police services contract ends in 2012, the District should not renew it.

Mark Airgood, teacher and site rep at Brewer, said school closures were never about saving money and are about gentrification and trying to break the historic power of the community of Oakland.

Timothy Terry said we need a strong Board that develops student wealth and not focus on school closures. He said there are huge political prices to pay by closing schools.

Bob Mandel, former teacher, said there is money and the new Board will need to refuse to make the debt payments of \$6 million a year, demand that the debt be cancelled, and join with OEA in going after Wells Fargo and all the banks that got bailed out. He said the District needs to go after the Port which has more than \$30 billion a year in business. Mr. Mandel said mutual matching is union busting which is part of the plan for education busting and privatization and it was no accident that Ms. Marshall was chosen to deliver the message because she presided over the busting of adult education closing of services to 25.000 students.

Jeremy Miller, Education, Not Incarceration, said on January 22 Raheim Brown's life was taken by Oakland School Police Officers. He said when the Board returns from Winter Recess, the community will still be here and will not rest until there is justice for Raheim Brown, Jr.

Raheim Brown, Sr., said the District has a man who killed his son working in a school facility with children. The District should not have a person that frequently has a gun killing people around people and the District should get rid of him.

An unidentified speaker spoke about Raheim Brown, Jr. She described the bullet wounds suffered by Raheim Brown to his face and heart and the inability of his family to cope with their loss. She said the District is supposed to protect kids, not slaughter them.

An unidentified speaker said her son is in fifth grade and she is here to represent Raheim Brown. She stated it does not make sense when police make \$90,000 a year and at the same time schools are being closed and programs being closed in schools.

An unidentified speaker said the deployment of deadly force on our children is inexcusable and Raheim Brown should not be dead. She said Raheim's assassins was in the Administration Building lobby and is a huge disrespect to the family and community. She said we need civilian oversight that serve and protect each other.

Daniel Davis, Santa Fe Elementary School, said he assisted in getting the signatures of the recall document.

An unidentified speaker stated there is panic over school closures and the panic is palpable at restaurants and community meetings. She said rumors persist that Kaiser Elementary School is closing.

Morris Tatum, AFSCME Local 257, commented on the mutual match process and asked who would determine a good fit and how the process would not be discriminatory. He said ASCEND Elementary School allows volunteers to clean schools and the volunteers have not been fingerprinted or had TB skin tests.

Caroline Stern, Kaiser parent, said Kaiser is 47 percent African American and the children are scoring in the 800's. She said Kaiser is a safe haven for LGBT families.

Betty Olson-Jones, OEA President, said the closing of schools creates instability in neighborhoods and a rush to go charter. She stated two schools are being courted by the CEO of Education for Change. She said we need to work together and demand the State provide a quality education for every student.

Bill Patterson, NAACP and New McClymonds Committee, asked the District to accept and match the Investment and Innovation Grant and that the funds help McClymonds High School. He spoke in support of the Stem Program and Advanced Placement classes.

Ben Tapscott said eight Black schools were lost and black education in West Oakland has been totally destroyed. He said they are asking for assistance. Parents are still being told that McClymonds is full. Mr. Tapscott said the community is asking for the reopening of Marcus Foster School for fall 2012. He said KIPP students are telling other students on campus that Kipp students are smarter and the atmosphere is very divisive.

David Montes de Oca, Executive Director, Quality Community Schools Development, reviewed the configuration change recommendations for Greenleaf and Sankofa simultaneously. He said the presentations were made to the Teaching and Learning Committee on December 5 for both schools and the recommendation was to focus on key areas of enrollment, facilities, and the larger middle school strategy questions that have emerged.

Mr. Montes said staff is recommending approval of Greenleaf Elementary School currently serving K-5 to serve students in grades Pre-K through 8 beginning July 1, 2012 with its first class of sixth grade students. Staff is similarly recommending approval of Sankofa Academy currently serving grades Pre-K-5 to serve students in grades Pre-K through 8 beginning July 1, 2012, with its first class of sixth grade students.

Mr. Montes said the projected enrollment for sixth grade for Greenleaf for next year is 64 students and expects to continue to grow back approximately 60 students each year in the sixth grade and ultimately serve approximately 180 students in Grades 6-8. It is projected to serve approximately 400 K-5 students next year and 20 transitional K students. Mr. Montes said there will ultimately be 600 students to be served by the school at its full capacity in the next three years.

Mr. Montes said the implications for the enrollment is projected at approximately 12 to 15 students are expected to be retained by the District annually based on the number of students that have historically left the District after fifth grade leaving Greenleaf Elementary. It is anticipated those students will be retained at Greenleaf based upon the grade level expansion on an annual basis, resulting in an additional 35-45 students in grades 6-8 that might otherwise leave the District. There are projected 19 fewer sixth grade students at Frick Middle School, as a result of the trends of enrollment at Greenleaf, and approximately 16 fewer sixth grade students projected at Roots International as a resulted of the expanded grades from Greenleaf for 2012-13 and no more than two students at any of the other middle schools throughout the District.

Mr. Montes said the projected enrollment for sixth grade at Sankofa for next year is 27 students and 30 in the subsequent year. The school is continuing to expand and grow up its lower grades. Over time, it is expected to serve two classes of sixth, seventh and eighth grades. Mr. Montes said the implications for the enrollment is projected to retain approximately a third of its fifth graders that would otherwise leave the District similar to

the past which is ten out of the 30 students for next year and 30 students over the next 3 years. Similarly, there will be approximately 10 fewer sixth grade students at Claremont based on the history of the transition students from Sankofa Academy and approximately seven fewer sixth grade students at Westlake Middle School for 2012-13 as a result of the expanded grade and projected not more than two fewer students at any other District operated middle school based on the prior trends of the number of students that have left Sankofa Academy in the fifth grade.

Mr. Montes stated the K-8 program at Greenleaf is projected to be supported by existing facilities. There are upgrades to some portables to be accommodated from existing funds at the school.

Mr. Montes said Sankofa, due to its slower growth over the next two years, is expected to be accommodated within the existing facility and there would be a need for the addition of classrooms adjacent to the building that would grow at a rate of approximately two to four classrooms each year to about six classrooms over the next 3 to 4 years.

Director Yee said when we talk about grade configurations that include middle schools, like Life Academy, it does have some implications and it needs to be a system-wide discussion that all middle schools, including our traditional large middle schools, are in the mix.

MIDDLE SCHOOL STRATEGY

Maria Santos, Deputy Superintendent, Instruction, Leadership, and Equity in Action, reported on the middle school strategy. She stated the District has been engaged in the math program for sixth and seventh grade and in building teacher capacity to develop a higher quality program for all of our students. The initiative includes professional development for teachers and principals and looking at quality in the classroom; alignment of math courses of algebra and geometry in the middle school to high school level. Ms. Santos said ELA focused our attention on reading for students and a reading inventory to assess reading level for each student and interventions to extend the learning time and supported by technology. The common core state standards are being looked at in ELA and piloting writing assessments to engage kids in oral skills.

Deputy Superintendent Santos said a task force on middle schools would be initiated in January to look at links and systems needed for college and career readiness and types of innovations that will align with secondary pathway programs so that our Linked Learning initiative gets aligned at the middle school level. She said more information will be presented at the study session in January.

Mr. Montes said staff is recommending the grade configuration changes as proposed for Greenleaf Elementary and Sankofa Academy.

Timothy White, Assistant Superintendent, Facilities Management, said there are cost implications for the two sites. The portable option for Greenleaf amounts to approximately \$485,000 which is a permanent portable solution and we have a lease option solution, as well. Two portables became available this summer and that option is \$225,000 which includes the moving of the portables.

Mr. White said more classrooms are needed for the Sankofa expansion at a cost of one

million dollars which include six portables, utilities, and telephones. A permanent classroom option is available at a cost of \$16,000,000.

Director Spearman asked about the cost and number of classrooms at Sankofa. Mr. White said the cost is to accommodate the grade level expansion. The six classroom expenditure cost of \$1 million is low cost to accommodate the expansion of grade level.

Director Gallo asked where is the \$16,000,000 coming from for construction? Mr. White said \$16,000,000 is the option for a permanent two-story building on the campus of Washington. We believe we can accommodate those needs with a much lesser expenditure of \$1,000,000 which will come out of capital funds.

Director Gallo said there were other schools that made a good case of becoming K-8 and/or having their portables removed and we told them a bond measure may need to be passed to accommodate all those needs. He said we are building new schools or adding to schools, but yet we are closing other schools. If we are looking for space, we have space. Director Gallo stated he wants to be assured that we are not taking money from another school.

Mr. White said no funds would be diverted from the Glenview project which is in progress.

Mr. Montes said we expect the school will be able to in its current facility accommodate the first two years of its growth before needing to expand outside and adjacent to Sankofa. Similarly, to Greenleaf, the costs associated are specific to the two portables that are expected to be replaced.

Mr. Montes said the school has 15 classroom size spaces for both floors.

Director Kakishiba said the resolution was adopted by the Committee last week. Three spending priorities are framed as outcome, as opposed to dollar amounts or specific programs. He read the 3 priorities. He said the McClymonds recommendation is consistent with the West Oakland corridor work that the Superintendent is working on.

Director Yee asked if new money is involved or reallocated funds? What is a full offering of advanced placement courses? He asked if the initiatives of the full service community schools and the African American male achievements are raised to the level of Board priorities for 2012-13 budget?

Director Kakishiba said the allocation is under the purview of the Superintendent. The Committee did not define the Advanced Placement courses and the sense was that the Superintendent would report back to us on the context of the concrete conditions of the school population. The Board has not stated as a budget priority the African American Male Achievement. It is a priority in the Strategic Plan adopted by the Board.

Director Yee said there is an opportunity in the first priority to establish McClymonds High School as a performing STEM anchor, full service community, African American Male Achieving, public educational institution which would mean in the upcoming year, those 3 initiatives will be visible and result in the benchmarks established.

Director Kakishiba said there was discussion at the Special Board Meeting to capture all of the major initiatives that we are talking about in a school and to see it come alive as a clear concrete demonstration of what we are trying to do.

Director Spearman said McClymonds was lacking in the academic piece and we wanted to level the playing field and ensure McClymonds has a full complement of academic classes.

Vice President Hinton Hodge said she has had conversations with Mr. Montes around the conditions we need around the STEM corridor. West Oakland has a big issue around the perception of black safety in the community and she has thoughts about that as a potential priority and making sure school sites have security officers. Those are some complements that need to be in place for people to feel safe. It might mean stabilizing staff in our corridor schools specifically. Would these priorities do that? She appreciates the specificity, but she wants to be clear about the long-range objectives we have around corridor development and expansion and whether the priorities could be talked about.

Director Kakishiba stated the items raised by Vice President Hinton Hodge deserve more time and a facilitative process. If there are investments to be made, there are investments at McClymonds High School with the Superintendent returning with recommendations affecting elementary and preschool levels in the West Oakland area.

Superintendent Smith said the three guiding priorities were embedded in the Strategic Plan when it was adopted by the Board.

President London recommended more careful monitoring of our utilities bills and the work we are doing to reduce our utility costs, particularly, electricity, natural gas, water, and waste collection. Superintendent Smith said part of the deliverables for us this year is the balanced score card work and working on performance metrics.

Director Kakishiba stated this item was approved in Committee.

Gloria Gamblin, Budget Director, reviewed the Executive Summary on page 4. She said we have a 3 percent reserve. We are filing a qualified statement due to the uncertainties at the State of California level and the deferrals. The First Interim does contain mid-year budget transactions. The projections were based on revenue reductions of \$189 per ADA and there may be changes depending on the Governor's budget.

Ms. Gamblin referred to information on fund balance on page 5 which is projected to decrease by \$12 million because of the loss of revenue. There are transportation costs in the amount of \$2.8 million for contributions for special education.

Ms. Gamblin reviewed information on comparison of the adopted budget to First Interim. The District had projected \$45 million in fund balance and at First Interim it is \$33 million. The main category is the loss of the \$6.2 million in revenue and increase in expenditures of \$4.8 million, a change of \$11 million because of decrease in revenue and increase in expenditures. Ms. Gamblin reviewed details of the \$6.2 million on page 8.

Ms. Gamblin reviewed Page 9, detail of our expenditures and increase to \$4.8 million; and due to enrollment loss, \$700,000. The big changes are in supplies and services in increases - \$2.3 million and the bulk is the \$3.3 million for early retirement incentive plan in the current year.

Ms. Gamblin reviewed Page 10, components of the ending fund balance of \$33 million.

She said the \$12.6 million is our 3% economic uncertainty reserves. There is \$7.5 million for audit findings and \$12.9 million for deferred payments from California.

Multi Year Projections on page 16 were reviewed by Ms. Gamblin. She said we are still doing conservative budgeting. All of the expenditures and revenue changes brings us down to the \$33.2 million fund balance and we are projecting no changes in revenue. There are minimal changes in expenses based on the consumer price index.

Director Spearman asked if allowances were made for transportation. Last year, we got notice in May that the County was not going to fund, and the District funded it.

Ms. Gamblin said the 50 percent reduction and the transportation program, based on the legislative analyst announcement a month ago were included in the First Interim. That may change in January. Right now, we have an increased contribution to Special Education because of transportation and we cannot absorb it as of First Interim.

President London highlighted the following information: Page 20 shows ending the fiscal year with a \$29 million negative cash flow and on page 22 we are assuming by the end of the year, the state owes us \$64 million in deferred payments. She asked about the strategy for the negative cash flow.

Ms. Gamblin said the majority of the negative cash flow is the delay of the payments from the State, in addition to the projected loss of revenue. The loss of revenue that we have projected at First Interim in addition to the deferrals are affecting our cash flow. The accounting office is managing and monitoring that very closely and we will be coming back to the Board at a later time because we may have to do some borrowing to meet our cash obligations during the year.

President London asked about the structural deficit. Ms. Gamblin stated we do not have a deficit as long as we are using the adult education flex dollars. If the flex dollars go away, then we would have a structural deficit.

President London opened the public hearing at 9:50 P.M.

Mr. David Castillo, Principal, Unity High School, used a powerpoint for his presentation on Oakland Unity High School, to review the mission and history of the school opening in 2003 and highlights on the schools API test gains since 2007. The school has small class sizes of 25 students, multiple safety net structures, A-G approved coursework for all of their students, AP course offerings for 11th and 12th graders, SAT prep classes; support for emerging learners, and on-line credit opportunities.

Sam Brewer, Assistant Principal and Social Studies teacher, reviewed slide information on Focus on Projects which is project based learning endeavors to create opportunities for students to apply class learning with real world issues.

Damon Grant, English Teacher, reviewed the advisory program. She spoke of the

communication skills that are developed.

Jacqueline Padissis, class advisor and Spanish teacher, provided information on the hands-on enrichment and creative program available for students.

William Nee, English teacher, spoke of the rigorous content at the school, including engineering programs, which have a large number of female students.

Mr. Castillo shared information on the after school program, including the sculpting class, creative writing, journalism programs, and spirit week. He said the school has a history of collaborations with Oakland Unified schools.

In response to Board Member question about ethnic balance at the school, Mr. Castillo said the balance is relatively the same as it was at the last renewal five years ago and is part of their extensive outreach to schools from Frick, Claremont and other parts of the District. He said the school is about 10 percent African American student, 85 percent Latino, and 5 percent other. They have a strong African American parent group at the school to help with recruitment.

Director Yee requested a more thoughtful analysis from the school and he will be asking for that information when the Board votes on the final decision.

Director Spearman asked about recruitment efforts at Frick. A Frick staff member responded that they have had a positive relationship with the principal at Frick and the school has a very high African American student population. Going from Frick to Unity, a lot of the students want to go to a big school, so they choose to attend Skyline and a lot of them want to play sports which are not offered at the charter school. Many want to play football and the basketball program offered is a charter school league. The school has an indoor space for physical education activities.

Public comments on this item:

Jim Mordecai said when Kipp started, they stated with Walmart money grant. The Department of Education has \$300 million to grow charter schools. Because this is a second renewal, what kind of money did the school receive from the Department of Education at start up? Did they get the \$600,000 or the \$575,000?

Warren Driscoll, staff member, Unity, talked about STEM education and ongoing projects at Unity, including inquiry based long term science projects. He said industry and universities expect high school students to have a skill set and to work in teams and collaborate and solve big problems which is what is taking place at Unity.

President London opened the public hearing at 10:15 P.M.

Superintendent Smith distributed copies of the different options for the attendance areas.

Director Spearman stated the Marshall attendance area should be called the Grass Valley attendance area. She asked about the 98th Avenue attendance boundary. She is unsure of the boundary line on the far left side.

David Montes de Oca, Executive Director, Quality Community Schools Development, stated there might be different titles for the different options. Because this is associated with the elimination of the attendance boundaries for the coming year, it is intended to support the community's understanding that it is associated with the existing attendance boundary and the change of that attendance boundary; so we have titled them for each school attendance boundary that is being eliminated. Director Spearman said for the 3 blocks above MacArthur on 98th Avenue, it would be easier for the kids to attend Grass Valley. She would be in favor of adjusting the new proposal boundary to 98th Avenue, rather than 99th Avenue. She said the top boundaries would naturally go to the top of the hill/city and the boundaries on the west go straight down 98th Avenue.

Mr. Montes said the red line reflects the longstanding historical Marshall attendance area which ends at 99th Avenue; 98th is a block further which is in the Howard attendance area. Mr. Montes said only those aspects of those boundaries that are within the area that are shown on the map are proposed to change. He said maps could be produced with a higher scale to show additional space surrounding and encompassing the majority of the boundaries.

In response to Director Yee, Mr. Montes stated given the timing of the boundary change process and the timing of the priority placement process, we have established that our placement of students currently in the schools associated with the Board's decision making around closure are going to have their new school placements match based on their preferences and/or the nearest highest performing school if that is not able to be accommodated in these changes or linked primarily to new students seeking enrollment that live in the affected areas or the surrounding attendance areas.

Director Yee asked about the amount of decision making based upon principals' equity around mixing racial, class and culture and does it play a factor in the boundaries and what are the overarching principles used in drawing the actual lines?

Mr. Montes said information includes facilities capacity, number of students living in and around the affected attendance areas, projected enrollment of affected schools, and the

geographic and logical street boundaries are predominantly driving how lines are being situated from the current attendance boundary to the next. We are maintaining enough of a balance of the sharing of the attendance boundary that is being eliminated by the surrounding schools and a consideration based on the number of families at the age group K-5 that live in those areas to not overly offset so many students in the expanded area that these schools might be disproportionately affected in the incoming classes. There is the potential for wait lists to be a result of some the expanded attendance boundaries. He said there are 28 schools that are affected by all scenarios.

Mr. Montes said the concept of community identify is a factor that is suggested to be worthy to consider and there are different options that could allow for some of that identity to be maintained.

Director Yee requested a report at the 2nd reading on the potential problems given the different options and from the people affected by the boundaries. When he sees someone arguing for one of the options, he is not sure what line they are talking about, and what is the implications are.

Mr. Montes said updated information would be posted after tonight's feedback to include some of the neighborhood Kindergarten enrollment data. The final recommendation would contain an explanation within a guide as to why any one was ruled out and why a particular option was ruled in; and if a third option emerges, we'll describe what that addition was to generate that option. Director Yee said he would like the options to list the number of community members who strongly objected or were in favor and reason(s).

For the January 11 recommendation, Mr. Montes said we'll take the remaining feedback received to date to the beginning of next week and report on the initial feedback so that community has that to take into account by the deadline of January 5.
