Jumoke Hinton-Hodge

Vice President Jumoke Hinton Hodge, responding, requested that Legislative File No. 12-2874 be pulled from the General Consent Report No. 1 for discussion and possible action. Without objection the requested was granted by the Board.

Jody London

President London stated that the District was saddened at the end of October at the loss of Mynette Theard, President, SEIU Local 1021. She stated Mynette was a great leader; someone who is already missed by many; that the Board welcomes the many colleagues of Ms. Theard who have joined us tonight to honor her. President London stated that the Board will be taking up to approximately 20 minutes to honor Ms. Theard, first, by presenting the District's Resolution and then hosting an open mike where anyone wishing to speak may do so. President London also noted that Memorial Services for Ms. Theard will be held tomorrow morning, Thursday, November 15, 2012 at 11:00 AM at St. Columba [Catholic] Church, San Pablo/Alcatrez Avenue, with all being welcomed to attend.

President London then invited Rita Bailey, First Vice President, SEIU Local 1021 (OSEA/OCDPA), to the dais, read and presented the District's Resolution, incorporated herein by reference as though fully set forth (see file attachment), regarding Ms. Theard. The Board unanimously adopted the Resolution. Ms. Bailey, accompanied by Vanessa Brooks, Second Vice President, SEIU Local 1021 (OSEA/OCDPA), accepted the Resolution. Ms. Bailey stated that although Ms. Theard it is no longer physically with us that she is here in spirit; that she will be with us across the table and that she will be with us in every effort that we make to keep her dream alive; her legacy alive, i.e., forming a strong union between the union and management for the community and for the children of the District. Ms. Bailey, speaking personally, said Mynette, whom she had known for many years in the Union, was truly an inspiration for her and that Mynette "only got greater;" that she was able to applaud Mynette, who was undergoing treatment for her illness, for not "missing a beat"; that it is her hope that [as a leader] she can live up to a miniscule percentage of the strength and power that Mynette had.

Public Comments

Victor Tang

Victor Tang, a School Security Officer, stated that Mynette was a wonderful person, who helped everybody. He said that Mynette had helped him, and thus his family, to get the job. He expressed his sorry at her passing and condolences to Mynette's family.

Dora Hopkins

Dora Hopkins, stated that Mynette, who she had meet some forty years ago, working in the District, was spiritually ready; that Mynette was a child of God. She said that all of us will miss Mynette physically; that she is still with us spiritually; that if we really want to remember Mynette, sisters and brothers, come to the [union] meetings and keep fighting for the children. She said of the Mynette that she knew, "there were no little "i's" and no big "u's" that she fought for everybody." She noted that teachers at Oakland Tech were very sadden by Mynette's death. She concluded by stating "God Bless Mynette, her memory and her love."

Troy Christmas

Troy Christmas, Director, Labor Relations, stated that he had the pleasure of working on "the opposite side of the table from Mynette." He said there were things that he learned from Mynette that reminded him from whence he came: that the greatest legacy you can have, as Mynette demonstrated, is helping other people. That Mynette helped District kids, employees - the most and the least; fought for people to be respected, treated fairly; for prosperity not just physical but spiritual prosperity. That Mynette dedicated her life to leaving that kind of legacy.

Roxanne Sanchez

Roxanne Sanchez, President, SEIU, Local 1021, here with all her co-workers. She said that we have all heard how Mynette fought, fought for all of us, but she stated, Mynette loved us all the time. She said they did not feel that fight, they felt the compassion, the love, the comradery; that Mynette built fruitful relationships; that a scholarship will be carried in her name; that she is loved and missed very much.

Allison McDonald

Alison McDonald, Executive Officer, High Schools, stated that she got to know Mynette in this capacity in the last six and one-half years. She said Mynette would call her about a member employee issue at a high school; that we would work it out. McDonald stated that she admired Mynette's skill/ability to build empathy for her fellow employee, for her colleagues; that Mynette was creative. McDonald said that she understood the union Grievance Process, why it is in place but that they (she and Mynette) rarely needed it because Mynette would pursue and succeed resolution w/o it (being invoked). McDonald stated that she admired Mynette tremendously and will miss her.

Gary Jimenez

Gary Jimenez, First VP, SEIU Local, stated that he knew Mynette for a little over 10 years; that it is hard [lost of Mynette] that Mynette remind him of his mom, whom he lost year, in that Mynette had a very resolute spirit; that when she saw something that was right, the truth, she had no trouble not backing down from the issue; standing up to the issue; pushing for the issue until finished to the end. Jimenez said he appreciated those traits about Mynette; that she fought for and desired to have the truth; that she fought very hard for the membership, locally and all across California.

Brigette Marshall

Brigette Marshall, Associate Superintendent, Human Resources, stated that she meet Mynette 10 years ago when she was a principal, in a situation with an employee who had some attendance issues; that she and Mynette were butting heads over the issue, which went on for several meetings. She said then Mynette and she, as a result, began to have a conversation about providing training and professional growth opportunities for classified staff. Marshall said, as a result of the conversations, majesty happened and the conversation [with results] continued for 10 years. In the last year, Marshall said, the conversation reignited and became more concrete in making the results real. That a week before passing, which feels incredible, Marshall said, Mynette keep a meeting at her office. Marshall stated, in retrospect, that Mynette was celebrating that she made sixty; that she mentioned taking the next week off to set affairs in order; and then went through a list of things she wanted Marshall to think about; asking what were the next steps for making the dream of high quality training and development for SEI U members come true. Marshall said, looking back on that conversation, she now understands what Mynette was asking her to do. She said with great pride and humility, for Mynette, she will do it; looking forward to making the dream come true and to naming such training programs in honor of Mynette.

Board Member and Superintendent Comments

Gary Yee

Gary Yee, said that he shares the grief and the pride that each SEIU Member and friends shares for Mynette; the pride in the life she lived and the God she served. And in the sadness in the empty chair, knowing that you will have to fill that seat following after her He said that Ms. Marshal reminded him - He having known Mynette for more than 25 years - of a project he worked on with Mynette about 10 years ago to get SEIU Members to finished up their AA Degree. He said Mynette saw that the best she could do for membership was to insure that membership had better skills, that it moved higher, higher, acquire more skills to offer and hopefully better pay. Director Yee said that he is committed to the project mentioned by Ms. Marshall and that project should get started. He urged that Mynette's members pursue college degrees. He further stated that while most of the speakers spoke of Mynette's fighting, it was not fighting against or oppositional, even though she could if need arose, but it was "for," for us, for the City, for justice, for fairness; that it is a tremendous legacy [Mynette's legacy] that each of you represent.

Noel Gallo

Noel Gallo, who worked with Mynette over 25 years, first as an employee of District and subsequently as an elected official, said that beyond being a remarkable woman, Mynette had integrity; that she cared for people. He said that his last experience with her was advocacy for maintaining school security officers at school site; that our employees deserved not only compensation but respect; for being Oaklanders, for having children in our schools and for caring. He said Mynette was quite an individual, a friend and she always did a good job advocating for all of us to make certain that Oakland had the best. He stated thanks to her family and all who were honoring her today.

Jumoke Hinton-Hodge

Vice President Jumoke Hinton-Hodge said she sends out many blessing to the SEIU Family and Mynette's personal family. She said that she personally supports work around training and professional development for classified staff, who put class into the work. She stated, having known Mynette may years before being "on this dais", she appreciated Mynette having helped her to understand what it meant to be a community advocate; a parent advocate; and organizer on campuses; working together to improve the entire environment on campuses. In particular, Hodge, mentioned Mynette stating that SSOs at McClymonds need to be including in the going ons. Hodge recalled her working, in times past, with Mynette, parent groups and SSO, together at McClymonds, as well as most recently having her part of the Ad Hoc Committee on [District] Police Services. She said Mynette could get really "hot" regarding exclusion of her membership in District processes. Hinton-Hodge stated that as Restorative Justice is grown in District, she is committed to making sure SEIU leadership, membeship is involved in such work. Hinton-Hodge further stated she appreciated Mynette's approach of "now that I have called you out [on a specific issue]," her willingness to work with you to handle the issue going forward.

Tony Smith

Superintendent Smith, said, after his appointment, at their first meeting, Mynette asked him "Are we going to get this District back on track?" He said for him, Mynette was an increbile partner, with all of labor. She said to him "Don't worry about it sweety, we will get it going." He said he got more emoticons from Mynette in his emails than from anyone; that she was a person that lived fully, authentically; genuinelly. He said Mynette would not only say something is not right, but, equally, also would say when things were well and good. Smith

said she was right, true and genuine. He said that he cannot say enough how much he will miss her. He appreciated all the time we had with her; that we have a legacy. And, again, he will miss her.

President London, in concluding the Tribute to Ms. Theard, also mentioned the passing of Rob Jue, a retired Klindergarten, Montclair teacher, who will equally be missed within the community.

President London stated that speakers will have two minutes on this item.

Lacy Asbill

Lacy Asbill,, Moving Forward Education, a diverse provider on District's continuation high school campuses, stated she is here today, annually about this time, to talk about continuation high schools getting access to District's tutoring program. She stated she is here today to share about how the partnership has worked; that organizations feel they are being listened to, not that everything is perfect; is resolved. She stated last year she remembers coming to the Board and urging you to put this resource behind students that most desperately needed the help support and service, to have the resource aligned with the District's Strategic Plan. She stated she saw Curriculum and Instruction making decisions about targeting a group of students and she really resource aligned with that decision. She states she has been fierce in advocating for students with folks who readily don't approve of this program. She said this year the District set aside 200 slots for continuation students.; that the problem is there were approximately 310 applicants. She said that only120 students or 60% of the applicants were approved for service; that the problem, in not having more applicants admitted to the program, is that students are not designated low income. The cause, according to Asbill, is that high school students, unlike elementary school students, do not utilize free and reduce lunch program at a rate similar to elementary students.

Asbill stated that there are 150 11th and 12th grade continuation high students, who were low income, who have not passed CHASSEE. She stated that she was here to say thank you, along with the partnerships that are in the Room, for the alignment and to ask the Board to take the last step of aligning resources for the students mentioned this year.'

Oscar Wright

Oscar Wright stated that for over a half century he has been appealing to this Board and this community for justice, equality for all of our students. He said as he sits in his living room watching students go to Berkeley Maynard School - Latino and African-American students. How parents have to block off the street to get in and out of school in the mornings and the evenings. He said he thinks about how we pledge allegiance to the flag, liberty and justice for all. How we

have by design not made it possible for young people to get an education. How sad it is we will not teach our kids how to read by third grade even though the state content framework states that is what we're supposed to do. He said in his old age, and he's not able to be here like he used to be, the Bible he reads and the God he servers declares that a house divided against itself cannot stand; that as a man soweth that he shall also reap; as you would others do unto you, do you also unto them. He stated America is the most prosperous country in the world and we have planted a lot of bad seeds. It's harvest time and we won't get out of this, because we sit here by design and "kill children"; make sure they go to school, and come out not being able to read, write, do not know multiplication tables and no marketable skill, said Mr. Wright. Then, continued Mr. Wright, we lock this place down (Board Room) and we (public) have to wait to come in; can't come in and sit down, until the Board comes down. He said he experienced [the lockout] this evening. It is a disgrace and we need to do something different. He concluded by stating that America is going to pay.

Jim Mordecai

Jim Mordecai stated that Mr. Wright speaks of many things; that he got to speak for 2 minutes. Mordeca noted that the Chair had asked the Secretary how many cards and the answer was 5. Mordecai said, Board Rules state 3 minutes and when Mr. Wright came up you limited him to two minutes and state his time has expired. Mr. Mordeca said that is inconsistent; that what he tries to do is look at the Board, look at rules, agenda, minutes to try to find out where "you" are inconsistent and he believes that is an important role others can play. He further stated for the moment he is sitting aside that role, noting that there was an election and as a result of that election, new school board members will be coming on Board; that he wanted to take a moment, beyond trying to find contradiction, to say thank you, each one that served because it is our democracy. Not only the people who are elected, but the elected appointing members, who also look after self-governance. He said he would like to see one Board meeting in which the public gets an opporutnity to come in to thank you because it is the essence of democracy, whether he agrees or not with you. President London and Director Yee thanked him for his remarks.

Ben Tapscott

Ben Tapscott, New McClymonds Committee, stated he has been here for about a year now looking at our school system, what is going on and that he had come to the conclusion that we have two different school groups: the haves and have-nots. He stated that prior to Superintendent Smith's arrival, the Board had closed 13 black schools and last year you closed 4 more. He said he heard parents last time [last Regular Board Meeting] talk about neighborhood schools. He said the Board had destroyed the schools in the black neighborhood; that "we" do not have neighborhood schools. They do not have - the African-American student, who comprise 34% of the population. These children I getting service. He said the Board wants the ADA but are not serving the African-American and Latino families. He said the API, the Superintendent balancing the budget. He said that the fact that we close schools we could go a different way. He said the API says that 46% of our students in this District are not achieving above 700 on the API. He asked where are the elementary programs in the black community to raise the API scores. He said she could go down the list and elementary middle and high schools, each, are behind. He said it's a clear pattern; the students are not being educated. He said the question to the Superintendent and this Board is "What are you doing for these children that you represent. because you are supposed to represent all of these kids, not just a select few? "

President London opened the Public Hearing at 6:55 P.M.

Nabeehah Shakir

Nabeehah Shakir, Lead Petitioner, introduced herself and several of the prospective Board Members of the proposed charter school, including Dr. Norma Francisco, Charlene Dagra, and Donna Hankins.

Ms. Shakir stated she is a native of Oakland, as are some of the prospective Board members, who are familiar with the conversation that has been held here tonight; believe that the prospective school has an approach that is going to be effective. Many of us, said Shakir, have spent our adult lives dedicated to improving education for African-American students – here – right in Oakland Unified School District.

Shakir stated that she was one of the later persons to join the Legacies group about a year ago. Shakir, quoting Dr. Martin Luther King, stated "Intelligence plus character, that is the true goal of education." So educating our youth, said Shakir, to think critically and intelligently is the goal. She said the Legacies group came together about 10 years ago to discuss the plight of families in the community who have suffered the brunt of at least four decades of poverty, drugs and crime as a results of segregation, mis-education and exploitation, and adopted a do for self-philosophy, from the sixties, meaning that they would find the solutions for themselves.

Legacies, said Shakir, will enroll all students and the focus is on safe teaching and a safe learning environment. What that means, said Shakir, is teaching and learning will be in an environment that is safe. Legacies will focus on under served students from the social services systems that are referred from foster care, juvenile justice, group homes, students with poor attendance, students with behaviors that are inappropriate in the classroom, said Shakir, with a focus and a goal of having them to become morally conscious, socially adjusted and high achieving.

Shakir stated Legacies response to intervention is going to be a key element in the program. It is going to provide support for teachers, students and parents. Shakir stated that the most unique part of the petition is Legacies Innovative Education Learning Plan. She said the Plan starts a conversation, recruitment of families, a conversation with parents about their needs, what the parents feel the school should do for them and it will continue with what Legacies has to offer, which is emotional and social skills, with a special effort to connect students with mental health and social services, which is an idea that is ten years old.

Community partnerships, said Shakir, is going to be critical to the Plan. Citing one community partner, Omega Boys Club, which has agreed to work with Legacies, Shakir, said one of the initiatives of the Club is to keep students alive and free. "Alive on the ground

and alive on the right side of the bars," said Shakir. The initiative, stated Shakir, has a prescription for violence prevention, which involved several hours of instruction.

Shakir, further stated, that the academic design of the Program is a key as well. Academic achievement is the goal, stated Shakir. Literacy across the curriculum is not just going to be a buzz word, she stated, but every teacher will be trained on how to teach students to read and every teacher will teach reading in every single curriculum area all day long. All students, stated Shakir, will be considered academic English Learners. Shakir stated that those associated with Legacies have methodologies used over the last three or four decades that connects students in a meaningful way with course content. She said Legacies has extended the time for learning and practice. Linguistically appropriate instruction will be for all students, and staff will respond to the cultural diversity and needs of each student, stated Shakir.

Shakir stated that the science and agricultural piece of the program, was formulated by the Legacies group some eight years ago, to work with the California Environmental Educational Initiative through the University of California, Davis. She said, Legacies will integrate this curriculum into the science and history program of the school. The historical piece, said Shakir, will connect students with people from their ethnic backgrounds, who have made contributions to agriculture engineering.

Shakir said that the staff will always, daily, constantly remind Legacies students that there is a connection between education and life; that school leads to careers; careers lead to jobs and a better way of living. Shakir stated that Legacies will be working with Lynn Martindale, UC Agricultural Education teacher, who will bring in volunteers, arrange field trips. Shakir stated that presently there are roof gardens and kitchens in the building designated to house the Legacies School to support the education program. [The school, said Shakir, is going to be located at 8024 Rudsdale, Oakland.]

Shakir stated that math and grammar are related to what has been talked about including agriculture. She stated the petitioners have learned that mathematics has been a "gatekeeper" for African-American students and Latino students for generations, so Legacies will break that barrier by helping students to understand that ninety percent of math is about the language. She said Legacies will teach students the grammar of math, removing the fear of math; use repetition, rhythm, relevance. She said these are not buzz words, but the school has training to go with all of these. Performance based assessment will always be administered throughout every curriculum and social, emotional learning areas, said Shakir.

The intervention and acceleration is very interesting, said Shakir. Intervention will be done during the class day; acceleration for advanced students and assessments and re-teaching, project based learning as well as assessments, which include oral presentations and after school curriculum, which allows for student demonstration of learning, and field trips.

Shakir stated the school's Master Schedule allows for Language Arts — 90 minutes; mathematics — 85 to 150 minutes, minimum, depending on student's need; social studies — 60 minutes; PE — 45 minutes. Health and Wellness is a unique course, stated Shakir, using the ripple effect and any other curriculum art therapy to teach students social and emotional skills, skills needed at home; to use at school and to use in their lives. Visual and performing arts, said Shakir, will be taught daily, as an elective. The After School Program, stated Shakir, has an additional 60 minute requirement for all students for intervention, acceleration and agriculture. Shakir stated homework, time for counseling and family therapy is built into the day so that the social services agencies can use Legacies site to provide those services.

Shakir reviewed the proposed schedule of the school, with a breakfast morning's greetings meeting where students are brought in and looked at "eyeball to eyeball, said Shakir, to examine what may have happened last night, on the way to school this morning before starting school day. Teachers will be required to spend at least 20 minutes, before beginning school day, with pupils and during the session will be shouting out good news, things that students have achieved will be shared, said Shakir. At the lunch period, there will be Lunch and the Spoken Word. During this period volunteers will be brought in, said Shakir, and paid staff, to teach students the skill of spoken word, which will help them to write about things that are hurting them; things that have impacted lives not for the best.

Shakir, said, for all of the foregoing spoken of to happen the school has to have strong Governance. She said the school plans to have a diverse Board of Directors; that the Bylaws provide for as few as five (5) and as many as thirteen I13), currently there are 11. The Board includes lawyers, financial experts, community leaders, educators, parents, multiple family advisory and fundraising groups, highly qualified and committed Directors, with education and seminars for all. She noted that the Board finished its second training at Nelly's Soul Food Kitchen this past Saturday Morning.

Fiscal Management, Shakir stated, is also important. She stated the school has already employed the services of Neil Shaw, a back office service provider, who has informed and educated the group about a conservative budget, based on student enrollment. She said, the group, also has had conversations with Charter Capital, which will help the school manage deferrals and cash flow issues. Shakir also said the group has a grant writer, who will write and facilitate acquisition of grants. She also state there are several organizations - small and large – who have given verbal commitments for loans and grants and community partnerships.

Before proceeding to the last PowerPoint slide, Ms. Shakir, recognized Dr. Francisco for comments.

Dr. Norma Francisco

Dr. Francisco stated that she has been with the Legacies Project since the beginning. She said that she could hardly keep her seat, listening to the Board deal with the issues that Oakland Public Schools is struggling with. She stated that she ran the Kumon Math and Reading Center in east Oakland for ten years. She said at Legacies they are going to be using the principles used in the Kumon Center to build students self-confidence; to learn with mastery, i.e., master materials before going on to next, that is the secret to ensure big gains. There will be parent involvement, said Dr. Francisco. Students will learn study skills and excel above grade level, she said.

Dr. Francisco further stated that she hopes Oakland, as a District, in general, will think about principles, like Kumon. She said, as she was siting in the audience, listening to the Board's discussion of issues, she thought "They should put me on this and I will help you." She stated that she is currently an Academic Advisor at Brandman University, where teachers are trained. She said she is part of the Legacies Board and will be using the principles that have been proven successful for over fifty years.

Prior to opening the Kumon Center, Dr. Francisco, stated she was associated with Director Yee in the Ph.D. Program at Stanford; before than served on the Admission Committee of the San Francisco University of Denistry. She said, at the time, she could not understand why Asian students did so well in math on the assessment test. After she found out about Kumon, said Dr. Francisco, she understood why. She said because of having a tight curriculum, starting young enough and making sure the materials are mastered before going on to the next is a principle of Kumon. She mentioned the appearance of Solomon Khan on television this past Sunday talking about same principles. She said that she is very

excited about being part of the Legacies of Excellence proposed program. In conclusion, Dr. Francisco, said the supporters "are fired up and ready to go."

Nabeehah Shakir

Nabeehah Shakir, following remarks of Dr. Francisco, said the Legacies group is "fired up and ready to ready to meet the challenge." Shakir, said, given the petition has been submitted several times. In this submission there is a major change, the addition of grade 5. Shakir said the group thought about it kind of at the last minute; that grade 5 pupils are not "quite as distorted in their way of thinking" at that age, so we wanted to get them earlier." She said due to a printing error there was an omission of the 5th grade portion of the curriculum ... that is available and where to find it. Shakir said the classes will be self-contained, because the Legacies group understands that pupils will be coming from "change", "change" change"; changing addresses; changing schools. She said pupils will no longer need to do that so the school will build a sense of family. She stated team teaching will be used, so teachers will not have to teach all subjects, but enough of a self-contained classroom situation as possible. She restated in the proposed site there are kitchens, science labs, roof gardens that students can walk to and the group is working on finishing the program in time for opening.

Shakir stated no one ever said it would be easy but the Legacies group is ready to begin the task. She stated thanks to the Board for listing to the presentation; looks forward to working with Oakland Unified, and using the program as a model for addressing the discussions had for the last four decades in Oakland.

Public Speakers

There were two speaker cards: Jim Mordecai and Jim Mordecai. Mr. Mordecai "passed" and Ms. Gorham was not present.

Board Member Comments

Gary Yee

Director Gary Yee thanked the group for the presentation, again. He stated that every time he sees the group, he hoped they will reference "linked learning" because it is so obvious it is the direction that Legacies needs to go. He said one the industry sections happens to be agriculture and it is widely used in the central valley (of California). Yee said every time that he sees youand you do not do that, he fears that you are caught in the bind of the ideas that you already have and you could be part of a statewide initiative around contextualized instruction that could benefit the Legacies Program especially in high school.

Secondly, Yee said, as an observation, since Dr. Francisco is the second of his doctoral colleagues from Stanford that has come supporting a Charter, the other one being Dr. Overman, it occurs to him that maybe he somewhat lost his way in the ten years that he has been on the Board. He said speaking directly, "It is nice to see you Dr. Francisco."

Ms. Shakir, responding, stated one thing about this initiative there is no such thing as locked. She said we are locked into the position of what the Charter has said but there is no locked minds here. She said, petitioners are not closed. She said petitioners believe that the Charter is a very good framework of a solution but if there is some way the linked learning program can be utilized she is sure that it will be done. Perhaps it just go omitted, said Shakir.

Director Yee, responding said, that he had referenced it every time the presenters have come and no one has taken him upon on it. Ms. Shakir said that she would. Director Yee,

acknowledging that it is the petitioners petition, but that it is an observation, [and recommendation], that in petitioner's high school work that other options be considered other than the U.C. Davis. He said, link learning happens to be one; Merritt College, has a new landscape horticulture program that leads to an AA, ready to do, less than four miles from the Legacies site. He said that he is just curious as to why, in the Legacies development and review work, that petitioners do not take advantage of some of these resources and reference them. He said that he is sitting next to his Board colleague, who is the Educational Director, Peoples Grocery, one the left side and on the right side, he has a colleague working on Urban Gardeners for sustainable gardening among immigrant populations. Yee said these are resources that are available but that he appreciates the fact that when people develop own ideas they own it. He said that was his observation.

Shakir, responding, said that Lynn Martindale has been the person that she, as Lead petitioner, was linked to. She acknowledged that she is not of an agricultural background, so when she was given the petition most of it had been done. She said Legacies is working with, as she said, community partnerships, including David Roach, who is part of More Better Foods. She stated there is built into this Charter opportunities for multiple partnerships. As we learn about new avenues, they will be looked into. She stated to Yee, Linked Learning and Merritt College, will be looked into.

Jumoke Hinton Hodge

Vice President Jumoke Hinton Hodge stated, for the record, that More Better Foods and Peoples Grocery, were designed and borne in west Oakland about the same time. She said [factually speaking] if you got David Roach and More Better Foods you do not need Peoples Grocery. Hinton-Hodge said that she feels like she has had a bit of trepidation in hearing this. She said this Charter has been presented at least three times. She said that she has been sitting here grappling with not going back to the past and just sitting where we are now and the future as to how one moves forward. But also hearing her colleague, said Hinton-Hodges, also talk about some of the observations and really, being actually curious that no one from the past timeframe is actually here with the group in presentation. Notwithstanding, Hinton Hodge said there will be a through process that the District's Charter Office will go through. She said she has read the Charter each time it has come forward as well as remembering the staff's recommendation each time and she knows why Petitioner withdrew the Petition each time. She said she is looking forward [to the staff recommendation] to determining if Petitioners/District approached some of the issues raised before to be able to resolve them.

Hinton-Hodge, noted that Mr. Mordecai, having passed on public comment on this item this meeting, but in a prior meeting, had said the Legacy Charter was the example of what a Charter School should actually be doing in terms of innovation and really helping to support something District may not do well. She stated "many of us" became excited about the work; want to support it - at the beginning of our African-American Male work. She said District has had a couple of years of a hope that Legacies would kind of pull itself together and actually be something that the Board could support. If there is significant push back from Board members, Hinton-Hodge stated, it is in some ways based on anticipation that Legacies would be a partner with us but the District wants to do that with highest amount of integrity. She further stated that there are a couple of things, based on personal connection, that are intriguing her: a) ripple effects – seen that be some significant good work; b) Omega Boys Club working with young people to be alive and free is important. As to Kumon, personally, Hinton-Hodge said, she had a kid who "died in drill and kill of Kumon", so it did not work for every single kid. She said Algebra Project, Bob Moses are a lot of things Legacies group is connected to; that she hopes Link Learning will be too and such things really get flushed out in a serious way. She further said, District's movement around Prop [Measure] J and looking urban farming come close to District schools it will be - there are all of these potential places to connect. She said she hopes the work is done

well.

Shakir, responding, said some of the people connected with the project are ill; others are still excited about it but do not believe that the Board is going to pass it. She said she is the naïve person who said to them "This time it is going to go through" so those persons are waiting to see what happens here but we are in constant communication with them.

Hinton-Hodges responded, asking to correct and push back a little. She said the Board and the staff were actually very excited; that one of the leading people in the community, who is against Charter Schools, actually stood up on the night that it was presented and sad he supported it - that would be Jim Mordecai. Hinton-Hodge said the District has stood very much in support of this work. And that the Charter Office, Hinton-Hodge said, helps support Charter schools actually do good work and strengthen their proposals and work with them. She said, the Board/staff has not seen Legacies show up in a particular kind of way. It's difficult, continued Hinton-Hodge, and is sorry that people feel discouraged but the Board members are also sitting in a place of kind of anticipation and if this time is it – great. She said she hopes that it is; that the District will go through a process, through the Charter Office, and one cannot get exhausted at this point in the game because she, too, does not want to be fatigued yet another time where people do not really follow through with and dig deep enough to kind of do this work. Lastly, Hinton-Hodge, said that she will look closely at the additions of the 5th and 6th grades; because, at this point, she does not understand at all. Going back to history, said Hinton-Hodge, a couple of years ago, there was talk [by petitioners] of getting students who were pushed out, not being served, were part of Juvenile Hall. For the time being, said Hinton-Hodge, in the competition of charters and District schools and things like that, she will be really cautious about taking 5th graders out of District system, being a part of the Legacies system.

Hinton-Hodge said, again, it is all public and it is fair game for parents to make choices around systems; if we are going on what history was said the school was going to actually do, in partnership with the District, around push out, or culturally sensitive work was not necessarily happening, she does not understand the 5th grade inclusion. Again, Hinton-Hodge continued, the process will be vetted out and she will get more clarity on why 5th has been added.

Jody London

President Jody London asked, "What is different [about petitioners' proposal] this time in addition to 5th grade? With respect, President London, said it has been great presentation and it is exciting, but why is this petition different than the other ones Board has heard? What about it is new or changed, asked President London.

Shakir, responding, said "me" because when she received the petition she saw a lot of the flaws in it; the different sections were not correct; having been in the system so long, gave her an opportunity to work on the various sections; to do the homework to get them written correctly. Shakir said, the Governance Section has been completely revised; there are things cleared up that are in the petition. We think everything is there, said Shakir. The curriculum piece, which was weak in past, has been strengthen, said Shakir. Shakir said when Gail Greely saw the revision this summer, she commented that it has been improved; that it met the standards. Shakir said that the Special Education section is rather clear on what needs to be done. Shakier, referencing the past, opined that the biggest problems was that there were not enough people working on it together and it was a disjointed effort but the idea, as you saw, was good. She said, she and several colleagues got together and made the petition more congruent. She said they also worked on the schedule President London said she does share the question about the 5th grade piece but that will be vetted through the process.

Shakir, restated, Legacies is not looking to take 5th graders from the District. She said, Legacies, is focused on pupils who are in the systems previously mentioned and to take them.

President London, having thanked the petitioners for their presentation, closed the Public Hearing at 7:24 P.M.

Performance School Program

Tim White

Tim White, Associate Superintendent, Facilities, Planning and Management, stated that this item is associated with the District's Sustainability Initiative that was adopted by the Board in 2007. One of two different initiatives; of which District is proud of. He highlighted several provisions of the Report: 1) Continued improvement in waste reduction diversion led out of the Custodial Department Services Division. He stated that his office is working with Waste Management [he District's waste collector] to get the percentage, which he hopes to highlight in next Report. He said last Report showed that District is around 45%-50% of diversion. 2) Support from Nutrition Services to allow increased composting. He said preparations are fully underway for the role out of Nutrition Services Master Plan, and that all of our kids have world-class nutrition as well as taking advantage of the sustainability as to how the meals are served and how waste associated with those meals is disposed of. 3) Coordination with the Alameda County Office of Education leadership in Energy Efficiency Programs to facilitate detailed audits of energy and water useage at our high schools and develop targeted energy efficiency upgrades projects. He stated there audits will be used as the base line for comparison of post efficiency project useage to verify savings on each individual project. He said the savings for District is a data metric that we have been trying to get to for several years and he is happy to announce progress in that area. 4) That District has on board an "in-house" Bay Area Climate Corporation Intern energy specialist focusing energy reduction District wide - both behavioral and energy efficiency - initiatives upgrade projects. The intern is paid for by a grant the District applied for and received. Mr. White said, perhaps long term, such a position can be turned into a District FTE. 5) The District is in final stage of a net zero energy Master Plan for a redeveloped Fremont High School Campus with this effort partially funded by PG&E through its Innovative Pilot Project Program.

Public Comment

Jim Mordecai

Jim Mordecai said an outstanding job has done, to pay attention to energy. Mr. Mordecai asked whether the plan is going to look at wind energy. President London noted that the Board recently authorized 4.5 megawatts of Solar Energy. Mr. White responded that the District has not looked at Wind Turbines. He said it is a great methodology for producing renewable energy. He said the District has actually focused on Solar Energy Inititions because of the availability of incentives, matching dollars.

Jody London

President London, noting that renewal energy technologies is her day job, invited Mr. Mordecai, if interested, to contact her for a long conversation on energy.

President London thanked Tim White for the Report. She noted that when the District adopted this initiative in 2007 she was a parent sitting in the audience; that it is good to see it starting to take shape this way.

Maria Santos, Deputy Superintendent, Curriciuriclum, Instruction and Equity-In-Action

Deputy Superintendent Maria Santo, at the request of Superintendent Smith, presented the Report, which is represented in the PowerPoint Presentation attached to this file and incorporated herein by reference as though fully set forth.

Deputy Superintendent Santo said it was a pleasure to present a Report on the impact of the work staff has been doing in this area over the last three years. She stated she wanted to begin the presentation by setting the context as related to the work and the work of the School Board. Over the last three eyars, Santos said, the School Board, has adopted a number of policies and plans that are informing the work throughout the District. She noted that in December, 2009, the Board adopted a Resolution supporting the Restorative Justice Practice and implementation through out the District; that in April, 2010, the Board adopted a Resolution increasing graudation requirements, to meet the A-G Requirements begining with last year's 9th Grade class; in May, 2010, the Board adopted a Resolution that focused on Elementary Science and requirement minutes in Elementary Science. And in June, 2011 the Board adopted the District's Strategic Plan. Santo said these key Board actions focus the work of the District, time and resources to this work. She said that as we think about the impact and where the District is academically, these key policies should be thought of which have had a significant impact on the system. Santo further stated the policies strive to address all students and equity issues and there is need to keep this in mind as the work goes forward. She said one of the things known for sure is the system - OUSD - is moving in the right direction with modest gains. She said that we have seen significant gains in the elementary science program as well as gains in the overall graduation rate and the number of students that are graduating that are meeting the A-G requirements that make them eligible for college.

Santos further stated that in addition to District's focus on academics, the policies, i.e., Restorative Justice, Strategic Plan, and the Full Service Community School Strategy, calls for District to address the needs of the whole child. And the impact of taht work, said Santos, is is measured by looking at the reduction in chronic absences, suspensions and dropouts. Santos noted that the District had been loosing significant numbers of students, kids moving from 9th grade to 10th grade. In 2006, she noted, the District lost over 700 between 9th to 10th grade but in 2010, the lost is less than 50 students in same grade level. It means District is holding on to larger numbers of students as they travel through the system; keepiing more students to graduation. Students are working with us, planning to leave the system with a high school diploma. She stated this school year District has over three hundred students engaged in their fifth year of study in high school working toward graduating with a high school diploma. She said in keeping more students, the District is keeping the most challenged among us, who tend to be poor readers and lower performers, which means the District has to double its efforts to gradute them. She said the District recognized this and has invested in a High School Strategy Reading Courses to ratch up the reading levels of our students. The strategy to hold on to more students also influences the District's academic gains, said Santos. She said over time, if we keep more students, we have to invest more. She also stated that we do not see as significant

academic gains, as we might have otherwise, if we had pushed those students out of the system.

Santos said that the data she is about to present will demonstrated how the Board's policies and the resource decisions have influenced academic performance and students lives. At the end of the day, Santos said, the District wants to impact all students and improve their life opportunities.

Santos said that she will explore District's CST data, multiple points within the data, chronic absence and suspensions, a little attention on Reading and then move into the high school graduation data as well as reductions in dropouts. She said the data is early indicators of the District's work relating to improvement efforts. Where are we in our journey, Santos asked?

Santos stated that staff has spent a significant amount of time creating awareness in the system for radical change and has begun to implement new and unique practices in the journey.

The District's ELA performance over the last three years, said Santos, has yielded an increase in performance, a modest increase. The same is true for mathematics. She said, District is "pretty much flat in this area". She also said as District looks at system movement, it is necessary to look at the different populations of students and how each is fairing. She said, given the District's attention on students traditionally who have been underperforming there are some gains, which are continuing, for African American and Latino students. She acknowledged that the District is aware that academically it is not yet where it should be for these student populations. As the work has been done, the white and Asian student populations have remained steady.

Santos said, there is similar data for mathematics. There is movement, relatively flat across the board, however there is movement for African-American and Latino students.

For English Language Learners both in Language Arts and in mathematics, Santos said, for those students the District is averaging compared to the State.

Santos said there has been wonderful movement in the area of science. As a results of the adoption of the Science Policy, Santa said, science is being taught in elementary schools. Last year significant attention was placed on professional development for teachers and principals resulting in more teaching and the quality of teaching improving significantly of science in the classroom. This year the efforts have increased and are now focusing attention on increasing the rigor of science in the classroom and the link to literacy.

Santos said chronic absenteeism, which is a key indicator, along with other data points, is looked at throughout the year, whereas CST and CASHEE are summative data points. Examining chronic absences, Santos said, is critical to the work because when a pupil is absent from school the ability to learn is reduced. Santo further stated that students who are chronically absent tend to really flounder within the system. She said the District is trying to impact this data and bring it down as much as possible. She said the District had significant reductions in this data last year. Looking at kindergarten, Santos said, kindergarten is critical because kids who are absent from kindergarten tend to be poor readers in third grade. She said the more a student gets into the habit of missing school it is less likely the pupil will graduate. As a result of attention in this area, Santo said, the District has reduced chronic absence from 1 in 9 to 1 in 10, which is huge for the number of students in our system.

Santos said not only has the District made an effort to utilize data in work but to work with school communities and leaders to set goals in the areas that are critical to the success of students. She said, every year schools that meet targets are celebrated. Last year, Santos said, twenty schools meet targets for reduction of chronic absences and 19 schools meet reduction targets for suspensions. She further noted some schools actually eliminated suspensions and did much more than the target. She said this is important because it means more kids are coming to school regularly and remaining within the system.

Jumoke Hinton Hodge

Vice President Jumoke Hinton-Hodge said there is some distinction made around chronic absenteeism for all students and reduced suspensions for African-American males. She stated we should be clear when we are talking about all and a segment, right? Santos, responded "right." For example, Santos said, in targets for suspension the District looks at overall reduction for all schools and then has a second indicator looking at African-American males. Santo said, as in the example, there is a concurrent examination of two data points.

Mario Santos

Santo, continuing, stated a key area of focus is Reading. She said students throughout the system are now required to take a reading test which is called the Scholastic Reading Inventory, which gives student a lexicyle, a reading measure, to help students understand their reading level for the grade level span. The graft, in the PowerPoint, said, Santos tells the District where it is across grade levels. She said the graft identifies the strongest readers being 5th graders. She said the deep red color indicates that those pupils are reading four grade levels or more below their peer group. She said it is the latter group that requires intense energy and support around Reading work. She said the District is keeping track of this data, looking at it three times a year, and asking schools to move pupils more than a year's growth each year. She said the key Reading target for all students is 1300 lexicyle, which indicates college and career readiness; that the District is striving for all pupils to meet or exceed that mark. She further said this data is important because the CST data is not as aligned to college and career readiness as District needs it to be. She further stated that the District is looking forward to the Common Core and the Smarter Balance Assessment which will give better information as to how well District is doing in preparing pupils for college and career. In the interim, the District is using the SRI.

As it relates to graduation, Santos said, there is increase in data; for CAHSEE showing increase, particularly at 10th grade, which indicates there will be an increase in graduates. Santos further noted, the data reflects a significant drop in the District's dropout rate, which means District is retaining more students and the data also reflects an increase in the A-G completion rate. She said the District tracks the latter because ultimately all pupils will be graduating A-G ready. She said the District needs to significantly increase the numbers and to concurrently see how the interventions put or being put in place, resources, and opportunities afforded students are making a difference for them.

Questions, said Santos?

President London, stated that the Board will engaged in questions and discussion, following public comment.

Public Comment

Jim Mordecai

Jim Mordecai stated that he was confused on reading the Chart presented on chronic absences cause it looked like the blue line was the most recent year and the yellow, whatever, other color line was the previous year, and it was going up, and the percentage

of the number of students out of 10 was reduced. Is the Chart wrong? Am I reading it wrong? asked Mordecai. He asked at some point for a return to chart and an explanation. President London, responding, said, as she reads the Chart, District data for absences, the data is lower across the Board. President London, further responding to Mr. Modecai's affirmed that the chart rising line is a negative. He thank her for the explanation.

Ben Tapscott

Tapscott stated that he, too, was confused. He said that he appreciated the numbers. He said on 66% of African-Americans (AA) being suspended if the teachers and administrators talked to AA males as if such were their children that rate would go down. He further stated there are 200,000 children in California under the age of 18 that are homeless and many of those are probably AA. They do not sleep, said Tapscott, in the same place each night, so such pupils come to school with some problems. Then we close schools, continued Tapscott, and the impact is that they have to travel greater distances (and many of their parents don't have the transportation that the "Hill Children" have. Looking at the API, Tapscott, said, so much for Charter Schools: in the top 10 there are none at the elementary level; in the next 30 there are only three charter schools. He said his question to Dr. Santo is: What is District doing for the 10 elementary schools that are below 600; District has 70 elementary schools? At the middle school level, continued Tapscott, there are 8 schools above 700 and 10, many of these schools in the black community, below 700. He said there are 25 high schools, when there was once 6 and 1 continuation school; 25; 40 Charter Schools. He said there are 15 high schools below 699. He said his question to the Superintendent and Dr. Santos is, "What are we doing for these schools that are not performing - the standard in California is 800?" He said the District must redirect more programs at the elementary level and need Summer School for all children, not after they reach Grade 11: that Summer School should be for every child that is behind, more so than for those children that are above target for graduation. So we have critical issues to look at, said Tapscott.

Board Member Comments

Noel Gallo

Director Noel Gallo thanked Deputy Superintendent Santos for the report. He said for him, and all, to understand, one, is when CST score are discussed they are a little different in report than the API scores. He said CST scores, which came out in July, are about performance levels – the advanced to proficiencies', et seq. As a parent, said Gallo, trying to read the Report on a child sometimes it can get a little confusing in trying to follow that. He said what would be real helpful for the Board, from CST, is 1) how is the District doing school by school; 2) by grade level, because a good number of schools or student bodies are struggling and not close to the proficiency level – where we want to be or the advanced level. He said, for Ms. Santos, and for the Superintendent, is 1) to be able to obtain that information that would impact schools, because there will be a cost to having District kids catch up; meet challenge.

Gallo said the information that was extremely valuable, presented by Ms. Santos, is when 60% of our pupils get to the middle school levels they are two years behind in reading and math. By the time pupils get to the 9th grade level, they are two years behind in reading, math and perhaps other areas. He said at that level, 9th, one has to do Algebra and if you cannot read, write, you cannot do Algebra or A-Gs. He stated the question is "What do you recommend for this Board to take an aggressive stand or a financial investment to be able to have our youngsters at the elementary school level ... cause when you look at the English language arts in certain schools – and I have looked at some of my schools – we are not at the proficiency level, let alone the advanced level. He said he saw one school, in particular, where pupils were proficient in math, at 5th grade level, outstanding. He said the

reality, and he knows some have an issue with testing, our pupils need to compete – for the job market, jobs that are coming into Oakland. He said if the Board could have that information it would be extremely important in pointing out the challenges with some of our schools; the need to be more aggressive and make a greater investment to have youngsters catch up so that by the time they hit middle and high schools level they are not years behind already. Thank you for the information, said Gallo.

Santos, said, the District needs to invest significantly, not only in preparing our pupils for college and career readiness, but to really align our system to the Common Core state standards, which District will be held accountable to in 2014. To do that, Santos said, District needs to invest significantly in literacy across the board as well as in professional development for teachers, leaders to really carry-out the charge. For example, District has invested in Basil Readers. The Common Core and university requires that students engage with authentic text, with very complex text, so District needs to provide such, which will require a significant investment not only in materials for classrooms, whether text or electronic based materials but also an enrichment of the libraries, so that students have interesting materials to read and to engage with.

Gallo asked "Are we heading towards a mandatory summer school for some of our student body?" Santo responded that one of the key investments needing to be done is to provide "extended time for students." She said the District has significant numbers of students who are going to require more time to graduate; that time can either be in summer school, to mitigate language lost, for example for ELL that is critical but also for credit recovery for students, whether seventh period day or summer school. She said District needs to think and study what extended time it can offer students. Such is critical for students to meet academic and competitive demands.

Christopher Dobbins

Director Christopher Dobbins, too, thanked Ms. Santos for the Report. He said what struck him was the reduction in chronically absent students: from 1:10 to 1:9, which does not seem like a lot, but in studies in terms of the financials what it means, and as a former teacher, what kids learn in the classroom really affects their social wellbeing, academic progress. Dobbins said that he heard the statement that there is more outreach to the community but that this is an issue "that really grabs the City itself as a whole." Dobbins said that three years ago District had a huge push on reducing truancy. He said that he would like us to really get behind it next year to bring that number down even more. He said, obviously, District is not where we want to be but at least we are making progress overall.

Tony Smith

Superintendent Smith, recognized by President London, stated a couple of things: He wants to recognize the Oakland Housing Authority, which has been a partner, for sharing resources and really supporting children and families; sharing information about what positive attendance can do and, actually, supporting the habit of positive attendance: Eric Johnson has been amassing and then Teresa Drenick, Deputy District Attorney and Nancy O'Malley, District Attorney, Alameda County, have been unbelievable. The DA, said Smith, has actually created attendance packets and ways for principals and other administrators to lead and to be engaged with community. He said, the District has had remarkable support from partners committed to the well-being of students in Oakland. He said District is obviously necessary in the conversation but not sufficient to make all the difference. He said District has deep appreciation and has seen a difference thanks to the partners.

Gary Yee

Director Gary Yee said he appreciated the clarity of the Report. He said the return on investment indicates the staff takes the Board's interest. He commended Director Gallo for always focusing on science and math and the importance of the decision the Board made to increase science. The API is tied in large part to the CST, said Yee, and that the global look on the CST, given by Ms. Santos, that the gains District was experiencing six years ago are beginning to tapper off. He said it looks like it is very difficult for the District to break through the Fifty (50%) percentile on the CST because, we are not flat line but we have grown a little a little bit in Reading and maybe a little bit in math – but for District to get break through the 50 mark, let along the 60, 70 or 100 percent mark on the CST, District is going to have to show more significant jumps – 5% per year. He said that seems pretty daunting. He asked is the District's commitment to every pupil graduating from high school, starting in 2014, every 9th grader will be ready for college and career in four years of high school? Is that still realistic that District aims for one hundred percent, given the deep [financial] cut made over the last couple of years hampered the ability to make the accelerated gains, he asked?

Yee said that the comments from members from the audience and from Director Gallo, essentially asks how much of an investment will it take to get 5% gains, in some schools, knowing that District had a Focus 15 initiative. Has that given us a sense of what kind of investment is needed and what it would take? Is the accelerated TSA, which we invested approximately \$1M last year, is that investment going to bring the 5% gain. Or is there something else, Yee asked?

Santo, responding, talked about some of the things that have been put in place that are making for some of the high school gains. One, put in place early on and which has been sustained, she said, is the transcript review, which is an important process, infrastructural piece, to make sure pupils are on track to graduation and that they know what courses are needed so they can acquire same as they go. Another piece, she said, is the institution of graduation plans at the 9th grade. Another is small learning communities at the 9th grade. She said results of the latter activity is expected to be known in 2013. She said District has also worked on academic language and literacy strategies. Also the Strategic Reading Initiative for 9th Grader, said Santos, with the latter impact to be known in 2014. How things compact themselves and impact the graduation rates, stated Santos. She further stated District has been working with the College Board and with middle and high schools to put in place a Spring Board Curriculum which is much more rigorous and ratchet-up the level of demand for students and teachers, which has significant differentiated strategies so that all students can be engaged. She stated the staff is currently working to put in place a Strategic Plan for strengthening academic rigor for middle schools. All of these efforts, said Santos, will add to our graduation rates and have a level of impact. She said District needs to consider how to actually address the high need, high, high at risk student populations that the District has. She said as the District grows a stronger system throughout the District, it still needs to pay attention to the students who did not benefit from such efforts. For those students, Santos said, the District needs to have multiple opportunities for credit recovery and for acceleration -e.g., extended time - because there are currently not enough resources in the Summer School to offer Summer School to all students that would benefit from it. Santo stated, the District has to prioritize on students that are closer to their senior year. Santos further stated, the District has done quite a campaign to make sure that District is not pushing out students and work with students for a graduation plan towards high school diploma, talking to students, informing them it is "ok" to stay a fifth year to obtain high school diploma. She said students are told, you can get it in fifth year, the summer, et seq. but leave the District with a diploma. Santo said these are strategies to get all of our students to graduation. Maybe, Santo acknowledge, that maybe the District is not going to get 100% of pupils graduating A-G in four years; it might take some students five years; even six years. The supports put in place, said Santos, will make a difference for the numbers that can graduate. Ultimately, said Santo, the District wants students to graduate with a diploma that's meaningful; that will open doors of opportunity for them. She said,

what is being seen from the data is that pupils are staying with the District. She said that over 90% of our students express a desire to go to college. She said District needs to think about and put in place means to enable it to occur; to become a reality, to fulfill their aspirations. She said a lot of work has been to put in place a variety of interventions to help students, which include things like the manhood courses, the ethnic study courses, the Latino Men and Boys Program in the secondary program. All of these things, said Santos, are additive and will make a difference for students.

Yee said he had three responses: One, acknowledging Santos having laid out a set of interventions, he asked are the interventions sufficient funded and are they powerful enough to lead District, at least close to ...Do you have confidence that the vision you put forth, and that families can embrace, is that all kids will be ready for college and career beginning with 2014 in the 9th and the four or five years forward. Yee further stated the Board is relying on Santos to give a sense that all that is enough no matter what pupils come to the starting gate from based upon their other educational experience that we can do it with this set of resources. Yee said it is a very ambitious goal looking at CAHSEE 10th grade, 12th grade graduation rate. He said, it is going to take a 5% gain every year for the next four years to get to 90% graduation. Second question to his Board colleagues, Yee said, is: Does the Board want to really look at this extended year, extended five years, extended vision that Deputy Superintendent Santos has put out; that we no longer look at high school as four years but look at until finished? The other one, is the question about summer school. One can imagine said Yee that the fifth year can be broken up into four summers, so four summers becomes the fifth year. He said those are two ways of doing it. He said the actual guestion, as a Board, is do we wish to invest in that kind strategy? And the third, said Yee, is, the Board invested earlier on, near the time he joined the Board, in reading by 3rd grade. Yee, said it should to him like a shift from the investment in the early strategy's, not to say it will not happen, but the metrics of success is actually based upon college and career readiness not CST, test scores in 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th grades. He said this is a further discussion the Board might wish to take on ... Board direction in these areas could actually focus District, especially regarding scorecard and everything else, on the 9th, 10th, 11th grade, 12th, 13th grade strategy.

Jumoke Hinton Hodge

Vice President Jumoke Hinton Hodge thanked Ms. Santos for the report. She said that providing context and history is always important, especially as the Board creates policy and ... staff goes about the business of trying to implement the policy. To come back and report to the Board, said Hinton-Hodge, is something that she would appreciate happening more often than not. She said that she listens very closely and heard Santos state raising literacy at the high school level, which is really different than at the elementary level. It does not mean, said Hinton-Hodge, that we are off saying let's not focus on young folk but we are saying to pay attention in a different kind of way. She said that she has heard from the first Day of Ms. Santos' arrival, the idea of a fifth year, having looked at Skyline, very specifically, as a school and saw that there were so many kids not on track to graduate; that such students will do a fifth year and the need to encourage them to do so. Perhaps, said, Hinton-Hodge, as a Board, there is a need to get more on course around the number of ways that young people can be a part of Oakland Unified School District and have some success.

Hinton-Hodge said that when we talk about investment and aggressiveness, the TSA movement that has been talked about, that she has questions. She asked, How aggressive are our high schools being looked – there is a lot of investment around literacy and putting some things in place? She stated, as an example, she is looking for the mandatory extended day in high school; for a longer class day. There is some direction said Hinton-Hodge that TSA policy and direction provides us, even the evaluation of teaches and that type of thing. She said she is wondering how District is using those particular

strategies that the Board has said "Yes" to already to actually make those bumps. She said, when looking at the data – math, language arts – and just see that we are not having huge, aggressive movements, and in some places, we are actually kind of falling back. She said we have a vision year, what is this – a design year and an awareness year with there being some concern there. She said that she wants to take it outside of, even, whether we have enough money, to be a little more creative, is it thinking about the fifth year, partnership in a different kind of way? She said sometimes as Board Members, "we get caught up in the minutia" of parents, community members, someone calls us up, a student, says hey this is what is happening inside of a classroom and then I can get up in arms?" Asking why is that happening that way, she said. She said that the idea of focusing in on schools would be really helpful for us, which she has wanted for a while, not from a micromanagement level but getting a better read or baseline of what is happening inside the schools. She said that she thinks the Quality Review Process that is going to happen with a set of schools – that is going to be the model that helps us see where movement is happening.

Hinton-Hodge, said it is a conversation that she would love to make sure as we think about, because she is getting bombarded right now around bargaining, not so much about the transactional back and forth, but that it is laden inside of initiatives. Laden inside this work, that we are saying how do we get aggressive she stated. She said that she needs teachers at the table, at the bargaining unit, whatever is happening in this moment to negotiate – and she hopes she is not stepping on any boundaries here – but the idea, it is not about just measuring a teacher necessarily just on test scores or anything like that, but that at this particular point we have to do a lot cooperatively to really move. What is the professional development looking like, she asked? She said those are her comments and thanked Santos for the work, analysis and just would like to see it more often.

Hinton-Hodge asked for confirmation that the assessment piece is being done three times a year, the common core get pulled out, and if it is possible to see some of that work three times a year? The response from Santos was "Certainly."

David Kakishiba

Director David Kakishiba said he did not wish to comment. He said he is trying to figure it out.

Jody London

President London thanked Maria Santos for the report. London said she had to asked, because for many years we've bragged about being the most improved large urban district in the State, "Are we holding true there? Are we..."

Superintendent Smith, responded, in the aggregate, total over seven years, from where the District started to now the answer is "Yes." He said there are other districts that have double digit gains but it is still true as a total number. And the other point, Ms. Santo raised, said Smith, District is holding on to more pupils and diminishing the dropout rate faster than others. He said it is one thing to be highlight that this District has done something that other districts are really struggling with; high school metrics are really hard and measuring change in high school but to say that the District is holding more pupils in high school is one of the more extraordinary things that District has accomplished.

Director Kakishiba stated that the District should lift that accomplishment up in documents.

President London, again, thanked Deputy Superintendent Santos for the presentation.

Tony Smith

Superintendent Smith, introduced, David Montes de Oca, to lead the presentation. Superintendent Smith, said tonight, the presentation will be focused on enrollment and the process and at First Interim, December 12, the report will contain all the monetary and budget implications.

Montes de Oca

Mr. Monte de Oca, using a Power Point, stated that he will be providing a brief presentation specific to enrollment, with a focus on key aspects of enrollment that he anticipates will generate questions and discussions. He said the intent is to capture as many, respond to as many questions and provide some additional posted information about enrollment for the Board and the public. Montes de Oca said he will provide an overview of current enrollment, some on-going enrollment trends, highlights of enrollment information, some key District initiatives; provide some basic enrollment information associated with specific restructuring that took place last year; provide some dynamics between District and charter schools; provide some background information on relationship between the timing of program decisions and enrollment projects relating to operations of the District.

The District conducts, said Montes de Oca, annually a day twenty enrollment count. It occurred this year on September 24, said Montes de Oca. District uses this information to inform budget adjustments for fall as well as to drive the enrollment project process for the coming year, stated Montes de Oca. Annually, however, stated Montes de Oca, the District reports its enrollment to the State through CBEDS, because those numbers are not certified until mid-December, the District uses the 20 day count as a proxy until then. The day 20 count this year of enrollment is 36,262 pupils, including general education and SDC students. This number, said Montes de Oca, is a decline in enrollment from 2011-12, based on comparison between the day 20 count — excluding Ascend and Learning With Limits Charter Conversions and the Advance Program w/i District — the change in enrollment is approximately 868 [less] pupils.

Montes de Oca said that because District does not currently have certified CBEDS the District does not know what the official reporting will state. But, using graph below (pointing to PowerPoint) that shows the enrollment trends for the District over the last dozen years. He said all the enrollment data represented on the graph is the CBEDS reporting except for current year. He said that the Board could be provided an official update to the graph when the official CBEDs Report becomes available this year in mid -December. He said the graph shows a steady decline in District enrollment; then stabilized between 2007-2011; then District experienced a decline in the past two years. Montes de Oca said, when the District authorized Charter Schools are included, the overall public school population declined steadily until approximately 2007 and then has remain fairly constant over the past six years.

Montes de Oca, said, given that this raises additional questions, he has additional slides to present to speak to questions this raises, and will continue with the presentation and take questions at the end.

Montes de Oca said the current slide focuses on two District initiatives: the expanding grade configurations and the STEM Corridor effort. In graph A, Montes de Oca, said it shows for the three schools that the Board approved last year to expand grade configurations beginning this fall, all three schools achieved the enrollment targets for sixth grade: Sankofa Academy enrolled 30 6th graders, the vast majority of whom were school's 5th graders last year; Life Academy enrolled 66 6th graders [Montes de Oca noted that because there was a specific effort to recruit 6th graders beyond the immediate neighborhood, the District will be mapping data just received to identify enrollment characteristic for this class.] and Greenleaf enrolled 65 6th graders, the vast majorly of whom were their 5th graders from prior year.

In graph B, Montes de Oca, said when you look at the 6th grade enrollment trends across the District, there are two key points to highlight: a) When District looked at the total enrollment of 5th graders who remain in the District for 6th grade, there is a continuing decline in the number of 5th graders that remain in the District the following year; from 69% to 67%. Monte de Oca, said, however, when the total size of the 6th grade class, compared to the prior year's 5th grade class, there is an increase in the ratio, from 74% to 78%. Montes de Oca stated this means there was a decline in the 5th graders remain in District in 6th grade, but there is an increase students new to the District in 6th grade. The new students, said Montes de Oca, are coming from Oakland based charter schools, private schools and outside the District.

In graph C, Montes de Oca, said, over the past several years, the District has engaged in an initiative to increase the rigor and relevance of instruction within schools located in west Oakland through an initiative called the STEM Corridor – Science, Technology, Engineering and Math. This initiative, stated Montes de Oca, is intended to create a coherent education program experience from pre-K through 12th grade. In addition to work inside schools, there has been an effort to publicize and promote the work externally, said Montes de Oca. He said in reviewing the enrollment of these schools, it was found that all of the elementary and middle schools involved have experienced an increase in entry grade enrollment compared to last year: K or 6th grade. In the case of McClymonds High School, Montes de Oca said, the total school enrollment grew by over 10%, which staff knows is the goal of the Board to see enrollment increases at McClymonds High School. The overall growth in enrollment across all west Oakland STEM Corridor schools, said Montes de Oca, is 81 students from last year to this year.

In the next slide, Monte de Oca, said the District has begun a transitional K program, in response to the change in age requirements for entry into K, which is a two year program that is available for children whose months of birth no longer allow them entry to K. He said the transitions program was piloted last year and expanded to ten schools this year, allow the District to serve over 200 students and prepares them for success in K. He said school current operating pre-K, are on the right in the slide

Montes de Oca, said, the District has benefitted from the support of various partnerships, such as the Oakland Rotary, which allows Distract to provide materials, professional development and support that is not otherwise state funded. There is a plan to expand to an additional 10 schools, Montes de Oca said, in the coming year with an expectation of serving at least twice the number of students served this year.

Montes de Oca, referencing another slide, provided enrollment information regarding four schools that ceased to operate at the end of last school term because of restructuring. He said, the information seeks to determine, how many students of the closed schools remained with the District this year. Across all four schools, Montes de Oca said, the District experienced approximately 81% retention of students w/l district schools with slightly less than 20% leaving to attend non-District schools. He said Lazear is not included in this information because it was converted to a county authorized charter school. He said

information on the change in the Lazear Program will be presented on December 12th. Nevertheless, the District retained slightly more than 25% of the Lazear pupils, with 74% not remaining in the District, said Montes de Oca. In the next graph, Montes de Oca, said he looked at the changes in enrollment at two large high school campuses where smaller high school programs were consolidated into a single school on each campus. He said in examining the data from last year to this year, it was found that 134 students left the District that were enrolled in 9th through 11th grade on those two campuses last year. At the same time, Montes de Oca, said, when the total enrollment at the same two campuses were looked at for this year, it was found, coincidentally, the exact same number of students were gained at each school from outside the District in grades 10 through 12. Essentially, said Montes de Oca, the District gain as many new students to the District through these two campuses as was lost outside of the District during the consolidation process.

Montes de Oca stated that while the District's enrollment has declined over the past twelve years, overall the public school population, including Charter Schools, has remained very stable over the past six years. He said when the losses are looked at in District schools this past year, the losses are gains to Charter schools.

He said these numbers highlights the unique relationship between these sectors of schools and it continues to elevate the importance of work to understand what is happening in the schools that are working/not working and in particular what students and families are drawn to. In this way, the District can continue to improve own efforts to insure the quality and type of programs that the District offers is attractive to families, as well as insure that we maintain the quality of the programs offered in Charter schools, because District families clearly move between these two sector of schools year to year, said Montes de Oca.

The last slide, said Montes de Oca, is intended to highlight the considering of timing of program decisions and the impact such has on the system. Every year, said Montes de Oca, staff works backward from March 15 as a critical deadline when our teacher contract requires that teachers must be notified if there is need for a layoff, i.e., that means staff must complete the enrollment projections process, the budgeting process, the staffing process and many other tasks in preparation for the coming year by March 15th. He said what is noticed in comparing enrollment this year to projections, he found that two significant enrollment decisions made after March 15th correlated to discrepancies in projections for at least grades 1-8. The growth of enrollment which occurred in both the American Indian Charter School II, which was approved to expand to grades K-8 as well as the growth of enrollment as a result of the Lazear Charter Conversion, which was not only a K-5 conversion but expanded to a K-8 Program serving 6th grade this year, a comparisons is seen between the gains with these programs and the discrepancies for these grades, said Montes de Oca. In responses to this, our Plan B, nonetheless, said Montes de Oca, engaged with school sites, monitored registration results, calling families to confirm enrollments, tracking the options results and, to the best of our ability, intervening in some of the staffing and budget decisions that had not already been made, so that more significant shortfalls could be avoided when school opened this fall. Montes de Oca said, as a result, mitigation of hiring, which may have otherwise caused additional consolidations and were able to conserve a number of funds that remain unencumbered to offset some of these unprojected losses. In the current year, staff looks forward to continuing to elevate the critical stages, said Monte de Oca, of the enrollment projections, the budgeting and staffing process for sites as well as for Board, so that collectively it work to support the stable trends in schools and in our system.

Montes de Oca then opened for questions.

President London then took discussion from colleagues and then Public Comments.

Board Member Comments

David Kakishiba

Director David Kakishiba asked "What was our projection for total District enrollment?" Montes de Oca responded total projection was 38,031 pupils, including SDC students. Kakishiba further asked if the number was correct? Was that the basis for schools allocation? Kakishiba said he assumed staff had already factored in [the loss] of Learning Without Limits and Ascend.

Jumoke Hinton-Hodge

Vice President Jumoke Hinton-Hodge said she wanted to clarify that the STEM Corridor work came in the Restructuring Decision [not on the Closure of Schools Decision.], recognizing that work has only just begun. She said for her to look, while there is excitement, coming together of staff about the development, it is year one, with the work just beginning. The jury is still out", said Hinton-Hodge.

Hinton-Hodge asked if there was going to be a deeper dive into the numbers. President London stated next steps have not been determined except to examine the impact of the data on the District's budget. President London stated that she is interested in better understanding, based on the earlier Report presented by Deputy Superintendent Santos, the relationship between overall decrease but greater retention of pupils in class issues.

Montes de Oca said the correct enrollment figure is 38,013. He said staff projected [decreased enrollment] for Ascend and Learning Without Limits when the Board ultimately approved those two schools [as Charters]. He said the project enrollment is essentially 38,013 minus the 437 students for Ascend and the 377 students for Learning Without Limits, a total of 814 students. Projected enrollment, said Montes de Oca, is essentially 37,199. Vice President Hinton-Hodge stated the District then ended up with 36,262.

David Kakishiba

Director David Kakishiba, referring to page 7 of the handout, the District vs. Charter Enrollment Dynamic – asked if this data is enough – Whether going forward, in the next three to five years, if District enrollment declines will it be because of Charter schools enrollment expansion? Monte de Oca responding said data indicates the two sets of schools seem to have a symbiotic relationship because of the stable trend of the total number of public school students – going back to 2007 - 46,000 pupils between the two groups – that this dynamic is likely to persist. Monte de Oca also noted that, with the exception of the two conversion charters [Ascend and Learning Without Limits] last year, since 2007, the number of Charters schools has remained steady at about 30, notwithstanding some Charter school closures and is likely to persist.

Gary Yee

Director Gary Yee thanked Mr. Montes de Oca for the report especially the graphical display of the "sort of zero sum game around the overall enrollment." Yee said he thought it was a powerful graphic.

Yee stated he has two broad comments around Policy issues he believes the Board should consider that emanates from the Report: 1) The differences between the deliberate and intentional strategy of converting Ascend and Learning Without Limits vs. the unintentional, and chaotic, consequences of American Indian and Lazear. He said that is really the story for himself, the public, the staff and for the Board to consider. Yee stated, it is his opinion, Learning Without Limits and Ascend were essentially a fiscal wash for District, because

District developed a relationship with them, in theory at least, mitigated the negative fiscal consequences of losing the students. The American Indian and Lazear cases, said Yee, because they came late in the year after the budgeting had already been established for schools, left District with the potential for surpluses of vacant seats in the classrooms which then leads to fiscal loss to the District because of ownership of seats not generating any revenue. He said these two instances are very different kinds of fiscal decisions that the Board makes which leads to a consideration for public and everyone else about the limits to District to Board's authorizing ability, since Lazar was rejected [by Board] and then went to the County for adoption (a set of issues that the Board always needs to be cognizant of) and realistically, the public understanding of these fiscal nuances is relatively limited, which as elected Trustees, the Board should hold that precious. 2) Yee said he appreciated the slide around Greenleaf, Life and Sankofa because it suggested, tied back to the academic achievement slides presented earlier, the Policy challenge for the Board is developing a middle school strategy that ties in academic focus on high schools.

Yee said the District has this doughnut: fully developing elementary schools, many of which want to hold or keep pupils, so the number of years is extended, K-6; K-7; and K-8; and then high schools that have compelling stories, like Life Academy, which desires to work with kids at an earlier age and develop a six year strategy for those pupils.

As a Board member, in a deliberative process, said Yee, the Board has to ask itself, "What is the role and function of the traditional middle school in our District vs. other Districts?" He asked if the Board is allowing reconfiguration of schools to happen idiosyncratically, where individual schools make these decisions, or does District have a thoughtful strategy where Board reduces the number of traditional middle schools because of some value they have – larger middle schools because space is not available in some neighborhoods or there is some value to large traditional schools because they provide a plethora and wide array of services or maybe afterschool activities or arts or science labs or something that is uniquely focused on having a large school? Or do we [the Board] just ditch or consciously direct the Superintendent, said Yee, to look into what it would be like if District eliminated several middle schools.

Yee said if District looks at something like that the Board will be reflecting what is happening all around us which that middle place, and American Indian is an example, is draining District's elementary schools with a promise of having middle school slots available for students. Yee, said if District actually had a strategy to change the way elementary and high schools look or something like that, if we do not do that, the District will have this donut ... He said, if he was a Charter School proponent, he would aim for that middle school slot, prepare pupils for linked learning academies in our high schools and reenter them in high schools because I [as a Charter School operator] can't provide kinds of labs, costliness of labs, worked based learning, electives, sports and music programs. Because of the expense, Yee said, he would [if he were a charter school proponent] have the District do the latter. He continued, as a charter proponent, he would do the American Indian strategy of having multiple subjects, train teachers, have teachers loop with kids and pick off that piece. Yee said he actually believe that is actually happening now. As a results, Yee said it is this type of discussion that he recommends the Board have; that District must have on behalf of the community.

Yee further stated that the District has a high school strategy that Deputy Superintendent Santo articulated very clearly; that the Board knows that the elementary schools are moving forward. He asked, as Board members, can any of his colleagues articulate District's middle school strategy?

Jody London

President Jody London acknowledged that last year Director Yee was very elegant in

saying that the District needs a middle school strategy. She also stated that the Board needed to allow Deputy Superintendent Santos to respond. President London also stated that on tonight's Consent Report is an item that will help the District to further develop said strategy and before the Board makes the decision proposed by Director Yee, which she agreed, is, bold, different, she would want to see what the District's strategy can be. She said, personally, now that she has two middle school children, she has a new found appreciation for some of the benefits of middle school and opportunities that it offers to young people: to be in a middle school environment; to have much greater responsibility for their day. London said now that she has two middle schools, she is kind of gunning that middle school is a program the District offer and opportunity to provide to students.

London stated what she takes away from the data – and the District has authorized a Committee on Diverse Providers, chaired by Director Yee, which may not have a Report yet – around the symbiotic relationship between Charters and District schools really speaks to the need to have a diverse provider policy where schools like Ascend and Learning Without Limits and others providers partner with District ... et seg.

President London then asked Deputy Superintendent Santos to say a few words about the middle school strategy.

Maria Santos, Deputy Superintendent

Deputy Superintendent Santos said staff is in the middle of working towards a middle school strategy. Santos said she has been engaging principals, securing an understanding of the research relating to middle schools and are coming together very soon with a middle school report as to a direction for middle school. That direction, stated Santos, will include some important areas, engaging pupils in blended learning experiences where technology plays a very active role in learning; where students are involved in project based learning, taking ownership and responsibility for their learning. Also, continued Santos, for increasing the academic demand at middle schools and looking to start very early with the college readiness plan for students and explanatories related to the different types of pathways available in high school so students learn how to plot a projectory, in partnership with parents. She said these are some of the elements that are surfacing.

Santos said staff will be ready to present the Report to the Board in February, 2013. President London said that would be great and would like to put it on the Meeting calendar.

David Kakishiba

Director David Kakishiba, pre-stated that it might be a tough question - and he believes staff did a lot of over the top and heroic work in trying to support, engage students and families' as District made closures (4 schools) and, as a result, schools of choice, and acknowledged that national studies show that there is about a 20% decline in attendance under such circumstances, and the District is coming in under such percentage but is pretty close to that figure, with variations among the four [closed] schools - but wanted to know if there are "any big ticket kind of lessons learned through this past year in doing the transition work?

Montes de Oca, responding, said, in part, he wanted to acknowledge that school site folk, in the District and in the community, stepped up to help support what he agrees is a heroic effort to engage families and communities with what the transition is going to look like and feel like, by acknowledging that staff is engaged in in-depth preparation for the December 12th presentation that will give an opportunity – from the voice of individuals who helped to support that process – to speak to what some of the lessons learned, to some of the things

done well, to some of the things that we might light to do differently. He asked to be allowed to honor that by engaging with the Board more deeply on the 12th that would be great.

Director Kakishiba, and the Board w/o objection, agreed to the request.

Director Dobbins

Director Christopher Dobbins, called upon by President London, opted not to comment at this time.

Public Comment

Ben Tapscott

Ben Tapscott said he keeps hearing about college readiness and all that; McClymonds enrollment is up. He said a promise was made to parents back in January; seven advanced placement course are in; visited the school last Friday and all those advance placement classes have between twenty-five and thirty students doing very well at a higher level.

Tapscott said the District did not keep its promise to provide 12 electives, at McClymonds, by only providing 4. So there are very few electives, said Tapscott, for the pupils at McClymonds. He said it is interesting, about 868 students. He said District tool 180 pupils out of Marshall and stuck them in Grass Valley so you are going to have a higher enrollment because more students were put in. The other promise made in January, Tapscott said, regarding Adult Education (AE) is still in the building; that Dr. Santo had stated "they" would be out in June. June has come and gone, and we now hear, said Tapscott., that McClymonds needs the space and AE needs to be out because the school wants to do another computer lab.

Tapscott, referencing the Report numbers, said: 70 elementary schools, 60 above 700; 10 below 700, (36% of schools); He said look at the API for middle schools, 18 schools – 8 above 700; but 10 below 700 (61%), so middle school pupils are not progressing at the same level as they were in the elementary schools. Tapscott, continued, for high schools 25; (40 Charter Schools), 10 above 700, 15 below. Now, said Tapscott, we are looking at 64% of schools. Tapscott said what the numbers tell us is the longer children stay in our schools the poor they perform. He said we have 25 schools that need additional resources; site based budgeting does not work. He said District needs to make it a priority for pupils not on target for graduation to attend summer school.

Tapscott, further stated, there needs to be some adjustments done in terms of what the District is doing and how it is operating. He said, District needs to start at the elementary level with Reading because that is the key across board, given we know that in 3rd grade pupils fall behind.

Board Member Comments (Continued)

Jumoke Hinton-Hodge

Vice President Jumoke Hinton-Hodge said she had a question. She said maybe it is to her colleagues around thinking about Open Enrollment and the Options Piece because it continually gets raised and because a variable in the process when projections are done by February, et seq.

Hinton-Hodge said that she knows in general in D3 there is always huge questions around what it would be like if District did not necessarily have folk opting out of the system and,

instead, participating in the growth, development of the system and less movement. She said "It is a hard call because people want to have choice and we [District] want to be able to support that." But, she stated, she is wondering whether Directors want to spend some time talking more deeply about the current Options policy? She said supposedly there was a Task Force reviewing that but that has been one-year and a half. She just wants to engage colleagues on the issue.

Gary Yee

Director Gary Yee stated that he appreciates that Deputy Superintendent Santos is preparing a Middle Schools Report. And, he expressed appreciation for the experiences President London and her choldren are having with middle school. He said, his comments are really meant to provoke a discussion about the ecology of schools and the choices that people are actually making. Yee said, so the question is, for instance, or for example, referencing President London's children's former attendance at Chabot, if Chabot had a plan to expand its program into a K-8, how many of the parents at Chabot, who perhaps choose an alternative other than the Oakland Public Schools, which President London did not, would be attracted to stay?

Yee said that is the kind of scenario he would like his Board colleagues to consider - - He goes to Bret Harte and Montera a lot and loves the programs each school has for students - whether such programs are sustainable when the enrollments in such schools, program and reputation and all other issues including safety, locality are not enough to convince elementary school parents to send pupils to that middle school. And if it is not, said Yee, then the Board either has to agree to overcommit to those schools by having more electives and more services and everything else, knowing in the short-term that we are not going to be able to fill the seats and at the same time cautioning our elementary and high schools not to poach on the middle schools enrollment.

Yee said that discussion is very appropriate for the Board to consider within the context of a real middle schools strategy that is going to be emerging. He said it is a combination of the instructional design of middle school experiences and the fiscal implications of how to fund it and, ultimately, going back to VP Hinton-Hodges question, how is the matter played out in Choice.

President London, responding, said that she did not disagree but said that she did not believe that the conversation can be had without looking at the facilities impact and the political impact. She said, if you want to talk about District 1, the minute we start to talk about reconfiguring the elementary schools, the middle schools in that district, it will become an issue of redrawing lines.

Yee responded that District has expertise in redrawing lines. London responded that the District has experience but does not necessary agree expertise citing the recent appearance before Board of Crocker Highland parents, very upset, about the impact of the redrawing of a boundary line. She said such a reaction will be a hundred times worst, if the Board begins to redraw elementary school lines. Yee said we cannot really have that conversation here now without preparation, but that is the kind of battle that is worth fighting; about our policies around serving all kids in an efficient and effective way. He restated "that is the fight worth fighting, just like school closures and redrawing the boundaries because that go to the core of our District's solvency."

London further stated that, personally, it is a discussion she is willing to entertain but she would need to see so much more data before even considering something like that; cost data and now we have to make sure that all elementary schools now have the labs, and all the other things that they need to have in order to provide the compliant middle school curriculum. She stated it is a very complex conversation and the Board has to decide if —

given we have a Strategic Plan that is being worked on – and to do what Director Yee is speaking of – could potentially divert a lot of time and attention into something else. She said it is something the Board would have to grapple with, whether to redirect the limited resources of the staff in that direction.

Yee and Preident London thanked staff for the report.

Jody London

President London said the matter is a discussion among the Board regarding budget priorities for Fiscal Year 2013-2014. She thanked Director Kakishiba for helping to keep the Board focused on the task of the budget priorities and the budget calendar.

The question before the Board, not necessarily tonight, stated London, at some point is Does the Board want to provide direction – for staff - that is different for the Budget priorities that they are working under?

President London asked Director Kakishiba if he wanted to talk through those priorities listed in the document that was posted with the Agenda [incorporated herein by reference as though fully set forth]?

President London stated that it is her observation that four of the items are very high level and then with the McClymonds priority, the Board took a deep dive into a specific school site.

London state that she does not know if the Board is ready to have a whole conversation around how the Board would want to change those priorities. Or whether, we would rather agree upon a process and a schedule for coming up with priorities fairly quickly, because the budget development process for next year is already underway.

David Kakishiba

Director David Kakishiba said "just stepping back more in the abstract" it is the responsibility of a Board to establish budget priorities, year to year (or if it is a two year budget or whatever). He said the CSBA kind of training will talk about that is the Board's responsibility to do so. The process under which we do that, said Kakishiba, requires an incredible amount of engagement between the Superintendent, his staff and this Board to arrive at things that make sense and are tied to strategic priorities of the District. Kakishiba said, as we are going – the Strategic Plan, a Superintendent on board, the calendar called for one of the first steps to close the books in September; then too evaluate the Superintendent, which by its very nature brings into what's happening with the entire District in both student outcomes and moving forward on the Strategic Plan – the operational benchmarks being made and from there, staff would have been going through a similar internal process of figuring out what priorities are and then we would come together to do that.

Kakishiba further said, maybe staff has done this but for the Board we have not. The listing read, Kakishiba said, is what happened the past two years. He said he would argue since this came out of the Finance and Human Resources Committee that the quality and quantity of what he outlined as a process was pretty thin. Kakishiba said the Committee did not do more than 25% of that process. Kakishiba stated, he knows the budget allocations are going to be made soon. He said Board just has to get going. He said that he recommends – knowing in December that the Board will receive the first interim report, the

further report on enrollment and all that comes into play – that the Board figure out between now and then how we can facilitate a discussion between Superintendent and his staff and this Board about what are our priorities. Kakishiba, in particular, stated he is personally interested in understanding from staff's prospective what they believe should be the priorities for the upcoming year's budget. Some of the priorities are on-going and strategic, said Kakishiba, and some are very time specific. In particular, last year, many of them were time specific, said Kakishiba.

Jumoke Hinton Hodge

Vice President Jumoke Hinton-Hodge, responding said she was taken aback by the comment regarding "thin process." She stated there were a couple of parallel processes that happened. She said that she remembered the Board having budget study groups, and as a results, the Board was able to pull out some things, that the Board weighed some things. She said that she would expect that the Board will do that again – coming soon.

Jody London

President London stated the Board has not yet at this point in time scheduled a Budget Study Session. She said that the Board certainly could do that.

Jumoke Hinton-Hodge

Vice President Hinton-Hodge recommend that be done in light – the passage of Proposition 30; the steady enrollment; the academic pieces we want to push on. She noted the Board said earlier today: Where does the Board wishes to get aggressive [areas yet to be identified]? How do we achieve that 5-10 point bump? Is it going to be a fiscal kind of investment or not.

Jody London

President London state what she would like to suggest or ask is that she would like to get one or two Board member volunteers to be designees to work with the staff on this.

President London directed Secretary Rakestraw to poll everyone - staff, Board members - as to possible times to schedule a Budget Study Session, for approximately 2-3 hours' time slot either last week in November or first week in December. She noted the Board has already scheduled a Study Session on December 5; that the 2012-13 Budget is a bigger topic and deserves separate attention. President London asked Superintendent Smith if he had any thoughts on the matter.

Tony Smith

Superintendent Tony Smith said he thinks staff can have conversation with Board reps. He said staff is having an internal discussion, kind of closing the loop, looking to see where there is return on investment, practices getting results. And investment made in those practices. Smith said he believes that there can be a conversation but he would remind folks, passage of Proposition 30 takes District's to 2007-8 funding level; so it is not new money. It simply avoids further cuts. District was cut deeply, so there is no new money, said Smith. He said there is also a state conversation as to what the formula for the allocation of Proposition 30 monies will be, which is being worked on for the Governor's January Budget. He said while there is a general sense but it is not yet known what the Governor's Budget allocation for education will be. It is very unlikely to be more, said Smith. He said there is a misperception that Prop 30 created more money, which is not true. Prop 30 is no cuts. Smith said it was a complex campaign, which passed, so we have some stability for seven year but there is no new money. And the District is "at the bone" after all the reductions, said Smith. He said being clear about the priorities and what is yielding the

best results for pupils. He said the term "compound effect", used by Deputy Superintendent Santos, or multiple strategies will have a long term impact. So staff can talk about what those strategies are and why their choice. Again, to Director Kakishiba's point, Smith said, it is the Board's responsibility to set the budget, so staff will do our best to be in dialogue. He said a big study session before first interim or January is really wise. Smith, in the interim, offered to talk with a couple of Board reps and talk through where we are and what we are seeing that would go a long way.

President London asked Directors Kakishiba, Dobbins to be the Board reps that meets with Superintendent and staff for the aforementioned discussions.

Public Comments

Ben Tapscott

Ben Tapscott said that Board should concern itself with all of the children, not just a member's individual district. All of our schools should be good, said Tapscott. He said we have integration, and segregation within integration in Oakland. He said at one high school, which he declined to name, there are one hundred students in Advanced Placement Courses and out of the hundred students last year, only seven African-Americans. Tapscott said he thinks the Board needs to work effortlessly on improving all of our children's schools. He said parents are looking for a good education for their children. He said if you look at the numbers, he feels that the revitalization of McClymonds High School has begun and there is need to continue to make a commitment to that school to bring it back up because it has been neglected for about six years. He said the school will rebound. He stated, he, and others, plan on walking the neighborhood and letting parents know, and maybe the District can put out a publication, that McClymonds now has college prep, advance placement course there; that will start to drive the enrollment.

Tapscott said the District lost students because schools were closed and that make it harder for some parents – around 1000 students and, of course, lost the ADA.

McClymonds needs to be beautified, said Tapscott. It needs to be a priority for Measure J, said Tapscott. Fremont, said Tapscott, needs to have an official football field where the District can joint venture with the City and maybe private industry to bring that school up to standards. He said there is a need for counselors back in the high schools which is a priority, because pupils are not getting the type of help needed to move on to the next level. So these are a couple things Board needs to look at in funding, said Tapscott.

She said, over and over the Board states to the public that it's [money] going for our special education pupils and the needs they have. Hinton-Hodge said that weeks ago she recalls the report by the new [special education] director speaking to the amount of money the District spends; that cycles out of the District; that District could be doing a better job of making sure District builds capacity to serve children inside of District.

Hinton-Hodge stated it [the service] goes directly to a child.

Deputy Superintendent Santos, responding, stated these particular services are residential services; that is why they are so high.

Jacqueline Minor

General Counsel Jacqueline Minor, stated that she had sent a text message to the SELPA Coordinator, who has responded, and affirmed the services are as Deputy Superintendent Santos has responded; that it is residential; board and care ... for an extremely emotionally disturbed child and that is the reason for the high annual cost.

Jumoke Hinton Hodge

Hinton-Hodge, referring to the just approved General Counsel Report 1, stated there are contracts for less money - \$31K, \$21K - maybe [current item] is the high range; maybe District will never be able to deal with residential needs of a pupil - which she understands. Hinton-Hodge further stated that she just wanted to note that District has an obligation - and that District resources which reflects 2007/2008 [level budgets] - to pay for these and all young people in the District to get these services.

K. Introduction of New Legislative Matter

Jim Mordecai

Jim Mordecai, having been recognized by the chair, stated he had a Speaker's Card in on the just approved General Consent Reports, was permitted to speak.

Mordecai stated the point he wanted to make - on Consent Agenda, page 8 – that there is a Professional Services Contract [not otherwise identified] that has a funding source of Tobacco Use Prevention Education. And in middle of the paragraph [item description] "it talks about awareness sessions for students violating District tobacco, drug free policies – a whole list of things that this money covers", said Modecai. He asked is this realistic? Or is this just boiler plate in the language? He asked if students with the description characteristics are identified. "Or is it somebody filling out a form? What are the numbers? 10? A few people? High school? Is it a pull out program? Or an assembly program? What is really going on?" He wanted to know if the \$23,000 for the contract was a targeted or generalized kind of program. He stated he has same kinds of questions about a \$34,000 contract on page 9 of Agenda. He said he did not expect an answer tonight but asked for a response in the near future.

Gary Yee

Director Gary Yee, addressing President London, said it was appropriate for her having mentioned diverse providers; that he has meet with some staff; that he thinks to appropriate to agendize a Response from the Superintendent at the next Board Meeting – December 12 – as to whether it fits within the framework of existing Strategic Plan Operational Elements or whether there is some merit to moving forward? Yee said "there is plenty there that reflects on the work that we have been discussing today including Charter Schools, Contractors and really everything else." Yee said the original intent was not for the Superintendent come back with a proposal but a proposal on how to move forward. And whether it fits within the Strategic Plan as it exists now or whether it needs some other kind of movement. Or is redundant? Or contradictors to the direction of the Plan? He said that some sort of direction from the Superintendent would be helpful before the Board invests a lot of time and energy. He said, like other things, it involves lightening rod issues that the Board has been discussing ...

President London, responded, that she is happy to potentially put the item on agenda but wants to further understand what he is saying. She asked Director Yee, reading between the lines, if he is saying the diverse provider theory is already imbedded in the Strategic Plan – need to make it explicit?

Yee responded that "we do not actually know." He stated that the Diverse Provider language is part of the Board's Theory of Action and it has a history of referring to Charterization of schools, et seq and "we seized upon the opportunity of the Strategic Plan to begin redefining diverse providers in a way that is more reflective of the direction that the District is going but that we felt like the site governance policy that came out three or four months ago it helpful to revisit it as a Board so as to give clarity about the decisions we are going to be making in the upcoming year and the years beyond."

President London requested Director Yee to coordinate with the Superintendent because she is not clear what is being asked for?

Tony Smith

Superintendent Tony Smith stated, that part of the confusion that he is having, is he and

Board had a conversation which is the other way around – clarifying - given the Board was in different places on diverse providers that the Board would spend some time – with more focus in x area as to what diverse provider would look like. Smith said there was a range on the Board of what people were talking and thinking about that in order for him to respond, more specifically, he needs more framing Smith said right now diverse provide means an extraordinary ranges of things to the sitting seven Board members and it is almost impossible for him to answer in a way that will be substantive.

Yee, responding, said that he believes Director Dobbins met with Mr. Montes and Director Spearman met with Mr. Sarikey to begin that discussion. Yee said, personally, he is hoping that the Superintendent could provide, as he did with the Site Governance Resolution, a way to move forward with it, so that the Board can play a meaningful and constructive role in terms of vision — diverse providers directing schools, providing out of school services, what that might look like from Superintendent's prospective.

Yee said it is clear to him that the Superintendent is a deep thinker around community schools and that the diversity issue is really at the heart of community schools. Yee said it will be difficult for the discussion to occur w/o the Superintendent helping to facilitate it.

Smith, responding, said that's great; just to know the two domains: directing schools and providing after school services including non-instructional services. He said in those two domains, the staff will bring back a working draft of a way to go forward.

Yee further commenting stated this could not be adopted in a single meeting, that preparation of this is a year long process to be sure that it synchronizes with the Strategic Plan.

Smith asked Yee if he is looking for a framework or recommendation.

Yee responded recommendation for how to move forward with a framework; "a frame for a frame." Smith said he "got it."

Jody London

President London, asking a clarifying question, "Does that include Charter Schools? Yee, said "Yes a way to discuss Charter Schools; a way to discuss the experiences ... had last year around closures; conversions; around all of these kinds of things as well as the on-going discussions the Board seems to have about contractors.

London further asked, "What about middle schools?" Yee said his statements about middle schools was just to be provocative about –his observations about diverse providers cropping up in all kinds of ways including our own people.

Tony Smith

Superintendent Smith said just to clarify "We are going to be using the quality standards and use the work we have done already establishing quality schools in every neighborhood and the kind of performance agreements we have to enter into in order to both direct schools and provide in and after school services against a quality standard." Smith asked, "Is there any expectation on your part that we would establish a threshold, e.g., it has been raised a number of times we have schools performing below 600. Would we in fact establish a performance threshold that if you are below that target you are eligible for being directed by others?"

Yee responded that he is hoping that is the kind of direction the Superintendent provides. Yee said the beauty of the experience of last year, with the work that General Counsel did

in constructing some contractual language plus the school quality review work, leads the way on how the Board can better understand and be consistent in its decisions as it goes forward in this year.

Smith said December 12 would be a push to get that there. He asked is it possible that ...? Yee said the Board could always table it for another meeting. Yee said that the only reason he brought up December is because that is the commitment he made to his colleagues when President London asked him to lead the effort; to get an interim plan for a plan from the Superintendent before the end of the year.

Smith said that he believes the dialogue has been good to date; this clarification even better and also given there will be new colleagues, he recommends bring the framework to the first meeting in January.

President London, and colleagues, w/o objection "agreed."

Vice President Hinton-Hodge, stated "I got lost in that one." She said that she thought the Board had some work that needed to be done –on clarifying it; that time is of the essence

Yee said the Board definitely have that work as a Board; that Board needed a facilitator to put it all together so we do not good off too far.

Hinton-Hodge said that she would like to Introduce New Legislative Matter — in terms of calendar — there are a number of things that are not going to happen before the end of the this year and there is a long laundry list of things not gotten into — OAL; all the things that are important to her that the Board has not talked about — the new Volunteer Resolution Program (VRP).. whether or not we are going to hire someone. She requested the Board have a discussion — if doing \$90k, 100k with folks, after school providers — how such providers are linked in to moving the VRP. In particular schools — Roosevelt, West Oakland Middle — Hillcrest — where District said change needed to be made and there has been a huge investment of resources on our part, Hinton-Hodge said she wants to know how "that stuff is getting linked up." She said she feels like she is way ahead of the course on this, knowing there is an infra-structure that has not been built, but her new legislative matter is just some way of getting a check in on the matter. She stated that the staff has lived with the mandate for some two months, that the check-in could be a 5 minutes update on the 12th.

President London asked for further clarification as to what is being sought.

Hinton-Hodge said she is very much interest – No way staff is going to have a strategy for how expansion to 38 schools – in knowing whose work ... President London, stated, "Its an update on the VRP implementation.."

Yee said that actually fits in with the diverse provider because one of the things Director Spearman, meeting with Mr. Sarikey, found out Mr. Sarikey is actually developing an advisory group around the certification of contractors. So the whole thing, said Yee, is moving in the right direction. He said the diverse provider frame work is a way for Board members to agree to a consistent implementation of those kinds of standards just mentioned.

Tony Smith

Tony Smith, Superintendent, stated the first and biggest thing is l'Asha Warfield, District's Teacher of the Year, has been selected, by State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Tom Torlakson, to represent California for the National Teacher of the Year. Smith said the District is extraordinarily fortunate to have for the State, the representative for teacher of the year coming out of Oakland, out of Frick. Another great Oakland Teacher, said Smith. Smith said, Proposition 30 passed which gives District some stability. And Measure J, which passed, is an extraordinary investment and commitment – 84% passage – is not only recognition of the kind of work Tim White and his Department is doing, but of young people who had conversations with families and communities, and the electorate who responded. He said now it means a community kitchen is one the way; continuation of development of community schools; high quality math and science support in facilities, et seq. He expressed deep appreciation to the citizens of Oakland.

Public Comments

Ben Tapscott

Ben Tapscott, going back to the 66% suspensions, stated, District really needs to look at the interaction between administration and children. He said the number one cause is "defiance of authority" but he questions that and probably go with "abuse of authority" coming from the administrators and teachers. The other thing, Tapscott, stated he would like the Board to strongly consider and direct the Superintendent ... 10 of 25 high schools need help – to provide additional funding to high schools, resources and programs. In middle schools and elementary schools, Tapscott, said we are doing fairly good but 10 middle schools need help, additional, funding, programs and resources and high schools 15. He said his question to the Superintendent is "What kind of programs are ... going to be put in place this year to improve those particular schools that are not performing? And it is relevant because they are our children."

Jody London

Jody London, President, said that she has a few things to share with colleagues and community.
