President Kakishiba stated Legislative Files 13-0009, Board of Education Regular Meeting Minutes for December 14, 2012 and 13-0010, Board of Education Annual Organizational Meeting Minutes, January 7, 2013, at the request of Secretary Rakestraw, on the Board's General Consent Report are being tabled until next Regular Meeting.

President Kakishiba asked and with consent of his colleagues, scheduled consideration of Item M, Superintendent's Report and Item O, Board Member's Report, after Item E, Public Comments, in part, to give the two new board members an opportunity to make comments early in the meeting. After Item O, the Agenda was taken up in the order as printed.

Director Gary Yee requested the meeting be adjourned in the memory of Pauline Yee, a longtime District employee and his mother.

First Round Speakers - Registered and Heard In First 30 Minutes

Trish Gorham, President, Oakland Education Association

Trish Gorham stated welcome to the Board, congratulated the new school board and President Kakishiba and Directors. Gorham stated to the Board that she is grateful for its service to Oakland students. Gorham continued, unfortunately the OEA Board is having a meeting this evening but that she wanted to come down to greet you, greet a New Year and to say happy New Year to all. She stated that she wishes in this New Year, the wisdom, the patience, the knowledge you need to manage the business of this District. She said the teachers of Oakland are ready and willing to work with the Board to address those issues facing urban education at large; the threat to public education and most importantly, Oakland's children; and how we are going to move them to success in this world.

Gorham said one way that we can is, as a new board, as a New Year, is to have a new contract for the OEA. She said she knows that is a high priority because only when "we" get such behind us can we truly move forward to address all of the issues that we need to face together.

Ben Visnick

Ben Visnick said that he wears many hats, more hats now that he is losing hair. Visnick, seriously, said he is here tonight to say that he has a son who is graduating from Montera Middle School; that he is a high school teacher. He said the Board needs to look at the high schools, the middle schools as well as elementary schools. He said we are losing students. He said, referencing, Oakland High School, where he teaches, that enrollment is down. He says because funding is tied to ADA," you" are asking the high school to cut \$150,000 from its current budget next semester. He said that means the school could lose three teachers. Meanwhile, said Visnick, the District is being sued for not having a correct teacher administrator ratio. He said the District has a possible \$5 million hit coming because the District continues to under hire teachers and over hire administrators.

Visnick said when he came to Oakland High School the school had four administrators and many more students; now the school has 5.5 administrators and many hundreds of less students. He said the same thing is seen with QEIA. He said we work with the District; will be supporting critically the waivers so the precious money can be kept for District students. But, continued Visnick, as teachers, they are "sick and tired" seeing precious funding jeopardized by the mismanagement of this District. And it stops with the school board. He said the school board has a major task to eliminate mismanagement from the people the Board hires to apportion the precious funds. He said the Board needs to look at all of the good teachers who were leaving the District yearly. Visnick said, and then the veteran teachers who stay are forced to train teachers and a few years later those teachers are gone. He said pretty soon the Board will not have any veteran teachers in the District. He said that may help the bottom line. He said the Board may say "we do not have to pay teachers \$70,000 a year. Let's bring in all these teaches at \$39,000." He said to the Board unless there is retention and buildup of a career teaching force in the District, not through merit pay, but through raising [pay] for all of the teachers in creating a stable professional teaching force, the Board's task is going to be very difficult.

He said, as a veteran OEA leader, that the Board has a challenge; that the OEA is willing to meet with and work with the Board on the challenge but we cannot continue to have the dysfunction in the District which affects students.

Jeremy Branson

Jeremy Branson stated that he was here to speak to the Board about the proposal to do Crocker Highlands Elementary [attendance area] redistricting. He said he believes, as of last year, when Lakeview [Elementary School] was closed, the street he lives on – Walker Avenue - was included in the district [school attendance area]. He said, now, there is a proposal being considered to move the Western boundary back to Lakeshore. He said, obviously, he has questions why this is being done since people have bought houses and moved into the area, a few streets, under the idea [their kids] would be going to that school. He said that is something that parents think about.

Branson, continuing, said understandably the District had to make some decision about closing Lakeview. He said that decision has now put the kids in this area in ambiguity and it

is stressful, as the Board may have heard from many of the parents. He said he is concerned if the solution to deal with overcrowding at Crocker Highlands is just to redraw district [school area attendance] lines, it is not really helping things. He said it would not address the short-term problem and who knows if things will stabilize over time. He said it certainly disenfranchises him; that is how he feels. "One day somebody says, said Branson, oh I don't like you or your street or the car you drive or whatever, you are out of district [school attendance area]. " He said it seems these things should come from a more impartial panel; some kind of way of deciding redistricting that has a long-term goal; planning for the future, as opposed to today - it's overcrowding, let's kick some kids out of the district [school attendance area]. He said that does not make sense to him. Why wasn't there a proposal, or maybe there is, to add teachers or resources to deal with that. He said he is not sure that a lot of people know that this is going on [redrawing of Crocker Highlands school attendance area]. He said he had talked to a few parents just of history long time; they were surprised and, obviously, very concerned as to whether or not the sorts of things are happening in secret. And is there a way for a whole lot of parents on the other side of the line to organize and have a voice and there are just a few of us on the other, it's hard for us to do that, said Branson. He said that is all he wants to say today and he hopes that the Board takes it into consideration.

Cedric Troup

Cedric Troup, an alumni from Castlemont High School, said he was here today for the cause of trying to see what can be done about getting [unspecified] swimming facilities available to young people. He said his background is in education; that he is a swim coach; a swim advocate; a small business owner. He said this is what he does personally so he's looking to stand with the Board and hopefully the Board can stand with him; so that [unspecified] swim facilities can be reopened.

Troup, referring to a handout that he had distributed, said he wanted to go to a couple points. He said the East Oakland Swim Club is an organization that he started. He said that it originated, out of him being a small business owner, in particular a builder, who was impacted by the bad economy of a few years ago. He said because people are not building houses, he is not as busy but rather than getting depressed about it, he has a friend that does triathlons and he started working out with her to do triathlons. He said he got motivated to do the Alcatraz swim, which he did a couple years ago, which made local media. He said friends began to tell him they wished that they could swim, etc. He said at "that point, when he became aware that the high school pool that he grew up in – Castlemont High School - the pool that he was a part of with Oakland Parks and Recreation was not available, has not been available for over a decade. He said they were successful in getting the pool back open in the 2011 swim season but then there were maintenance problems, causing the forfeiture of the 2012 season. He said he could not describe for the Board the reward it was to see the students, that did not have the ability to swim prior to enrollment in swimming courses, self-accomplishment when they had completed the short 2.5 week, rather than the planned five week, [swimming] course.

Troup stated that in 2011 they had football guys, 25 incoming freshman and all of them by the completion of the course could swim the length of the pool. He said his effort is to try to bring awareness to the swim club as an aspect of the education process. He said to the Board if you look at the sheet presented, you will see a number of different defenseless women. He said one of the first points he put "knowing how to swim can save your life." He said Oakland Park and Recreations swimmer, Charles Gibson, who suffered a gulf boating accident, credits his having learned how to swim -Oakland public schools and the YMCA - with saving his life.

Troup said one is also talking about a life skill here. He said there are seven high schools in the District, of which only three competed in last year's swim finals - Oakland High,

Oakland Tech and Skyline, the latter which does not have a pool. He asked the Board to review the handout. He said he doesn't know how all of this is supposed to work but he knows that it is a great opportunity to give young people another tool, as well as the surrounding community, another tool for success. He said if you look at people who are swimmers they are going to be in good condition ... He said the point he is making is that he would like to begin a dialogue and a process where things are up and running so all of our students will have equal opportunity to excel in their education.

Ben Tapscott

Ben Tapscott said he welcomed the Board back and the two new Board members. He said he would hope the Board would serve all of the children of Oakland and not the select few. He said this school board has closed 14 black schools, one brown school. He said the Board, last year closed four black schools, making it harder for parents to get their child to school, and one brown school. He said there is a dropout rate of 48%, which is almost half of our students that are out in the streets under the age of 18. He said black and brown students are being underserved and he said there needs to be program funding, special attention. If API scores, said Tapscott, are any indicator black children are being underserved. Low performance primarily in those neighborhoods, where in the hills, schools are performing at a higher academic standard. So the question has to be, said Tapscott, what is the Board to do? What is the Office of the Superintendent going to do to bring those schools at the elementary level up to a higher standard? He said if they are behind at the elementary level they will probably be behind at the middle school level and probably behind or drop out by the time they reach grade 12.

The other thing, said Tapscott, is sixty-percent of the black males being suspended, with the number one cause being insubordination. He said he had a strong feeling that it is abuse of power by administrators or by teachers. He said parents have to take some blame for the behavior of their child but if you approach a young man, particularly a black male, in a hostile manner you will get back what you give. If those children, Tapscott said, were treated [by administrators and teachers] like they were their children, the behavior and the outcome would be different. The other thing, said Tapscott, is that you make a pledge twice a month that says "justice for all" so educating black and brown students is not only a civil rights issue but it is a human rights issue. Tapscott said we are not addressing it at this time by this Board or the Superintendent.

Carrie LaBauve

Carrie LaBauve, having greeted the Board with Happy New Year, said she is a representative from Carl B. Munck School; a parent of Oakland Unified School District; with a daughter that graduated in 1984 from Skyline and went to Ohio State. She said she is a grandparent of one child that just graduated from Skyline, with a 4.9 average; with another granddaughter who has just passed the benchmark. She said there was a letter written October 25 to discuss problems and issues that are going on at Carl B Munck and there has been no response.

At this point, the letter is left with Dr. Smith, said LaBauve. She said she also sent a copy to 12 people and the Oakland Unified School Board was one. She said some of the issues are: someone came out to discuss bullying; that is a joke policy. If you don't take it seriously we certainly need to at school said, LaBauve. When I tell you about a joke, said LaBauve, your kids in the cafeteria, one little boy has another one by the neck and he's doing a hump job. You take another young man, who gets out of the line and tries to jug his tongue down a girl's throat. And the policy of this lady who came, said LaBauve, strictly said there are degrees. There are degrees to murder, burglary as well, but this bullying thing has got to stop, said LaBauve.

The administrator at that school, said LaBauve, is vindictive, revengeful and anything else you can name; teachers against teachers, parents against teachers; that is what is going on at Carl B. Munck. She said she is going to close her remarks soon but she has a list of all that is going on there. LaBauve said there is a teacher, well-seasoned, well-liked, well discipline class and he's been given evaluations next to, lined with "You need to find a job." Everybody likes him. We have another teacher, said LaBauve. Oakland said it wasn't laying anybody off and guessed what she got a letter of consolidation. She is no longer there and we replaced that teacher with a teacher that has never taught before and is on YouTube. LaBauve said, that is Oakland Unified School District at Carl B. Munck. She said she does not know about other Oakland schools but she knows about that one.

LaBauve said when "We ask about the SSC budget and the financing and funding being done at the school, we are not privy to that information." She said she did come downtown seeking the information, detailed budget of the items going on and were told to go back where you come from, that is administration from Oakland Unified School District. LaBauve said she has yet to hear from Dr. Smith; yet to hear from anybody. She said the parent who wrote the letter October 25 is yet to hear from anybody to say we received your letter, with the exception of the Ombudsman. In closing, LaBauve said, if her granddaughter is caught in the middle of her being here to discuss this, she will be back and will be going to Sacramento.

Hayri Hatipoglu, Principal, Bay Area Technology School

Hayri Hatipoglu, stated and submitted the Petition/Charter Renewal for Bay Area Technology School (Grades 6-12)

Mike Hutchinson

Mike Hutchinson, speaking, stated that he is a lifelong resident of Oakland and proud graduate of Oakland Public Schools, said welcome to everyone on the Board. He said he hoped Board Members know what they have gotten into. He said he looks forward to being proven wrong. He said unfortunately it sounds like the beat continues. He said that the meeting here today is kind of indicative of the problems that have been going on in the District, especially over the last decade. He said it seems like we are incapable of taking care of our infrastructure; really taking care of what we have heard but that we like to build shiny new buildings across the street. He said it really tells a lot and unfortunately it is sad. He said hopefully we can see a different direction and a lot better going forward. He said, for himself personally, for a lot of us, who have been working on it, said Hutchinson, over the past year, we have decided this year that we are going to be a lot more proactive. In that vain, said Hutchinson, at the end of this month, he is going to be in Washington, DC, presenting testimony to the U.S. Department of Education about school closures, charter schools, and privatization; because, unfortunately, it is not just happening in Oakland but across the country. He said that links with other cities across the country have been established which are facing the same situation. He said he is very excited that Oakland is going to have ten minutes to present its story at the Department of Education with Secretary Duncan in attendance.

Hutchinson said along with that "We" would really like to link up with other people who are interested in being a part of the presentation. It would be nice to see, said Hutchinson, some current Board members wanting to get on board because these are problems that are affecting all of us. He said a lot of stuff has been heard out in the media, especially over the last year, that really was not true; that this is affecting all of us, especially poor communities; especially poor black and brown communities. It's not just happening here is Oakland, said Hutchinson, it is happening across the country – Crenshaw High down in LA; they are getting mobilized. It is happening from here all the way to DC; all the way down the Mississippi and everywhere in between, said Hutchinson. He said all really need to get on board and get on the same page. If people really care about our community, said Hutchinson, we need to have thriving public schools. If you close the school and it turns into a charter school where does the community go in an emergency? What happens to the property values in that neighborhood? What happens to the local businesses in the local industries? He said we are killing ourselves by the decisions we're making here, he said. Hutchinson said we can't wait, someone has to do it. To say that there is not enough money, said Hutchinson, doesn't cut it anymore. He said we need to have a better way of doing business; draw a line in the sand. He said that is what many of us already have done; draw a line in the sand and we're waiting for some of you [Board members and others] to come along with us. If not, we're already working on an end run, going to the state level, to the federal level because eventually someone will listen to us, said Hutchinson, and someone will see the value of public education. He said, please everyone let's get involved and start working together; and have a better way for Oakland. He said January 29, "look for us in Washington, D.C."

Carmen Jimenez

Student Director Carmen Jimenez made the following report:

On December 18th, 2012 we had our 4th All City Council general Middle School meeting at West Oakland Middle School. Among the attendees were Westlake, Bret Harte, Frick, and West Oakland Middle School.

Delegates from Bret Harte Middle School report that some of the improvements in their school were less bullying. These improvements were due to conversations with students who had been bullied in the past. Two remaining concerns include unsanitary bathrooms and the school lunches. The custodian has taken care of the bathrooms and the students have spoken to the lunch providers. An upcoming event is the Valentine's Dance. The students have begun planning their action project which will be to organize and plan an assembly/rally/play to address the issue of bullying.

Delegates from West Oakland Middle School report that some of the improvements in their school are improved uniform policy and less fighting. These improvements are all due to the implementation of having different uniform options. Some remaining concerns are rats in the school. No steps have been taken to address this action. Two upcoming events are 5th grade Play Day and Award Ceremony. The students have begun planning their action project which will be Phoenix Rising Day to help increase school size and enrollment and will also incorporate a tour of the school campus to new and future students.

Delegates from Westlake Middle School report that some of the improvements in their school are the apprenticeship show and discovery night remix. These improvements were due to the Spark Program and through the planning from the leadership teacher, Mr. Bell. Some remaining concerns are the dress code and Friday night school. The school has doing ongoing promotion of the Westlake Way. The students are trying to help out and push the Westlake Way. The administration provides incentives for everyone who follows

the dress code. Upcoming events include a school dance and Winter Concert. The students have begun planning their action project which will focus on building diversity and relationships.

Delegates from Frick Middle School report that some of the improvements are the full implementation of a leadership class. Student representatives from each class were elected and the students meet weekly. The Meaningful Student Engagement curriculum is fully intergraded in the leadership class. No concerns were identified. The students have begun planning their action project which will address the issue of bullying by creating a more positive school climate.

On December 20th, 2012 we had our 4th All City Council general High School meeting at McClymonds High School. Among the attendees were Life Academy, Fremont, McClymonds, Ralf J. Bunche, CCPA, and Skyline.

Delegates from CCPA report that some of the improvements in their school are uniforms, improved grades, lower classmen and upper classmen are getting along better. One remaining concern is the cafeteria food. Student leadership is currently working on better lunches and more activities for students. An upcoming event is Martin Luther King Jr. event.

Delegates from Skyline report that some concerns are teachers, administration, confronting violence, and gang activity. There is no principal at the school so no actions have been taken to address this issue. Student leaders at the One Land One People Center are currently working on improving their campaign skills and getting ready to launch their campaign in January. An upcoming event is First Friday and Lunching Campaigns.

Delegates from Bunche report that some concerns are competent teachers and cafeteria food. No actions have been taken to address the identified issues. Student leaders are currently working on decorating the school and fundraising. There are no upcoming events.

Delegates from McClymonds report that some of the improvements in their school are the heater working and a lot of events for students to participate in. A remaining concern is the cafeteria food. An adult is helping the students to address the issue of improving the cafeteria food. Upcoming events include Winter Ball, home coming, and Alumni Basketball Game.

Delegates from Fremont High report that some of the improvements in their school are decrease in fights due to longer lunch. Some remaining concerns include lights at night and more support for junior and seniors. Student leaders are currently working on a talent show and rallies. There are no upcoming events.

Delegates from Life Academy report that some of the improvements in their school are AP classes, medical based classes for juniors and sophomores, sports, and connection with larger organizations for internships. Student leaders are currently working on Season of Peace building and plans for next year. Upcoming events include Season of Peace Building and Love and Peace Festival.

President Kakishiba opened the Public Hearing at 6:04 P.M.

Don Stoneham, Vice Chair, Board of Directors, East Oakland Leadership Academy High School (EOLAH), introduced the presentation for the Petitioners. Mr. Stoneham noted that he has served EOLAHS for 9 years since its inception. He thanked the Board for approving the school's charter five years ago. He said the school really appreciates the opportunity to serve and shape the young people's future. He said the school is proud of the fact that in May 2012 that 90% of their graduates went on to college. He said many of those pupils are first generation college students.

Stoneham said today rather than him speaking EOLAHS current and future high school students will speak, not able to get any of the graduated students to be heard today because they're in college. He said students will be followed by Ms. Jamieson, an English teacher from the academic program. He urged the audience to inspire and encourage the young speakers.

Chantenee Fortelle, a 7th Grader

Chantenee said during her four years at EOLAHS she went from a not so good student to an advanced student. She said she likes EOLA because it is safe, and how hands-on and focused the teachers are with students. She said she would like to continue her education at EOLA and then further her education at EOLAHS. She thanked the Board for its time.

Malisa, a 7th Grader

Melissa Aloysius said she has been going to EOLA for five years. She said the school has helped her improve. She said she is doing much better than when she first got there. She said what she likes most about the school is, it is very safe and it gives her a great education. In addition, Melissa said, she has heard some fantastic things from her brother and she is excited about continuing to go to EOLAHS. She thanked the Board for its time.

Emily, a 7th Grader

Emily stated that she likes EOLA because it is small, safe and that she likes that the teachers teach lessons thoroughly. She's also said that she likes that classes are smaller and that you can learn better. She said she would like to go to EOLAHS because her cousin and her brother are students there and say wonderful things about. She thanked the Board for its time.

Christopher, a 9th Grader

Christopher stated he likes EOLAHS because of the way the teachers communicate with each other, with students and he also likes it because EOLA has helped him be focused and with his attitude. He said that he's been allowed to do good job and he hopes to go forward. He says he has a little sister in second grade and because of the teacher she has his sister is going to be someone in the future. He thinks all of the teachers are good and he likes EOLA because it is also small. He knows that he can actually be someone in life, thinking that school. Thank you.

Ashly Brown, a 10th Grader

Ashley said she is in 10th grade and has been at EOLA for five years. She stated her favorite subjects are math and science. In the future, she said she sees herself becoming a lawyer. She said she believes that her school will help her achieve that goal. Thank you.

Jamail, an 11th Grader

Jamail Mithcell stated that she has been going to EOLA for six years and has four brothers who also attend: one in 10th, 6th, 5th and kindergarten. She said she still keeps in touch with some of the graduates of the class of 2012; they are doing good and they're in college. She said she just wants to go down the same path, graduate and succeed. Thank you.

Tommaso, an 11th Grader

Tommaso said that she had been an EOLA student for six years. She said she wants to go to college to become a neonatal nurse. She said she knows that the school will help her accomplish a goal. She said she likes EOLAHS because it is a safe school. EOLA is a family to her, said Tommaso. She said when she first started school at EOLA she lived a couple of blocks away; then they moved but her family stayed at EOLA because her parents feel that it is a good school. She said she now has cousins enrolled in elementary school that want to come to the high school. She stated EOLAHS is a good school and it should stay open. She thanked the Board for its time.

Mr. Stoneham stated that Doctor Armstrong, the founder, is available to answer any questions. But for right now Mrs. Jamieson, the English teacher is going to walk us through the presentation.

Ms. Julia Jamieson, using a PowerPoint, made the EOLAHS presentation. Ms. Jamison said this [slide 2] is our class of 2012. Of these students, this is a map [slide3] that shows where some of the graduates are now, with more details in a moment, said Jamieson. Jaimeson, said, 9 of the 15 students of the class of 2012 graduated and all are enrolled in postsecondary education: four are at four-year universities; two at Cal State East Bay; one at San Francisco State; one at Humboldt State; four at community colleges – two at Merritt and two at Chabot and one graduate is at Wyotech, a technical school. She said there also was one young man who completed the credit requirements for graduation from high school and passed the English Language arts portion of the Exit Exam but, unfortunately, was not able to pass the Math portion of the exit exam. He is now enrolled in Job Corps, where he received math CASHEE Tutoring; took the exit exam, again, before the holidays , and is awaiting his score. Meantime, he is receiving training as a plaster and has his first, very lucrative, job in that industry. He came back Monday and shared his story, said Jamieson.

Jamieson said there were five students that did not graduate in 2012 due to insufficient credits as well as an ability to pass the exit exam – by some. These students are all enrolled in continuation high school education programs and all are scheduled to receive their necessary credits at the end of the first semester or by the end of this year.

Jamieson said one comment that should would like to make about those students is that they entered EOLA after the ninth grade. Jamieson said the school requires 230 out of 240 possible credits to graduate; unfortunately, if students come to the school in the 10th or 11th grade more than 10 credits deficient they did not have the ability to make up all of those credits. Jamieson stated the school has improved its program for credit recovery, which she will discuss a little bit later during the presentation.

Jameson said the EOLAHS academic program exceeds the A-G requirements. The school requires four years of math; four years of English; four years of science; three years a world language –Spanish; three years of social studies; two years of physical education; two years of service learning; one year of drama - the visual and performing arts requirement; and one year of an English language arts high school exit exam preparation class. All of the school's students must satisfy the UC, CSU A-G requirements to graduate. She said this means that a "C" is the lowest passing grade at the school.

Jamieson said credit recovery is available to summer school and in addition to the schools summer program, there is ACELLUS. ACELLUS is an online learning program in which teachers are able to enroll students in courses which are compatible with the high school courses. These courses feature multiple video segments instructed by classroom teachers followed by exercises assessing student's ability to complete the content discussed in the video segments. ACELLUS instruction is paced, said Jamieson, so that if students do not demonstrate mastery of content, they are given more instruction until they are able to show mastery. Jamieson said, while the school does not intend to use ACCELLUS to supplant classroom instruction, it will be used as an opportunity for credit recovery for students who find themselves irreparably deficient, through summer school, in credits. The staff has been trained in the use ACCELUS in November 2012 and will be piloting its use this upcoming semester for credit recovery with a select number of students. ACCELUS and summer school, said Jamieson, will be for credit recovery starting in 2013. She said, like the previous one year, referred to five from this past year, the hope is that students will now be able to complete all of their needed credits at EOLAHS and stay with the school until they are able to graduate.

Jamieson said that EOLAHS API growth was not great for the first three years. Unfortunately, the school's suffered small declines each year, said Jamieson. However this year, said Jamieson, the school's 2012 year growth not only compensated for both the years of loss but in fact exceeded the 2009 scores significantly and had a 2012 API growth equivalent to that of Oakland Unified School District.

Jamieson stated that EOLAHS high school exam rates have been significantly better in terms of how the numbers look. She said there was a small decline in English Language Arts performance between first and second year but then made a major improvement in 2012. She attributes the improvement to implementation of the English Language Arts Exit Exam Class which is required for all freshmen. By requiring this class of freshmen, said Jamieson, the school is able to provide subsequent additional instruction during the sophomore year before and after school before students have to take the exam for the first time.

Jamieson stated that EOLAHS mathematics pass rate has increased each year and in 2012 the pass rate was only 3% less than the average for the State of California. Jamieson said the school continues to provide supplement instruction as needed, before and after school, to increase the pass rate to the goal of 100% of students passing the exit exam.

Jamieson said, in addition to the academic program, EOLAHS has a Service Learning Program (SLP). She said this picture [slide 11] is of the school's SLP students right before the holidays making a visit to an elderly care facility. All juniors and seniors are required to take SLP, said Jamieson, as a course and students must complete a minimum of 20 hours of community service during 11th and 12th grade years. In some previous years some students have completed internships to fulfill the community service requirement including internships with Beehovath and Riles, Attorneys-at-Law, and Fairmont Medical Center as well as several different auto repair facilities. In addition, said Jamieson, students do complete field trip community services, as represented by picture shown [slide 11].

Jamison said in the current school year EOLAHS has implemented an afterschool program for all 9TH grade students. There are two components: the EOLA After School Youth Leadership Program and an Enrichment Component, said Jamison. The EOLA After School Youth Leadership Program supplements the school's academic curriculum and has five components: 1)Learning 101 where students have supervised homework time with access to peer and adult tutoring and college preparation; 2) inner and outer beauty includes knowledge of self, public speaking, character building, personal hygiene and writing as self-expression, students keep a journal to learn to express themselves in a form that they might not usually choose; 3) healthy living including nutrition, physical activity and cooking, with a focus on healthy recipes; 4) abstinence for pregnancy prevention, STD awareness with a focus on HIV and AIDS awareness, examining the consequences of teen pregnancy, teen birth rates and practicing abstinence; and 5) career development/career choices, job interview preparation and resume and cover letter. Jamison said for the healthy living component students have an opportunity to participate in the Culinary Arts Academy at Rainbow Recreation Center.

The Enrichment Component is the Digital Arts Academy at Rainbow Recreation Center, which gives the students a bit of fun as well as supplemental learning, said Jamison. This picture [slide 15] is of the Career Development Students on the day of their mock job interview, which happened right before the holidays. They were required to come to school in job appropriate attire, with prepared resumes and cover letters and real job applications, said Jamison, prior to afterschool job interviews.

Jamison said EOLAHS students are representative of the neighborhood, fundamentally a neighborhood school. Like Tommaso, some start as neighborhood students and when they move away stay with the school, with the vast majority of pupils living in the neighborhood. The school has 53 students current school year as follows: 19 in 9th grade; 19 in 10th grade; seven in 11th grade and 8 in 12th grade; 25 are female and 28 are male; 11 are African-American and 42 are Latino and 100% of the students are eligible for Free and Reduced Lunch, stated Jamison. Jamison said the school serves the community in which it

is located. She said the school takes great pride in the fact that it serves the local student with a program that does well and prepares them for college. Jamison said the college advising consists of formal advising for juniors and seniors; field trips to area colleges and universities to promote student interest and some students this year have received their college acceptance letters. Jamison showed a picture [slide 18] of the college field trip to UC Berkeley this past fall.

Jamison thanked the Board for its attention.

Public Comments

Ben Tapscott

Tapscott said he was wondering if we could take the best practices from some of our top performing charter schools and transfer those techniques and strategies to the schools that are not performing? The other question, said Tapscott, that he wanted to have answered is: are the charter schools following the Oakland Athletic League (OAL) grading policy A-F? He said it is his understanding that McClymonds was not issuing D's at one point and that was clarified because it is a violation of the grading policy. He recommended to new board member James Harris that he checked to see whether Castlemont is in fact still violating [no D] that policy.

Tapscott further stated that it would be advantageous for high schools as well as charter schools to go to a seven period day because students could then make up credits in which they are behind and also get them back on target. He said McClymonds parents will be requesting a seven period day which will give pupils four more credits over a four-year period. The other thing that could increase retention, said Tapscott, and reduce the dropout rate is summer school. He said he taught in Oakland for 16 years and all students that were behind were allowed to go to summer school. He said, Doctor Smith, unless he is incorrect that you must be [currently] an 11th or 12th grader to go to summer school. He said if that is factual, it doesn't make a lot of sense if we are trying to reduce the dropout rate.

Tapscott noted that Vice President Hinton Hodge had just left and had mentioned priorities about the building across the street. He said that he is hoping that McClymonds will get a beautification project pretty soon because that building was built in 1939.

[No other registered Public Speakers for this item spoke.]

President Kakishiba noted that this legislative item is both a SECOND READING and a Public Hearing regarding the attendance area boundaries for Crocker Highlands and Cleveland Elementary Schools. Kakishiba announced, in terms of process, that there will be a staff presentation from the Superintendent of Schools, opening of the Public Hearing, taking of Comments, closure of Public Hearing, and then entertainment of a Motion [if one].

Superintendent Tony Smith said that David Montes de Oca, Director, Quality Schools Improvement, will do the Presentation; that it is a follow-on from the Presentation done at the prior meeting of the Board. He said there have been some amendments made to the initial proposal and as requested by the Board two scenarios of which Mr. Montes de Oca will take us through each. Superintendent Smith said he appreciated a) the way that Mr. Montes de Oca has managed the process; b) how he's engaged community, the number meetings he has held, which is pretty remarkable.

Mr. Montes de Oca said the Superintendent and the staff are presenting a recommendation this evening, in response to the Board of Education's direction, approved on October 24, 2012, to provide a remedy to address the potential for chronic kindergarten over subscription at Crocker Highlands Elementary School.

Montes stated, following the Board approved restructuring in 2011, the staff conducted a

series of steps to implement revised attendance area boundaries that included the attendance area boundary of Crocker Highlands Elementary School as a result of the closure five elementary schools [School Year 2011-2012]. Subsequent to that, said Montes, oversubscription of the kindergarten class at Crocker Highlands Elementary occurred during the 2011-2012 School Year. Meaning, said Montes that those applicants residing in the school's attendance boundary had oversubscribed for the kindergarten class for the 2012-2013 School Year.

Montes said while a temporary solution was implemented for the 2012-2013 School Year staff initiated an effort to develop a long-term remedy. He said such resulted in the recommendations that are in today's staff report.

Montes said based on analysis of new, additional information and data, staff anticipates fluctuating degrees of chronic oversubscription at Crocker Highlands Elementary School is likely to be ongoing. He said, based on the Board's direction to consider remedies, staff recommends that the Board of Education revise the current Crocker Highlands Elementary and Cleveland Elementary Attendance Boundaries, reducing the former and expanding the latter. He said doing so will ensure that all affected residents will maintain enrollment priority in a quality community school option; increases the likelihood that neighborhood residents interested in enrolling in their attendance area school will gain access, though not guaranteed, based on Board policy; reduces the total enrollment demand and likelihood of substantial chronic oversubscription at Crocker Highlands, further aligning with the school's enrollment capacity, and increases the ability to establish a connection between Cleveland Elementary and residents within the expanded attendance area, continuing the opportunity for sustaining long-term enrollment viability.

Montes said factors in identifying Cleveland Elementary attendance area [compared to Crocker Highland] for expansion were: similar high academic performance, comparable high quality program, proximity to the area and capacity of [Cleveland] facility and program.

Montes said it is staff's recommendation that the Board take action on the item this evening, to be implemented for the 2013-2014 enrollment period.

Montes said that staff presented in the FIRST READING a boundary change scenario, now entitled version 1, which depicts a large section between Lakeshore and Grand Avenue, currently contained within the Crocker Highlands Attendance Area to be allocated to Cleveland Elementary. Following the presentation of the staff recommendation during FIRST READING, said Montes, Board discussion indicated a desire to consider continued growth in enrollment [at Crocker Highlands]. For that reason the Superintendent and staff are providing a second attendance area proposal designated as version 2, which effectively removes the blocks, based on the 2010 Census, that contains the highest density of 0 to 4-year-olds reported, thus further reducing the demand on kindergarten enrollment [at Crocker Highlands].

Montes said, therefore, the Superintendent and staff have presented two proposed boundaries scenarios with proposal version 2 taking into account the Board's desire for consideration of continued growth [within the Crocker Highlands Attendance Area.] Staff recommends, said Montes, the Board of Education, at its discretion, approved either of the proposed scenarios: version 1 or version 2, contained in the staff report, to be implemented beginning the 2013-2014 enrollment period.

Montes, concluding presentation, said staff is happy to answer questions.

President Kakishiba recognized the following Board members for comments/questions to staff:

Jody London

Director Jody London thanked Montes de Oca for this work. London asked Montes to restate for her the differences between scenario 1 and scenario 2, i.e., streets. Montes, responding, said specifically there is a section to the most northern portion of what was to retain blocks within the Crocker Highlands Attendance Area, identified through the 2010 Census Data, that has the highest density of 0-4 students in the area on the opposite side of Lakeshore Avenue and, in scenario 2, ascribed those blocks to Cleveland Elementary and left the remaining portion for Crocker Highlands.

London said she's just trying to make sure that she understands the differences between scenario one and scenario 2. She said it is our understanding that one of them went to Weldon. Is that the Street to become the dividing line, ask London? Or Fairbanks? She said she is trying to remember and had driven the area this afternoon. Montes said the new shift is to Warfield, under scenario 2. He said scenario one, created a triangular shape that went all the way to Grand Avenue.

London said there was a portion between Lakeshore and Grand Avenue that remained in the Crocker Attendance Area and that she is trying to remember what that was. Montes said, bringing up the visual, pointed out the triangular shape of the northern section that is allocated to Crocker Highlands Elementary in scenario 1 and in scenario 2, that section is removed and allocated to Cleveland Elementary.

London, referencing scenario one, in the visual, ask what is the name of the Street between the "green and the pink" on the bottom section?" Montes said "Fairbanks."

London said her second question is, having talked at the last Board meeting about additional outreach that was to be done to folks living in the green triangle area, and the Board just heard a Speaker during Non-Agenda Item Public Comment Period, who said he didn't feel he had been notified. She asked Montes if he could talk a little bit about what the outreach process has been? Montes, said between the previous Board meeting and the current Board meeting, including Winter Break, District posted through blogs that went out, posted with both of the schools notice of the upcoming public hearing [today] at the school sites and he sent staff throughout the region to post flyers and in other parts of the City.

London thanked Montes for his responses.

Gary Yee

Director Gary Yee thanked staff for the work. He said he's interested in the potential impact of oversubscription to Cleveland with the additional space. Yee asked, how many new students is the estimated maximum impact on Cleveland's enrollment? Montes responding said, naturally sometimes enrollment follows trends and sometimes it doesn't. He said that in the presentation, staff has included a description of some enrollment trends that lend to the belief given the number of neighborhood students that are currently served at Cleveland Elementary, and the trend of those numbers, the number of students identified through data analysis and the potential for those students to historical apply to Cleveland Elementary, staff believes the school can sustain, over an extended period of time, the potential enrollment subscription. He said naturally choices made by families could shift but staff believes

Yee said he would like an estimate of the actual number. He said the number must be in staff's mind of the reduction and the subscription to Crocker. He said he is doing this in a very simple way under the assumption that those students would now attend Cleveland and that there would not be drop-off to charters, to open enrollment. What would be the maximum, feasible number, in staff's professional judgment, received by Cleveland, asked

Yee?

Monte responding, said specifically to the kindergarten classes at Cleveland, the school could enroll as many as 75-80 students in three kindergarten classes, potentially. Continuing, Montes said, the school's kindergarten classes currently serves about 50% neighborhood students and given the number of 0-4 families and the distribution of those students 0-4 each year, which is essentially divided by five years, one might approximate for about 145 additional students, 0-4 divided by five. Montes said roughly 50% of that would be roughly

Yee said 20. Montes agreed, roughly 15 to 20 subscribed. Yee acknowledged to Montes that he had been following his [Montes] analysis. Yee said that most of the people who have come [to the prior meetings] have spoken about the desire to preserve space and flexibility to Crocker. He said he is very interested in providing equal attention to the other schools – Piedmont Avenue and Cleveland School. Yee said in many cases these pose a dilemma of competing values, resources. He said he likes the idea of increased predictability in enrollment at Cleveland School. He said he raised his own children across the street from the school; shopped in the Lakeshore Neighborhood. It is within walking distance, said Yee, so he does not think there are any issues there. He said he is very proud of how the school [Cleveland] has continued to develop as a high quality school.

Yee said that he is not inclined to positions which value or favor Crocker Highlands over Cleveland. And, would say the same things about Piedmont Avenue, with its growth, stated Yee. He said he wants to be sure the policy the Board makes is not in response to the large number of Crocker Highland families who are coming to express their view and the small, significantly, smaller number of families that are representing the interests of Cleveland School. Yee, continuing, said, and in the judgment of the professional staff involved in Cleveland School, [that the recommendations are] not an absorption of Crocker Highlands problems.

Montes, replying, said the entire process has been driven by both the spirit and the intent of the Board's Policy on School Portfolio Management, which is to ensure a high quality school for every child in every neighborhood. He said staff believes that the recommendations put forward to the Board is in-service of insuring that the District provides a high quality school in every child in every neighborhood.

Yee said correct; that staff has now provided Board with an option 1 or option 2. He asked Montes to apply a politics neutral, valued, thoughtful dilemma based value recommendation regarding the two options.

Montes said, in service to the Board's desire for staff to consider continued growth, staff believes that option 2 provides the ability to consider continued growth.

Superintendent Smith, responding, stated he believes that scenario 2 captures the Board's request for considering growth. He also said he wanted to highlight the leadership and work of Cleveland, not just the sitting principal but the community and the way it has considered the questions raised by Director Yee. How does this impact Piedmont Elementary? Others? Not taking away kids? He said the school has held these questions as the frame the whole time. He said as staff has considered growth, obviously there are other people that have advocated for drawing the Crocker Highlands boundary as very small, as possible, and having a very tiny boundary because there are many children who live next to Crocker that do not choose the school. He said, in fact, if in fact the District drew by Census, the smallest boundary. He said Cleveland folks did not advocate that. Smith said staff's recommendation is the "balanced approach" to consider requests from multiple schools. He said although Piedmont Avenue is not represented in this, they also have been part of the staff dialogue.

Yee said the reason he raised this is because it is a Board member's responsibility, in his view, not simply to respond to large numbers of public comments regarding a particular issue but to charge the Superintendent and staff to make thoughtful decisions [recommendations] on behalf of the District as a whole. He said that when staff offered two options, he needed to know option 2 enhances the notions of equity; does not redistribute privilege or problems to other sites, which is often alleged by Board decision making. And that, said Yee that the Board can thoughtfully decide. He said, continuing, that he knows that Mr. Montes de Oca looks at the numbers much more thoughtfully and that Board members can look at boundaries, as Director London has, and drive the streets but do not know the enrollment trends; the live go data, the number of 0-4 families, etc., so we need to entrust that the Superintendent and his staff is looking after all schools with equity in mind and distribution of resources in fair ways. He said that is why he wanted Montes, and, ultimately, the Superintendent's recommendation to be clear for all Board members.

President Kakishiba, upon query, having received no further questions from his colleagues, opened the Public Hearing on this legislative matter at 6:40 p.m.

President Kakishiba, having been advised upon query there were 15 Speaker Cards on the matter, allocated Speaker Time at 2 Minutes each.

Nikki Maguire

Nikki Maguire stated that she lives in the 3500 block of Lakeshore Avenue, which on the map, unfortunately, marked as part of a parking lot as opposed to being a residential street. She stated she is here to ask the Board to consider an amendment to both versions 1 and 2. She said in the original staff report, all of Lakeshore Avenue was included but there are [in latest report] three blocks, on both proposals, that are excluded. She said she would like to keep the street together as part of the community. She said she is advocating an amendment to both plan versions.

Maguire stated she has two young children and both of them are in private school at the moment; intends for them to stay in private school. She said the District's Plan has no benefit to her personally but [she is here advocating] to keep the community together.

Matt Davies

Matt Davies, a Crocker Parent, said he really appreciates the opportunity to work with the District and staff in this process, as a community and to generate the feedback on the oversubscription matter at Crocker; to see the analysis. He said this a case of supply and demand. And there is a tremendous amount of demand at Crocker and only a certain amount of seats, said Davies. He said the school has had three kindergarten classes in the past and had to add a fourth this year in order to accommodate the demand. He said of the fourth kindergarten, Principal Beth Ryan has said, is not sustainable on the facility. He said to talk about politics or privileges or any of those matters, the issue is really about the seats at the school and the demand within the community, not only of the boundary as it is now, but, he believes, the school was at capacity in the prior boundary before the school closures [School Year 2011-2012]. He said he thinks the current process has been extremely thoughtful; detailed and it is the most thoughtful one seen yet. He said that it is important to take stock for what is best for the school.

Davies said that the community dialogue is two ways and it is a positive for the staff; for the community and for the Board. He said "we" want to get as many families into the District as possible; bring that conversation together, so that families can be long term members. He said over 50 percent of Crocker last year moved on to Edna Brewer and the same thing needs to be done at the high school level. He that is what all should be talking about, not

about who can get in here, there. He said the time for division is over and this is a step in the right direction. He asked the Board to vote on whichever scenario give the most amount of growth for the school that will allow more people to apply in from other areas, because if there is too much demand you cannot apply in from outside of the boundaries.

Unidentified [Name Not Stated] Speaker (Female)

Speaker urged the Board to approve version 2 of the recommendation which, in her opinion, provides the most flexibility for, at this time, Crocker Highlands to remain a neighborhood school. She urged the Board to continue to explore ways to make sure that such is true in the future. She understand it's a little benefit, as the last speaker said, that Crocker was oversubscribed or at capacity. She said maintaining a neighborhood school is a benefit to the school, to the District and to the City as a whole. It, said the speaker, is not so much about who gets in and who does not, but allowing it to be – the read is to allow it to be some sort of predictor that if you live in the attendance area or boundary that your child has a very likelihood of getting in, will make the school better. And that, she said, is better for everyone, for the school, for the environment to be able to walk two blocks to school. It is a community issue, she continued, and removing that will degrade the quality of the school and will not help anyone else.

Elizabeth Karger

Elizabeth Karger, member of the Crocker Long-Range Planning Committee, and a parent of three, two of whom are currently attending Crocker, said she is starting out by taking a moment to say "Thank You" to the OUSD Board Members, in particularly to Director Kakishiba, to District staff and officials, for taking the time to hear concerns and work with them over the last six months.

Karger said the responsiveness has given her renewed optimism that there is a process through which grievances can be heard and responded to in a timely manner. "Thank You for That, said Karger.

Karger said tonight represents the culmination of more than six months of working together to address the oversubscription problem at Crocker through much iteration and back and forth. She said tonight, the Board is asked to vote on District staff recommendation to revise downward Crocker's previously expanded boundary. She said while the recommendation does not go as far as rolling back Crocker's boundaries to the original locations, the new recommendation does reduce the expanded boundary by about seventy-five percent (75%) versus the proposal put in place about a year ago. A seventy-five percent reduction in homes added to the boundaries is a significant step in the right direction, but some of us, said Karger, wonder whether it is enough. She said if neighborhood trends continue as they have, many, including herself, will be back before Board within three to six months' time facing yet another oversubscription problem at Crocker. Karger said as much as she admires her follow CLRPC Members, please trust her when she says none of us want that.

Karger said with the hopeful passage of the reduced boundary recommendation, tonight, a wait and see approach seems prudent regarding Crocker's enrollment for 2013-2014. She urges the Board to keep an open door to consideration of further boundary revisions, if in fact Crocker is once again oversubscribed this year or in coming years. She thanked the Board for time and consideration of the issue.

Sina Anderssel

Sina Anderssel, mother to a two and four year old. She said "Thank you" to the Board for the work done and the continued study on this issue. She too fears that "we are not

finished", said Anderssel. She thinks today proposal is a huge step in the right direction but the data being used is primarily the 2010 Census. She said she has the benefit of having been the President for the Crocker Coop and knows that a lot of young families are moving into the area. She said there is an onslaught of them and they all want to go to Crocker and will go to the school. She said more and more children and families are choosing public education.

Anderssel, again, said today's proposal, is a step in the right direction. She said she wants to make sure that all are open to the idea of continuing this discussion and maybe rolling back the boundaries further if needed. She also said she is sorry that she may not be able to stay at meeting for resolution –sick husband and two sick kids at home - but her being here is an indication of how important the issue is to her. She said she wanted to be here to talk with Board. She thanked the Board for time and its attention.

Tara Montanez

Tara Montanez, a mother of two, who will be kindergarten age in 2014, 2016, respectively. She said she has been involved in this issue since eighteen of her friends and neighbors were turned away from Crocker, initially, in last year's class. At that time, in response to what could be done about that as an issue, she started a petition, said Montanez, to reverse to the old boundaries of Crocker Highland. She said the Petition has received over 350 signatures within the neighborhood both offline and online, the results of which have been presented to all Board members, with an email to the new Board members today. Montanez said she is very happy about the resolution tonight and the fact that it does reduce the overcrowding and, hopefully, will add some relief for next year's class, in time for next year's enrollment period. She said, however, as many have stated, she does not believe this [pending recommendation] is a remedy for long term oversubscription and that "we" will be in front of Board as an issue in the future. She said as previously mentioned, Crocker was at capacity fully within the old neighborhood before the boundary changed. And the data used from the "2011 (sic) "Census is one point in time, said Montanez. She said approximately 490 homes have been added to the 1900 or so homes that were in the old boundary; that is an addition of twenty-percent of homes. She said Judy Cain will speak to this a little bit but research of recent home sales within 2012 found that eighty-percent of all the homes being sold are going to families who either have young children, or like herself purchased homes intending to have children a few years from now who would go to Crocker.

Montanez said, using other data sources, actually shows the trends to be higher than for 2011 and in a survey done by the Crocker Long Range Planning Committee, they saw very similar statistics of people looking to send children to the school from previous years. So, said Montanez, they do not see these numbers going down. Again, said Montanez, she supports the version 2 initiative for tonight but hope not to actually appear in front of the Board too many more times in the future and hope a long term resolution becomes a priority.

Nia Lozano

Nia Lozano, a parent of two Crocker graduates: one now at Edna Brewer and the other at Oakland Tech. She said that she is a deep believer and strong supporter of Oakland Public Schools. She said she has been involved in this issue since the very beginning. She said while she does not have children who will need to attend Crocker, but she is here on behalf of all of the families who had their hopes dashed when the District over expanded the boundaries last year.

Lozano said she has been involved in a grass-roots community group called the Cocker Longer Range Planning Committee (CLRPC) for the past six to seven months. She said the group has been working with the District. She is very happy the District has slowly realized that there is in fact a problem and, in addition, has created a response for this, first version 1. She said there is realization that "we are not there yet" in rolling back the boundaries to a sustainable level for the community and in fact, the District has gone ahead with version 2. She said she very strongly supports version 2 tonight. She said there is an absolute need to insure that families have the option, a better opportunity, a better chance to get into their neighborhood school. She urged the Board to make a vote tonight to implement version 2. She said, however, as some other speakers have said, she, too, is worried that enough has not been done and "we" will be back again in a number of months. She said she hope the Board will consider making a vote tonight and considering this in the future as well. She thanked Board for time.

Yulanda Smith

Yulanda Smith, a member of the Crocker Long Range Planning Committee, and a current Crocker parent of a first grader and a pending 2015 kindergartener addressed the Board. She said her motivation to participate in the Committee was truly out of her commitment to public school and public education in the concept of a neighborhood school and for people to have a relative, reasonable amount of certainty that they can go to the school that they can see blocks from their home.

Smith said that she believes tremendous work has been done. She thanked the District, in particular David Montes de Oca for the work done with him over the past six months. She said it has been a long road and a lot of time by a lot of individuals for "us" to get to this place. Smith stated that she believes option 2 is an option that actually remedies the situation today and, as she understands it, not only for Crocker but remedies the under subscription for Cleveland Elementar Scjool. She said it is a "win win" on both sides.

Smith said she believes the lession learned that all should take away from this is that the boundaries in the District probably should be revisited on a more frequent basis; that this is not just something about Crocker's oversubscription, its also learning how to address under subscription in other schools in the District. She said that she would hope the Board and the District moving forward will take a much broader look to understand how all schools are being impacted by over and under subscription and draw lines to insure that all kids within their communities have an opportunity to go to their neighborhood schools. She, again, thanked all for the work that has been done. She strongly encouraged the Board to vote tonight so that any uncertainty is alleviated for parents or anyone impacted by this decision as soon as possible.She, again, urged the Board vote tonight for option 2. She thanked Board for time.

Unidentified [Name Not Stated] Speaker (Male)

The Unidentified Speaker began by stating that one of the things that he loved about the building across the street [the now shuttered Administration Building @ 1o25 2nd Avenue], and there are not many, is that fact that there is a podium [public speakers] and he can rest his paper on it. He said good evening to all and welcomed the two newest Board members and acknowledged that he had meet most Board members over the last six or seven months and likely would be doing so again soon.

The Speaker said the decision the Board is going to make tonight is going to affect hundreds of kids and hundreds of families. He said Board members know, because most of you are parents, it's the not knowing that really hurts. Where are my kids going to go to school, he said? He said that is a deep, deep issue and very painful. He said his daughter is already admitted to Crocker, so he does not have to worry, but like Yulanda, he is dedicated and motivated by the long term interests not only of the school but also of parents and trying to alleviate some of their stress. He asked, "Will changing the boundaries achieve a hundred percent of what is necessary to combat oversubscription at Crocker?" The numbers state "No. But it is a start," said the Speaker. He said just today the Vice President of the United States, who probably is not quoted very often at these meetings, said "I want to make clear that we are not going to get caught up in the notion that unless that we can do everything we are going to do nothing. It is critically important that we act." [Gun violence] Speaker said he is saying the same thing to the Board tonight on the Crocker issue, "that it is critically important that we act." He said his group is committed to see this through and working with the District to make sure Crocker, Cleveland and Piedmont are all better schools in the future that serve the students and families in their respective neighborhoods. He thanked all for time and work.

Lisa Young

Lisa Young, a parent with three children: two who have graduated from Crocker, gone on to Brewer, Tech and a fifth grader at Crocker, addressed the Board. She said that she is not here tonight to advocate for her family but for the neighbors and the people who live on the 3500-3600-3700 blocks of Lakeshore, which she believes were mistaken excluded from both options 1 and 2. She said families on those blocks of Lakeshore have a history of sending children to Crocker. She said she was here tonight on behalf of friends and immediate neighbors to ask that the Board amend the current Crocker boundaries proposal to fix what appears to be an error in address selection.

Young said that she has worked with Director Kakishiba to make the unofficial Lakeshore boundary official for over a decade; that she has had many meetings with him. She noted that she personally has had kids in Crocker for 16 years, so she has historical knowledge about the boundaries and admittance policy. Young said, consequently, the Board has directed the staff to consider remedies "redrawing the attendance area boundaries up to and including Lakeshore Avenue." She said it was the understanding of Director Kakishiba as well as members of the Long Range Planning Committee, that she spoke with, that all of the addresses on Lakeshore were included in the resulting staff recommendation. She but unfortunately and to the surprise of all involved in the process on the named blocks on Lakeshore were surprised when notification was received from Principal Ryan, with the link to the map, to surprise that the specific addresses were excluded.

Young said there are nine single family homes that are nine homes boarding Mandana Plaza Park and eight homes directly to the north of the park that have been excluded. She said she believes this is an error because the map that is including in the proposal – Board receive – is mislabel as a parking lot.

Young, having acknowledge the sounding of buzzer indicating that her speaking time had expired, and in concluding stated "We have a long history on those blocks of Lakeshore, of being committed to this school [Crocker Highlands]. She said to come this far and then at this late date to be excluded seems like cruel blow." She thanked the Board for the time.

Irene Lee

Irene Lee, mother of a kindergartener at Crocker Highland Elementary, addressed the Board and staff.

Lee said that she was here to support her neighbors. She said her street has first time kindergarteners entering in 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016, including a family who moved in two months ago, from San Francisco with a four year old and a two year old, all intending to go to Crocker Highlands Elementary.

Lee said her family moved into the original Crocker Highlands boundary back in 2008 in order to send children to neighborhood public school. She said it was done with very

personal and financial considerations in mind. In 2011, she understood that the kindergarten class was filled to capacity with neighborhood children; that there was some concern as she reentered the options process for 2012. Lee said that numbers from this past year, show that children from the original boundary would have filled the entire kindergarten class w/o the exception adding the additional kindergarten class, which was a temporary measure.

Lee said she thinks the logical assumption to be made, in our growing neighborhood, is that for future years the kindergarten class will continue to be at capacity or oversubscribed. Of all of the schools to be impacted by the Lakeview closure, said Lee, it appears that Crocker is the only school that was already at capacity with neighborhood children. She said the decision to expand the boundary last year blindsided many families and some of those families ended up choosing not to stay in District schools even though their original intention was to go to public school. Lee said, in the end, it should not be this difficult for families; its not fair for people who move into a neighborhood and not be able to go to their neighborhood school. Lee requested the Board to make the common sense decision which will be to approve proposal 2. She said it might not be the ultimate proposal but she believes it is a common sense proposal. She thanked the Board for the time.

Corrine Karp

Corrine Karp, mother of a four year and a two year old addressed the Board. Karp said that she bought her house on Walavista in the Crocker Neighborhood just over a year ago. She said that she bought there very intentionally; want to go closer to Crocker. Karp said shortly after moving in, she found the District lines had been moved. She said the rug was sort of pulled out from under her and suddenly what almost seemed like a certain thing was no longer. She said her family would no longer be or less likely to be going to the school that is three blocks away from her home; as will her friends and neighbors., whom she is just getting to know. She said it was much more likely that she would be going someplace else.

Karp said she would not repeat what others have said so elegantly but just point out there is no bad guy here. She said people that disagree with the decision frequently include in their decision something about Crocker neighborhood either being elitist or being some sort of shame: "no you guys do not really walk your kids to school; you are not really all the community that you say you are." She said she thinks just as much as the data presented by the Board as well as the CLPC supports the fact that Crocker is going to be oversubscribed if version 2 is not selected. She said the fact that pretty much everyone here is not impacted by the decision is really strong evidence that Crocker is a community; a strong community; a gem within Oakland and to make any decision, voting for option 2, or at the very lease option 1, is to sort of to take that away and would be a detriment to the community as a whole for all of Oakland. She thanked the Board for the time.

Jonathan Essner

Jonathan Essner, resident of Kenmore Avenue and father of a two year old, and a – 3 month old (expecting a boy in April) addressed the Board. He said if you are taking data for a Census "we are done after this. No more." He said that he is on one of the impacted streets between Lakeshore and Grand Avenue. Essner said he is pleased to say he remained in the Crocker attendance area only because he has friends who live in the community – college friends – who have children same age as his two year old daughter, and he had looked forward or had hoped that they would be in the same school in three years time from now.

Essner said he has been involved in the process, and watching it closely since December 2011, participated in community meetings; Board meetings here and spoken at some of them; organized neighborhood. He said there are forty (40) homes, forty addresses on

Kenmore Avenue, five of which have children 0-4 and six children who are all 0-4. He said he has spoken to all the households and all of them said if afforded a good school option in OUSD none of the families will move and leave OUSD. But if not afforded a good school option, every family will be interested at looking at other options, including moving out of the area to enroll children in another school. He said that is how important schools are to the neighborhood, families and parents behind him.

Esssner said of the proposals, he commends the Board for an excellent set of options. He said proposal 1 is very good. He understands the rationale, from the folks behind him, for proposal 2. He said both are excellent options for the affected families in the neighborhood. He thanked the Board for the consideration.

Judy Cain

Judy Cain, at the outset Thanked the Board for bringing the meeting to this beautiful building [the LaEscuelita Education Center]; that she did not know it existed. It is a privilege to be here and that Oakland has such wonderful architecture.

Cain said the oversubscription situation has been something of a journey for her. She said that she has learned more about how OUSD works, operates, the interaction between the community and staff has been wonderful to see, how receptive the Board members are. It is very enlightening and very heartening. She said she wanted to specifically acknowledge Director Yee. She said one of the positive outcomes of voting for revision 2, she said, is that it will do a lot; a long way to restoring confidence in the District's ability to do accurate forecasting. She said that in order to have a strong public school system, the public needs to have confidence in all schools. She said that she really listened to Director Jody London back in November when she said think about Piedmont Avenue.

Cain said that she has been thinking a lot about Piedmont Avenue. She said she has called the principal twice; asked for an appointment to tour the school; walked to the school from Fairbanks; timed it to see how long it takes; because she feels like there are so many positive things about all the schools here and it is her job, as a real estate agent, to inform the public about how good Oakland Public Schools are and that they should not just rush out and move to Moraga; take off and leave the area once their child turns 10 years old. Cain said there is a lot of positive stuff going on and she is happy that the Board is listening to the Community. She thanked Board for time.

Jeremy Branson

Jeremy Branson stated that he attended Crocker Highland Elementary School as did all of his brothers; McChesney Jr. High and graduated Skyline in 1992; went to UC Berkeley and pretty much has stayed in the community. He said he has his own business and is raising a family. Branson said he and his wife moved into what they think of as the Crocker Highlands area; apparently they are in the disputed triangle of doom – Walker Avenue. He said that he does not know if that is actually true. He said they like to be close to restaurants and shop at the same places as the rest of the Crocker Community.

Branson said that he is not making his statement as a challenge as to "what they are saying." He said that he would not want Crocker to be overcrowded either. It would not be good for his two year old child. He said, we kind of feel like ... Where was the Superintendent coming to our community since we are in the disputed area and asking us what we wanted to do? What our feelings were? What sort of ideas. He said certainly when growing up he knew kids that went to Cleveland. He understands it's a good school but today he has no idea because that was 30 years ago, maybe more. He said they would like some information. He said he feels like this whole thing has been a giant train leaving the station; steam roller, if you will. He said in his area they are not as organized as are

some of the other parents although his values and ideas are certainly in the same line: we want to put our kids in good schools; there to be good options. He said his son is only two so he has a few years to think about it. He said it is true, if he does not feel like there is a satisfactory solution here, or really some consistency, some way to decide what we are going to do, we have to move and find a school that is going to be suitable. He said that is not what he wants. He said he went to Oakland Public Schools. He believes that he is a fine example of what can be done here and things were pretty violent back in the late eighties and nineties. He said he survived.

Branson said that he hopes that he can advocate for option 1; that includes his street. He said that he knows that some people are asking for amendments to include Walker Avenue between Mandana and Lake Park. He thanked the Board for listening.

President Kakishiba stated that he neglected to acknowledge whether Director Dobbins was on the phone [as was noticed.] Director Dobbins answered that he was out in beautiful Baltimore enjoying all of the conversation and ready to participate in the meeting.

President Kakishiba closed the Public Hearing at 7:12 P.M.

At the conclusion of the Public Hearing, adoption of version 2, was moved by Presdient Kakishiba, seconded by Director Dobbins; opened for debate by President Kakishiba.

Gary Yee

Director Yee said that he needed clarification. [Does] a vote opposed to option 2 then make the item still amenable to item 1 in case there are Board members who prefer version 1 to version 2. What is the parlimentary procedure for having that discussion. Yee said his question is for a point of clarification before he further comments.

President Kakishbia asked Secretary Rakestraw, the Parlimentarian.

Rakestraw said the Board must make some parlimentary disposition of the motion pending on the floor currently. He advised that the Board may approve it or not or table it.

Yee said that his question is now that it is moved, seconded Option 2; if some members of the Board wish to propose an amendment to include option 1 then the parlimentary procedure would be to vote on that as a friendly amendment? And then vote it down and then proceed with ...

Rakestraw said that as he understands what Director Yee had stated is ... that an amendment could be done but those proposals are opposites, in my opinon, so he recommend that the Board do a disposistive disposition on the pending proposal before considering any alternative.

Yee said that he just wanted to make it clear to the public that if in fact the Board decides to vote down option 2 it is not necessary the case that the Board has voted the entire resolution.

Rakestraw stated that a member of the Board would have to make a motion to go to an alternative solution. Rakestraw said staff had proposed two proposals and the Board now has a specific proposal pending before it which is labeled as version 2. If version 2 for some reason is not adopted, you may have the option of considering the alternative but first you must dispositively dispose of the current motion.

Yee said "exactly" and the second item, which is a point of clarification, is several of the Speaker's proposed an amendment to both versions 1 and 2. For that amendment to be

considered one or more Board members would have to propose that as a friendly amendment to either version 1 or version 2.

Rakestraw replied "that is correct" [friendly or not]."

Yee continuing said he just wanted the public to know that is the parlimentary procedure that the Board will be undertaking on the current item.

He said that the raising of the parlimentary questions does not count against his 5 minutes debate time because he probably will need it.

Yee said his comments are: first of all, he thanks the pareents who came. He said as he stated in the beginning the responsibility of Board members is to look after - to be Trustees of the entire District. He said that he does not actually expect parents of individual -- who come to these meetings to consider anything but the best interest of their own children and their own neighborhood. HE said that his comments earlier were not a disparagement of the prospective parents take but only a reminder to his colleagues and to himself of his responsibilities as Trustee of the whole District.

Secondly, Yee stated that he appreciated one of the last comments from the person who spoke about Skyline and so forth. He said he was amused at the time because the Speaker is probably a peer of his children who went the same route at Cleveland Elementary School. Yee said that is one of the reasons that he feels so strongly about the power of elementary schools in particulary; the value of a neighborhood's prospective; that is why in the late eighties or early nineties - late nineties, early two thousands - that he and Director Dobbins worked on the boundaries and the options policy to look at focusing on a restatement of neighborhood over choice, which had been the model that had been in place for many years.

Yee said that he wishes to restate his interests and beliefs that neighborhood schools are important. Yee said that he also knows that there is a big difference in the days when his children when to school, most kids walked to school by themselves and our current state of affairs are most children are driven to school - not necessarily in their own neighborhoods because of the availability of transportation and desire of choice. Yee said he "gets all of that."

Yee said the decision that he is supporting, version 2, is because he was very clear that he expected his staff - the Superintendent and his staff - Mr. Montes de Oca - to exercise due diligence around his values not necessarily the parents here. He said that he expects that equity, justice and fairness be folded into any decision that comes before him as a Board member. Yee said that is why he made the pointed comments to Mr. de Oca that he did. He said that he feels Mr. de Oca and the Superintendent rightfully said under those standards that version 2, option 2 was the best decision.

Yee said, finally, you can see how difficult boundary changes are to any community. He said to those members of the community who believe that the Board should revisit boundaries every year or every two years, he would say if you review the school policy we clearly state that lottery, not boundary changes, is the way, in general, we handle these kinds of oversubscriptions which do not come randomly but do happen from time to time.

Yee said that his most important standard is that all of the schools we have are of sufficient quality that as he as a Board member can stand behind the assignment of kids to those schools. With respect to Cleveland School, said Yee, he has two grand children come up - ages 3 and 1 - and he fully expects them to go to their neighborhood school - Cleveland. Yee asked but if Cleveland School should be oversubscribed because of option 1 or option 2, will he come back to the Board and demand that the boundary be changed. He said,

"No." He said that he will accept the lottery decision for his chid and the choice decisions that are in place now for his grand children.

Yee said that he is entering into this process sort of dragged, kicking and screaming because the boundaries that were proposed and adopted by the Board were based upon a decision that the Board made, i.e., that is the closure and reutilization of some of the District's buildings; that is the reason he is supporting any boundary change in this circumstance because the boundary decisions and the oversubscriptions were the results of a decision he made as a Board member. And that is the reason, Yee, again stated, that he is supporting version 2 of this particular item.

President Kakishiba asked his other colleagues if there were additional comments.

Jody London

Director Jody London thanked the public for its comments. London stated that she had a couple of questions for Mr. Montes de Oca: London stated that it is her understanding that when the District draws a boundary line it goes down the middle of the street. She asked if he was aware of situations where the District takes both sides of street and the houses behind would go to a different school?

Montes responded that the vast majority of the attendance boundary lines in the District is drawn down what is called "the center line." He said there are instances in some cases where the attendance boundary may meander across properties; that there may be some discrepancies within a single property; that being said, the vast majority are through the street center line.

London asked if it is correct that until this school year the boundary for Crocker Highlands in prior years has not gone all the way down to Lakeshore in every instance. Is that correct?

Montes further responded that the historical Crocker Highlands attendance boundary that was in place prior to the closure of Lakeview Elementary had a small section of Lakeshore Avenue that was a part of the Crocker Highlands attendance area and based on versions 1 and 2 that same section remains a part of the Crocker Highlands attendance area.

London said that in reviewing all of the presentations on the issue, she is kind of struggling with the proposal 2 and the impact of it on Cleveland and how many more kids would go to Cleveland because when the Board saw option 1 a month ago it did not look to her like Crocker was going to be oversubscribed under option 1. She said it also looked to her that the proximity – she has a preference for option 1 -she is trying to understand ... the staff's preference/recommendation for option 2 and what changed in the staff analysis.

Montes clarifying stated the rational for creating option 2 was "in service of the Board's interest in considering continued growth at Crocker Highland's Elementary and in service of that interest version 2 supports that." It is not necessarily a staff preference, said Montes, it simply supports that particular interest. He said Superintendent and staff are actually making a recommendation to the Board of either version 1 or version 2 at its discretion.

London thanked Montes for his responses.

President Kakishiba asked Director Dobbins if he had questions. He responded, "No. the discussion is great."

President Kakishiba then called the question, resulting in option 2 being adopted 5-2 as reflected herein.

In GENERAL

President Kakishiba, at the outset, noted that the Board has 20 Public Hearings for Waiver Requests to the California Department of Education [State Board of Education] for matters related to the Quality Education Investment Act. He said what would be helpful is the Superintendent making a presentation framing what the issues are in all 20 different waiver requests, with the Board members asking any clarifying questions and then open up each hearing and take action.

Superintendent Smith stated that Mr. Montes de Oca will lead the presentation and considering the way President Kakishiba has introduced the matter, so staff understands, each hearing will open, any clarifying questions will be asked about this first one and move in succession through the following nineteen.

Montes stated the Quality Education Investment Act (QEIA) is a result of the settlement between then Governor Schwarzenegger and the California Teachers Association [CTA, et al v. Schwarzenegger. et al] aimed at boosting student achievement in the lowest performing schools. In May 2007, said Montes, then State Superintendent of Public Instruction Jack O'Connell announced 488 low performing schools that had been selected to receive QEIA funding.

Montes said at that time the District had 19 schools identified. Since that time two (2) QEIA schools have ceased to operate and four (4) schools have exited the QEIA Program. The District currently has thirteen (13) QEIA funded schools: four (4) middle schools and nine (9) elementary schools.

QEIA schools, said Montes, have demonstrated meaningful to significant growth in academic achievement overall as a result of implementing the various strategies outlined in the QEIA Program. Beginning in 2011-12, last year, QEIA non-compliance reported for schools has been determined to be correctible under the State's General Education Waiver

Process.

Montes said that in an effort to insure maintenance of funds for 2013-2014 School Year, the District must seek a General Waiver for specific schools from the State Board of Education . QEIA funding, said Montes, is scheduled to "sunset" at the end of the 2014-2015 School Year. Because of the state level education funding crisis, QEIA does not adequately provide, said Montes, for the cost of the original class size targets established for many QEIA Schools. Thus the California Department of Education (CDE) and the State Board of Education (SBOE), said Montes, have set revised class size targets for which they consider recommending continued QEIA funding. Montes said, however, because these new targets set by the State are not set forth in the QEIA statute, a General Waiver is required. What this means, said Montes, is that waivers have become a part of the fabric of how QEIA funding will likely continue to contribute significantly to the academic gains for designated schools.

Montes said last year over one hundred forty (140) QEIA Waivers were submitted to the State for approval. This year almost 100 waivers have already been submitted to the State Board of Education for consideration from districts throughout California. He said District staff has generated a waiver for each school based on class size waiver needs or in some cases, a compliance issue related to Teacher Experience Index requirements, or Highly Qualified Teacher requirements.

Montes said if the Board approves the waivers, this evening, for submission to the State, District staff along with representatives from identified schools, will attend the State Board of Education meetings in which these are scheduled for consideration to advocate for approval, likely March or April. In the meantime, staff is working in a differentiated manner with school sites, with the Executive Officers, with the Fiscal and Human Resources Department to develop alternative budgeting plans for the 2013-14 School Year in light of the possible elimination of these funds should a Waiver for a given school not be approved [by SBOE]. He said all QEIA schools have been in dialogue since last year that QEIA remains a tentative funding source which sunsets in 2014-15. As a results, Montes said, many sites have already initiated planning for the potential absence of QEIA funds.

Montes said staff is requesting the Board to approve the individual Waivers presented here to be submitted to the California Department of Education for consideration by the State Board of Education in order to maintain QEIA funding for individual schools for the 2013-2014 School Year. Montes offered to answer questions about specific schools or aspects of the waivers.

President Kakishiba asked his colleagues if there are questions for Mr. Montes de Oca.

Jody London

Director Jody London said the Board had been through this process recently; that some QEIA Waivers were submitted last year. She asked did all get approved? Montes said all of last year's submitted QEIA Waivers were approved. Great, said London. Thank you.

President Kakishiba hearing no further questions from his colleagues, opened the first and each subsequent public hearing.

The individual General Waiver Pubic Hearing particulars are below:

Bernadette Breen, said she is here to read the OEAs position on the Waivers that you are submitting to the State and a teacher at Brookfield School, one of the school's that is seeking a waiver as well. She read the following:

Dear President Kakishiba and OUSD School Board Directors:

The Oakland Education Association supports the submission of QEIA Waiver requests to the California State Board of Education for the School Year 2011-2012. The money provided by the QEIA Grants support our most needy students by reducing class sizes and assuring qualified and experienced teachers are in our most needy schools. This support has been critical to the improvement of those school site plans, programs and outcomes. OUSD can be commended for its committment to lower class sizes and its struggle to maintain lower class sizes in the primary grades District-wide long after resources from the state proved insufficient to support them. The OEA will work with OUSD to secure the funds -national, state and local - to provide lower class sizes for all Oakland students. In the meantime, maintaining class sizes that can continue to support increase individualization, active learning experiences and greater social and emotional security for our most vunerable students is a primary concern.

The majority of the Waivers clearly demonstrate a good faith effort to closely approximate their goals of class size and teacher quality and experience. Both the District and the state shoudl support these efforts of these schools. The OEA urges the OUSD School Board assure that QEIA Schools are being managed and monitored in the current school year to prevent so many waiver requests next year. We cannot afford to put this resource in jeopardy again. A statement of positive intent on how OUSD will adhere to QEIA goals and hold administrators responsible for the maintenance of those goals now and in the future should only help with the current requests.

Ms. Breen noting that she has 47 seconds of Speaker's time left stated she would like to comment about her experience of working at QEIA School for the last seven years - since 2007. She said when QEIA started we had some years to get ready for it before having to be completely compliant. She said it seems like with all those preparatory years we should be completely compliant every year instead of having to struggel to figure out how many teachers are needed and how many combination classes are to be made to keep school numbers down. She said she knows at her school we are not in compliance with the QEIA requirements right now, as are many of the schools. She said she really does urge the OUSD staff to try to alleviate that problem in the future and especially in this year or we are going to have to be asking for waivers again. She thanked the Board for the time.

Jim Mordecai

Jim Mordecai, speaking as an individual, said that he does not agree with the OEAs position on QEIA. He said each school has to be judged separately. The QEIA situation, said Mordecai, first of all this money is Propositiion 98 money that was supposed to come to this District, there was a lawsuit and this is the settlement of the lawsuit. The money was suppose to be \$2.7 billion dollars that would be used for the lowest performing schools,

reduce class size, get experienced teachers in the lowest performing schools, that sort of thing, said Mordecai. It was suppose to be an incentive, he said. He said what he heard the administration say is that "Well you know it is just proforma. We are just going to go to the state and we will get waived. We do not really have to pay attention to low class size." He said seven years; that the District had three years to get its act together; up to seven vears to get the act together. He said some of these schools are just ridiculously not doing it. There is also the issue of the principal wanting to cap the enrollment because they want to make their QEIA goals, said Mordecai. Don't worry about it HR says, we will get a Waiver, said Mordecai. This is mismanagement, said Mordecai. He said Los Angeles Unified has 100 QEIA Schools: 15 out of the 100 are falling down, not making making it; most of those because their test scores are screwed up; not because they could not get experienced teachers at the schools. He said, the District "just screwed up" and "screwed up" and "screwed up" the QEIA funding because you do not make it and it really makes a difference in some of these schools. He said - Acorn Woodland has two parts: an expereinced one. He said there is absolutely no excuse, in seven years, why you cannot get the experienced teachers. He said several teachers retired. He said the District's system is messed up. He asked, "You are going to tell me there are no teachers more than 6.4 years of expereience taht you could have hired on at Acorn Woodland?" He said "No. There is just no excuse for that." He said this is an example of disfunction in this District; it is a stain on the District the way this has been handled. Mordecai stated that he said the same thing last year and you are doing the same thing this year. It does not change, said Mordecai.

President Kakishiba closed the Public Hearing for Legislative File No. 13-0011, Class Size Reduction Targets for Acorn Woodland Elementary School at 7:37 P.M.

Director Jody London moved adoption of Waiver Request, seconded by Vice President Hinton Hodge, who then had a question during debate:

Vice President Jumoke Hinton Hodge

Jumoke Hinton Hodge, VP, asked Montes de Oca to clarifiy, distinguish for her the distinction with Acorn Woodland coming twice: first around Class Size Reduction Targets and then Teacher Experience Index Average (upcoming Legislative File No. 13-0012). Montes responding said the Class Size Redudtion Waiver is specific to instances where the specific target that has been set for the school in a particular grade level may have been surpassed but is still within the targets that are set by the State for consideration of a Waiver. In the instance for Teacher Experience Index, said Montes, he said the school has met that target year over year over year for the duration of the QEIA program but because there is annual change in teaching staff at every single school site a given instance may occur the composition of the staff may differ. In the upcoming particular instance Legislative File No. 13-0012) the variation is a set of .10ths of a year, based on Special Education Staff hiring, which is a high need area for school sites and is often conduct in a process that is separate from General Education Teacher assignments. Montes further said the addition of that Special Education Teaching staff brough the school a set of .10ths of a eyar below what the target should have otherwise been.

Montes further stated that an analysis completed today of the class sizes of all of the District's Elemenary Schools and the middle schools indicates the Disrict's elementary schools that have the lowest class sizes in the District are entirely QEIA Schools. The only one that is not is a former QEIA School up until last year and for middle schools three out of the four are the lowest class size middle schools in the District, said Montes. One out of the four is Urban Promise, which is about at the middle, said Montes, and nevertheless one of the highest performing middle schools serving Latino students in the District.

Hodge, during a follow up question, stating that she is a visual person, asked if the data

was embedded in one of the reports. She said that it is important for Board members to have a breath of how District is doing, where doing very well and as we think about Class Size Reduction and Teacher Ratios there are actually places where District is doing the work and holding to smaller class sizes, and improvement, more importantly.

Montes, responding, said he can provide to the Board the staff analysis on Class Size Reduction across the District which also includes the minimums and maximums for each school site.

If you took the time Board members to actually read what is written, the principal is essentially saying they do not like the Class Size Reduction Targets; they do not want to follow the Class Size Reduction Targets, so they are waiting for a waiver. Mordecai said the District now has 13 schools that are in QEIA that is 100% QEIA schools. They are all not the same. For some of the schools it is reasonable to grant the Waivers but the Board cannot distinguish one from the other because the Board has not read the materials, said Mordecai. He said the Board has no idea; that you are just voting and nodding. If staff says it, ok you will rubber stamp it, said Mordecai, teacher experience was last time. He said you have brand new labor. They have it again. Mordecai said the District's Human Resources Department and the principal at Manzanita Community could not get together and get the staffing up from last year to this year, so there is 6.4 years of experienced staff. He said it is known that low performing schools need a balance in experienced teachers but "No" your administration cannot get its act together. They have 20.4 target; they want to go up to 22.7 that is a 10% against state funding. Third grade, 20.44, they want to go up to 22.8 that is a 10% reduction of state funding for lower class size; 4th grade 18.33 wants to go to 22.4. This school is not managing like other schools ... But it's all the same for you. You just sit

there and say "Yes" to the staff. You are not prepared to say "No." Continue, said Mordecai.

President took up Legislative File No. 13-0066, sponsored by Director London.

President Kakishiba, having received a motion and second on the matter, recognized Director Jody London to lead the discussion.

Jody London

Director Jody London said those of you who were at the City Inauguration on Monday heard her talk about this a little. She said in November the voters approved Proposition 39, which closes a corporate tax loophole, that is expected to bring about \$1 billion a year to California. For the first five years the tax is in effect \$550 million is to be directed toward schools and local governments for the purpose of energy efficiency, clean energy and job creation. She said there are already three bills introduced in the Legislature around how to actually allocate the money, because the Proposition did not say how to allocate the money. She said one of the things that she has seen lacking in the District's energy management is the ability to actually manage energy usage. It is something that most school districts don't have.

London said that in Alameda County we have been piloting a program where the County Office of Education provides those energy management services, such as looking at the energy usage and all of our buildings and figure out where we have higher or lower usage. If we had that capability it would allow Deputy Superintendent Hal to be able to say, even last night, for example or two nights ago "Gee water usage seems to be going out of control at the Administration Building, what is going on there?"[Referencing the Administration Building flooding]. We don't have that ability right now, said London. It is something that most school districts don't have.

London said she would like the District to be able to advocate as the debate heats up - this is turning into a very big issue in Sacramento, lots of people coming to the table. She said that the proposal crafted would take about \$32 million per year from the \$550 million and direct it toward County Offices of Education, because those offices have answers that we already know, work with, to provide this energy management capability. We could pool our resources with other districts and not be required to pull out of our own General Fund an additional staff person. She said that is what the issues are and she is happy to take guestions or discuss it.

London said she would like to see if Mr. White has anything to say because he has thought about it a lot as well particularly because he plays a leadership role in the Coalition for Adequate School Housing, which is a group for school districts that looks at these issues as well.

Timothy White, Associate Superintendent, Facilities Planning and Management, stated that he supports the Resolution offered by Director London. He said the Alameda County Office

of Education has the kind of resources that can be deployed to provide districts with the type of services they need to improve energy efficiency and planning across the district for District to actually net the the greatest possible results in terms of reduction in energy, savings of money to go back to the General Fund. He said he actually applauds this and hopes that it is something that Board approves and can move forward with the County Office of Education.

He said it we learned anything at the close of the year is no school can be lax on safety issues. He said they need to take it seriously not just sign off on it. He says he is not studied it; Point out names and you can't do anything but pass it but he really hopes that board members take it seriously and whatever schools you are responsible for look at the safety plan; see if if they really had involvement always it all done by the principal and never got to involve beyond that. He said involvement is the key to it. He said you need to have everyone aligned on the safety issues at school. It is terribly important, said Mordecai.

He said the 2013 work is looking really good. He said he appreciated the comments of OEA President Gorham.

Superintendent Smith also expressed appreciation to the 153 employees of the Administration Building and their leadership. Smith said people may have followed this in the media. He said in a custodial closet, on Monday Evening, about 10 PM, cleaning out some supplies, and under some water a hose connected to a Faucet was left on, which as the sink filled up, the hose then fell onto the floor and, subsequently, somewhere in the neighborhood of 3000 gallons of water flowed through the fourth floor and began to rain down in the middle of the building.

He said folks have had to be moved and we made a commitment, first, not to disrupt any service to employees, in the sense of, paychecks or payroll. He said Payroll was the first to move. Payroll is up and running. So employees are not going to miss any checks.

Smith said kind of working from Payroll, then to Accounts Payable, then to Human Resources, we're getting everybody relocated. He said we expect to issue a list of relocations by Friday. We have been told by Restoration Management Services and professional services that we are looking at between 3 to 6 weeks to just assess the damage. Smith said, as people know, it is a very old building but the infrastructure - we're talking about ceilings down, floors, walls, all kinds of stuff happened. He said we are responding as fast as we can. He said most of it is about appreciating the folk who just got in - moving stuff and trying to make sure that we maintain services.

Smith said there are other places - schools have taken some staff. He said he appreciates

the flexibility, including this space [LaEscuelita Education Center]. He said this is crisis right out of the gate and people have responded in incredible ways. He expressed "huge appreciations and thank you'."

Smith said we are also looking forward to tomorrow – the Governor's Budget tomorrow. He said there has been a lot of conversation and he appreciates the advocacy up in Sacramento by some folk in the audience; talking with the Governor about the weighted student formula and thinking about changing the way we allocate [money] based on student need rather than just sending money per district, per child. Smith said we actually have to look at the needs of our children and begin to allocate those resources in different ways because children and districts are situated in different ways. He said he looks forward to seeing some movement on that tomorrow. He said he expects to see that and appreciates the advocacy some folks have done so far. He said between now and May we're going to have to continue to rally.

Public Comment

Ben Tapscott

Ben Tapscott said if we look at the API scores, and he's glad to hear the Superintendent talking about reallocation, the myth about charter schools out of the top 30, there are only six charter schools here: 61% of the elementary schools are performing below 350, which is the score. He said if we look at the middle schools, 61% of those middle schools are not performing and when we look at the high schools, 64% of those schools are not performing. He said this is a challenge for reallocation and to bring up the schools on the bottom to an acceptable level so that all of our children will get a quality education. Tapscott said one of the biggest challenges has to be Reading. He said in the paper last week there was an article that indicated children in Africa are learning how to read without a teacher and on an iPad. Tapscott said we need to start thinking about some alternatives to the Reading scores. He said but if you look at charter schools they do not perform that well contrary to what people believe.

Tapscott said the other thing that he is looking at here is the fact that we have 40 charter schools [in the District]. How much rent are these charter schools paying to the District and how is that money being reallocated? He said we also received \$5 million from Congresswoman Barbara Lee. The question also is where is that money and how is it being spent? He said we really need to look at our fiscal side of the house and talk about how we're reallocating funds so the children in lower performing neighborhoods are being brought up to an acceptable level. He said we have a large job there. He said if over half of our kids are below it speaks to the fact that our academics need to be addressed.

Tapscott said the other thing he understands is to retain our teachers. He said they definitely need a raise because a lot of them are doing a hard job and they have not received a raise since 2007. He said we need to look at that aspect.

There were no other Public Speaker Request Cards submitted.

Board Member Comments

Jody London

Director Jody London requested and was granted an opportunity by the Chair to comment on the Superintendent's Report. London thanked the superintendent and the staff for the recent work that had to be performed unexpectedly related to the Administration Building, across the street. She said one of the things that struck her about the building the first time she visited it, there are very faded signs on the building that indicate it does not meet the standards of the California Education Code, and being someone who knows a little bit about building efficiency, it's an incredibly inefficient building. She said she may be leaping ahead of herself, and maybe this is something that she should bring up under new legislative items, but she is ready to have a conversation about whether we sink money into retrofitting that building versus just tearing it down and re-utilizing that space in a way that would be much more efficient and useful, in numerous ways, as Vice President Hodge indicated doing her Report.

President David Kakishiba welcomed Directors James Harris and Rosie Torres, newest members of the Board of Education

James Harris

Director James Harris thanked President Kakishiba for allowing him to make a report. He said, "I report that I am very nervous." Harris said that he is looking forward, as Mr. Hutchinson said, getting to a place where we can communicate; where I can bring back news and information about what is going on in District 7 and that the other six Districts can do the same. He said he is looking to create a better space for communication and a better space to do right by District students by doing right by our teachers.

Harris said there are some exciting opportunities that has been heard so far; that he is looking forward to starting off and working to create a better Oakland.

Roseann Torres

Director Roseann Torres, too, said she is a bit nervous; that she is eager to have been here tonight because it is time to get started; start doing the work. Torres said that she appreciated the comments that were made by the OEA president -wisdom, patience, and knowledge. She agrees that it will take a lot of patience, especially at the beginning, learning this new role as a Board Member.

As a mother, said Torres she is an urgent need to see the changes we want to see in Oakland. We want the City, said Torres, to reflect why we live here; why we love Oakland. Primarily, number one, for her it is the diversity and raising her daughter in this environment. There is no other place, said Torres, that she would rather raise her. Torres, continuing, stated, however, she does want to see an improvement in the schools in her present term; a tangible improvement. She said we need to work together with regard to all the groups that are here; they care about Oakland Public Schools and Oakland's children. She said she is excited to see the groups here - one side; the other side - she is hoping that there can be collaboration, people can see each other's perspective and though we have differences, we also have a lot of commonality. She hopes to see in the four years that we start talking about the things that we have in common across the city; the things that are working; the things that we can improve, so we can get excited instead of just focusing on the broken things, said Torres. She said the broken things are important but we should give ourselves credit and she is looking forward to this "Team," this Board working well together because that is critical; that we communicate as a Board; that we communicate well with our Superintendent in order to accomplish all of the great things that we are set out to do. Inclusion, said Torres, she looks forward to meeting more [people] and getting out to see exactly what is happening at all of her District 5 schools because there is so much more than she knows; than meets the eye from what she knows today.

Jody London

Director Jody London wished everyone a Happy New Year. She thanked people for all their hard work, mentioning that Monday was Inauguration [Day] of reelected and newly elected Board Members. She thanked her constituency for reelecting her; her colleagues for entrusting her with the presidency for 1.5 years and the past two years to be in the Board leadership. It was a great honor, said London, and she is excited not to be in the Board leadership but still working toward the good of the District on a lot of different initiatives.

London mentioned that in December 2012 she had an opportunity to attend the Latino Family Conference. She's expressed sincere thanks to the many people who were involved in the organizing of that conference. It was really a great day and opportunity for Latino Families to come together and learn a lot about how they can be better advocates on behalf of their children and themselves, said London

London announced:

Congratulations to the Superintendent for his Op Ed in today's San Francisco Chronicle and it was her honor to have an Op Ed in the Chronicle over the recent break as well on Proposition 39, something that will be talked about later.

Invited public to tune in this coming Saturday to the radio program This American Life, featuring principals from Claremont Middle School - Ronald and Reginald Richardson.

That on Thursday, January 24 she will be hosting a Town Hall Meeting at Sankofa Academy, at 61st and Shattuck Avenue, from 7 PM to 8:30 PM. featuring Deputy Superintendent Maria Santos talking about the District's Academic Initiatives, including Common Core; Literacy; A-G Requirements. She said as she was campaigning [for reelection to Board] she realized that the work that is being done in the District is not widely enough known by the public, so that it is known beyond the confines of this room.

London welcomed the two new colleagues; stated very happy to have them here and looking forward to great year.

Gary Yee

Director Gary E said he was also very excited to be at the Inauguration celebration, not only the election of the two new Board members but also the new City Council members. He said he was especially impressed with the Inauguration swearing-in of the new City Attorney, Barbara Parker, who demonstrates a lot of firsts in public office in Oakland. He said what really strikes him is the common theme of City Council Members was on safety and his colleagues on the Board speaking of education, especially positive education, positive schooling as intermittently connected to safety. It suggests many ways in which the public lives and policy of the two bodies may be a intersecting, said Yee.

Yee said an immediate outgrowth of that is he and Councilmember Libby Shaft met this morning to discuss having a District 4 level neighborhood meeting. They have tentatively decided that such meeting will be January 26 from 8 AM to Noon at Bret Harte Middle School, looking at ways the City and schools can work together on common interests. He said he believes that most of us know that 80% of the residents of the city do not have kids in schools. So the question, said Yee, is of what interest in a school matters to them? Yee said what is found out, particularly during campaign season, is schools matter to residents whether they've gone to the schools themselves, as the gentleman who came here and talk about Castlemont and have fond memories of the neighboring school; whether they are concerned about safety, graffiti, access to schools for their neighborhood groups and nonprofits and things like swim clubs and so forth.

Yee said the he and Councilmember Shaft talked about the importance of looking at ways their work increases the livability and viability of neighborhoods through the resources of the City and of the school district. He said the Measure J bond initiative provides some opportunities not only to enrich, modernize the school facilities but to improve the quality of life to neighborhoods. He said it is an exciting initiative to start on. Yee thanked former President London for urging City Council members and Board members to get together. The meeting he and Shaft are planning is an outgrowth of that urging. Yee, acknowledging that he was not here for some of the school board meetings in November and December, stated that it had to do with the passing of his mother – Pauline Yee - on November 23. He said not only was she his mother but she was actually an employee of the Oakland Public Schools in the 1970s, 1980s for 20 years. He said she started out as a Noon Supervisor; moved into making roll in District's Central Kitchen; subsequently became a school secretary and finally ended up working in Payroll and Personnel Records. Yee noted she was also involved in the first District school-based health initiative, the first in the state, headed by Dorothy Patterson in the 80s at Fremont High School. Yee said that his mother passed away peacefully; appreciated the kind words from people who worked with her; people who knew her work. He asked at the meeting be adjourned in her memory in respect to her service in the District.

Jumoke Hinton Hodge

Vice President Jumoke Hinton Hodge wished all a Happy New Year. Hinton Hodge said, she, too, is grateful to District 3 voters for allowing her the opportunity to come back. She thanked her colleagues for the opportunity to serve with them. She thanked the new colleagues for their commitment to good service on behalf of young folk.

Hinton Hodge said she had partial announcements, wanting to almost set some intentions for the New Year for herself around District 3 and overall. She said probably the biggest thing is across the street [referring to the flooded out District Administration Building]. She said she didn't quite get the public comment that it was indicative of something that the Board did or did not do. But more importantly, said Hinton-Hodge, for a long time it has been said that it is important that our administrative offices were not going to crumble down around us but is a big challenge for us around us where we put our priorities: teacher salaries, school sites. So often, said Hinton Hodge, we left behind the adults who work on behalf of young people. She said while it is a headache right now for the staff, she puts her sympathy out there for all who are having to deal with unhealthy conditions, even right now in figuring out what to do, the beginning of the year. She said she realizes it is a bit chaotic and hopes that people will have a bit of calm and peace in the midst of all of this. Hinton-Hodge said, nevertheless, it is an opportunity for the District to create and actually develop a meaningful Education Center on behalf of children, educators; even to be super creative around what it looks like to possibly generate revenue. She says she knows that it will be lively, engaged conversations on the road and conversations about how we repair what is across the street.

Hinton Hodge said the second thing is really understanding all of the District's initiatives – the Middle Schools Strategy, STEM. She said, just as her colleagues talk about town hall meetings, she would really like this to be the year where we are putting STEM in the street. Yes, District 3 and West Oakland, but all across the District, said Hodge. It would really be a powerful thing, said Hodge. She said we look at a school like Lazear, which just became charter, talking about the STEM. What does that look like? She said we know that Korematsu is doing a lot of work around technology and blended learning. She said she knows that within the District, amazing things being done around the work. She said one should be thinking about how to showcase ourselves, provide more opportunity in learning for the entire community around STEM would be great.

Hinton Hodge made the following announcements:

There is a grocery store coming to District 3 – Moving Forward Peoples Community Market, an outgrowth of Peoples Grocery, around 2014. She said that the reason she brings this up is because as a District we have attempted to pay attention to the climate of our neighborhoods; looking at whether not kids, and families, have access to fresh and healthy foods.

Another thing that is coming to West Oakland, in the Hoover Neighborhood, said Hinton Hodge, is the West Oakland Youth Center, which reached its 50% mark of construction right before the holidays. Tomorrow at noon, there is an unveiling of a mural, said Hinton Hodge, sponsored by the Attitudinal Healing Connection, through the Mayor of Emeryville, San Pablo Corridor Coalition and some other folks that represent a lot of the young people that were murdered in east and west Oakland that will move around the city.

Alternatives In Action, along with Attitudinal Healing Connection, is doing a lot of work around some parent groups who are beginning to organize themselves. She said she is looking forward to our setting intentions this year, to seeing our parent leaders coming to meetings; coming to school sites sharing out ideas they have around African-American males; how to get healthy foods on campuses

Hinton-Hodge said she is very excited about 2013.

Second Round Speakers – Registered But Not Heard In First 30 Minutes

Lacy Asbill

Lacy Asbill said that she just wanted to welcome the new leadership here at the table joining some of the wonderful dedicated leaders. She said it's really exciting to see and feel some of the new energy at the start of a new year. Asbill said, Representing Moving Forward Education, she said you might have guessed that she was here to continue annoying you about the situation of the 224 continuing high school students this year, who applied to receive tutoring support and were denied.

Asbill, providing a bit of background to those who are new, this year the District saw 365 students a continuation high schools reach out and ask for additional tutoring to help them recover credits and pass the CAHSEE. This year two thirds of those students were not approved even though the District had intended to set aside 200 slots for this high needs population. She said when research was done to determine why the students were not approved the biggest answer was that the students were not approved for Free and Reduced Large and were not qualified as low income; not qualified as low income.

Asbill said that we all know the students are low income whether they are qualified or not; whether their parents filled out the paperwork. Actually to date, Asbiill said, of the 224 students more than 50 have been approved as free and reduced lunch qualified since the October date when their application were reviewed. She said more than 50 students have conflicting duplicate statuses on the Free and Reduced Lunch Computer System, which shows them both approved and not approved. She said these are the kind of little glitches that keep the students from recovering their credits; passing the CAHSEE; being a part of a positive trend in graduation rates in the District.

Asbill said one of the reasons that she comes to the Board tonight is that she thinks that there is an opportunity to fix the problem right now and to set ourselves up for greater success next year. She suggested for this year that there is some additional funding that is coming into the program, from what she has heard, in the next 30 days. If that is the case, said Asbill, she hopes the students would be prioritized at the top of the list for receiving services. She says she certainly has staff available to start working with them and helping them for the next CAHSEE date. The suggestion for the future, said Asbill, is to think about how we can interpret the SCS Regulations which say that students have to be qualified as Low Income. It does not say they have to be on Free and Reduced Lunch. She suggested that District think about another way to qualify students as Low Income, understanding that they are from a population whose parents are not super likely to fill out the very lengethy application form. She said that she has seen a lot of parents at Registration state that they do not know their welfare case number I am not filling this out. Asbill said that she has a Masters Degree and she would have a difficult time filling out the form personally.

Asbill said these students are referred to on campus as the "ghosts." They are 12th-graders; they have completed their credits; they are still showing up at school because they want to graduate but they have to pass the CAHSEE; maybe they are only five points away from passing and English Language Arts or in Math. She said she knows if given the opportunity to send her Mentors to the school sites to help them not only with their academics skills but providing them with some of the social and emotional guidance will help them get through to the next transition point in their lives in which we can really make a difference here in this community. This year and in years to come, as your partner, said Asbill.
